Civics lessons teach that government in the United States is founded upon three separate, coequal branches: executive, legislative and judicial. The truth tends to be murkier, particularly with regard to the executive, as the tendency is for governors to exert significant leverage over the legislative branch, to varying degrees. Checks and balances operate on something of a pendulum, though. For example, newly elected governors usually enjoy a willingness from the legislature to advance priorities that tends to fade over time. As terms wear on, the legislature usually pushes back and often tires of bending to the governor's will. Outgoing governors have, historically, not done well.

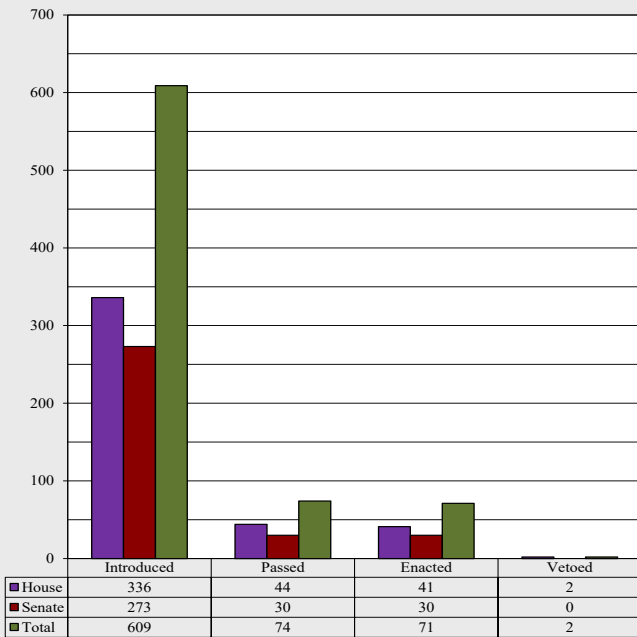
All trends have outliers, though, and New Mexico's governor enjoyed unusual influence over the legislature throughout her two terms. This is particularly evident in the sessions that bookend her terms. In the first term, she advocated for the so-called rocket docket, a package of bills vetoed by the previous governor and fast-tracked for final passage in the first weeks of the 2019 session.

Similarly, the 2026 legislative session began with the legislature fast-tracking a package of bills backed by the governor, addressing three subjects: medical licensure, transportation bonding and the intersection of criminal justice and mental health. The medical licensing compacts were the beginning of the legislature's attempt to address significant practitioner shortages in New Mexico. It should be noted here that passing anything other than a bill funding a legislative session in the first two weeks is not considered normal legislative behavior in New Mexico. Doing so for the first and last sessions of a governor's term is unheard of in recent legislative memory.

After the quick start, the 2026 legislative session remained a busy one. While the overall number of bills introduced and passed was down somewhat from previous 30-day sessions, a number of significant (and perhaps landmark) pieces of legislation made it across the finish line. The session even saw a bit of clever parliamentary maneuvering, as Senate Republicans devised a call of the Senate on a motion to change orders of business.

Much of the legislation considered in 2026 was in response to the national political climate. Bills prohibiting the housing of federal immigration inmates in New Mexico prisons, banning federal troops at election polling sites and limiting the use of information obtained from automatic license plate readers all passed.

Other important pieces of legislation that passed included changes to the state's medical malpractice laws (cited by some as a major factor in the aforementioned practitioner shortage), changes to the capital outlay system and creation of an Office of Special Education.

Of course, the most important job of the legislature in a 30-day session is to develop and pass a budget. In 2026, another record budget was passed, along with a significant tax package.

Also, in the fall of 2025, the governor announced an initiative that would provide free child care to all New Mexican families. While many legislators initially balked at the price tag, and could have chosen to back away from it, legislators found a way to fund it and build some guardrails into the program.

Two other pieces of legislation with potential long-term ramifications for the legislature as an institution also passed, technically. The first was a bill addressing the use of state funds in emergencies and disasters. Critics have noted that the governor's ability to administer funds in emergencies without legislative approval undermines the legislative branch. The bill passed, but it was vetoed. The other could put an end to a discussion that has taken place in the

legislature for decades: after countless attempts, the legislature passed a proposed constitutional amendment authorizing salaries for legislators.

