Over the past decade, it seems there is little agreement across the political landscape. In fact, disagreement is perhaps the one thing that most everyone can agree on. Nationally, this is particularly true. An especially heated presidential election cycle tossed gasoline atop an already smoldering heap of partisan rancor at all levels. As the dust from the 2024 election began to settle, whispers across the legislative landscape suggested that the upcoming 2025 session would prove to be as difficult as any in recent memory.

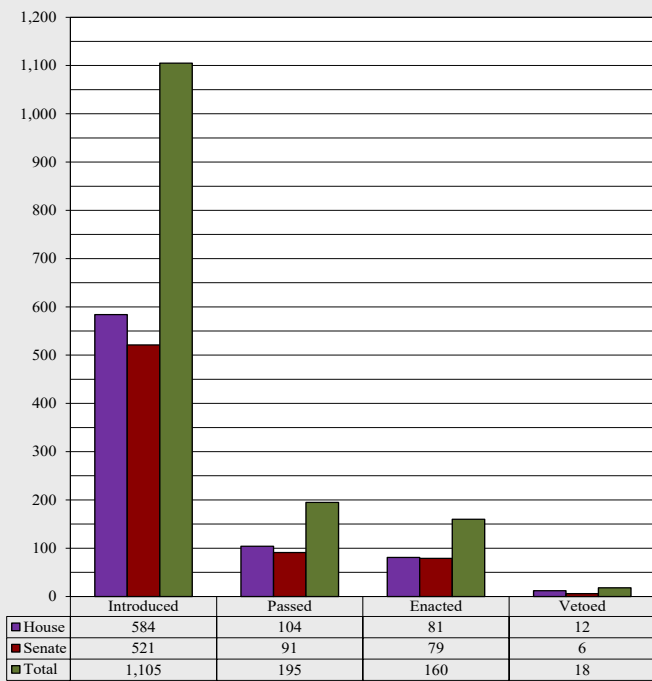
Still, despite several twists and turns, and against the national backdrop of a much rougher style of governing, the New Mexico Legislature set about rolling up its collective sleeves and getting some work done.

As always, a bit of back story is helpful. The 2024 election, particularly for United States president, delivered new levels of hyperbole and outrageous claims. There were also assassination attempts and a post-primary switch in the presidential candidate from the incumbent party. New Mexico's legislative races held a few surprises of their own. After defeating the incumbent in the primary election, one candidate passed away before the general election. Another incumbent, who lost the primary election, attempted to claim residency in another district after the incumbent there passed away just after winning the general election.

With that, the curtain rose on the 2025 legislative session with new faces in new roles, familiar faces in other roles, leadership changes and a vacancy in one chamber that would remain for most of the session. New Mexico's long struggles with crime, homelessness, health care (particularly behavioral health care) and education still loomed as massive challenges for the legislature to address.

A key issue in legislative campaigns in 2024, particularly in the primary election, was the failure of a measure to mandate paid family medical leave to workers in New Mexico. During the 2024 session, the bill died in the House of Representatives. Not coincidentally, most of the members voting against the bill were targeted in the primary election. Most of them lost. At the same time, a number of fairly experienced members of the House moved over to the Senate. That movement, coupled with new leadership for the minority party in both chambers, carried the possibility of settling the fights that punctuated previous sessions in more amicable ways, but also the threat of increased partisan strife.

To complicate matters, in July 2024, the governor called a special session to address the crime and homelessness issues affecting the state. Instead of considering the governor's proposals, the legislature did its best to provide relief to wildfire-stricken areas, then adjourned. Still, the legislature acknowledged that behavioral health was a significant factor in driving the issues identified by the governor, and it agreed to further explore and develop proposals on this topic.

All of this is to note the obvious: beginning on the third Tuesday in January, the legislature had work to do. It responded by introducing 1,105 bills and passing 195, beginning with a package of legislation aimed at addressing New Mexico's behavioral health crisis.

Of course, passing a budget is one of the legislature's principal duties. In 2025, a \$10.7 billion budget was passed, about a \$611 million, or 5.5%, increase over the previous year's budget. Key provisions included \$50 million for public school buildings, \$170 million in additional funding for the

Early Childhood Education and Care Department, 4% pay increases for all state employees and \$78.5 million to lower the cost of health care premiums for state employees.

Two of the other critical pieces of legislation the legislature contemplates each year are a tax package and capital outlay. Unlike in past years, the 2025 tax package passed by the legislature, which would have replaced the working families tax credit with a new earned income tax credit, created tax credits for foster parents and health care practitioners and increased liquor excise taxes, was vetoed in its entirety by the governor. However, a \$1.2 billion capital outlay package did pass and was signed by the governor.

Other significant measures that passed included reform of the State Game Commission and the Department of Game and Fish; a measure allowing school districts to ban the use of mobile phones by students in public schools; training requirements for members of college governing boards and university boards of regents; an enforcement measure for the Cannabis Control Division of the Regulation and Licensing Department; and enabling the use of medical psilocybin.

Measures that failed to pass included: the aforementioned measure requiring businesses to provide employees with paid family medical leave (although this year it died in the Senate); an assault weapons ban; juvenile justice reforms; medical malpractice changes; and an increase on penalties for violations of the Oil and Gas Act.

Other interesting developments, either as the session drew to a close or just after adjournment, included a unanimous override by the House of the governor's veto of a measure allowing school districts to determine their own number of instructional days. The override was not considered by the Senate. Just after the session adjourned, the governor threatened to call a special session to address crime, mostly in response to a shooting in Las Cruces during the final 24 hours of the session. Lastly, in a veto message for a bill declaring the tortilla the official state bread of New Mexico, the governor chided the legislature for spending valuable time passing this bill and similarly frivolous legislation regarding license plates and lowriders.

The *Highlights* is an annual publication of the Legislative Council Service (LCS) that summarizes much, but not all, of the legislative action during each session. The omission of certain legislation or issues should not be interpreted as an indication that those are not important; each is important to someone. Many issues in the *Highlights* defy single-topic categorization, so every effort has been made to organize and cross-reference the contents.

ANIMALS AND LIVESTOCK

Relating to animals and livestock, two bills passed and were signed into law in 2025. To address a shortage of veterinarians in New Mexico, especially for food-animals in underserved areas, the legislature created a new loan repayment program for licensed veterinarians. With a focus on pets, the legislature created an animal welfare program to fund projects that support the welfare of domestic cats and dogs.

Just as in human health care, there is a shortage of veterinarians in New Mexico. **Senate Bill 8 (Chapter 53)**, the Veterinary Medical Loan Repayment Act, is modeled on other loan repayment programs administered by the Higher Education Department, though there are differences. The department will appoint an ongoing Veterinarian Selection Committee, which will select up to 10 qualified applicants per year to participate in the Veterinary Medical Loan Repayment Program. The committee will also designate food-animal veterinarian underserved areas in the state and rank them as to need. Award amounts are based on the location and characteristics of the veterinary practice and the total veterinary medical school indebtedness, and a preference is given to veterinarians who graduated from a post-secondary educational institution that gives preferential enrollment to New Mexico residents. Like other programs, it requires one year of service for one year of loan repayment.

The Animal Welfare Program and the Animal Welfare Program Fund are created by the enactment of **House Appropriations and Finance Committee Substitute for House Bill 113 (Chapter 94)**. The program provides funding for projects that support the welfare of domestic cats and dogs by allowing the Department of Finance and Administration to award grants through a competitive process to a municipality, a county or an Indian nation, tribe or pueblo, or to contract for services with a nonprofit organization, to repair, renovate or operate an animal shelter and purchase equipment and supplies or provide related services. The department is required to submit a report to the Legislative Finance Committee (LFC) on the costs and progress of the funded projects.

APPROPRIATIONS AND FINANCE

"Deceleration but not a contraction" was the story setting the economic and fiscal stage for New Mexico's 2025 legislative session. This basic narrative described the global, national and New Mexico economic conditions, capturing a positive yet cautious outlook that followed the significant post-COVID-19-pandemic recovery. While New Mexico continued to experience growth, particularly from the energy sector, signs of moderation and ongoing structural challenges persisted.

Globally, economic growth was moderate, easing from the rapid post-pandemic recovery phase. Commodity prices, crucial for New Mexico's economy, were influenced by geopolitical tensions and supply adjustments. Trade frictions between the United States and China, marked by new tariffs, introduced uncertainty. In the U.S., the economy remained strong but displayed slowing momentum. Inflation,

once a significant concern, was down substantially, nearing the Federal Reserve's target of 2.4% year-over-year by early 2025. High interest rates persisted as the Federal Reserve maintained a cautious stance, aiming to secure this progress without tipping the economy into recession.

New Mexico employment had fully recovered from pandemic losses, reaching about 4.4% above pre-COVID-19 levels, though growth was forecasted to decelerate sharply in coming years. New Mexico faced ongoing structural challenges, including the nation's fourth-highest rate of children in poverty, fourth-lowest per capita income and fourth-lowest labor force participation rate, averaging just 57.8% in early 2025 compared to the national rate of 62.4%.

The increasing levels of oil and gas production in New Mexico continued to present new opportunities for the state. Direct oil and gas revenues generated more than \$4.9 billion in fiscal year (FY) 2024 and were expected to generate \$4.7 billion in FY 2025 and \$5 billion in FY 2026, with lower prices pulling down continued production volume growth. Before recent changes in the distribution of severance and royalty revenues, these ups and downs would have led the General Fund on a roller coaster ride. Instead, the General Fund's direct oil and gas revenues can be almost assured to remain stable at \$3 billion from FY 2024 through FY 2026. The unstable portions are now directed to the Early Childhood Education and Care Fund and the Severance Tax Permanent Fund, which are designed to operate with these unstable inflows.

As budgets for the 2025 regular session were initially crafted, the August 2024 consensus revenue estimate projected massive growth in General Fund revenue to come to a halt and decrease by 0.2% in FY 2025. It then expected General Fund revenue to increase from \$13 billion in FY 2025 at a moderate pace of 2.8% to reach \$13.4 billion by FY 2026. The August 2024 forecast was based on oil averaging \$76.50 per barrel for FY 2025 and \$71.50 per barrel for FY 2026. It also assumed oil production levels of 735 million barrels in FY 2025 and 790 million barrels in FY 2026.

In December 2024, preliminary FY 2025 General Fund revenues came in higher than expected at \$13.3 billion. The December pre-session estimate projected a drop in oil prices, averaging \$70.50 in FY 2025 and then even lower to \$68.00 in FY 2026; however, it left expectations for oil production levels resilient, with an expected 745 million barrels in FY 2025 and 780 million barrels in FY 2026. After adjusting for these changes, overall expectations for FY 2026 General Fund revenues edged slightly upward to \$13.6 billion.

A great amount of New Mexico's revenues continues to hinge on the single globally priced commodity of crude oil, directly affecting severance and royalty revenues, as well as a substantial share of gross receipts tax and corporate income tax revenues. Although the price of natural gas may increase in the medium term, it is also exposed to extreme price volatility. Three factors now serve to insulate the General Fund from short-term fluctuations in oil and natural gas prices and production uncertainty: 1) high levels of General Fund reserves; 2) distributions of above-trend severance and royalty revenues to

separate trust and permanent funds; and 3) growing, more stable interest earnings flowing into the General Fund. At the end of FY 2024, General Fund reserve balances were \$3.2 billion, or 33% of recurring appropriations, and were estimated to grow to \$3.9 billion, or 38% of recurring appropriations, in FY 2025 before any 2025 legislative actions.

Additionally, before any 2025 legislative actions, the FY 2026 "new money" estimate (defined as FY 2026 recurring revenue less FY 2025 recurring appropriations) was forecast to be \$3.4 billion. This was the fourth year in a row of massive amounts of new money, coming on top of a run of \$1.6 billion, \$3.6 billion and \$3.5 billion in prior years. When taken together with an uninterrupted run at these levels and no negative new money shortfall to claw back from since FY 2018, this run of new money was unprecedented not just in nominal terms, but also as percentages of prior-year appropriations, with amounts of 21%, 43%, 36% and 34% of their prior-year recurring appropriations, respectively. These percentages were the highest by far in the modern budgetary history of New Mexico, with no new money amounts before these four years ever exceeding 20% of prior-year appropriations. As such, a new term began to be used of "total new money", defined in a different way as estimated recurring revenue in FY 2026 less total General Fund appropriations in FY 2025 for a lower total new money figure of \$0.9 billion.

At the mid-session revenue update, there was no official revision to the General Fund forecast by the Consensus Revenue Estimating Group. The update reviewed the most recent revenue and economic data and forecasts. It noted that the direct severance revenues into the General Fund continue to be shielded due to the distributions of oil and gas emergency school tax revenue and federal mineral leasing payments above their five-year averages to the tax stabilization reserve, the Early Childhood Education and Care Fund and now the Severance Tax Permanent Fund. However, there are no insulating measures for gross receipts tax or personal or corporate income tax revenue swings other than large reserves. The update noted that a \$1.00 change in the annual average price of New Mexico's oil has an impact of approximately \$50 million on severance tax and royalty revenues, while a \$0.10 change in the annual average price of New Mexico's natural gas has an impact of approximately \$37 million.

Global trade and stability concerns manifested as the 60-day session moved forward, shifting the economic mood much more toward caution. Departing from relatively predictable trade practices, a 10% tariff on all Chinese imports was imposed on February 1, 2025, which was then doubled to 20% on March 4, and then shortly after the session, but before the April 11 governor's signing deadline, what amounted to a cumulative tariff of 125% was imposed on Chinese goods on April 9. U.S. and global equities fell during and sharply immediately after the session, but more directly important for New Mexico's revenues was the precipitous drop in oil prices. They fell from a high of \$80.73 per barrel the week before the session began to \$66.31 the week before the session ended on March 10. This level had not been seen since the end of 2021, and it lurched even lower the week before the governor's signing

deadline when the West Texas Intermediate oil price reached its lowest point in about four years at \$60.04 per barrel on April 8.

General Appropriation Act

After line-item veto action taken by the governor, the General Appropriation Act of 2025 (GAA), enacted in **House Appropriations and Finance Committee Substitute for House Bills 2 and 3 (Chapter 160, p.v.)**, appropriates \$33.2 billion from all sources for the operation of state government in FY 2026. This includes \$10.7 billion from the General Fund (a year-over-year increase of 5.5%) and \$14.4 billion from the federal government. Special appropriations from FY 2026 nonrecurring revenue account for another \$1.5 billion, and supplemental and deficiency appropriations claim another \$184 million in FY 2025 revenue from all sources (General Fund, federal funds and other state funds).

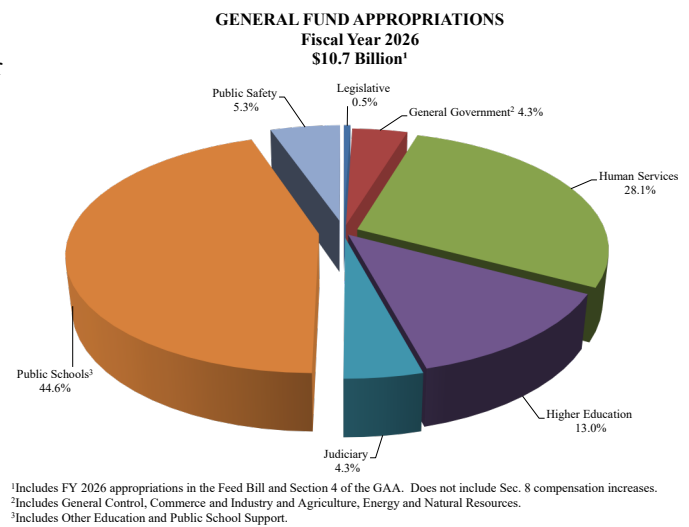
The GAA directs \$13.8 billion in recurring and nonrecurring appropriations and transfers from the General Fund in FY 2025 and FY 2026. The total General Fund effort for the GAA represents a 6.9% increase over last year.

As part of the recurring FY 2026 appropriations, Section 8 of the GAA allocates \$141 million from the General Fund for direct compensation increases, primarily to provide a 4% cost-of-living salary increase for state employees. The Section 8 compensation appropriations include \$17 million for the Public Liability Fund and \$3.8 million to help higher education institutions incorporate the employer share of medical insurance rate increases. In addition to the across-the-board increases, there were two specific increases of \$1.5 million for the state engineer and \$5.7 million for salary increases for judiciary employees earning less than \$75,000 per year.

Most states across the nation fund their public schools with a mixed model relying on local property taxes for a major funding source; however, New Mexico funds its public schools via a centrally funded equalized system. As a result, the "Public School Support" category receives, by far, the most recurring General Fund appropriations of any category in the GAA at \$4.7 billion. This includes \$4.5 billion for the state equalization guarantee distribution, which finances K-12 public education (a 7.8% increase), and \$141 million for the FY 2026 transportation distribution. Additionally, this category includes \$12.8 million for standards-based assessments and a \$20 million General Fund appropriation for the Indian Education Fund for the third year in a row.

The second-largest category of General Fund appropriations is the "Health, Hospitals and Human Services" category, which receives \$3 billion from the General Fund and \$11.8 billion in federal funding. The majority of General Fund appropriations in this category, almost \$2.1 billion, go to the Health Care Authority, and \$1.3 billion from the General Fund and \$8.7 billion in federal funds are allocated for that agency's Medical Assistance Program. Its stated purpose in the GAA is to "provide the necessary resources and information to enable low-income individuals to obtain either free or low-cost healthcare".

Rounding out the top three categories with the highest total of General Fund appropriations, the "Higher Education" category receives \$1.4 billion in recurring funding from the General Fund, which is split among the Higher Education Department and New Mexico's 18 post-secondary educational institutions. Continuing the major change first implemented in 2023, the Opportunity Scholarship Program is again fully funded in the same amount of \$146 million in General Fund appropriations, but this year that amount is combined with a larger \$22 million appropriation from the Higher Education Program Fund.



◆ Other Appropriations and Fund Transfers

2025 marks the sixth consecutive year that General Fund money is allocated to the Department of Transportation in the GAA, with \$190 million appropriated for expenditure beginning in FY 2026, which will revert to the General Fund if unexpended by the end of FY 2028. The appropriation is divided into several parts, with the largest two amounts composed of \$65 million for statewide road maintenance and \$50 million for the Wildlife Corridors Fund. Lesser amounts include \$38 million to the Transportation Project Fund, \$12 million for rural air service enhancement grants and \$8 million for roadway beautification and litter control.

In a continuation of the structure created in the 2024 legislative session, the GAA funds additional special or pilot initiatives with the Government Results and Opportunity Expendable Trust (GRO Trust) and parallel Government Results and Opportunity Program Fund (GRO Fund). The goal of this system is to shift from one-time funding (as found in previous House Bill 2 Junior bills) toward a more medium-term funding program that can be combined with better planning and oversight. Section 9 of the GAA appropriates amounts from the GRO Fund for more than 30 projects across state government, which are identified in [Table 2](#) of [Appendix B](#). Some are for a single year, some for two, but most continue for three years.

In addition, the GAA transfers \$1.5 billion from the General Fund into a number of existing and newly created funds. Like last year, the largest transfer is to the government results and opportunity program, with \$265 million transferred to the GRO Trust and an associated \$140 million to the GRO Fund. Water-related funds receive a major investment, with the Water Project Fund receiving \$200 million and the Strategic Water Supply Fund another \$40 million, and the amount transferred into the Appropriation Contingency Fund tripled from last year to \$150 million. Newly created funds receive large transfers from the General Fund, with the Community Benefit Fund receiving \$210 million and the

Behavioral Health Trust Fund \$100 million. Further details on these new funds are discussed under the "Public Finance" heading on this page.

