INTERIM SUMMARY

Courts, Corrections and Justice Committee 2022 Interim Summary

The Courts, Corrections and Justice Committee (CCJ) met for a total of 18 days in Santa Fe and Albuquerque during the 2022 interim and heard presentations from state officials and advocates on a wide array of issues ranging from a review of the implementation of House Bill 68 (2022), various ways to address gun violence and drunk driving and a *Kevin S*. settlement update.

At the beginning of the interim, the CCJ added three dates to its interim schedule to focus exclusively on criminal justice reform topics. Those meetings were held on September 1 and December 7-8. Topics discussed included: an update on the Criminal Code rewrite by the New Mexico Sentencing Commission; probation and parole reform; fines and fees reform; corrections oversight; proposed changes to the felony sentencing structure; and a review of the findings of the Senate Memorial 6 (2022) and House Memorial 11 (2022) Task Force regarding prison and jail unification.

In July, the CCJ reviewed the progress of the implementation of House Bill 68 (2022), an omnibus crime bill, had one day devoted to potential ways to address gun violence in New Mexico and received an update from the Corrections Department. In August, the committee discussed bankruptcy reform and affordable housing's connection to crime and heard about cannabis regulation and alcohol issues in the state.

In September, the CCJ received updates from the New Mexico Counties, the Children, Youth and Families Department, the Administrative Office of the Courts, the Public Defender Department and the New Mexico District Attorney Association. During its October meeting, the committee discussed ideas to address gun violence, the Albuquerque Violence Intervention Program, regional water systems and the State Bar of New Mexico and received an update from the attorney general.

At its November meeting, the CCJ discussed modernizing the legislature and law enforcement retention, received an update on the *Kevin S*. settlement and considered legislation for endorsement. The committee endorsed six bills relating to: medical and geriatric parole; payment of fines, fees and costs associated with conviction; creating a crime reduction grant fund; revising rules of data collection; revising judicial salaries; and relocating the Judicial Education Fund to the Administrative Office of the Courts.