In any session, there are bound to be high-profile bills that fail to pass. In 2026, two of the most high-profile bills did not cross the finish line: a bill codifying language in executive orders issued by the governor regarding greenhouse gas emissions; and a bill creating additional requirements for firearms dealers and prohibiting the sale of certain weapons.

The *Highlights* is an annual publication of the Legislative Council Service (LCS) that summarizes much, but not all, of the legislative action during each session. The omission of certain legislation or issues should not be interpreted as an indication that those are not important; each is important to someone.

Many issues in the *Highlights* defy single-topic categorization, so every effort has been made to organize and cross-reference the contents. A complete listing of bills that passed is included in the Concordance located in [Appendix E](#).

AGRICULTURE AND ANIMALS

Two laws related to agriculture and animals were enacted in the 2026 session, one regarding the imposition of fees on animal food products and another affecting various agriculture licensing and inspection fees.

The New Mexico Commercial Feed Act imposes a fee on pet foods for cats and dogs. The money collected from this fee is primarily used to fund an assistance program administered by the Board of Veterinary Medicine for the spaying and neutering of cats and dogs. The fees were set to expire on July 1, 2026; however, **Senate Bill 38 (Chapter 32)** permanently extends the fee on registered pet foods for cats and dogs and keeps the funding stream for the spay and neuter assistance program in place.

With the enactment of **Senate Bill 143 (Chapter 13)**, the New Mexico Department of Agriculture now has the ability to raise licensing, inspection and other regulatory fees on some of the acts it administers and enforces, including the Egg Grading Act, the Pesticide Control Act, the Plant Protection Act, the New Mexico Fertilizer Act and the New Mexico Commercial Feed Act. The Board of Regents of New Mexico State University (NMSU) may index the amount of a fee for inflation until July 1, 2031 by using the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers published by the United States Department of Labor.

APPROPRIATIONS AND FINANCE

New Mexico entered the 2026 session with a fiscal position that was especially strong by historical standards. The state's position was lifted by high oil and gas production in the Permian Basin, large General Fund reserve balances and growing permanent fund balances and investment earnings. At the same time, revenue growth had and was expected to slow down, oil price assumptions were lower and federal uncertainty hit New Mexico especially hard. The budgetary question confronting legislators in 2026 was not if they had resources available, but once again how much of that capacity could be prudently allocated to recurring programs with clear results, and how much should be allocated to reserves, trust funds, permanent funds, capital investments or other nonrecurring uses.

The broad economic stage was also mixed. National economic activity continued to expand, inflation had moderated from its recent peak and the national and New Mexico labor outlook remained comparatively stable; however, interest rates, federal fiscal policy, trade conditions and energy markets continued to create uncertainty for revenue forecasts and the policy choices they informed. The state's revenue forecast identified both strength and caution: strength from record-breaking oil and gas production; and caution from lower price assumptions, slower employment growth, unresolved inflation risk and the threat and possibilities that federal policy changes could affect the flow of federal funds and impact state expenditures.

While the state benefited from higher oil and natural gas production, rising investment income, a relatively strong General Fund reserve balance and multiple years of expanded budget levels, long-term challenges remained, including low household income, high levels of poverty (especially for children), low labor force participation and unique and large needs in both public education and health care. This situation focused legislative efforts on optimizing continued investment in education, health care, infrastructure, stabilizing funds and targeted programs with the longer-term goal of transforming New Mexico's high revenue into broad and durable economic improvement across the state.

As budgets for the 2026 regular session were initially crafted, the Consensus Revenue Estimating Group (CREG) forecast in August 2025 provided budget builders with a projection that multiple years of beyond-trend growth would come to an end in fiscal year (FY) 2026. The CREG forecast projected anemic growth (well below inflation) of just 0.4% in FY 2026. It then projected General Fund revenue to increase from \$13.7 billion in FY 2026 at a moderate pace of 2.9% to reach \$14.1 billion by FY 2027. The August 2025 forecast assumed oil prices dropping and averaging only \$60.50 per barrel for both FY 2026 and FY 2027. It also assumed oil production levels of 800 million barrels in FY 2026 and 825 million barrels in FY 2027.