Feed Bill

House Bill 1 (Chapter 1), known as the "feed bill" because it funds the legislative session, appropriates \$68.75 million from the General Fund and legislative cash balances for the legislative session and for legislative agencies in FY 2025, FY 2026 and beyond. Of that amount, approximately \$11.4 million provides for the operations of the 2025 legislative session, and the remainder supports interim activities and year-round operational costs of the legislative agencies that include the LCS (\$12.2 million); the Legislative Education Study Committee (LESC) (\$1.9 million); the LFC (\$7.5 million); the house and senate chief clerks' offices (\$3.7 and \$3.4 million, respectively, including funding for the leadership offices and leadership staff); district legislative aides and legislative district offices (\$14 million); and the Legislative Information System (\$3.2 million for non-salary expenses). The bill also includes funding of \$35,000 for the Senate Rules Committee's interim expenses. Additionally, the feed bill includes the following nonrecurring appropriations: support for a classified employee salary study undertaken by the LFC (\$750,000); economic analysis software for the LFC (\$350,000); State Capitol building upgrades (\$4 million); ongoing development and design of a legislative processing system (\$500,000); and support of the Legislative Clerks and Secretaries Section of the National Conference of State Legislatures' annual meeting to be held in Santa Fe (\$100,000). An appropriation of \$257,500 for the contractual services of the Capitol Buildings Planning Commission and an appropriation of \$400,000 to the New Mexico Compilation Commission are also included in the bill.

Public Finance

Public finance received a lot of attention this session, as seen in the number of bills introduced pertaining to this topic. A total of eight bills were enacted, four of which create new funds related to providing behavioral health services, supporting the state Medicaid program and addressing climate change issues. Another adjusts the funding sources to the early childhood funds to temporarily send part of the revenue to the new behavioral health and Medicaid funds. Two bills focus on creating funding mechanisms preventing and providing relief from natural disasters, and one bill enacts funding criteria and grant management and oversight requirements for grants of state capital outlay appropriations.

The Behavioral Health Trust Fund and the Behavioral Health Program Fund are created by **Senate Bill 1 (Chapter 2)** to fund behavioral health services and programs. The trust fund is invested by the state investment officer and, beginning in FY 2027, 5% of a five-year average balance of the trust fund will be distributed to the program fund to provide money for mental health and substance abuse treatment, intervention and prevention; infrastructure, technology and workforce supports; matching

funds for federal, local and private money and grants; and implementing regional behavioral health plans. Similarly, **Senate Bill 88 (Chapter 113)** creates the Medicaid Trust Fund and the State-Supported Medicaid Fund. This trust fund is also invested by the state investment officer and, beginning in FY 2029, 5% of a five-year average balance of the trust fund will be distributed to the State-Supported Medicaid Fund to support the state Medicaid program and to match federal funds. In FY 2026 through FY 2029, appropriations may be made from the trust fund if a reduction in federal Medicaid funding will cause a reduction in coverage or benefits.

New funds related to climate change issues include the Community Benefit Fund created by **Senate Bill 48 (Chapter 141)**. Money in this fund is subject to appropriation by the legislature to fund projects that include reducing greenhouse gases; increasing electric grid capacity; increasing electricity from renewable energy resources; reducing the use of combustion engine vehicles through transportation projects; and assessing or reducing the effects of climate change on the natural environment, agricultural production, land and natural resources and human health. The Department of Finance and Administration administers the fund and, in consultation with the Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources Department (EMNRD), is tasked with developing or identifying a data tool to identify communities experiencing disproportionate burdens in climate change, energy, health, housing, legacy pollution, transportation, water and wastewater and workforce development. Another new climate change fund is created in **Senate Bill 83 (Chapter 63)**, the Innovation in State Government Fund, which can be appropriated to state agencies to create master plans and increase agency capacity to achieve net-zero emissions; implement sustainable economic policies; provide technical support to entities applying for grants and other funding that seek to address climate change; and implement, enable or reduce the barriers to implementing climate change policy.

With the success of the Early Childhood Education and Care Fund and its present balance of nearly \$10 billion, **House Bill 71 (Chapter 26)** alters the inflows and outflows of money in the fund. It doubles the minimum annual distribution from that fund to the Early Childhood Education and Care Program Fund from \$250 million to \$500 million and requires reporting on the use of money in the program fund. The bill then halves two of the revenue streams to the Early Childhood Education and Care Fund for FY 2026 through FY 2028. Where formerly 100% of the following transfers went to that fund, for FY 2026 through FY 2028, 50% of the balance of the excess amount above the annual average amount of the Excess Extraction Taxes Suspense Fund after certain transfers will be transferred to the Behavioral Health Trust Fund, and 50% of the money received pursuant to the federal Mineral Leasing Act that exceeds the annual average amount will be distributed to the Medicaid Trust Fund.

With the historic wildfires that have recently ravaged the state, the legislature undertook numerous efforts to prevent and provide relief for such natural disasters. One of these efforts is **Senate Bill 31 (Chapter 157, p.v.)**, which creates the Natural Disaster Loan Program, the Natural Disaster

Revolving Fund and the Federal Reimbursement Revolving Fund. The Natural Disaster Loan Program provides, through the Department of Finance and Administration, zero-interest reimbursable loans to political subdivisions of the state and electric cooperatives that have been approved for funding from the Federal Emergency Management Agency for a federally declared natural disaster. The bill maintains a balance of \$50 million in the Natural Disaster Revolving Fund through 2028 to be used for the loan program and compliance management of programs administered by the Federal Emergency Management Agency that serve as the basis for the loans. The Federal Reimbursement Revolving Fund collects money received by the state for emergency expenditures from the federal government and uses that money to make appropriations for disaster relief after the governor declares an emergency.

In addition to, and in some cases, as a result of the wildfires, areas of the state have experienced damaging flooding. To aid in the recovery from floods, **Senate Tax, Business and Transportation Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 383 (Chapter 24)** provides for the issuance of flood recovery revenue bonds. The bonds can be used for the rebuilding, repairing, replacing and hardening of municipal property that was damaged by a flood. To back the bonds, the bill allows a municipality to impose by ordinance a municipal flood recovery gross receipts tax, the revenue of which must be pledged irrevocably to the payment of the principal of and interest on the bonds.

In 2013, Governor Susana Martinez issued Executive Order 2013-006 establishing uniform funding criteria and grant management and oversight requirements for grants of state capital outlay appropriations. **House Appropriations and Finance Committee Substitute for House Bill 493 (Chapter 154)**, the Public Finance Accountability Act, enacts into law many of those funding criteria and grant management and oversight requirements. In order to qualify for a capital outlay grant: a grantee must have completed an annual audit for one of the past two fiscal years; if a grantee's most recent audit documents material weaknesses or significant deficiencies, the grantee is required to prepare an actionable plan to address the weaknesses; and if a grantee's most recently completed audit is not from either of the two immediate past fiscal years or if the grantee's prior-year audit findings have repeated weaknesses and deficiencies, the granting state agency must determine that another appropriate entity is able and willing to act as fiscal agent for the grantee. Also, the substitute bill contains requirements for grantees that are not required to have annual audits and provisions for a grantee to appeal an agency's determination that a different fiscal agent is needed, and the Department of Finance and Administration is required to establish grant management and oversight requirements. Moreover, the secretary of finance and administration, in consultation with the state auditor, is permitted to waive strict compliance with the act under extenuating circumstances.

New Mexico Finance Authority

Each year, three pieces of legislation are introduced that allow the New Mexico Finance Authority (NMFA) to administer its flagship finance programs and funds. The Public Project Revolving Fund (PPRF) is one mechanism employed by the legislature and administered by the NMFA to provide low-cost financing to state, local and tribal governments to complete public infrastructure projects and to finance the purchase of equipment. As is required by law, the legislature authorized a variety of public projects and water projects around the state through two bills. **Senate Finance Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 115 (Chapter 67)** authorizes the NMFA to make loans from the PPRF to qualified entities for 200 public projects that require a loan of more than \$1 million relating to building, equipment, furniture, machinery, electric, debt refinance, road, street, airport, land acquisition, water, wastewater, water rights, solid waste, public transportation system, parking facility and public recreational facility projects. Similarly, **House Bill 206 (Chapter 35)** authorizes the NMFA to make loans or grants from the Water Project Fund to 62 public entities for 84 qualifying water projects around the state.

Additionally, **House Bill 41 (Chapter 25)** makes appropriations from the PPRF to three funds that are administered by the NMFA. Specifically, this bill appropriates \$6.25 million to the Drinking Water State Revolving Loan Fund to provide state matching funds for federal Safe Drinking Water Act of 1974 projects and to carry out the purposes of the Drinking Water State Revolving Loan Fund Act as well as \$5 million to the Cultural Affairs Facilities Infrastructure Fund and \$2 million to the Local Government Planning Fund to carry out the purposes of those respective funds.

Two bills amending existing financing programs that the NMFA administers passed during the 2025 legislative session. First, **House Bill 240 (Chapter 103)** provides various amendments to the Drinking Water State Revolving Loan Fund Act. Previously, the NMFA was limited to providing loans under that act, but, with the passage of this bill, the NMFA may now provide grants for the construction or rehabilitation of drinking water facilities. Additionally, the bill extends the repayment period requirements for loans made pursuant to that act. The bill also redistributes the duties of the NMFA and the Department of Environment, as they are both tasked with administering certain provisions of the act.

Likewise, **Senate Tax, Business and Transportation Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 175 (Chapter 14)** amends the Child Care Facility Loan Act to allow the Early Childhood Education and Care Department and the NMFA to contract for services with child care providers and employers seeking to create or expand child care programs for their employees. However, these loan contracts are conditioned upon factors reflecting the child care needs of the state, including requiring a provider to be located in a designated child care desert and to provide care to a specified percentage of children who are recipients of a child care assistance program.

In addition to changing existing financing programs of the NMFA, one bill creates a new fund that reflects increasing legislative efforts to shift toward alternative energy sources. The Local Solar Access

Fund is established within the NMFA by **House Bill 128 (Chapter 96)** to provide grants for solar energy systems. The legislation requires the NMFA, in consultation with the EMNRD, to establish rules for the application and approval of solar energy system projects to eligible political subdivisions of the state and Indian nations, tribes and pueblos. Grants from the Local Solar Access Fund will enable eligible entities to plan, design, construct, purchase, install and equip solar energy systems used to power buildings and infrastructure located in New Mexico that are owned and operated by the eligible entities.

Capital Outlay

This year's capital outlay bill, **House Taxation and Revenue Committee Substitute for House Bill 450 (Chapter 159, p.v.)**, appropriates \$1.2 billion in capital outlay project funding for FY 2025 through FY 2029. The bill includes \$798.5 million in General Fund appropriations, \$292 million in severance tax bond projects and nearly \$133 million in appropriations from other state funds for capital projects. The governor vetoed 17 projects totaling almost \$1.3 million in General Fund appropriations, in most instances citing the insufficiency of the appropriations made to execute those projects.

A package of statewide capital outlay projects totaling nearly \$627 million, jointly requested by the legislature and the governor, includes a \$24 million appropriation from the Capital Development Program Fund to the Department of Finance and Administration to provide grants to complete previously funded capital projects. Appropriations of \$40 million each are made in the statewide package to the State Parks Division of the EMNRD to improve state parks, to the Capital Program Fund to construct a firefighter memorial, training facility and wildfire response facility for the Homeland Security and Emergency Management Department in Santa Fe, to the Capital Program Fund to construct a new forensic unit at the New Mexico Behavioral Health Institute at Las Vegas and to the University of New Mexico to construct a humanities and social sciences complex in Albuquerque. The University of New Mexico also receives a \$30 million appropriation in the statewide package for renovations at its School of Medicine and \$25 million to renovate the Health Sciences Center College of Pharmacy. In addition, the EMNRD receives \$16 million to cap abandoned oil and gas wells statewide, the Higher Education Department receives \$20 million to construct a new science, technology, engineering and mathematics institute in Albuquerque and an appropriation of \$14 million is included in the statewide package for Expo New Mexico for a new site acquisition and facility improvements.

House and Senate members and the governor split a total of \$545,580,000 in this year's bill to fund capital outlay projects of their choice. The governor's funding package includes funding for a number of water projects across the state, including \$4 million to extend water lines in Curry County and \$10 million to plan a water reuse treatment plant in Albuquerque. The governor's package also funds a \$7 million affordable housing project in Albuquerque and health initiatives that include \$10 million for a reproductive health clinic in northern New Mexico and \$8 million to construct an acute care hospital in

Valencia County.

This year, the legislature adopted a new method of introducing capital outlay projects that uses the online system developed over the past few years to collect capital outlay project requests. One capital outlay request was introduced this year in each chamber instead of each member introducing an individual capital outlay request. Under the new system, members in both chambers are able to select from the full list of introduced projects as they make their funding choices. The new system gives members earlier access to their funding sheets and additional time to make funding decisions.

A House/Senate Capital Outlay Work Group, a subcommittee of the LFC, retained some of the General Fund capacity available for capital expenditures with the intent of using the funding to help local projects reach their full funding requests. The work group spread \$52.4 million over 94 local projects in the capital outlay bill. Specifics regarding funding by legislators, the governor and the work group are available on the legislature's website at https://www.nmlegis.gov/Legislation/BillFinder/Capital_Outlay.

Anticipating a high volume of funds reverting to the Tribal Infrastructure Project Fund this year from projects previously authorized for the Navajo Nation, provisions are included in this year's capital bill directing the Tribal Infrastructure Board to prioritize applications from the Navajo Nation for projects in San Juan and McKinley counties in FY 2025 and FY 2026.

Senate Finance Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 425 (Chapter 158, p.v.), the capital projects reauthorization bill, reauthorizes 323 prior-year appropriations, with a total of 423 reauthorization requests included in the bill. Projects are reauthorized to extend the time of expenditure, change the administering agency or expand or change the purpose of the original appropriation. The number of requests remains high to reauthorize projects originally authorized during the COVID-19 pandemic, due in part to the complicating issues of business closures and supply chain interruptions. The governor vetoed 97 of the reauthorization requests. In 84% of those cases, the appropriations had not been spent to date, and the governor cited that as the reason for the vetoes. Also, the governor line-item vetoed language in 14 requests, targeting language that split the original appropriations, as well as language that the governor deemed limiting for project execution. In those cases where the reauthorization request is vetoed in its entirety, the provisions of the original appropriation remain intact.

BUSINESS AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Over the past few years, New Mexico's annual recurring revenue has increased to more than \$13 billion, with approximately \$3 billion from oil and gas. Revenue forecasts predict that revenue from oil and gas will taper off in the coming years. Understanding the importance of revenue diversification, the

legislature in 2025 passed substantial legislation to facilitate new and expand existing businesses and economic development.

One such measure is **House Commerce and Economic Development Committee Substitute for House Bill 20 (Chapter 133)**, which aims to enhance innovation and catalyze the growth of key future industries in New Mexico. The legislation creates the Technology and Innovation Division, a Technology Innovation Prize and the Research, Development and Deployment Fund in the Economic Development Department. The new division and concomitant Technology and Innovation Network Advisory Board will be responsible for overseeing and facilitating statewide innovation, specifically through evaluating the state's innovation efforts, identifying and supporting key target sectors and developing a statewide technology and innovation strategic plan. Through the fund and prize, the division will provide funding for eligible projects in key target sectors that advance innovation in the state.

New Mexico may be landlocked, but it shares a valuable border with Mexico, providing a gateway for trade and commerce. One way to maximize this geographical advantage is through trade ports. Enacted in **House Taxation and Revenue Committee Substitute for House Bill 19 (Chapter 86)**, the Trade Ports Development Act provides for the designation of trade port districts and the implementation of trade port projects through public-private partnership agreements. In the bill, "trade port" is defined as "a multimodal system of facilities and services in a given location with the logistical capacity to efficiently manage cargo and enhance national supply chain resiliency by facilitating the movement and redistribution of goods and commodities to other locations". The bill sets forth requirements for public-private partnership agreements and establishes specific criteria for trade port districts and projects that are initially reviewed by the Trade Ports Advisory Committee before being approved or disapproved by the secretary of economic development, subject to final approval by the State Board of Finance. The Trade Ports Development Fund is created for grants and loans for proposed trade port projects, and an annual report regarding trade port districts and projects is required from the secretary of economic development.

In the interest of accelerating business development, the legislature passed **Senate Tax, Business and Transportation Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 169 (Chapter 70)** to anticipate and prepare "shovel-ready" industrial and commercial sites for development on a shortened time frame. The bill enacts the Strategic Economic Development Site Readiness Act to identify and prepare potential economic development sites throughout the state for accelerated business development. The Economic Development Department is authorized, in consultation with the Strategic Economic Development Site Advisory Committee, to enter into agreements with public partners and private partners to study and certify the suitability of proposed economic development sites as strategic economic development sites. Once designated as a strategic economic development site, the secretary of economic development may solicit proposals from public partners and private partners for site pre-development projects that will enhance the readiness of the site, including surveying, engineering, planning and architectural work,

environmental assessments and remediation, public infrastructure improvements, site preparation and government permitting. After considering recommendations by the advisory committee, the secretary may award grants, loans or other funding for the proposed site pre-development projects.

A critical element in making potential economic development sites ready for actual development is the accelerated availability of public utilities, including electricity. **Senate Bill 170 (Chapter 71)** permits, for a limited three-year period through 2028, the use of financial resources from the PPRF for projects without the specific authorization of the legislature. This allows public projects, such as the construction of assets of a long-term capital nature by a qualified entity, to move forward without the necessity of legislation. The term "qualified entity" is amended to include rural electric cooperatives, and the bill allows public utilities through 2035 to recover prudent and reasonable costs incurred for the ongoing development, construction or maintenance of resources for economic development projects that provide incremental capacity or serve incremental load growth within the economic development project's service area. Projects are certified by the Economic Development Department, and the Public Regulation Commission must issue a final order within six months of the date of application.

Lastly, **Senate Judiciary Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 159 (Chapter 119)** facilitates the process for certain owners, operators and businesses to serve alcohol in theaters. Movie theaters that are owned and operated by a New Mexico resident or that are registered as a business in New Mexico and have been in existence for at least one year may be issued a license to serve limited amounts of wine and beer to theater patrons. Such a license is contingent upon approval by the governing body or local option district within which the theater is located.

CHILDREN AND FAMILIES

Following years of abysmal child well-being rankings and oft-publicized troubles within the Children, Youth and Families Department (CYFD), improving the lives of children and families in New Mexico was one of the priorities of the legislature during the 2025 session. As a result, new laws were enacted to: provide oversight of the CYFD and improve the services it provides to children in its custody; revise the protocols for plans of safe care for substance-exposed newborns and their families; create a pilot program to support kinship caregivers raising children; and expedite the confirmation of the parentage of children born through the use of assisted reproductive services.

House Bill 5 (Chapter 13) creates the Office of Child Advocate, which is administratively attached to the Office of the Attorney General (also referred to as the State Department of Justice). With the passage of this legislation, New Mexico joins a majority of states with an entity that provides independent oversight of the child welfare system. Pursuant to the bill, the Office of Child Advocate is

charged with duties that include: reviewing the delivery of services provided by the CYFD to children in its custody; receiving, investigating and attempting to resolve complaints made by or on behalf of a child in custody; monitoring federal, state and local laws, regulations and policies relating to child and family welfare and recommending changes; and providing an annual report of its findings to certain legislative committees and the governor.

In addition, the bill requires the CYFD to promptly report instances of injuries, near fatalities and fatalities and the abuse of children in its custody to the Office of Child Advocate. Additionally, this legislation empowers the attorney general to bring a civil suit against the CYFD, based on a finding by the Office of Child Advocate of a violation of federal or state constitutional rights, reckless disregard of the health and safety of a child or a pattern of conduct or repeated incidents of violating laws and rules relating to child and family welfare. Finally, the bill amends the Children's Code and the Inspection of Public Records Act to require the Office of Child Advocate to protect the confidentiality of information it collects in carrying out its duties.