Unlike most years, there was a General Fund forecast revision in September: in the initial August forecast, the total General Fund balance at the end of FY 2026 was expected to near \$4 billion, or 36.4% of recurring appropriations; however, it did not account for an unprecedented outflow of unappropriated disaster allotment funds via the governor's multitude of emergency orders. An updated General Fund accounting presented to the Revenue Stabilization and Tax Policy Committee on September 30, 2025 identified almost \$400 million of disaster allotments (\$194 million already out the door in FY 2025 and on track for another \$200 million in the final FY 2026 accounting). This reduced the forecast for General Fund reserve levels at the end of FY 2026 to less than \$3.5 billion, or 32.1% of recurring appropriations, without any change in expectations of revenue inflows. During the 2026 session, the legislature acted to prudently allocate funding and manage these emergency expenditures in the unanimously passed House Bill 180, along with corresponding actions in Section 8 of the General Appropriation Act of 2026 (GAA); however, both House Bill 180 and the entire Section 8 of the GAA were vetoed.

In December 2025, the forecast for total FY 2026 General Fund revenues was nearly unchanged, remaining at \$13.7 billion; however, it included two major revisions: a \$322 million downward revision to corporate income tax revenue and an offsetting spike in State Land Office revenue in which \$363 million was scored as nonrecurring revenue. The December pre-session forecast assumed a larger decrease in oil prices to average \$58.00 in FY 2026 and \$57.50 in FY 2027; however, following a familiar pattern, expectations for oil production levels were again revised upward, assuming 820 million barrels of oil would be severed in New Mexico in FY 2026 and 840 million barrels in FY 2027. Although overall FY 2026 General Fund revenue growth was still projected to be positive (0.9%), the CREG characterization of

the major negative revision as recurring and the positive State Land Office spike as nonrecurring meant that total General Fund recurring revenue was projected to be negative 1.6% in FY 2026, which would be only the second year of negative growth in a decade. After adjusting for these changes, overall projections for General Fund revenues were still forecast for growth in the FY 2027 "budget year" reaching \$13.9 billion. This projected 4% growth for FY 2027 would still be the envy of most states, but it would be much more subdued than the year-after-year double-digit recurring revenue growth New Mexico enjoyed in FY 2022 (19.7%), FY 2023 (19.8%) and FY 2024 (12.6%).

Oil and gas remains the principal driver of both revenue strength and fiscal risk in New Mexico. Overall direct oil and gas severance and royalty revenues generated \$4.9 billion in both FY 2024 and FY 2025. With oil prices expected to drop in the December estimate, total FY 2026 oil and gas revenues were forecast at \$4.6 billion. Continued production volume growth forecast for FY 2027 was expected to be sufficient to generate a new record oil and gas revenue of \$5 billion, even with lower prices. Before recent changes in the distribution of severance and royalty revenues, this would have triggered substantial volatility in General Fund revenue (a painful \$300 million drop followed by a \$400 million jump). Instead, the General Fund's direct oil and gas revenues are expected to remain stable at around \$3 billion from FY 2024 through FY 2030. The unstable oil and gas revenues are now directed to the Early Childhood Education and Care Fund, the Medicaid Trust Fund, the Behavioral Health Trust Fund and the Severance Tax Permanent Fund, as all of these funds are designed explicitly to operate successfully and relatively painlessly with unstable inflows.

The CREG forecast highlighted that stable interest earnings flowing into the General Fund from the Severance Tax Permanent Fund, the Land Grant Permanent Fund and State Treasurer's Office earnings were expected to surpass personal income tax revenue for the first time in history in FY 2026 when they are forecast to reach \$2.2 billion and then ultimately even surpass the General Fund inflow of severance tax revenues in FY 2030 as they are forecast to exceed \$3.2 billion.