Senate Judiciary Committee Substitute for Senate Rules Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 42 (Chapter 156) addresses a range of issues applicable to the CYFD, including the implementation of new programs and procedures to better serve New Mexico's children and families as well as requirements for recordkeeping, reporting and protecting the confidentiality of the information that it collects and maintains. Additionally, this legislation requires the Health Care Authority, in consultation with the CYFD, other state agencies, Medicaid managed care organizations and insurers, to promulgate rules for providing services to newborns who show symptoms of prenatal drug exposure and their families, including the development of plans of safe care, that comply with the federal Comprehensive Addiction and Recovery Act of 2016. Another component of the bill is the enactment of the Families First Act, which enacts the federal Family First Prevention Services Act in state statute and directs the CYFD to develop a strategic plan to guide how it will provide services to children who are at risk of entering foster care and their families to enable these children to remain in their homes. The bill outlines the time line and specific criteria the CYFD must follow to formulate the strategic plan, which requires approval by the federal Administration for Children and Families to make the state eligible for federal funding to pay for the foster care prevention services.

New Mexico has the highest rate in the nation of children in kinship care, with 9% of the state's children raised by relatives, compared to a national average of 3%. In 2024, an estimated 40,000 New Mexico children were raised by grandparents or a relative other than their parents, according to the Aging and Long-Term Services Department. To alleviate some of the economic, legal and logistical burdens faced by caregivers, **House Bill 252 (Chapter 131)** establishes the Kinship Caregiver Support Pilot Program in the Aging and Long-Term Services Department. The intent of the three-year pilot program is to support kinship caregivers, a group that includes grandparents, next-of-kin and fictive kin nonrelatives

who share close emotional bonds with children they are raising in the absence of biological parents, and to stabilize and enhance the lives of children in their care. The pilot program will operate in five to seven counties across New Mexico and will serve 50 kinship caregiver participants in each community. Participants will be selected based on eligibility criteria with a focus on household income and the specific needs of the children involved, and the criteria will be developed and implemented by the department, along with program partners that include community organizations, nonprofit organizations and area foundations. The department will also collaborate with the program partners to create a streamlined application process and connect kinship caregivers with essential services, including monthly financial support, legal services for those seeking legal custody or guardianship and referrals to federal, state and local resources.

There are several federal programs that provide cash assistance to children, particularly children of deceased parents. Social security is the most well known. Supplemental security income, more popularly known as SSI, is available for children who are disabled or blind. There are a number of federal retirement systems for which children of deceased federal employees or retirees, including civil servants, railroad employees and military personnel, are eligible. The Federal Benefits for Children in State Custody Act, enacted in **Senate Bill 283 (Chapter 12)**, requires the CYFD to determine any federal benefits a child in CYFD custody is eligible for and apply for those benefits and either act as the child's representative payee or determine an appropriate alternative. The purpose of the act is to ensure that an eligible foster child will receive the accumulated benefits when legal custody is terminated. The CYFD has 60 days after a child enters its custody, and annually thereafter, to determine whether the child is currently receiving or is eligible to receive federal benefits. Also, the CYFD is prohibited from using federal benefits to pay for or reimburse itself for any of the costs of a foster child's care, although the department may use benefits to pay for the foster child's unmet needs beyond what it is obligated, required or has agreed to pay. When the child leaves CYFD custody, the department shall release any remaining funds to the child who is aging out of the system or who is emancipated or to the child's parent or guardian if neither applies. Prior to the release from custody, the CYFD must provide the child with financial literacy and planning tools to assist the child to align conserved benefits with the required transition plan.

Over the years, assisted reproductive services have become more accessible to help people start families. However, when these services are employed, issues regarding parentage can arise. **Senate Bill 417 (Chapter 15)** creates an expedited confirmatory adoption process for parents of children born through assisted reproduction to establish and confirm parentage of the child.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

In the 2025 regular session, 34 joint resolutions proposing amendments to the Constitution of New Mexico were introduced, but only one passed both chambers and will be included on the 2026 general election ballot. The LCS publishes a summary of and arguments for and against proposed amendments to the Constitution of New Mexico prior to any election in which they appear. The next publication, titled *Summary of and Arguments for and Against the Constitutional Amendments Proposed by the Legislature in 2025 and 2026*, will be released by the LCS in the summer of 2026.

Currently, the Constitution of New Mexico provides that if the governor does not sign a bill passed by the legislature and presented to the governor during the last three days of the legislative session, the bill does not become law; this is known as a "pocket veto". Subject to ratification by voters, **House Joint Resolution 2 (C.A. 1)** proposes to amend Article 4, Section 22 of the Constitution of New Mexico to provide that any bill passed by the legislature and presented to the governor during the last three days of a legislative session that is not subsequently signed or vetoed by the governor would become law, thereby eliminating the pocket veto. Furthermore, the veto of a bill in whole or in part would be required to include a substantive explanation of the governor's veto.

CORRECTIONS, COURTS AND CRIMINAL LAW

The legislature placed a major emphasis on corrections, New Mexico courts and changes to criminal laws during the 2025 session, with the work starting during the 2024 interim. The interim Courts, Corrections and Justice Committee added multiple dates to its interim schedule to work on legislation intended to reduce crime in the state. In July 2024, the governor called a special session to focus on public safety, although nothing substantial relating to public safety was passed. However, the work going into the special session was not for waste, as much of what had been discussed culminated in the enactment of House Bill 8, a crime package bill that combines six public safety measures. In addition to this bill, a number of other measures became law, including changes to racketeering and embezzlement crimes, parole and earned meritorious deduction provisions and magistrate courts and magistrate judges.

The most comprehensive piece of the crime package, **House Judiciary Committee Substitute for House Bill 8 (Chapter 4)**, amends statutory criminal competency procedures to allow the courts to be more responsive to the needs of criminal defendants who are believed or found to be not competent to stand trial. While the bill makes several changes to statutory competency procedures, the key changes include the creation of a noncustodial "community-based competency restoration" for nondangerous defendants, an expansion of the list of crimes for which dangerous defendants may be criminally committed and the integration of certain elements of the criminal competency process into civil commitment and assisted outpatient treatment procedures.

Notably, the crime package also includes increases in penalties for felony auto theft and making a shooting threat offenses and provides for sentencing enhancements for the crime of trafficking fentanyl. The new crime of "unlawful possession of a weapon conversion device" is created that aims to ban devices known colloquially as "Glock switches" that could convert semiautomatic firearms to automatic ones. The legislature also incorporated into the bill changes to the procedures for arrests for driving under the influence that allow law enforcement to obtain a warrant to test the blood of a suspect and allow additional types of medical professionals to draw blood for chemical blood tests.

The legislature continued to work on similar issues through the rest of the session. **Senate Judiciary Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 70 (Chapter 128)** expands the definition of "racketeering" in the Racketeering Act to include the crimes of sexual exploitation of children, criminal sexual penetration, criminal sexual contact, dog fighting, cockfighting, bringing contraband into places of imprisonment and human trafficking. Meanwhile, **Senate Bill 155 (Chapter 69)** provides for the aggregation of embezzlement offenses against any one victim in a consecutive 12-month period, which allows prosecutors to combine instances of embezzlement to increase penalties for repeat offenders.

In response to vehicle-related crimes, **House Bill 102 (Chapter 29)** reclassifies homicide by vehicle or great bodily harm by a vehicle as a serious violent offense that may limit the possibility for those convicted to earn meritorious deductions from time served in prison. Under this bill, persons who are convicted of these crimes will have limited eligibility to reduce their prison sentences through good behavior. The bill also ensures that these restrictions extend to parole, maintaining consistent limits on earned time deductions throughout the duration of an offender's sentence.

The legislature also worked on issues regarding corrections, parole and DNA information sharing. To promote strong and constructive relationships between parolees and parole officers, **Senate Bill 375 (Chapter 79)** introduces key reforms to the parole system. The bill supports rehabilitation and successful reintegration by allowing early release for low-risk offenders who consistently meet probation conditions. The bill also removes the financial burden of parole supervision by eliminating associated fees. Additionally, the bill clarifies the process for earning meritorious deductions, ensuring greater transparency and understanding for parolees and parole officers. **House Bill 340 (Chapter 42)** allows for the entering of DNA into CODIS, the national database for storage and exchange of DNA information used by law enforcement across the country, if a person arrested for a felony has died before charges are filed or if the person had died or been released before July 1, 1997, which was before New Mexico's current DNA statute was enacted. This will allow DNA to be entered and cross-referenced against any crimes yet to be solved.

Additionally, the legislature passed two bills related to the judiciary. First, magistrate circuit courts in several New Mexico magistrate districts are closed and another magistrate court is relocated with the passage of **House Bill 352 (Chapter 152)**. The law provides for the consolidation of court operations

in the McKinley, Santa Fe, Torrance, Dona Ana, Lea and Rio Arriba magistrate districts. The second bill, **House Bill 244 (Chapter 37)**, sets the minimum age for magistrate judges in the state at 28 years of age at the time of the judge's election.

EDUCATION

Education is a broad category for the legislature and includes the public school system, public post-secondary educational institutions, constitutional special schools and, to some degree, the Early Childhood Education and Care Department. As in previous legislative sessions, the legislature dedicated significant time to vetting and debating bills related to education, particularly bills regarding public schools. Newly enacted education-related laws range from public school finance, personnel and licensure changes to public school capital outlay modifications to public post-secondary education measures.

Public Schools

Due to the *Yazzie/Martinez* consolidated lawsuit as well as national and local trends affecting student achievement more generally, the legislature has prioritized reforming the public school system for the better part of a decade. Since 2016, the legislature increased appropriations for public school support by more than 60%, with the GAA appropriating more than \$5 billion in FY 2026 for that purpose. This increase for FY 2026 reflects several substantive policy changes. Regarding public school finance specifically, two bills were signed into law. First, revisions to the public school funding formula are made in **House Bill 63 (Chapter 89)** by increasing the basic program unit for sixth through twelfth grade; adding English learners as its own program unit based on a three-year average rate; increasing the at-risk program unit; basing the at-risk index on the family income index rate; and changing how charter schools calculate their at-risk index.

Next, **Senate Bill 201 (Chapter 72)** amends the uses of the Public Education Reform Fund and requires the Public Education Department (PED) to develop accountability and evaluation plans approved by the Department of Finance and Administration prior to the expenditure of appropriations for projects that demonstrate evidence of improving approved performance measures. Accountability and evaluation plans must follow a specific set of criteria, and the PED is required to submit such a plan for each program receiving an appropriation from the Public Education Reform Fund to the Department of Finance and Administration, LFC and LESC, which then make recommendations regarding recurring funding for the following fiscal year. Of the six projects the LESC and LFC recommended, the legislature in the end funded five three-year projects totaling \$61.8 million¹ from the GRO Fund (Section 9) in the GAA. The

¹Appropriating beyond a biennium consisting of the current fiscal year and the next succeeding fiscal year may run afoul of the Constitution of New Mexico. For one, it binds future legislatures; appropriating from 2027, 2028 and 2029 revenues could most likely mean that membership in the legislature will have changed in both houses – the legislators who crafted and voted for the GAA will not be the same legislators who are bound by these provisions.

projects and their funding amounts are: supports for unhoused students at \$6.3 million; secondary teacher literacy training at \$15.6 million; evidence-based math instruction training at \$13.5 million; truancy prevention at \$18.6 million; and innovative staffing strategies at \$7.8 million.

Growing the public school workforce has been a major area of concern for the legislature. **House Bill 156 (Chapter 149)** increases the minimum salaries for teachers, school counselors and school administrators. The minimum salary for level one is \$55,000, for level two is \$65,000 and for level three-A is \$75,000, including counselors; school administrators receive the minimum level three-A salary multiplied by the responsibility factor. Additionally, the law requires public post-secondary teacher preparation programs to instruct students on how to teach reading using the science of reading, structured literacy and scientifically based reading instruction and, for those students who want to become elementary teachers, 100 hours or more of supervised field experience in public school classrooms to implement what they have learned. The Higher Education Department is allowed to cut the budgets of higher education institutions if they do not adopt and implement the science of reading and structured literacy instruction in their teacher preparation programs.

In addition to increasing teacher salaries, the legislature also provided for an across-the-board 4% salary increase in the GAA for all school employees and passed several measures to modernize licensing. In line with efforts to expand career technical education within the public schools, the legislature passed **Senate Bill 343 (Chapter 145)**, which amends the teacher licensure provision in the Public School Code to place teachers with a vocational license on the same salary track as teachers with a standard license. Prior to this year, teachers with a vocational license were locked into a salary track that was \$10,000 lower per year compared to other teachers with a standard license at a commensurate licensure level.

House Bill 157 (Chapter 148) makes substantial modifications to level three-B administrator licensure. The law defines "site administrator" as a principal, assistant principal or charter school head administrator, and it creates three licenses: provisional site administrator, initial site administrator and professional site administrator. Also created are two superintendent licenses, provisional superintendent and superintendent. Waiver and reciprocity sections are amended to account for the new licenses. Additionally, the law provides that anyone holding a valid level three-B license on July 1, 2029 shall be granted both a professional site administrator license and a superintendent license, presumably without having to meet additional requirements contained in the bill such as enrollment in induction and mentoring programs and other license-specific administrator preparation programs. The PED must approve all school administrator preparation programs by July 1, 2027.

School nurses also benefit this session with the passage of **House Bill 195 (Chapter 150)**, which provides a tiered salary and licensure system for school nurses that is similar to the teacher licensure system. A level one license, a provisional three-year license for beginning registered nurses who do not have previous nursing experience, is for nurses who hold an associate or baccalaureate nursing degree,

while a level two license is a nine-year license for school nurses who served successfully as a level one school nurse or who have at least three years of registered nursing experience or who are granted reciprocity. Lastly, a level three license is a nine-year license for school nurse leaders who have been level two nurses for at least three years or who hold a post-baccalaureate degree or certification from the National Board for Certification of School Nurses; either of those candidates must demonstrate nursing leadership competence. The minimum salaries for school nurses at each licensure level are the same as for teachers.

Another licensure-related bill, **Senate Bill 345 (Chapter 146)**, allows an applicant for level one licensure to use a New Mexico teacher portfolio instead of passing the New Mexico teacher assessments. The bill also allows reciprocity for instructional support providers licensed in another state if that provider has professional experience, holds a professional license, if applicable, in addition to a school license and demonstrates the required competencies for a level two or three-A license, including clearance of a background check; a local superintendent may require a mentorship period. An instructional support provider may apply for a lower-level license if the provider does not meet the requirements and qualifications for the higher level.

Several other public-school-related bills make small, but impactful, changes. **Senate Education Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 387 (Chapter 81)** features a subtle statutory amendment; it changes the amount of annual community school implementation grants from \$150,000 to "up to" that amount, which may result in more grants being awarded. In addition, the Community Schools Fund is renamed in honor of Dr. Jeannie Oakes, late of Santa Fe. Dr. Oakes, a senior fellow at the Learning Policy Institute, played a pivotal role in advancing community schools in New Mexico through her research, advocacy and policy development efforts. Renaming the fund as the Dr. Jeannie Oakes Memorial Community Schools Fund is the education community's way to honor her work and legacy in New Mexico.

Meanwhile, the Hispanic Education Act is amended in **House Bill 487 (Chapter 153)** to include the protection and preservation of New Mexico's heritage Spanish language and culture. The bill also provides that Hispanic Education Advisory Council members may receive per diem and mileage; previously, they served for free.

Preserving the right to expressions of cultural identity is the subject of **Senate Bill 163 (Chapter 7)**. This legislation amends the Public School Code to prohibit local school boards and charter school governing bodies from preventing a student who is enrolled in, or eligible for enrollment in, a federally recognized Indian nation, tribe or pueblo from wearing tribal regalia or objects of cultural significance along with or attached to a cap or gown or wearing tribally significant footwear or other items of apparel under a gown at graduation ceremonies or public school events. Additionally, the legislation adds a new section to the Charter Schools Act enacting a broad nondiscrimination policy that includes tribal regalia protections.

Over the past two decades, first cellular phones and then smartphones have become ubiquitous in American society and on school campuses, but these devices can be a distraction for students. In response, the legislature enacted **Senate Finance Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 11 (Chapter 155)** to limit students' use of cell phones, smartphones and other wireless communication devices while they are at school. The bill requires every school district and charter school to adopt and implement a policy that restricts student use of wireless communication devices during instructional hours while providing for permissible uses for all students and exceptions for certain students.

According to analysis by the LFC, drowning is the leading cause of death for children ages one through four and the second-leading cause of death for children ages five through 12 in the United States. **House Bill 532 (Chapter 135)** aims to reduce drowning deaths in New Mexico by leveraging the system of support that public schools provide to families. This legislation requires each local school board and charter school governing body to provide water safety guidance to parents and students each school year and ensures that such guidance covers safety around bodies of water as well as water infrastructure.

Finally, the legislature amended the Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children in **Senate Bill 146 (Chapter 118)** to correct references to a United States Code citation in the compact necessary to ensure that the children of active-duty service members in New Mexico can continue to qualify for educational opportunities under the compact.

Public School Capital Outlay

Public school capital outlay is inextricable from public schools but deserves its own category due to the unique and comprehensive system the legislature established through the Public School Capital Outlay Act around the turn of the millennium. The act provides for fairness among schools by ensuring that all schools in the state meet baseline adequacy standards, regardless of whether they are part of a "property-poor" or "property-rich" school district. Under the act, school districts and the state share the cost for buildings and building systems pursuant to a funding formula based on the school district's capacity to raise revenue through bond levies and direct mill levies. While the public school capital outlay process has largely been a success emulated by other states, problems persist for the small school districts with a low property tax base. **Senate Bill 82 (Chapter 16)** provides for both temporary and permanent provisions in the Public School Capital Outlay Act to reduce the cost share of capital outlay projects for school districts that meet certain criteria.

Constitutional special schools are the primary and secondary land grant institutions created in Article 12, Section 11 of the Constitution of New Mexico and include the New Mexico School for the Blind and Visually Impaired, the New Mexico School for the Deaf and the New Mexico Military Institute. Both the school for the blind and school for the deaf have fallen under the provision of the Public School

Capital Outlay Act for some time, and **Senate Bill 280 (Chapter 123)** includes the New Mexico Military Institute in the act, making it eligible to receive public school capital outlay funding.

In 2021, the legislature created the Office of Broadband Access and Expansion to develop and implement a plan to build out broadband infrastructure throughout the state and at the same time tasked the Public School Capital Outlay Council with developing a broadband network for public schools called the "statewide education network", with an allocation of up to \$10 million per year from the sale of supplemental severance tax bonds to the council to build the network. **Senate Bill 401 (Chapter 82)** transfers both the program and the bond funding for the statewide education network to the Office of Broadband Access and Expansion and creates the Education Technology Infrastructure Fund to receive the bond funding proceeds and any additional money appropriated to the program in the future. It also creates a grant program from the new fund that school districts may apply to for assistance for projects that will become components of the statewide education network. However, the allocation of supplemental severance tax bond sales to the Education Technology Infrastructure Fund expires in 2030.

Post-Secondary Education

To provide accountability for the independent leadership of the state's public post-secondary educational institutions, the legislature passed **Senate Education Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 19 (Chapter 111)**, which requires members of the boards of regents of state educational institutions created in Article 12, Section 11 of the Constitution of New Mexico and the governing boards of the statutorily created public post-secondary educational institutions to complete 10 hours of training within the first six months of the members' terms. The training is provided by the Higher Education Department and covers topics related to the administration of public colleges and universities.

In **House Bill 89 (Chapter 92)**, the Graduate Scholarship Act is amended to clarify that an eligible student must be a New Mexico resident and that the scholarships are only available at the graduate-degree-granting universities enumerated in Article 12, Section 11 of the Constitution of New Mexico. While the bill excludes medical students from eligibility, the needs-based scholarship focuses on groups who are underrepresented in graduate education. In addition to residency, an applicant must have earned a bachelor's degree; have maintained a grade point average of 3.0 or higher or be a person who holds a paid position supporting faculty teaching or research activities; be enrolled in at least six credit hours (down from a full-time student with at least 12 credit hours); and comply with the law and rules promulgated by the Higher Education Department. Among the bill's other changes, the requirement of serving an unpaid internship or assistantship is removed; and a graduate scholarship may be awarded each semester until the recipient either receives a terminal degree or has qualified and received eight semesters of scholarship.

Despite failed federal efforts to alleviate the debt burdens of many, student loan forgiveness remains an issue of national concern. However, the federal Public Service Loan Forgiveness Program provides an avenue for those employed in government and certain public service positions to have their loans forgiven within 10 years of employment in those positions. **House Bill 69 (Chapter 90)** enacts the Public Service Loan Forgiveness Multiplier Act to support former or current adjunct and contingent faculty employees at New Mexico's public post-secondary educational institutions in qualifying for the federal Public Service Loan Forgiveness Program. The bill requires the Higher Education Department to develop informational materials about the federal program and disseminate those materials to all existing and new employees of public post-secondary educational institutions. To ensure that adjunct and contingent faculty receive appropriate credit toward full-time employment under the federal Public Service Loan Forgiveness Program standards, the bill establishes that such faculty are to be credited with 4.35 hours of work for each hour of classroom instruction, retroactive to October 1, 2007.

With the intent to improve the future for motivated teenagers and young adults, the legislature enacted **House Bill 167 (Chapter 32)**. The law directs the Higher Education Department to provide free high school equivalency credential tests to New Mexico residents who are at least 16 years of age, are not currently enrolled in secondary school, have not graduated and have passed an official practice test with scores indicating test readiness.

ELECTIONS

Two pieces of legislation relating to elections passed during the 2025 legislative session, one to allow all New Mexico voters to participate in primary elections and the other to change the way elections for conservancy districts are administered.

Of the elections-related legislation introduced this session, a common theme emerged with some legislative efforts: increasing voter participation. Many other states have accomplished this by adopting an open primary or semi-open primary model, and with the enactment of **Senate Bill 16 (Chapter 54)**, New Mexico voters who have not designated a party affiliation on their certificate of registration now have the option of participating in primary elections. Starting with the 2026 primary election, a voter who has declined to affiliate with a political party may request a major political party's ballot for purposes of voting in the primary election, regardless of whether those voters vote in person or by mailed ballot. However,

that voter's certificate of registration will not be changed to reflect the party designation voted for during the primary unless the voter so requests. The bill also provides conforming amendments to other sections of the Election Code that provide procedures for mailed ballots and notices sent to those voters and sections relating to the administration and conduct of elections.

In 2022, state conservancy districts became subject to the Local Election Act, which was enacted in 2018. Since then, these conservancy districts have sought to return to the manner in which they previously administered their elections pre-2022. **House Judiciary Committee Substitute for House Bill 308 (Chapter 21)** removes all conservancy districts from the Local Election Act. While this bill provides specific directives with regard to the timing of elections and compiling lists of qualified electors, it allows each conservancy district's board of directors to promulgate rules necessary to administer its election, including provisions for canvassing election returns and certification of elections, among other provisions.

EMPLOYMENT AND LABOR

The legislature passed three employment and labor bills in 2025, one that restricts employment opportunities for certain criminal offenders and ex-convicts, one that focuses on increasing wages for certain employees and another that increases the allowable attorney fees and discovery costs in workers' compensation cases.

With respect to restricting employment opportunities for certain criminal offenders and ex-convicts, the Criminal Offender Employment Act was originally passed in 1974 to assist criminal offenders and ex-convicts with rehabilitation by removing barriers to employment and putting limitations on the use of a job applicant's criminal history. The original legislation provided that law enforcement agencies were exempt from complying with that act. **Senate Bill 66 (Chapter 61)** expands that exemption to include the CYFD, the PED for consideration of an applicant for licensure under the School Personnel Act, the Early Childhood Education and Care Department for certain applicants at child care facilities and agencies considering an applicant as a caregiver or hospital caregiver subject to the Caregivers Criminal History Screening Act.

The Public Works Minimum Wage Act requires public works projects of the state or a political subdivision of the state that are in excess of \$60,000 and that will necessitate the employment of mechanics and laborers to pay the prevailing wage to individuals working on that public works project as determined by the director of the Labor Relations Division of the Workforce Solutions Department. **House Bill 6 (Chapter 132)** extends the requirement of paying the prevailing wage to individuals working on a project that is undertaken under the auspices of a municipality or county through the issuance of an industrial revenue bond.

Finally, the Workers' Compensation Administration Act and the New Mexico Occupational Disease Disablement Law provide limitations on the amount of attorney fees that can be collected and the

amount of money that can be spent on discovery costs in workers' compensation cases. These limitations have not been updated since 2013. **House Judiciary Committee Substitute for House Bill 66 (Chapter 18)** provides for increases in the allowable amounts of attorney fees and discovery costs in workers' compensation cases.

ENERGY AND UTILITIES

Six bills regarding energy and utilities were passed in the 2025 session that include topics such as the repurposing of oil and gas wells, advanced grid technology projects, Public Regulation Commission authority, allowing state funding for certain utility infrastructure projects, spending for the implementation of telecommunications services and the provision of storm water service.

In light of the recent wildfires, storms and flooding, **Senate Bill 7 (Chapter 52)** provides municipalities with the power to establish by ordinance a utility to provide for storm water service for the collection, treatment, storage or disposal of storm water and assess a fee.

House Bill 361 (Chapter 44) enacts the Well Repurposing Act to empower the EMNRD to authorize the conversion of an oil or gas well into a facility that provides or supports energy storage or geothermal energy development and to establish concurrent fees and financial assurance requirements. An oil or gas well that is repurposed pursuant to that act and actively operated for energy storage will not be considered an inactive or abandoned well that is required to be plugged and abandoned unless the energy storage operations cease for a length of 12 months or longer.

With the increasing generation and use of electricity, there is also aging infrastructure in the state. To address this issue, **House Government, Elections and Indian Affairs Committee Substitute for House Bill 93 (Chapter 93)** provides that a public utility may apply to the Public Regulation Commission for its approval of advanced grid technology projects, which are defined as projects with technology that increases the efficiency, capacity or reliability of electric transmission and distribution systems, facilities and equipment, and to recover costs for such projects. The bill also permits the generation and distribution of electricity using a qualified microgrid that includes a self-source generation resource, and it allows an electric public utility to acquire self-source generation resources or energy.

Prior existing statutory provisions prevent public utilities from giving unreasonable preference or advantage to any group of customers. However, the Public Regulation Commission may approve economic development rates and rates to retain load. **House Bill 91 (Chapter 147)** authorizes the Public Regulation Commission to approve rates and programs designed to reduce the burden of energy costs on low-income customers.

Article 9, Section 14 of the Constitution of New Mexico, also known as the "anti-donation clause", was amended in 2022 to provide an exception to the prohibition of state and local governmental

entities providing aid to private persons or entities. The exception allows state resources for "essential services". **Senate Bill 357 (Chapter 125)** enacts enabling legislation for the exception by creating the framework to provide public support for essential services projects, defined as "an infrastructure project that allows access to internet, energy, water and wastewater services primarily for residential purposes", and each project must be authorized by law. Also, the bill stipulates that the state and local governments can provide public support, which includes the direct or indirect provision of infrastructure, broadband telecommunications network facilities, payments for professional services contracts and loans or grants for infrastructure.

Lastly, the legislature has increased funding for the development of broadband. In 1999, the legislature enacted the Rural Telecommunications Act of New Mexico and established the State Rural Universal Service Fund, administered by the Public Regulation Commission, to mirror and leverage federal programs to develop telecommunications services in rural areas. Given the changing technologies involved in communication services, the legislature amended the Rural Telecommunications Act of New Mexico in 2021 to require the Public Regulation Commission to implement a broadband program and dedicate up to \$30 million per year, excluding some expenses for ancillary programs, from the State Rural Universal Service Fund to the program. **Senate Bill 126 (Chapter 117)** increases the amount dedicated to the broadband program to up to \$40 million per year with the same exclusion in place.

ENVIRONMENT AND NATURAL RESOURCES

Significant legislation was passed in 2025 to protect the Land of Enchantment's environment and natural resources. To control or prevent pollutant releases, three bills were enacted, while one bill aims to reduce carbon emissions. One bill was enacted with the intent of fostering a recycling economy to reduce illegal dumping in the state, two bills give the state and private property owners additional tools to reduce the risk of wildfires, one bill addresses timber grading and one bill raises the royalty rate on oil and gas produced on certain state trust land. Another bill aims to preserve the state's wildlife through reforms to the agencies tasked with overseeing wildlife and by raising certain hunting and fishing license fees.

For many decades, products containing per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances, commonly known as "PFAS", have been widely used by a variety of industries, yet studies and testing have shown concerning amounts of PFAS contamination in water, air, soil, wildlife and humans, and such contamination may cause adverse health effects. To protect humans, animals and the environment, **House Judiciary Committee Substitute for House Judiciary Committee Substitute for House Energy, Environment and Natural Resources Committee Substitute for House Bill 212 (Chapter 102)** enacts the Per- and

Polyfluoroalkyl Substances Protection Act, which prohibits manufacturers from selling or distributing in New Mexico certain products that contain intentionally added PFAS, and it authorizes the Environmental Improvement Board to adopt additional rules prohibiting certain products that contain any intentionally added PFAS. Furthermore, the bill requires the disclosure of information and testing of products sold or distributed in New Mexico that contain any such intentionally added substances, and it provides penalties for violations of the act's provisions.

PFAS are also the subject of **House Energy, Environment and Natural Resources Committee Substitute for House Bill 140 (Chapter 98)**, which amends the Hazardous Waste Act to add "discarded aqueous film-forming foam containing intentionally added" PFAS to the definition of "hazardous waste". By changing the definition, the bill provides direct authority for the state to regulate PFAS as hazardous waste. Additionally, the bill reiterates the federally listed exemption for agricultural waste.

Also related to pollution control, **Senate Bill 9 (Chapter 136)** amends the Pipeline Safety Act to double the existing civil penalties for violations of that act, which mirrors penalties for analogous oil and gas pipeline safety violations under federal law.

To facilitate the reduction of carbon emissions through the capture and storage of atmospheric carbon dioxide, known as "carbon dioxide sequestration", **House Bill 458 (Chapter 48)** enacts the Geologic Carbon Dioxide Storage Stewardship Act. The bill defines the space to be used by carbon dioxide sequestration, or "pore space", as "the empty space between rock grains, fractures and voids in the earth's subsurface" and vests ownership of the pore space formations in the owners of the surface above the pore space. The bill gives rulemaking and regulatory authority for carbon dioxide sequestration to the Oil Conservation Division of the EMNRD, and it also creates the Geologic Carbon Dioxide Long-Term Storage Stewardship Fund to ensure the long-term storage security of geologic sequestration facilities. Additionally, the bill establishes a framework for the issuance of certificates of completion to carbon dioxide sequestration operators as well as the eventual release from stewardship responsibilities for operators and the assumption of stewardship responsibilities by the state.

As a means to reduce waste, **House Government, Elections and Indian Affairs Committee Substitute for House Bill 291 (Chapter 151)** amends and renames the Recycling and Illegal Dumping Act to incorporate a circular economy in New Mexico. The act, now the Recycling, Circular Economy and Illegal Dumping Act, defines "circular economy" as an economy that uses a systems-focused approach and involves industrial processes and economic activities that are restorative and regenerative by design, that enable resources used in such processes and activities to maintain their highest values for as long as possible and that aim for the elimination of waste through the superior design of materials, products and systems, including business models. To aid in this effort, the positions of "recycling and waste reduction coordinator" and "circular economy coordinator" are created in the Department of Environment.

Two measures aim to prepare the state for wildfires. **Senate Finance Committee Substitute for Senate Conservation Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 33 (Chapter 55)** enacts the Wildfire Prepared Act, creates the Wildfire Prepared Program and alters the composition of the Fire Planning Task Force. It provides the task force with additional duties, including the development of wildfire preparedness standards, mapping of high-risk areas in the state, consideration of fire suppression measures and development of guidelines and requirements for grant eligibility. The EMNRD is tasked with using these standards and guidelines through the Wildfire Prepared Program to provide technical assistance and training; conduct assessments of structures' and properties' compliance with the wildfire preparedness standards; and provide certification of compliance and award grants to increase wildfire preparedness by making changes to structures and properties, reducing hazardous fuels, providing buffers and establishing community-based programs.

Next, **House Bill 175 (Chapter 5)** amends the Forest and Watershed Restoration Act to give the Forestry Division of the EMNRD a broader spectrum of approaches to address the risk of wildfires to homes and other structures built in wildland-urban interfaces. With this new law, projects to create defensible buffers with reduced vegetation in areas identified as posing a high risk of having a wildfire spread to homes or other structures are now eligible for funding from the Forest Land Protection Revolving Fund.

Timber grading is an inspection and labeling process that is done to ensure that milled timber is suitable for a consumer's intended end use. **House Bill 553 (Chapter 49)** enacts the Timber Grading Act and requires the Forestry Division of the EMNRD to create the Structural Timber Grading Certificate Program for sawmill owners and employees. Certificates will be issued to those who complete the program, and certified graders will be given the privilege of grading and labeling timber that was processed at the sawmill that the certified grader owns or is employed by. Prior to the passage and enactment of the Timber Grading Act, timber that was milled in New Mexico was shipped out of the state to be graded and labeled.

Oil and gas production is currently a major source of revenue for the state. Entities seeking to lease state lands for oil and gas production are required to use the lease form set forth in statute. **Senate Finance Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 23 (Chapter 137)** amends the statutory form to raise the maximum permitted royalty rate from 20% to 25% of the value of oil or gas produced from specified tracts of state trust land located within the Permian Basin. The bill also prohibits the commissioner of public lands from canceling leases except upon failure or default of a lessee to comply with the terms of the lease and provides greater transparency on how lease rates are set through the publication of classification factors for parcels being offered for lease.

Last, but not least, pursuant to **Senate Bill 5 (Chapter 9, p.v.)**, major changes are made to the Department of Game and Fish and the State Game Commission, and many hunting and fishing license fees are increased, according to the following schedule:

◆ starting on April 1, 2026:

- the cost of a majority of hunting and fishing licenses will be increased, with exceptions for junior licenses for state residents who are under 18 years old, senior licenses for state residents over 65 years old and state residents with disabilities;
- license fees will be adjusted to inflation yearly until 2032 and every five years after that;
- resident participants in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program are eligible to receive a 25% discount on all fees; and
- nonresident shed hunters may purchase a license allowing them to collect shed deer and elk antlers; however, shed hunter licenses will not be required for state residents;

◆ beginning on July 1, 2026:

- the name of the Department of Game and Fish is changed to the "Department of Wildlife", and the name of the State Game Commission is changed to the "State Wildlife Commission";
- the department is tasked with identifying "species of greatest conservation need" and publicizing collected data on those species and the state and federal money being spent for their support and recovery;
- the commission is authorized to promulgate rules regarding the management and protection of any species of wildlife, including insects and certain invertebrates; and
- the commission's rulemaking authority is expanded to include the release and barter of wildlife in the state; the import or export of wildlife, including their bodies or body parts, into or out of the state; and the consideration of factors that are judged to affect the health of a species or a species' ecosystem; and

◆ starting on January 1, 2027:

- the composition of and criteria for commission membership will be revamped. Instead of commission members being composed of five members each representing a different geographic district and two at-large members, the commission will have three at-large members who live in different counties, one of whom is a member of a federally recognized Indian nation, tribe or pueblo in New Mexico, and four members with the following specific backgrounds and knowledge: 1) a rancher or farmer who actively ranches or farms on land where at least two big game species are frequently present; 2) a conservationist who for the previous four years has been an employee or a member of a board or advisory committee for a nonprofit wildlife or habitat conservation organization that primarily focuses on nongame species; 3) an individual who for the previous four years has held both a New Mexico hunting

and fishing license; and 4) a scientist who holds a master's or a more advanced degree in wildlife biology, conservation biology, fisheries science or management, wildlife science or management or a comparable wildlife field of study;

- the governor will appoint commission members from a pool of at least three candidates approved by the newly created nine-member State Wildlife Commission Nominating Committee; and
- except for the initial appointments, commissioners will serve staggered six-year terms and are limited to two terms.

HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

During the 2025 session, the legislature spent a significant amount of time focusing on bills related to health and human services. The legislature passed bills designed to increase the accessibility and affordability of health care services and prescription drugs through a variety of strategies. Some bills aim to make widespread improvements in the health care system, one by providing a significant increased investment in the state's behavioral health care infrastructure, and another by providing increased oversight and accountability over health care entities. Other bills provide more targeted improvements to the health care system, such as improvements to the Mi Via waiver program, the federal 340B Drug Pricing Program, the prescription drug donation program and the process to certify deaths. Two bills expand access to health care, one through the credentialing of doulas and the other by expanding the types of providers that can provide services through telehealth, and one bill changes provisions regarding caregiver criminal history background checks. Additionally, two bills designed to improve responses to cardiac emergencies were passed, and another bill legalizes the use of medical psilocybin for certain medical conditions.

Addressing long-standing shortcomings in the provision of behavioral health services was a priority of the legislature in the 2025 session, resulting in **Senate Finance Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 3 (Chapter 3)**, which creates the Behavioral Health Reform and Investment Act. Through the designation of the Behavioral Health Executive Committee and mandated participation by behavioral health stakeholders, the bill overhauls how the state coordinates and funds behavioral health services. The bill provides for the designation of behavioral health regions and, with the assistance of the Administrative Office of the Courts, the development of regional behavioral health plans addressing

specified criteria. In addition to regional behavioral health planning, the bill addresses behavioral health workforce development, including the credentialing of behavioral health service providers, standards for behavioral health services and evaluation guidelines, criteria for the investment of state funds to implement regional behavioral health plans, coordination of the 988 behavioral health emergency system and the 911 emergency system and audits and evaluation of grantees by the Health Care Authority. Periodic reporting is required on the development and implementation of regional behavioral health plans, including annual reports by regional governmental entities to the legislature and the judicial and executive branches.

In 2024, the legislature passed a truncated version of the Health Care Consolidation Oversight Act, which included only hospitals and would remain in effect only until July 1, 2025. The bill lost its emergency clause, which made some actions taken by hospitals in the state unreviewable under the law. This session, Senate Bill 14, the Health Care Consolidation and Transparency Act, was introduced as an attempt to go back to the original 2024 bill, with changes negotiated with health care providers of all types. That bill was bottled up in the Senate, so late in the session, **House Judiciary Committee Substitute for House Bill 586 (Chapter 50)** was introduced. This bill recompiles and amends the current Health Care Consolidation Oversight Act to require review of proposed transactions that involve mergers, acquisitions or other actions that change control of a hospital or certain health care provider organizations and to change the administrative and enforcement agency from the Office of Superintendent of Insurance to the Health Care Authority. Whistleblower protection, administrative penalties and a repeal of the delayed repeal are included in the bill. The Health Care Authority now has the authority to require a review of changes in control that affect New Mexico hospitals or health care provider organizations, and the secretary of health care authority may approve the change, approve with conditions or deny the change in control, particularly if it will negatively affect the delivery of essential health care services or otherwise affect the availability, accessibility or quality of health care in the state. Moreover, the authority can maintain oversight on a project for no more than three years from the date of conditional approval.

In 1999, the Mi Via waiver was created as a self-directed home- and community-based services program designed to help individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities or medically fragile conditions manage their own services and supports. Mi Via waiver program participants are provided annual individual budgetary allotments that can be used to pay for supports and services. **House Bill 357 (Chapter 43)** aims to maximize the purchasing power of Mi Via waiver program participants by prohibiting gross receipts taxes from being used to calculate a participant's individual budgetary allotment.

Some of the bills aimed at increasing the accessibility and affordability of prescription drugs can be found in the [Insurance](#) section of these *Highlights*, but there are two bills that improve accessibility and affordability of prescription drugs without affecting the health insurance industry. The first of the two bills is **House Judiciary Committee Substitute for House Judiciary Committee Substitute for House Bill**

78 (**Chapter 91**), which provides protections to federally qualified health centers and similar centers that participate in the federal 340B Drug Pricing Program. The 340B program allows certain types of health care entities to purchase prescription drugs at lower wholesale prices. However, prescription drug manufacturers have implemented burdensome reporting requirements for entities participating in the 340B program. The new law limits the requirements that drug manufacturers can place on entities participating in the 340B program.

The second bill aimed at improving accessibility and affordability of prescription drugs is **Senate Bill 122 (Chapter 116)**, which expands the prescription drug donation program to allow more entities to donate prescription drugs and accept donated prescription drugs.

To make the process of certifying deaths more timely and efficient, **House Bill 117 (Chapter 95)** makes several updates to the requirements related to death certificates. One of the changes now allows a physician assistant to medically certify the death of a patient who is being treated by the physician assistant for an illness or condition that resulted in the patient's death. Additionally, the bill only requires a case to be referred to the Office of the State Medical Investigator if a patient's death occurs more than 365 days after the patient was last provided a medical examination, medical advice or a medical prescription by a primary care physician, physician assistant or nurse practitioner. Prior to the passage and enactment of the bill, this referral was required to be made if the death occurred more than 10 days after the patient was last provided a medical examination, medical advice or a medical prescription by a physician.

Certain parts of the state have been characterized as maternal health care deserts, and this lack of services requires residents to travel long distances for routine pregnancy-related care. According to the Department of Health, doulas are trained, nonmedical professionals who provide emotional, physical, psychosocial and informational support to people who are pregnant, birthing or postpartum, as well as their families. Moreover, research shows that doula involvement improves a person's experience with reproductive health care, promotes positive birth outcomes and can reduce health disparities. Despite these findings, however, there was no mechanism in place for reimbursing doulas who provide their services to Medicaid recipients. **House Bill 214 (Chapter 20)**, the Doula Credentialing and Access Act, establishes a voluntary program that allows doulas who meet certain requirements to become credentialed with the Department of Health and, once credentialed, eligible to receive Medicaid reimbursement for their services.

Improving access to health care, particularly in rural and underserved areas of the state, is a perennial issue in New Mexico. One way to address this is to allow health care providers to render certain services remotely via telehealth. **Senate Bill 252 (Chapter 75)** authorizes additional categories of health care providers, including all licensed social workers and certified peer support workers, to provide services in this manner.

In 1998, the legislature passed the Caregivers Criminal History Screening Act, which required the Department of Health to ensure that all caregivers who are working with vulnerable populations undergo a background check. **House Judiciary Committee Substitute for House Bill 131 (Chapter 30)** updates that act by moving the background check program from the Department of Health to the Health Care Authority. The bill adds additional types of felonies that disqualify a person from being a caregiver, which now include human trafficking, assault of a peace officer, identity theft and cruelty to animals, and it allows the Health Care Authority to disqualify a caregiver based on whether that person poses an unreasonable risk to care recipients.

The first of the two bills designed to improve responses to cardiac emergencies, **House Education Committee Substitute for House Bill 54 (Chapter 129)** requires every school in the state to develop and implement a plan to respond to incidents that involve a person experiencing a sudden cardiac arrest or a similar life-threatening emergency while on school grounds. To bolster the ability to respond to such emergencies on school grounds, the bill requires every school in the state to install an automated external defibrillator. The second bill, **House Bill 439 (Chapter 47)**, requires public safety telecommunicators to be trained in the practice of walking bystanders of cardiac emergencies through the performance of cardiopulmonary resuscitation.

Finally, with the passage of **Senate Judiciary Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 219 (Chapter 73)**, New Mexico becomes the third state in the country to legalize the medical use of psilocybin. The bill enacts the Medical Psilocybin Act to allow the use of psilocybin in an approved setting to treat qualified medical conditions, which currently include major treatment-resistant depression, posttraumatic stress disorder, substance use disorders, end-of-life care and other conditions approved by the Department of Health. Similar to the medical cannabis program, the Department of Health will administer the Medical Use of Psilocybin Program with the assistance of the Medical Psilocybin Advisory Board.

HOUSING

Despite the introduction of several dozen bills relating to housing, the 2025 session saw only two bills enacted. One bill allows nonprofit condominium associations to engage in business remotely, while another bill increases protections for residential renters and rental applicants.

Recognizing the need for some nonprofit corporations to conduct meetings, establish a quorum and vote without a strict in-person or by proxy requirement, **Senate Bill 72 (Chapter 62)** allows nonprofit condominium associations to transact business by "simultaneous remote electronic means" to ameliorate burdens to association members who cannot attend meetings in person or have a proxy attend in person on their behalf. The bill provides for more convenient and efficient operation of nonprofit condominium associations by allowing business to be transacted through online meeting platforms.

Additionally, the legislature responded to the state's housing crisis by passing a bill to create transparency and limit costs for prospective and current renters. **Senate Judiciary Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 267 (Chapter 122)** caps the screening fees that rental property owners may charge applicants and requires that all fees and costs associated with a tenancy be published and readily identifiable in listings of dwelling units for rent. Pursuant to the bill, rental property owners are limited to one screening fee per applicant in a 90-day period for any of the owner's properties, and the owner is required to return screening fees in certain circumstances. In the event a resident is late on rent, a rental property owner may now charge a maximum late fee of 5% of the monthly rent, which is reduced from 10%. The bill also amends the Unfair Practices Act to include an owner charging a fee not authorized pursuant to the Uniform Owner-Resident Relations Act as an unfair or deceptive trade practice.

INSURANCE

This session, the legislature enacted legislation regulating the insurance industry, including bills that address issues relating to travel insurance, unfair claims practices and insurance oversight, in addition to several bills affecting health insurance.

In 2013, the New Mexico Insurance Code was amended to provide for the regulation of travel insurance. **Senate Tax, Business and Transportation Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 168 (Chapter 127)** enacts the Travel Insurance Act to incorporate the Travel Insurance Model Act published by the National Association of Insurance Commissioners. The Travel Insurance Act regulates insurance coverage for personal risks incident to planned travel that include interruption or cancellation of a trip or an event, loss of baggage or personal effects, damage to accommodations or rental vehicles, sickness,

accident, disability or death occurring during travel, emergency evacuation and repatriation of remains. Furthermore, the bill authorizes the issuance of a limited lines travel insurance producer license to applicants meeting specific requirements, and it sets forth requirements for travel protection plans, which must disclose whether the plan includes travel insurance, travel assistance services or cancellation fee waivers, as well as permissible practices for the marketing of travel insurance. Certain practices related to the marketing of travel insurance are defined as unfair and deceptive practices pursuant to the New Mexico Insurance Code.

With respect to prohibited unfair claims practices, **Senate Bill 221 (Chapter 120)** prohibits insurers from treating an insured's inquiry relating to damage or loss as a claim when the damage or loss is not covered by the policy, the insurer makes no payment to the insured and there is no fraud on the part of the insured. The purpose of the bill is, therefore, to protect insureds who make such inquiries from adverse future consequences such as the imposition of increased premiums or nonrenewal of coverage.

House Health and Human Services Committee Substitute for House Bill 398 (Chapter 108) accomplishes two objectives regarding insurance oversight. First, it amends the Insurance Holding Company law to require certain insurers to perform group capital calculation reports and liquidity stress tests and then report the results to the Office of Superintendent of Insurance. The bill also amends the Health Maintenance Organization Law to modify the time line for the examination of health maintenance organizations and contract providers from once every three years to no less frequently than once every five years.

Relating to health insurance, in 2021, the legislature passed legislation that eliminated consumer cost-sharing obligations applicable to a range of covered behavioral health services for a five-year period beginning January 1, 2022. This session, **Senate Health and Public Affairs Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 120 (Chapter 115)** revisited this issue by removing the five-year limitation, thereby making the elimination of cost sharing permanent. Additionally, the bill clarifies that certain short-term plans are excluded from this provision.

Building on legislation passed in 2023 that requires insurers to cover a range of medically necessary diabetic resources, **House Bill 233 (Chapter 36)** requires private insurers to expand coverage to include certain types of equipment for the treatment of active diabetic foot ulcers, including topical oxygen therapy, effective January 1, 2026.

In recent years, the legislature has taken several measures to limit unnecessary prior authorizations for prescription drugs. The legislature continued the effort in the 2025 legislative session by passing **Senate Bill 39 (Chapter 57)**, which limits insurance companies from requiring prior authorizations for prescription drugs that are prescribed to treat rare conditions and illnesses.

Legislation enacted in 2023 requires the Office of Superintendent of Insurance to adopt and promulgate rules for health insurers to provide for a uniform and efficient provider credentialing process

for physicians who contract with them to ensure that they are reimbursed for providing services to covered individuals. It specified that any rules promulgated would require insurers to assess and verify the qualifications of a physician applying to become a participating provider and then, barring the discovery of any sanctions against the physician, load the necessary information into their payment system within 30 days of receiving the application to ensure timely reimbursement to the physician for the services provided. This session, **House Government, Elections and Indian Affairs Committee Substitute for House Bill 402 (Chapter 45)** directs the Office of Superintendent of Insurance to promulgate a set of rules regarding the credentialing process applicable to dentists and dental hygienists that would impose the same time constraints on insurers for loading information into their payment systems.

Additionally during the 2025 legislative session, the legislature spent a significant amount of time and effort crafting policies aimed at improving Medicaid reimbursement for health care professionals. **House Bill 56 (Chapter 88)** increases Medicaid reimbursement rates for services provided at birthing centers, and **Senate Finance Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 249 (Chapter 121)** ensures that all health care providers are reimbursed for gross receipts taxes related to services provided to Medicaid recipients. Also relating to reimbursement, **House Bill 174 (Chapter 33)** requires all health insurance plans purchased by the state to reimburse community-based pharmacy providers for the cost of a prescription drug plus a professional dispensing fee.

LAW ENFORCEMENT AND PUBLIC SAFETY

The 2024 interim placed a strong emphasis on public safety, setting the stage for a series of targeted bills in the 2025 session aimed at enhancing protection and response efforts across the state. Enacted legislation encompasses a wide range of measures reflecting this priority, including the expansion of the Silver Alert system and the introduction of a new Turquoise Alert for missing Native American persons, as well as an increase in the 911 emergency response surcharge. Additional legislation establishes clear criteria for search and rescue operations, strengthens the state's red flag law and carves out exemptions related to the carrying of firearms at polling places. New laws also create the Enforcement Bureau to investigate violations of the Cannabis Regulation Act, amend qualifications for law enforcement officers and address communications infrastructure through a reporting requirement on digital trunked radio subscriptions and fees, further illustrating the comprehensive scope of the public safety agenda.

Potentially life-saving changes are made to the Missing Persons Information and Reporting Act through the passage of two bills. **House Bill 197 (Chapter 19)** amends the definition of "Silver Alert" to

encompass a missing endangered person who displays signs or symptoms of Alzheimer's disease or another form of dementia, cognitive decline or impairment, regardless of age. In a similar vein, **Senate Bill 41 (Chapter 58)** adds a new "Turquoise Alert" procedure to be used when a missing person is an enrolled member or a person eligible for enrollment in a federally recognized or state-recognized Indian nation, tribe or pueblo.

Updates to the Search and Rescue Act are made in **Senate Tax, Business and Transportation Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 353 (Chapter 77)** to require the state search and rescue resource officer, in consultation with local, state, federal and tribal emergency responders, to establish standardized search and rescue criteria for notifying the Department of Public Safety of a search and rescue emergency. The state search and rescue resource officer is also required to provide training to local, state, federal and tribal emergency response entities, public safety answering points and volunteer search and rescue organizations on the protocols for reporting a search and rescue emergency. The bill also clarifies that a notification of a search and rescue emergency does not prevent deployment of other agencies' personnel or resources in response to a request for aid. Additionally, the bill requires the Department of Public Safety to promptly notify the entity that requested assistance as to whether or not search and rescue resources have been activated pursuant to the established criteria, and it requires the department to facilitate and assist in securing alternate search and rescue resources to support the affected area.

While initially introduced to increase or modify certain administrative fees and surcharges, **Senate Finance Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 535 (Chapter 84)** had a late amendment to include a new act. In its final version, the bill increases fees assessed against employers and employees to fund the Workers' Compensation Administration; and increases inspection fees paid by public utilities and telecommunications and transmission companies, but also delegates authority to the Public Regulation Commission to adjust the inspection fees, as well as other filing fees paid by public utilities. The bill also increases the 911 emergency surcharge and the telecommunications relay service surcharge. Most of the latter's revenue is transferred to a new 988 Lifeline Fund to administer a public telecommunication service for emotional, mental or alcohol and drug use support. In its final location, the House floor, the bill was amended to include a new Supported Decision-Making Act that was introduced as House Bill 149, which allows a "supporter" to enter into an agreement with and assist a "decision-maker" with understanding information relevant to a life decision that can include medical, psychological, financial, educational or treatment records of the decision-maker.

In 2020, the legislature enacted the Extreme Risk Firearm Protection Order Act that allows for certain persons who pose a "significant danger of causing imminent personal injury to self or others" to be disarmed outside of the criminal justice context. Statutes such as the Extreme Risk Firearm Protection Order Act are commonly referred to as "red flag laws" and aim to prevent gun violence. **House Bill 12 (Chapter 17)** makes two substantive amendments to the act. First, the bill allows law enforcement officers

to file a petition to disarm a person based on information the officers collect while carrying out their duties, whereas the original version of the act allowed officers to file such a petition only at the request of a third party. Second, the bill imposes a general requirement that respondents who receive a protection order under the act relinquish weapons immediately upon service of the order, while respondents had 48 hours to relinquish after service of an order under the original version.

Also relating to firearms and public safety, **House Bill 101 (Chapter 28)** provides for the legal carrying of a firearm at polling places by adding two exemptions: a commissioned law enforcement officer with arrest authority acting in the performance of official duties; and a commissioned law enforcement officer with arrest authority acting in accordance with the policies of the officer's law enforcement agency. These join existing exceptions for certified law enforcement officers, concealed carry permit holders and individuals inside private vehicles.

The Cannabis Regulation Act became law in 2021 and provided for the legalization of the recreational use of cannabis in New Mexico. In the ensuing years, it became clear that enforcement of that act was problematic. To remedy this issue, **House Commerce and Economic Development Committee Substitute for House Bill 10 (Chapter 85)** creates the Enforcement Bureau within the Office of the Superintendent of Regulation and Licensing. The Enforcement Bureau chief and enforcement agents are designated as peace officers to investigate alleged violations of the Cannabis Regulation Act and enforce laws and administrative rules within the scope of that act. The bureau and its agents have the authority to conduct announced and unannounced inspections, restrict the movement of and embargo cannabis products suspected of being adulterated, dangerously or fraudulently misbranded or possessed in violation of that act, take control pursuant to a warrant issued by a court of competent jurisdiction of the premises where a cannabis product is produced, manufactured or stored, petition the district court for injunctive or other equitable relief and destroy cannabis products pursuant to court order. Additionally, the bill prescribes procedures to be followed by enforcement agents in carrying out their duties and provides an appeal process for licensees. Criminal penalties and disciplinary actions against licensees are prescribed for violations of orders issued by the Enforcement Bureau.

To expand the pool of candidates eligible to become law enforcement officers and potentially reduce officer vacancies in law enforcement agencies, **Senate Bill 364 (Chapter 78)** amends the qualifications for certification and the appointment of law enforcement officers to include individuals who are not United States citizens but who have legal authorization to work by the United States Citizenship and Immigration Services.

As a way to make the budgeting process for payment of digital trunked radio system subscriber fees more accurate, **House Bill 192 (Chapter 34)** requires the Department of Information Technology to submit an annual report to the LFC detailing projected subscriber fees and users for the digital trunked

radio communications system. Users of the digital trunked radio system include municipal, county and tribal public safety agencies.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT AND SPECIAL DISTRICTS

In 2025, the legislature addressed numerous issues affecting local governments and special districts. Three bills were enacted concerning municipal and county governments, and five bills became law covering a wide range of smaller political subdivisions and special districts ranging from land grants-mercedes to watershed districts to a new special district created in Albuquerque.

The most complicated piece of legislation may have been a bill making changes to the Municipal Code. The Municipal Code has seldom been amended to reflect recent judicial rulings or to address emerging administrative challenges facing municipalities. **House Bill 298 (Chapter 40)** amends the Municipal Code to update various requirements for the operation of the governing bodies of mayor-council forms of government and clarifies the authority and duties of mayors. Additionally, it clarifies that mayors and local governing bodies do not have authority over the administration of the judicial branch, specifically with regard to the supervision, hiring and termination of judicial employees. It also mandates that members of a local governing body recuse themselves when actual or perceived conflicts of interest exist and outlines the procedure for the recusal process. Finally, it also addresses the procedures for filling vacancies, dealing with tie votes and appointments of members of a local governing body by a mayor.

Senate Bill 290 (Chapter 124) raises fees that are assessed by a county clerk for marriage licenses from \$25.00 to \$55.00 and amends the disposition of marriage licensing fees, distributing \$15.00 from the fee to the county general fund, \$20.00 to the state treasurer for credit to the Children's Trust Fund and \$20.00 to the county clerk.

Two bills provide mechanisms for local governments to pay for certain health and emergency medical services expenses. First, the authorized uses of county health care assistance funds are now expanded to allow money to be used to pay for all or a portion of monthly premiums or out-of-pocket costs incurred by indigent patients pursuant to **Senate Bill 45 (Chapter 139)**. It also clarifies that monthly premiums and out-of-pocket costs include those incurred from public or private health insurance policies or coverage plans. Second, counties and municipalities are now allowed to issue emergency medical services bonds to purchase equipment for emergency medical system improvement projects or emergency medical services vehicles pursuant to **Senate Bill 197 (Chapter 23)**. The state treasurer is also now

authorized to redirect distributions to the NMFA to make loans for purchases authorized pursuant to the Emergency Medical Services Fund Act.

The Albuquerque Metropolitan Arroyo Flood Control Authority issues bonds and uses the bond proceeds to pay for flood control projects in the greater Albuquerque area. **Senate Bill 100 (Chapter 64)** increases the limit of outstanding indebtedness of the authority from \$80 million to \$120 million.

Spanish and Mexican community land grants have been recognized under New Mexico law since territorial times. Pursuant to a law enacted in 2004, a community land grant that met the criteria for the new statutory term "land grant-merced" became a political subdivision of the state, and the Santa Cruz de la Canada Land Grant-Merced in Rio Arriba County and Santa Fe County received political subdivision status. However, the status of land grants-mercedes continued to be confusing to many local governments and state and federal agencies that interacted with them, and some land grants-mercedes reported that some local governments and agencies would question whether they met the required criteria and did not treat them as political subdivisions. To resolve these issues, in 2023, the legislature amended the law to specifically designate land grants-mercedes by name, but Santa Cruz de la Canada was not included. **Senate Bill 47 (Chapter 140)** adds Santa Cruz de la Canada to the list of land grants-mercedes in statute, thereby giving it official political subdivision status.

The Community Governance Attorney Act was enacted in 2019 to provide a free source of legal help to acequias, land grants-mercedes and indigent people living in colonias. The act provides incentives for law students enrolled at the University of New Mexico School of Law to apply to the Community Governance Attorney and Conditional Tuition Waiver Program and authorizes a maximum of two newly graduated attorneys to become program attorneys each year. The program was designed to leverage nonstate funding, with office space and training provided by New Mexico Legal Aid, but with the recent federal budgetary cuts to the national legal aid program, there no longer is an employer for New Mexico's community governance attorneys. **House Judiciary Committee Substitute for House Rural Development, Land Grants and Cultural Affairs Committee Substitute for House Bill 24 (Chapter 87)** addresses that issue by expanding the pool of eligible employers to include the University of New Mexico School of Law, counties or municipalities with a designated colonia within their boundaries and nonprofit organizations whose mission includes providing free legal assistance to low-income New Mexicans. The bill also transfers the administration of contracts for the program attorneys from the Higher Education Department to the University of New Mexico School of Law.

Albuquerque has experienced challenges with drug use, crime and homelessness, especially in the area around the State Fairgrounds. **Senate Tax, Business and Transportation Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 481 (Chapter 83)** is an effort to address this by redeveloping and improving that area of the city through the creation of the State Fairgrounds District as a political subdivision of the state, similar to a district established pursuant to the Tax Increment for Development Act. This legislation transfers to a

special fund of the district 75% of the net receipts attributable to the gross receipts tax and gaming tax from the district. In addition, the State Fairgrounds District is empowered to issue revenue bonds up to \$500 million, impose a property tax, acquire land and alter the boundaries of the district to add acquired land contiguous to the State Fairgrounds, purchase, sell, grant and donate property, undertake projects and enter into contracts or expend money for any public purpose or community benefit with respect to projects of the district. Projects include acquiring, developing, demolishing, operating, improving and installing land, infrastructure, buildings, roads, utilities, public improvements or equipment in both the district and public schools in the close vicinity of the district.

Watershed districts are governed by a board of directors and are subunits of soil and water conservation districts, which are governed by a board of supervisors. Prior to the enactment of **House Bill 431 (Chapter 46)**, the watershed district directors were elected officials. However, that caused some confusion about whether the boards of directors were subject to the policy direction of the boards of supervisors for their respective soil and water conservation districts. The new law resolves this source of confusion by providing that the directors for watershed districts shall be appointed by the boards of supervisors of their respective soil and water conservation districts.

MILITARY AND VETERANS' AFFAIRS

With four military installations and a sizeable veteran population in New Mexico, the legislature has long recognized the importance of military and veterans' affairs, exemplified this year through the passage of two bills regarding construction or communities near military bases and one bill that provides a benefit to veterans.

The Military Base Planning Commission and its supporting Office of Military Planning and Support within the Economic Development Department were established in 2003 in response to the federal realignment of military missions and base closures at the time. However, since its creation, the commission's mission has been primarily limited to monitoring federal decision-making regarding military base realignment with an eye to alerting state officials and New Mexico's congressional delegation when federal military planning might result in the closure or downsizing of a military base within the state.

House Labor, Veterans' and Military Affairs Committee Substitute for House Bill 158 (Chapter 99) expands the role of the commission and puts the state on a more proactive footing. The commission's monitoring functions are now geared toward "assigned base missions" rather than simply the bases themselves. This change reflects the state's experience with Cannon Air Force Base, which, instead of being closed as part of base realignment in the early 2000s, transitioned from a manned fighter mission to a special operations command in 2006. In addition, the commission is tasked with developing rules for

and making recommendations regarding grants from a new Military Base Impact Fund created to assist counties, municipalities and special districts that encompass a portion of, or are within the service area of, a United States military base or defense facility. Grants from the fund can be used to accommodate or enhance a planned expansion of an assigned base mission, the retention of an assigned base mission or the recruitment of a new assigned base mission.

The federal government has had an ongoing concern that construction near military bases, particularly air force bases, does not interfere with the mission of a given base. So for years, federal law has required construction projects such as radio towers or electricity transmission towers within the zone of concern of a military base to submit a "notice of proposed construction or alteration" to the Federal Aviation Administration that initiates a review process by the United States Department of Defense's Military Aviation and Installation Assurance Siting Clearinghouse. The submission of such a notice typically results in either a military compatibility letter or a finding of unacceptable risk. This has been a completely federal process without a record being kept by a state agency. **House Bill 159 (Chapter 31)** establishes a recordkeeping mechanism for these projects within the state. Beginning on July 1, 2025, when the owner or developer of a renewable energy construction project submits a notice of proposed construction or alteration to the Federal Aviation Administration or receives a determination by that administration or a letter of military compatibility or a finding of unacceptable risk from the siting clearinghouse in response to the notice, the owner or operator must provide a copy of the notice or the determination, finding or letter to the Military Base Planning Commission. Thus, the commission will be able to maintain a record of the types of projects that are under review or have been approved or disapproved, which record then will be available for future planning by the state, local governments and the private sector.

In 1999, the legislature provided a free day-use pass for unlimited entry into state parks and recreation areas and one three-day camping pass for 50% or more disabled veterans. **House Bill 161 (Chapter 11)** provides the benefit to all veterans and makes the camping pass good for unlimited use of camping areas operated by the State Parks Division of the EMNRD.

MOTOR VEHICLES AND TRANSPORTATION

Normally in a 60-day session, the legislature enacts a variety of motor-vehicle-and-transportation-related bills, but that was not the case this session, with only three bills enacted in this topic area affecting the ownership, registration and use of motor vehicles or bicycles.

House Bill 99 (Chapter 27) reorganizes and supplements the statutory provisions of the Motor Vehicle Code that govern the acquisition of nonrepairable vehicle certificates and salvage titles for

privately owned passenger vehicles. The bill provides an administrative path for insurance companies to obtain these documents after the payment of total loss claims to the vehicle owners and after towing or storage charges are paid.

In 2023, the look twice for motorcycles vehicle registration plate was created for cars and trucks; however, the legislation did not include the creation of such plates for motorcycles. **Senate Bill 236 (Chapter 74)** adds look twice for motorcycles license plates for motorcycles to the specialty vehicle registration plates offered by the Taxation and Revenue Department's Motor Vehicle Division. These plates are available at an initial cost of \$40.00 and can be renewed each year for \$10.00, and the money collected in excess of the cost of creating the plate is deposited in the Motorcycle Training Fund for the Department of Transportation to provide driver awareness education and motorcycle training statewide. Like the plates for cars and trucks, if certain conditions are met regarding a decrease in demand for the plates, the division will stop issuing the plates.

This year, New Mexico joins 10 other states and the cities of Anchorage, Alaska, and Washington, D.C., in allowing what has become known as "Idaho Stops" for bicycle riders. Pursuant to **Senate Bill 73 (Chapter 22)**, bicycle riders still need to come to a full stop for a red traffic light, but when there is no approaching traffic on the cross street, they may resume riding through the intersection without waiting for the light to change to green. Similarly, bicycle riders may now treat stop signs like yield signs – stopping when there is oncoming traffic on the cross street and proceeding through an intersection when there is no oncoming traffic. The name "Idaho Stops" is based on Idaho enacting the first legislation of this type in 1982.

PROFESSIONAL AND OCCUPATIONAL LICENSURE

The legislature passed and the governor signed a number of bills pertaining to professional and occupational licensure that affect varied professionals such as certified registered nurse anesthetists, nurses, psychologists, accountants, engineers, hair braiders and certain make-up artists and hairstylists.

An approach for making health care more accessible is to expand the scope of practice for certain qualified health care providers. Physicians practicing in specialty areas, including anesthesiologists, are not widely available in certain parts of the state, which can result in delays when a patient needs emergency surgery. Before the passage of **Senate Bill 78 (Chapter 142)**, the Nursing Practice Act authorized certified registered nurse anesthetists to function only as part of a team, where the care of the patient was directed by a physician, osteopath, dentist or podiatrist. The bill amends the Nursing Practice Act to authorize certified registered nurse anesthetists to function in an independent role to perform any action, including determining, preparing, administering or monitoring anesthesia care or anesthesia-related services, without

the supervision of another health care provider and in accordance with the policies of a health care facility.

House Bill 178 (Chapter 101) updates the Nursing Practice Act in number of ways. First, it clarifies that only certified registered nurse anesthetists are authorized to administer general anesthesia, while other registered nurses, with training required by the Board of Nursing and oversight required by their workplace, may administer other types of anesthetics. Second, the bill expands the powers and duties of the Board of Nursing to raise professional licensing fees, and under certain limited circumstances such as first-time licensing, waive those fees altogether. Additionally, the bill requires the board to promulgate rules to establish standards for the use of artificial intelligence in patient care; ensure that the board retains ownership of the data it collects; and develop a system for nursing schools to coordinate prelicensure clinical placements. Finally, certain terminology is updated, such as changing "diversion programs" to "alternative to discipline programs" in the context of rehabilitating impaired nurses, as well as the definitions used that pertain to the prohibition of conversion therapy.

Efforts to increase access to behavioral health care have resulted in various legislative proposals to expand who can participate in the process of granting licensure to clinicians. **Senate Bill 53 (Chapter 59)** amends the definition of "independently licensed prescribing clinician" pursuant to the Professional Psychologist Act to include a prescribing psychologist who has at least four years of independent experience in prescribing psychotropic medications to treat behavioral and emotional conditions and mental illnesses. These prescribing psychologists now may participate in the supervision of psychologists who apply to the New Mexico State Board of Psychologist Examiners for a conditional prescription certificate.

Significant changes are made to the 1999 Public Accountancy Act by **House Judiciary Committee Substitute for House Commerce and Economic Development Committee Substitute for House Bill 296 (Chapter 105)**, including replacing the "substantial equivalency" standard with "comparable licensure requirements" for out-of-state accountants to meet to provide services in New Mexico. The bill also updates the educational requirements for examination and the educational and accounting experience requirements to be certified in New Mexico and extends the amount of time to complete all parts of the exam from 18 to 30 months. Changes will also allow accountants in other jurisdictions to practice in New Mexico if they meet the comparable licensure requirements.

House Bill 323 (Chapter 41) clarifies exemptions to the provisions of the Engineering and Surveying Practice Act to allow for the unlicensed practice of engineering by rural electric distribution cooperatives. Specifically, the bill amends the exemptions to allow rural electric distribution cooperatives to perform engineering services on property that the cooperative owns, leases, has an easement or right of way on or lawfully operates without being subject to the Engineering and Surveying Practice Act. However, these services cannot be offered to the public.

Finally, two bills passed the legislature that create exemptions to the licensing requirements of the Barbers and Cosmetologists Act. **House Bill 281 (Chapter 39)** exempts hair braiding and distinguishes the service from hairstyling, barbering and cosmetology, which allows individuals who engage in hair braiding to establish and operate a hair braiding business without obtaining a license for barbering, cosmetology or hairstyling. Also, **Senate Bill 127 (Chapter 68)** exempts make-up artists and hairstylists employed in theatrical or cinematic productions from the provisions of the Barbers and Cosmetologists Act.

PUBLIC OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES

Regarding public officers and employees, five bills were passed by the legislature during the 2025 regular session. Three of these bills amend the Educational Retirement Act to make various changes, one bill amends the Public Employees Retirement Act to expand a definition used in the return-to-work section of that act and one bill amends the contribution percentages for state employee health benefits.

The issue of return to work is addressed by amendments made to the Educational Retirement Act in **Senate Bill 133 (Chapter 144)**. To encourage retired members who fall under the Educational Retirement Act to fill vacancies and return to work, the bill increases the salary that a retired member may earn without causing a suspension of the member's retirement benefits when returning to work from \$15,000 to \$25,000, while also increasing the period that a retired member can return to work from 36 months to 60 months.

Additionally, the legislature worked to provide more options regarding choice of beneficiary to retired members who are subject to the provisions of the Educational Retirement Act by passing **House Bill 251 (Chapter 38)**, which allows a retired member to exercise a one-time irrevocable option to deselect a spouse who was previously selected as the retired member's beneficiary and to designate a new beneficiary.

Also in regard to educational retirement, **Senate Bill 75 (Chapter 6)** clarifies certain terms and cleans up several provisions of the Educational Retirement Act. The bill:

- ◆ allows for unclaimed member contributions to be deposited into the Educational Retirement Fund, which aligns the law with a provision of Article 20, Section 22 of the Constitution of New Mexico;
- ◆ adds a clarifying definition of "five years of contributory employment" to the section of the Educational Retirement Act discussing retirement benefits and minimum contributory employment;
- ◆ allows a member on disability status who is over age 60 and receives an annuity adjustment to continue to receive the annuity adjustment if the member is on disability status and certified by the Educational Retirement Board as disabled at the time of regular retirement;

- ◆ extends the amount of time that a member who is eligible for a service credit for engagement in military service or in the Commissioned Corps of the United States Public Health Service can pay the required contribution for that service credit from 60 days to 90 days. The bill also eliminates the requirement that the required contribution be paid in a single lump sum; and

- ◆ allows the Educational Retirement Board to disclose member or retired member information to the Public Employees Retirement Board for the purpose of administering the Public Employees Retirement Reciprocity Act.

The only bill to amend the Public Employees Retirement Act is **House Bill 336 (Chapter 106)**, which expands the definition of "peace officer" in the return-to-work statute to include an employee of the state with a duty to maintain public order or to make arrests for crime even if that duty is limited to specific crimes. This change allows retired members of the Public Employees Retirement Association to return to work to collect a pension while earning a paycheck in positions such as a livestock inspector, who has a duty to only enforce laws relating to livestock and animals. Previously, the definition of "peace officer" was limited to a person who is appointed by the attorney general or a district attorney, who is a certified law enforcement officer and who investigates and enforces all state laws.

All state employees will benefit from the passage of **Senate Finance Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 376 (Chapter 80)**, which makes some changes to state employee health insurance benefits. The most significant change involves an increase in the contribution percentages for state employee health insurance benefit premiums. Now the state is required to cover at least 80% of state employee health benefit premiums for all state employees. Most state employees will be required to cover the remaining 20% of the premium, but the state may cover 100% of premiums for some low-income state employees.

REGULATION AND LICENSING

Two bills in the area of regulation and licensing became law, one dealing with regulation of controlled substances at licensed custodial care facilities and one creating a fund for use by the State Racing Commission.

With the passage of **House Bill 171 (Chapter 100)**, a new section is added to the Pharmacy Act to address an issue impacting rural, licensed custodial care facilities that provide substance use disorder treatment, including medically monitored withdrawal services. When patients experiencing withdrawal present at these facilities at night or on a weekend, when the local pharmacy is closed, waiting until the next day or Monday to obtain the withdrawal management drugs can be life-threatening. Effective January 1, 2026, these facilities will be authorized to stock these drugs on their premises to provide immediate relief from withdrawal symptoms, as long as two conditions are met: first, the facility must be under the

supervision of a consulting pharmacist; and second, the facility must have nursing staff on duty 24 hours per day.

Next, **Senate Bill 92 (Chapter 114)** creates a nonreverting fund in the state treasury, the Horse Racing Integrity and Safety Authority and Jockey and Exercise Rider Insurance Fund. Money from the fund will be used to pay the cost of complying with the federal Horseracing Integrity and Safety Act of 2020 and the cost of jockey and exercise rider insurance as required by state and federal law. Additionally, the legislation provides authority to the State Racing Commission to expend money from casinos at horse racetracks allocated to the new fund in the Gaming Control Act.

STATE GOVERNMENT

Measures enacted into law in 2025 that fall under the state government category include bills that affect the day-to-day operations of certain state entities, certain contracts and property of the state and local public bodies, record sharing and public affairs.

Entities and Operations

Various state entities are granted quasi-judicial powers that allow them to efficiently execute the laws and respect the due process rights of people they serve. Many of these entities are granted a subpoena power by statute, which aids those bodies in the investigations for administrative proceedings. **Senate Bill 124 (Chapter 143)** allows the superintendent of insurance to issue a civil investigative subpoena in examining and investigating insurance matters. Correspondingly, the bill also allows the authority enforcing the subpoena, upon a person's failure to obey the subpoena and upon reasonable notice to the affected parties, to apply to the district court for an order compelling compliance.

Every two years, legislation is enacted to extend the sunset dates for certain boards and commissions. In **Senate Bill 113 (Chapter 66)**, the termination dates of the Board of Nursing Home Administrators, the Board of Barbers and Cosmetologists, the Board of Landscape Architects, the Coal Surface Mining Commission and the Water Quality Control Commission are extended 10 years to July 1, 2035.

Procurement and Property

Regarding the current business of the state, the executive department issues hundreds of contracts for information technology projects each year. Until now, those contracts and the amendments to contracts and the requests for proposals for information technology projects had to be approved by three separate departments: the General Services Department, the Department of Finance and Administration

and the Department of Information Technology. **House Government, Elections and Indian Affairs Committee Substitute for House Bill 618 (Chapter 51)** streamlines the procurement process for information technology projects. The Department of Information Technology retains its oversight roles regarding the state's information technology projects, including strategic planning, reviewing agency compliance with the state's strategic plan and approving agency information technology projects prior to procurement. However, the Department of Information Technology no longer has to approve agency requests for approval or changes to existing contracts.

House Bill 456 (Chapter 109) addresses contract limits that can be entered into by a state agency or local public body. A state agency or local public body may have multiple project contracts with an architectural or engineering firm under a single qualifications-based request for proposals, but the total amount for a single contractor, including any renewals, cannot exceed \$2 million. The agency or body may procure multiple indefinite quantity construction contracts pursuant to a price agreement for multiple projects under a single request for proposals, but all contracts, including renewals, cannot exceed \$30 million in a period of no more than 10 years, and the contract must provide that any one purchase order under the contract cannot exceed \$7 million. A contract to be awarded to a firm that is currently performing under a contract shall not cause the total amount of all contracts issued to exceed \$15 million in any four-year period for architectural or engineering services or \$30 million in any 10-year period for construction.

It has been decades since the legislature raised the property value thresholds that require State Board of Finance, or other agency, approval before the sale, trade or lease of property by the state or certain local public bodies such as counties, school districts, community colleges and special districts, although municipalities and certain state educational institutions are exempt from this provision. This year, **Senate Bill 274 (Chapter 76)** raises these property thresholds, some of which include that: the maximum resale value of tangible personal property that may be disposed of and deleted from the public inventory of a state agency, local public body or school district without State Board of Finance approval is increased from \$5,000 to \$30,000; the minimum value that requires a sale through public auction or disposal of surplus road equipment by the Department of Transportation is raised from \$5,000 to \$30,000; the current value of real property or tangible personal property that may be sold, traded or leased without State Board of Finance approval, but that may need higher-level approval by certain state agencies, is increased from \$5,000 to \$30,000; except for certain sales, trades or leases approved pursuant to Section 13-6-3 NMSA 1978, a sale, trade or lease of real property belonging to a state agency, local public body or school district that requires State Board of Finance approval is increased from \$25,000 to \$150,000; and a real property sale, trade or lease exceeding 25 years that is required to be ratified and approved by the legislature is raised from \$100,000 to \$550,000.

Records

Open government is an important principle that is often accomplished through the Inspection of Public Records Act. That act is an important tool to ensure transparency, but it must also balance legitimate privacy concerns for third parties. **Senate Bill 57 (Chapter 60)** exempts from the Inspection of Public Records Act records that contain personal identifying information or sensitive information related to the practice of a medical provider employed by a public body who performs medical services related to abortion.

Another measure passed to address privacy is **Senate Bill 36 (Chapter 138)**, which serves two purposes. First, it restricts state employees from purposefully disclosing to anyone outside of the state agency a person's sensitive personal information except for specified purposes or when the applicant consents in writing to the disclosure of such information. Second, it prohibits a current or former employee or contractor of the Taxation and Revenue Department or the Traffic Safety Bureau of the Department of Transportation from divulging an individual's personal information to a federal, state or local government agency or a nongovernmental entity for purposes of enforcing the federal Immigration and Nationality Act, except for felony criminal provisions of that act.

Public Affairs

Two bills passed this session that will have symbolic impacts. The first is **House Bill 468 (Chapter 110)**, which provides guidance on how a used state flag should be retired, preferably by burning, in a dignified public or private ceremony. The second is **House Bill 172 (Chapter 134)**, which declares August of each year to be "New Mexico Red and Green Chile Month" and encourages all to enjoy August of each year as an opportunity to recognize chile and the extensive historical, cultural and economic impacts it has in New Mexico.

TAXATION

Once again, the legislature included most tax-related bills intended for passage in an omnibus tax package; however, this year's package, House Taxation and Revenue Committee Substitute for House Bill 14, was vetoed by the governor. This left only four tax-related bills that were signed, including a bill that updates property tax exemptions for veterans after approval of certain constitutional amendments, another creating a statutory (as opposed to a constitutional) property tax exemption for the New Mexico

Renewable Energy Transmission Authority, an administrative cleanup bill that makes hundreds of changes to the tax code and a clarification to a definition in the high-wage jobs tax credit.

Pursuant to constitutional amendments approved by voters at the November 5, 2024 general election, **House Taxation and Revenue Committee Substitute for House Government, Elections and Indian Affairs Committee Substitute for House Bill 47 (Chapter 10)** amends certain property tax exemptions for veterans: one to increase the exemption amount for all veterans and their widowed spouses from \$4,000 to \$10,000; and another to extend a property tax exemption only allowed for 100% disabled veterans and their widowed spouses to veterans with less than a 100% disability and their widowed spouses. The amount of the exemption would be equal to the percentage of the veteran's federal disability rating.

House Bill 295 (Chapter 104) makes improvements on land owned by the New Mexico Renewable Energy Transmission Authority exempt from property tax for as long as the authority holds title to the property. The bill amends the fractional property interests section of law to provide that improvements, including leasehold interest in the improvements, are exempt if the improvements are: electric transmission and interconnected storage facilities and all related structures, properties and supporting infrastructure that have been acquired by the authority and qualify as an eligible facility pursuant to the New Mexico Renewable Energy Transmission Act; and leased by the authority to a nonexempt entity to construct, operate or assist the authority in constructing or operating the eligible facility.

A massive tax administration cleanup bill, **House Bill 218 (Chapter 130)**, was also enacted. Among many other changes, the bill updates and deletes multiple outdated provisions of Chapter 7 NMSA 1978; amends the Metropolitan Redevelopment Code and the Tax Increment for Development Act to conform with destination sourcing; amends how the Taxation and Revenue Department can make adjustments of distributions and transfers to political subdivisions; increases the amount and extends the time period the secretary of taxation and revenue may set tax reporting and payment intervals; increases the amount a taxpayer may owe to allow quarterly or semiannual filing; allows a completed return to constitute a filing of a claim for refund; amends certain provisions on interest on deficiencies; provides that electronic filers file and pay with the same deadline as all other filers; removes contingent rates for the petroleum products loading fee; and amends a 2024 session law that would have inadvertently repealed certain provisions of the Tax Administration Act.

Finally, **House Bill 368 (Chapter 107)** amends what a "threshold job" means for a taxpayer to be eligible for the high-wage jobs tax credit to clarify that an employee of the taxpayer must occupy a job for 52 weeks, as opposed to a "calendar year", and that the time frame begins on the first day the job is occupied.

WATER

With a changing climate, droughts, overuse and New Mexico's arid climate, water is both vital and precarious. The legislature passed three bills this session to enhance and protect its fresh water resources.

First, **Senate Judiciary Committee Substitute for Senate Bills 21 & 22 (Chapter 112)** increases protections for the state's water resources by amending the Water Quality Act, enacting the New Mexico Pollutant Discharge Elimination System Act and creating a Neglected and Contaminated Sites Fund to provide funding for responding to, investigating and remediating water pollution and contamination in soil and soil vapor. The amendments to the Water Quality Act include: regulation of water reuse; modifications to surface and ground water permitting and permit enforcement by the Department of Environment; changes to the role of the Water Quality Control Commission with regard to water quality impact; increased ground water protections; and clarification of rules related to potable water reuse.

The newly enacted New Mexico Pollutant Discharge Elimination System Act provides that the state, rather than the federal Environmental Protection Agency, is primarily responsible for the prevention and regulation of point source discharges of pollutants into surface and ground waters of the state. The act establishes a permit system for point source discharges of pollutants, including opportunities for public comment on permit applications. In addition, it specifies duties and powers of the Water Quality Control Commission and the Department of Environment, provides for administrative, civil and criminal enforcement and penalties and for administrative appeals of department actions and judicial appeals of commission actions and makes available to the public most records generated or obtained by the commission and the department.

The second water-related bill, **Senate Bill 37 (Chapter 56)**, creates the Strategic Water Reserve Fund for the purposes of the strategic water reserve and updates the powers of the Interstate Stream Commission. The bill adds that water and water rights in the strategic water reserve shall be used to assist the state or water users with water management and water conservation efforts to support aquifer recharge or reduce ground water depletion. Furthermore, when establishing priorities for the acquisition of water or water rights, the Interstate Stream Commission is now required to consider potential supplementary benefits, including supporting traditional and cultural practices, habitat improvement or recreational opportunities within the affected water reach or ground water basin.

Lastly, **House Energy, Environment and Natural Resources Committee Substitute for House Agriculture, Acequias and Water Resources Committee Substitute for House Bill 137 (Chapter 97)** is designed to catalyze the treatment of brackish water by removing or eliminating contaminants to meet certain water quality standards. The bill creates the Strategic Water Supply Program and the Strategic Water Supply Program Fund to allow the Department of Environment and the Office of the State

Engineer to enter into contracts or award grants for eligible projects that involve the treatment of brackish water for the purposes of enhancing the state's fresh water resources.

FIFTY-SIXTH LEGISLATURE
FIRST SPECIAL SESSION, 2024

Shortly after the regular session adjourned on February 15, 2024, the governor indicated that she was considering calling a special session to address several public safety proposals that did not pass during the regular session. Over the ensuing months, the legislature's interim Courts, Corrections and Justice Committee held a series of meetings devoted to public safety topics such as amending criminal competency proceedings and prohibiting people from standing on medians on certain roads. Although no consensus was reached between the legislature and the governor on these proposals, the governor called the legislature back to Santa Fe on July 18, 2024, with her proclamation solely focused on public safety.

In the end, none of the governor's bills received a committee hearing, let alone a floor vote, with the legislature instead turning its focus to an appropriations bill. In five hours, both chambers passed **House Bill 1 (Chapter 1, p.v.)** and promptly adjourned. The bill, in addition to paying for the expenses of the First Special Session of the Fifty-Sixth Legislature, appropriates the following:

- ◆ \$10 million to the Indian Affairs Department for the Mescalero Apache Tribe to pay for damages and losses caused by the South Fork and Salt wildfires;

- ◆ \$10 million to the EMNRD for wildfire mitigation, watershed restoration, slope stabilization, erosion control, post-fire management and regional master planning of public infrastructure reconstruction due to damages caused by wildfire or flooding;

- ◆ \$10 million to the Homeland Security and Emergency Management Department to support individuals and businesses in the state throughout the claims process for receiving public assistance through the Federal Emergency Management Agency and in making private insurance claims;

- ◆ \$70 million to the Department of Finance and Administration to provide zero-interest reimbursable loans to political subdivisions of the state that have been approved for public assistance funding for projects to repair or replace public infrastructure damaged by the South Fork and Salt fires; and

- ◆ \$3 million to the Administrative Office of the Courts to fund assisted outpatient treatment programs and competency diversion pilot programs.

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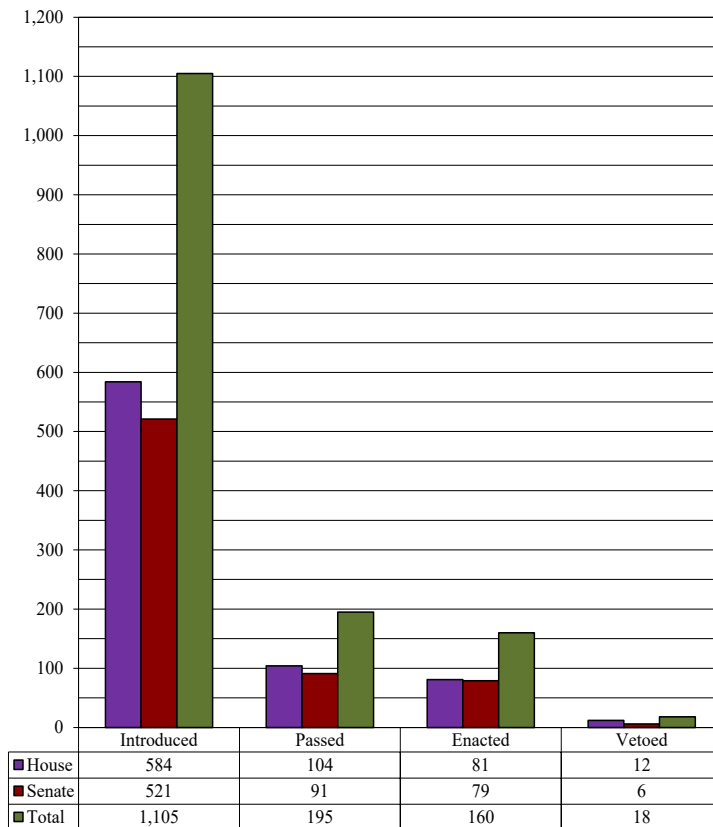

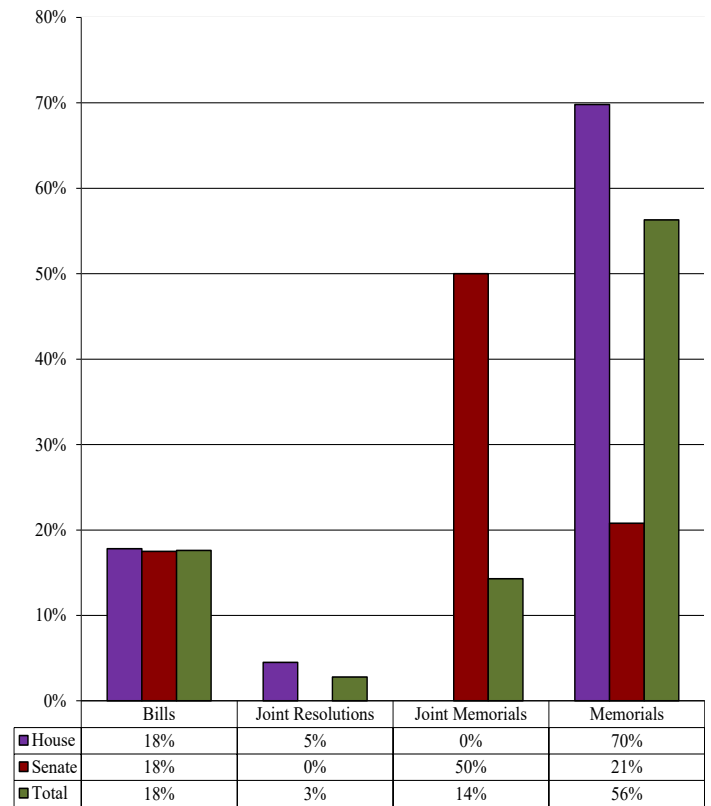

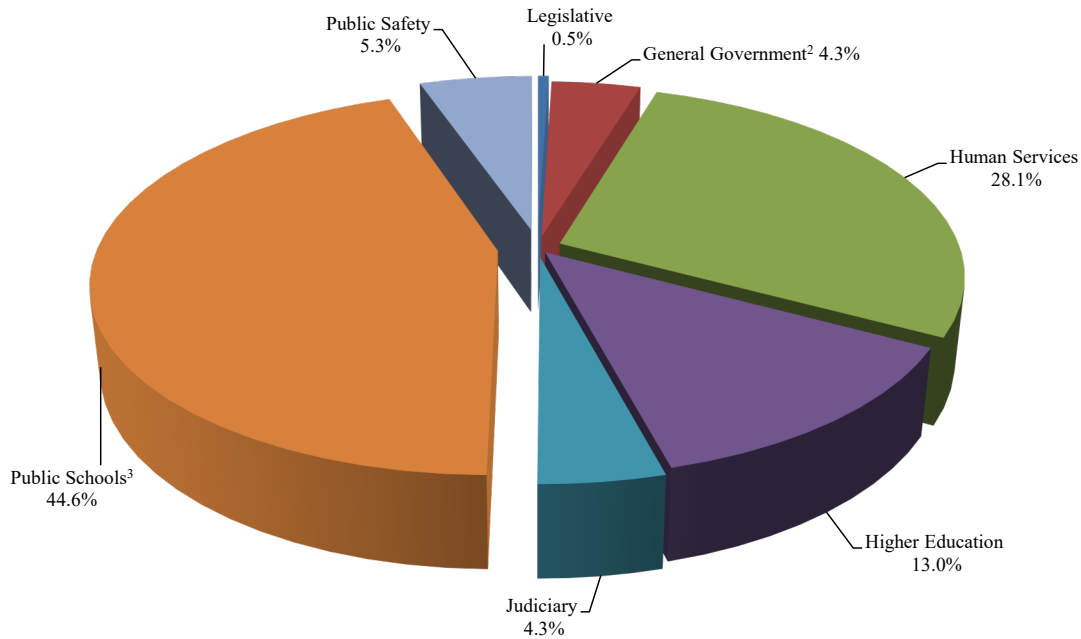

\$10.7 Billion¹

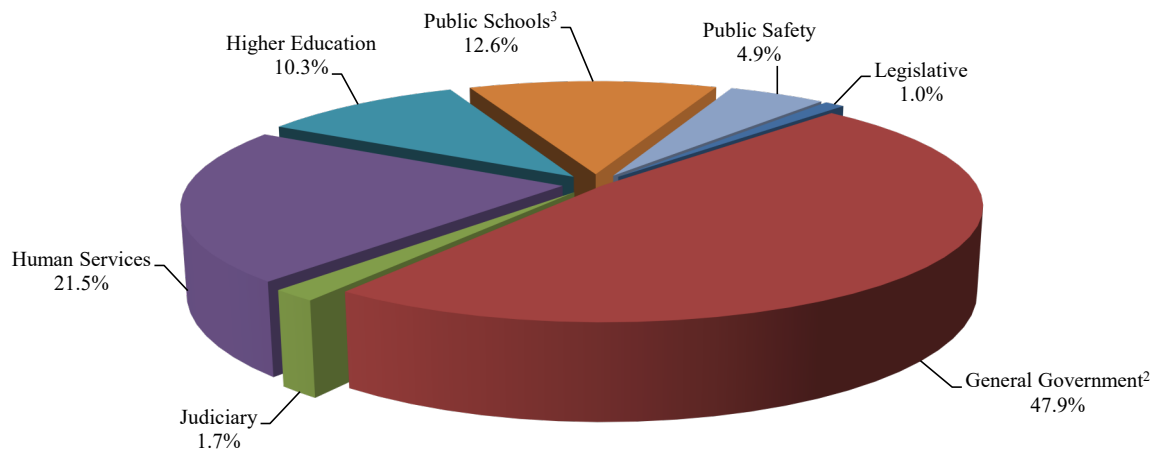

\$1.6 Billion¹

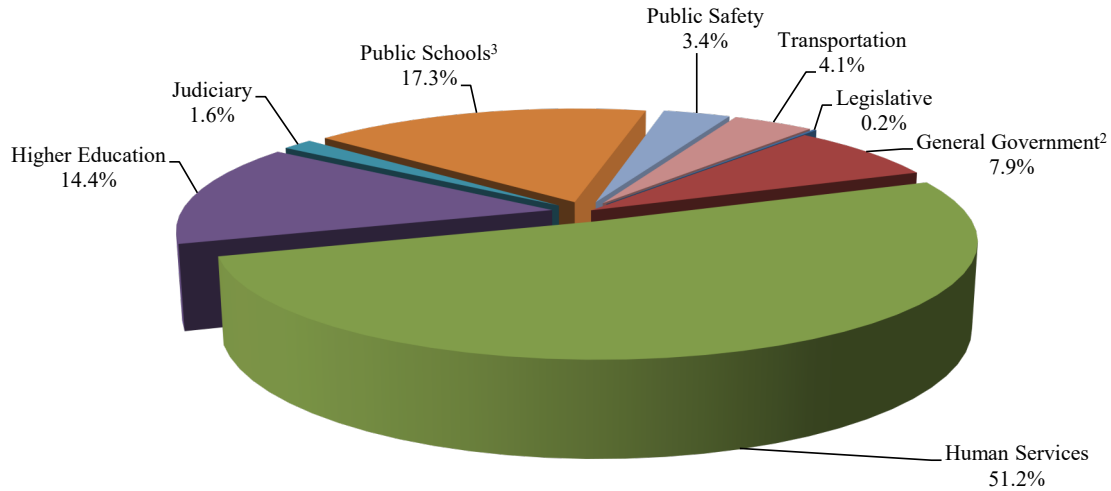

\$31.2 Billion¹

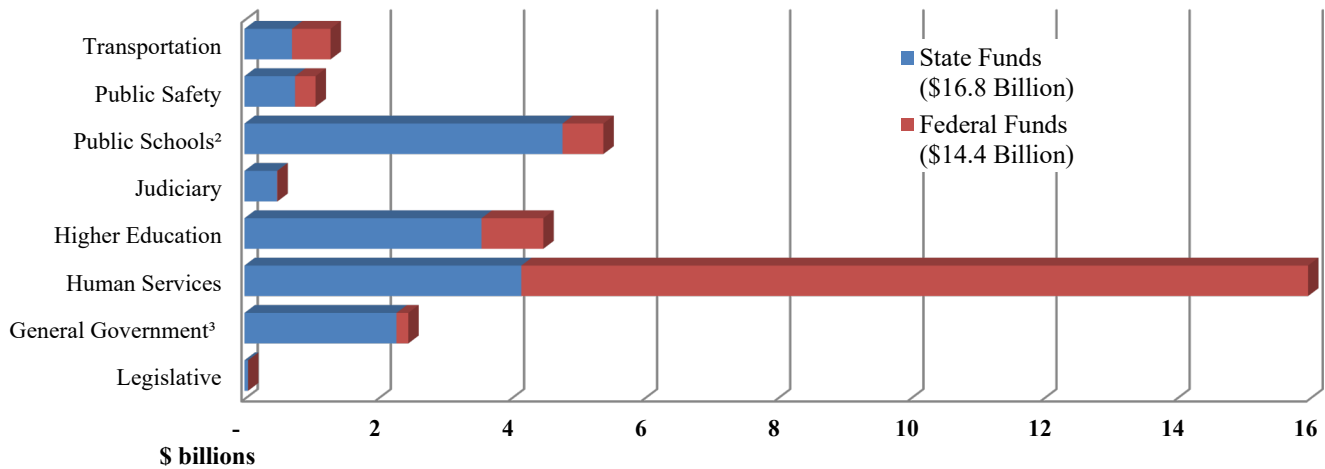

\$31.2 Billion

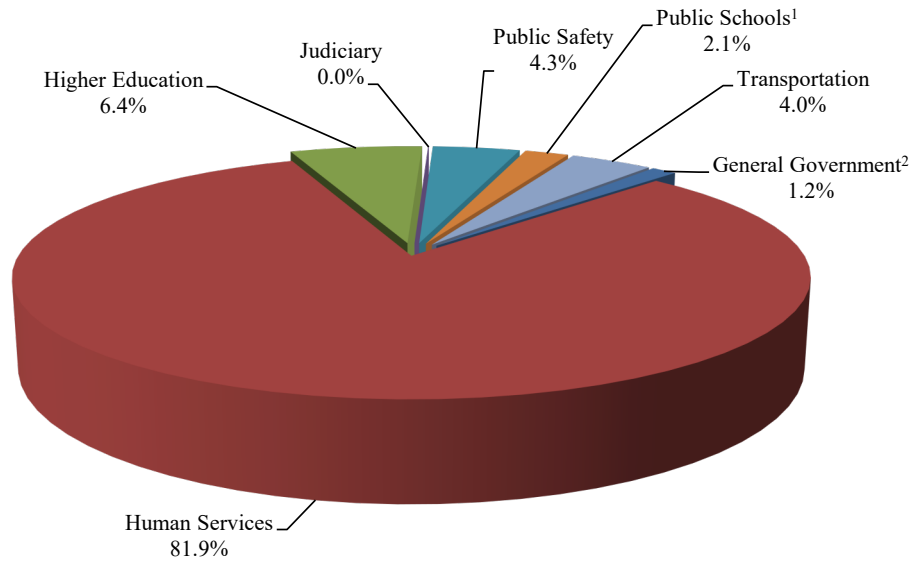

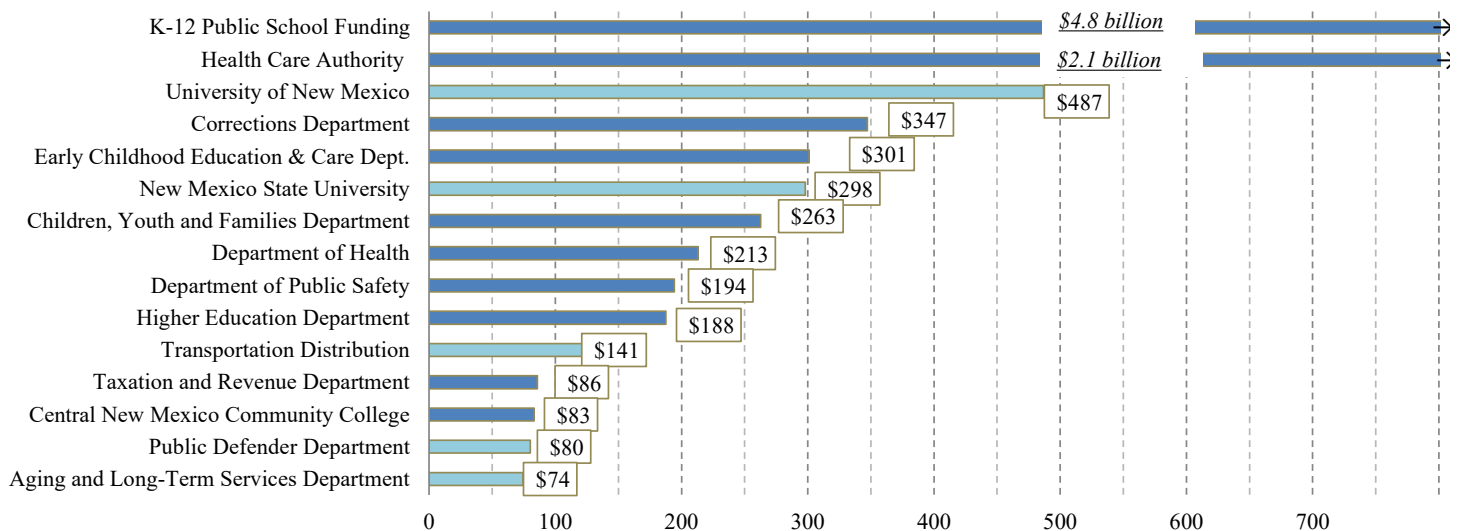

GENERAL APPROPRIATION ACT OF 2025 VETO TABLE ENDNOTES

1. The general appropriation act (or House Bill 2) is the omnibus bill the legislature passes each year to fund the current operations of state government. Generally, the Constitution of New Mexico (Constitution) prohibits the legislature from passing bills that embrace more than one subject; however, Article 4, Section 16 provides a specific exception for "general appropriation bills" so long as they "embrace nothing but appropriations for the expense of the executive, legislative and judiciary departments, interest, sinking fund, payments on the public debt, public schools and other expenses required by existing laws". Since early in New Mexico's statehood, the New Mexico Supreme Court (Supreme Court) has held that, in addition to appropriations, a general appropriations bill may also include provisions that are germane and naturally connected to those appropriations. *State ex rel. Lucero v. Marron*, 1912-NMSC-037, ¶ 13; *National Building v. State Board of Education*, 1973-NMSC-053, ¶ 14.

Article 4, Section 22 of the Constitution provides for the partial veto (also known as the line-item veto), which is the governor's power to approve or disapprove parts or items of any bill that appropriates money. Although this power confers broad discretion to the governor, the Supreme Court has ruled that the partial veto power is not without limit and must be exercised with restraint and in accordance with the constitutional principles of separation of powers and checks and balances. After each legislative session, the Legislative Council Service (LCS)

provides commentary on the governor's partial vetoes in House Bill 2 and relies on Supreme Court case law and attorney general opinions when analyzing the effects of the vetoes.

Importantly, the Supreme Court has held the following regarding the general parameters of the partial veto power:

"The power of the partial veto is the power to disapprove. This is a negative power to delete or destroy a part or item, and is not a positive power, or a power to alter, enlarge or increase the effect of the remaining parts or items. It is not the power to enact or create new legislation by selective deletions." *State ex rel. Sego v. Kirkpatrick*, 1974-NMSC-059, ¶ 18. "[T]he Legislature has the power to affix reasonable provisions, conditions or limitations upon appropriations and upon the expenditure of the funds appropriated", and "[t]he Governor may not distort, frustrate or defeat the legislative purpose by a veto of proper legislative conditions, restrictions, limitations or contingencies placed upon an appropriation". *Sego*, ¶ 23.

The legislature, however, may not attempt to intrude on the executive managerial function by including provisions concerned with detailed, miniscule or inconsequential management decisions. *State ex rel. Coll v. Carruthers*, 1988-NMSC-057, ¶¶ 11-12. When the legislature includes an unreasonable or otherwise inappropriate provision with an appropriation, the governor may veto only those provisions and is not required to veto the entire appropriation. *Coll*, ¶¶ 14-15. On the other hand, when the legislature includes reasonable or otherwise appropriate provisions with an appropriation, the governor may not use the partial veto power to carefully strike words, phrases, clauses or sentences to avoid legislative oversight. *Sego*, ¶ 18; *Coll*, ¶ 15.

The LCS's commentary on the governor's partial vetoes in House Bill 2 is not intended to serve as an official position regarding the constitutionality of the vetoes. Rather, this commentary is intended to aid legislators in their review of the legislative session and is based on the analysis of LCS staff. The preceding chart describes each of the governor's partial vetoes. The vetoes that LCS staff determined may conflict with the parameters established by the Constitution and the Supreme Court are footnoted with the LCS's commentary. The money shown in the fund columns reflects both the vetoed appropriations and, based on the analysis of LCS staff, the appropriations that may be questioned due to the governor's specific exercise of the partial veto power in connection with those appropriations.

2. This strike may distort legislative intent and enlarge the effect of the remaining language. By removing the word "average" from an appropriation to provide an average four percent salary increase for public school personnel, the governor is arguably substituting her judgment for the legislature's judgment. Pursuant to this strike, a four percent salary increase for all eligible positions at all salary levels is required, regardless of whether the amount appropriated is sufficient, which usurps the agency's ability to consider merit or other factors.
3. Specifically, the strike of the sentence on lines 8 and 9 may enlarge the effect of the appropriation and subvert legislative intent. By removing this language that sets aside a portion of the appropriation for tribal education departments, the governor removed an expenditure limitation that the legislature has the power to attach to an appropriation. (See *Holmes*.)
4. This strike removes a contingency attached to only \$2.77 million of the total appropriation; however, the legislative intent for including this contingency is not clear and may be an unreasonable restriction on the expenditure of the appropriation. The governor has the authority to strike an unreasonable or otherwise inappropriate provision in a general appropriation bill and is not required to strike the entire appropriation. (See *Coll*.)
5. Article 4, Section 16 of the Constitution provides, in relevant part, that "General appropriation bills shall embrace nothing but appropriations for expense of the executive, legislative and judiciary departments, interest, sinking fund, payments on the public debt, public schools and other expenses required by existing laws". The Supreme Court has interpreted this provision as allowing appropriations only for the current expenses of state government.

The New Mexico Supreme Court has also held: "The object and purpose of [Article 4, Section 16] was to protect the treasury against legislative raids by the insertion of special appropriations for new purposes in a general appropriation where they might easily pass unnoticed. When careful consideration of such items upon their merits, which might be had if presented separately, would result in their defeat by reason of their doubtful strength. The further purpose was to prevent the passage of general legislation as a part of such bill, which in no way was connected with the subject of making provision for the expenses of the government. The term 'general appropriation bills shall embrace nothing but appropriations,' as used, means that no appropriations other than those specified shall be valid if placed in such general appropriation bill." (See *State ex rel. Whittier v. Safford*, 1923-NMSC-041.)

Regarding amendments by reference, Article 4, Section 18 of the Constitution provides that: "No law shall be revised or amended, or the provisions thereof extended by reference to its title only; but each section thereof as revised, amended or extended shall be set out in full." Section 5 of the GAA provides for "special appropriations", which are generally non-operational expenses that may otherwise be required by existing laws. It is noted that some of the special appropriations in the GAA are for new purposes and not current expenses. Additionally, Section 5 contains some provisions that may amount to substantive law or amendments by reference.

In Section 5 and elsewhere in the GAA, there are provisions that extend the expenditure periods for or change the purposes of appropriations made in previous fiscal years by previous legislatures. Although general appropriation bills are considered ephemeral laws that are not compiled in the New Mexico Statutes Annotated, they are still duly enacting laws subject to the provisions of Article 4, Section 18 of the Constitution. To align with the requirements in Article 4, Section 18 and with the Legislative Style Manual adopted by the New Mexico Legislative Council, the session laws containing appropriations that were amended by reference in the GAA would need to instead be set out in full in legislation and amended with brackets and underscoring. Alternatively, the appropriations in those previously enacted laws could be allowed to expire and those amounts to revert, allowing the current legislature to choose whether and how to re-appropriate the money.

6. This strike may remove a reasonable condition precedent. The statute that creates the Appropriation Contingency Fund (Section 6-4-2.3 NMSA 1978) provides, in relevant part, that the fund may be expended "only[...] upon specific authorization by the legislature". By removing this condition precedent, the governor may be usurping legislative authority, and the result may give rise to accountability concerns.

7. This strike may enlarge the effect of the remaining language and subvert legislative intent by removing the appropriation's intended recipient and parts of the appropriation's purpose. The governor has neither the authority to substitute the legislature's judgment nor the "power to enact or create new legislation by selective deletions". Of particular note, the governor may have exceeded the scope of the partial veto power by striking the first two words of the compound adjective, "direct-to-housing". (See *Sego*; *State ex rel. Cisneros v. Martinez*, 2015-NMSC-001; and *State ex rel. Smith v. Martinez*, 2011-NMSC-043.)

8. This strike may enlarge the effect of the remaining language and frustrate legislative intent. First, by striking the fiscal year, the governor is authorizing expenditure of the appropriation in an earlier fiscal year that the legislature did not account for, which may lead to collateral consequences for the state's finances. Second, by striking the specified sums for Albuquerque and Bernalillo County and Las Cruces and Dona Ana County, the governor may be substituting her judgment for the legislature's and usurping the legislature's power to make policy and appropriate accordingly. In *Sego*, the Supreme Court held that the legislature may properly limit the expenditure of appropriated funds, particularly when the funds will have a significant financial impact.

9. The fund referenced in this appropriation was incorrectly cited, which may justify the governor's veto.

10. This strike may impermissibly enlarge the effect of the remaining language and frustrate legislative intent. The legislature intended the appropriation to be used for capacity building grants to specific recipients and the governor has removed two categories of intended recipients with the veto; however, the feasibility study for municipal incorporation is not an expense of state government and the strike of that language may, on its own, be a proper veto.

11. This strike may enlarge the effect of the remaining language and frustrate legislative intent.

12. This strike may enlarge the effect of the remaining language and frustrate legislative intent by striking the language providing for expenditure in fiscal year 2025 and the reversion clause. The legislature passed the Behavioral Health Reform and Investment Act early in the session, but the emergency clause included in the bill was not sustained. This special appropriation anticipated an earlier effective date for the act, and with this strike the governor appears to have usurped legislative power and in effect "appropriated" an additional \$200,000 to the Health Care Authority for fiscal year 2026.

13. This strike may enlarge the effect of the remaining language and frustrate legislative intent. The governor's veto message stated that the stricken language inappropriately restricts the use of the funding; however, in *Sego*, the court stated that the governor's partial veto power is a negative power — "it is not the power to enact or create new legislation by selective deletions". The remaining language may amount to a completely different appropriation than what was passed by the legislature.

14. This strike may enlarge the effect of the remaining language and frustrate legislative intent by directing the entire appropriation to the Corrections Department when the legislature intended it to be available as grants to local detention centers as well. The *Sego* court established that the power of the partial veto does not provide the governor with the power to enact or create new legislation by selective deletions.

15. This strike may improperly enlarge the effect of the remaining language and frustrate legislative purpose by removing a part of the provision requiring that out-of-school time programs incorporate social-emotional learning and community service learning; however, depending on the nature of the relevant programming, the restriction may be too specific and invade the executive managerial function. (See *Sego*.)

16. This strike may subvert legislative intent and expand the effect of the remaining language by removing the part of the appropriation that provides for expenditure in fiscal year 2026, which may have collateral consequences for the state's finances.

17. This strike may enlarge the effect of the remaining language and completely subvert legislative intent by removing both the intended recipient of the appropriation and the potential grantees, which may now include private persons.

18. This strike may enlarge the effect of the remaining language and frustrate legislative intent by removing parts of the appropriation providing for its purpose while leaving an ambiguous sentence appropriating money for "a doctorate degree program in social work".

19. This veto may frustrate legislative purpose. The legislature intended to fund planning for a wellness center, and the governor's veto allows the money to be expended for the ambiguous purpose of "wellness planning".

20. This strike may remove a reasonable condition precedent and subvert legislative intent because the strike eliminates the parameters provided by the legislature for the Higher Education Department to determine distributions. Without the sentence describing the formula parameters, the Higher Education Department could potentially use a formula that allows for distributions larger than anticipated or for distributions that do not provide for an equal, per student amount.

21. This strike may enlarge the effect of the remaining language and substitute the governor's judgment for the legislature's by removing the language providing for expenditure in fiscal year 2026.

22. This strike may enlarge the effect of the remaining language and subvert legislative intent by striking the \$2 million set aside for an expansion of rural air service locations; however, the stricken proviso may be substantive law that conflicts with the statutory language of the rural air service enhancement grant program. Therefore, the governor's strike of the proviso may be justified.

23. This veto may be proper, particularly because the stricken language allows for use of the Local Economic Development Act Fund that may conflict with the statute that creates the fund.

24. This is likely a proper veto because the governor struck the entire item. Additionally, the inclusion of this provision in the GAA aligns with constitutional requirements.

(Laws 2025, Chapter 159, p.v.)

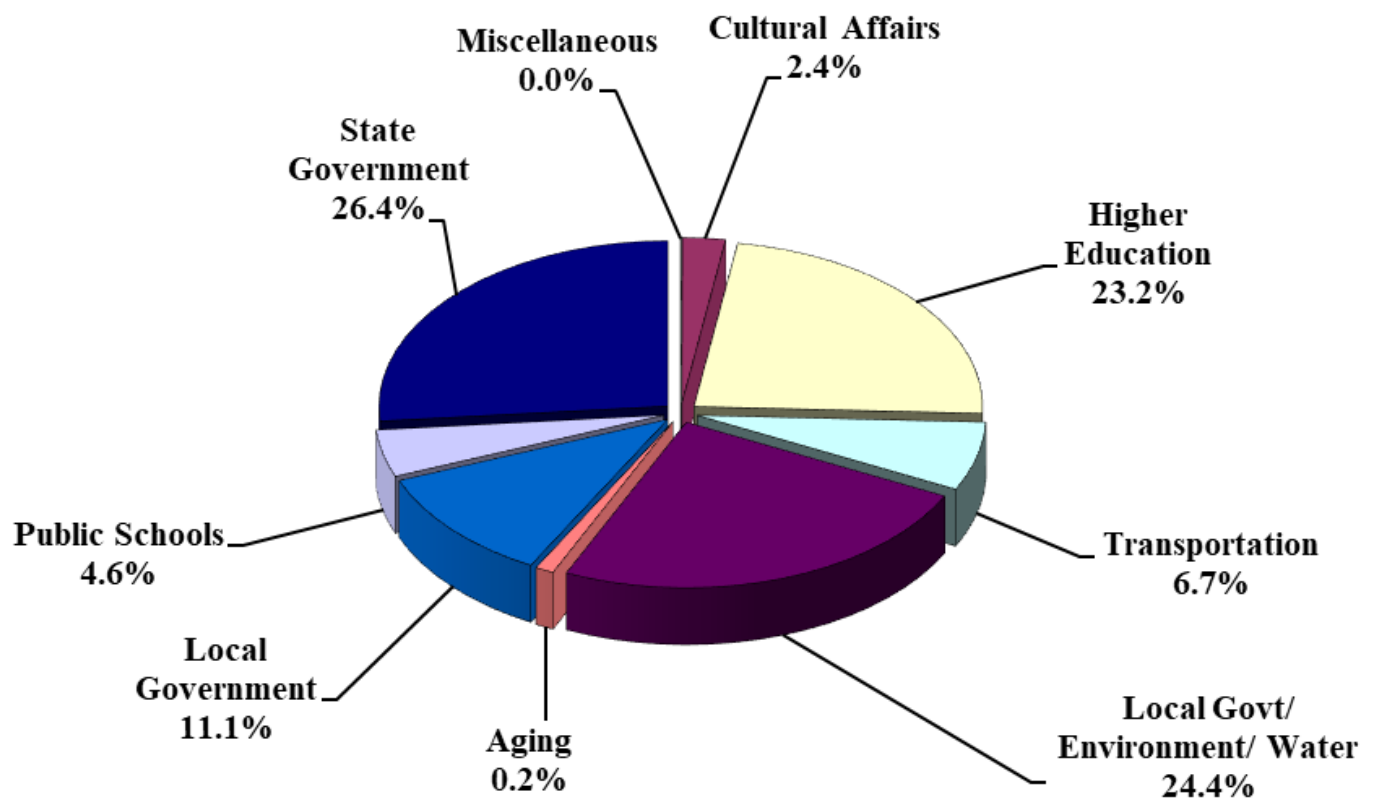

The legislature may reauthorize funds that have been appropriated for capital outlay projects in previous years to change, expand or clarify the project purpose; to extend the time of expenditure or the certification period for the project; or to change the administering agency. Descriptions of the projects that were reauthorized in 2025 are presented here in the numerical order in which they appear in the bill. Projects are presented in the bill in alphabetical order by the county in which they have most recently been authorized. Original citations for the reauthorized projects appear in italics following the text of each project listing. The governor vetoed 97 projects in their entirety and vetoed language in 14 projects as indicated in the listings below.

SECTION 3.