The size and nature of the budget led to differing ways of describing the state's fiscal capacity. Under the conventional measure of "new money", which compares projected recurring revenue for the next fiscal year with recurring appropriations for the current year, the state again appeared to have substantial room for additional spending. In the old, conventionally defined metric of new money (FY 2027 recurring revenue less FY 2026 recurring appropriations), the budget for FY 2027 would have had \$2.6 billion of conventionally defined new money. However, using a broader measure that compared projected recurring revenue with both recurring and nonrecurring appropriations and transfers from the prior year produced a much narrower margin. Both measures described real features of the budget: the conventional measure showed that recurring revenue remained well above the prior recurring base, while the broader measure reflected the degree to which recent budgets had already committed large amounts to special appropriations, transfers and other one-time uses. This distinction was important during the 2026

session because the state was not facing a shortage of cash, but it was operating in an environment where policymakers had to distinguish between recurring capacity, temporary balances, reserves, stabilizing fund deposits and one-time investments. Instead of focusing on the conventional definition of "new money", both the Legislative Finance Committee (LFC) and the Department of Finance and Administration's (DFA's) executive budget recommendation focused on the amount of recurring FY 2027 revenue less total (recurring and nonrecurring) FY 2026 appropriations of only \$106 million.

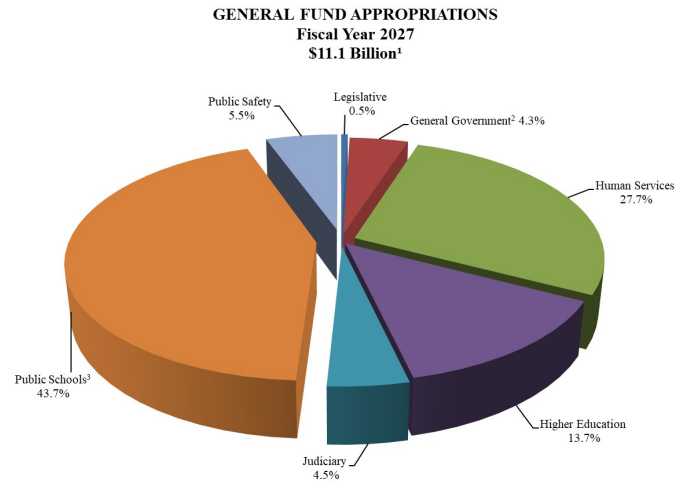
At the mid-session revenue update, there was no official revision to the General Fund forecast by the CREG. The update noted that a \$1.00 change in the annual average price of New Mexico's oil has an impact of approximately \$57 million on severance tax and royalty revenues, while a \$0.10 change in the annual average price of New Mexico's natural gas has an impact of approximately \$29 million. However, these no longer 100% translate directly into General Fund revenue swings since the General Fund continues to be shielded due to the distributions of oil and gas emergency school tax revenue and federal mineral leasing payments above their five-year averages to the tax stabilization reserve, the Early Childhood Education and Care Fund and the Severance Tax Permanent Fund. There are no insulating measures for gross receipts tax or personal or corporate income tax revenue swings other than large reserves. The mid-session update highlighted that New Mexico's corporate income tax collections represented the largest "unresolved risk to the forecast". It also noted both the perennial national and global recession risks along with an unusually high source of uncertainty from federal fiscal and regulatory policy.

In retrospect, global geopolitical and trade concerns were muted during the 30-day session but would erupt before the signing deadline. At the January 28, 2026 Federal Reserve meeting, the United States economy was summarized as "solid", with the opinion that both inflation and employment risks had diminished. There were simmering anxieties around external global and federal fragility, but this overall view of state and national steadiness prevailed. This outlook would shift dramatically shortly before the pocket veto deadline: on February 27, 2026, President Donald Trump gave the order to proceed with Operation Epic Fury, sparking what the International Energy Agency described as "the largest supply disruption in the history of the global oil market". In continuing escalation, the weekend before the signing deadline, Israeli airstrikes hit Iran's oil infrastructure for the first time, and when markets opened, oil prices spiked above \$94.00 per barrel, the highest since the summer of 2022 and almost \$30.00 above the price when legislators left Santa Fe after the session. A closed Strait of Hormuz, an uncertain magnitude of oil and natural gas infrastructure destruction and no clear end in sight for military action in either the Middle East or Europe was the backdrop as the governor signed, partially vetoed and delivered her last budget to the secretary of state on March 11, 2026.

General Appropriation Act

After line-item veto action taken by the governor, the GAA, enacted in **House Appropriations and Finance Committee Substitute for House Bills 2 and 3 (Chapter 67, p.v.)**, appropriates \$33.5 billion

from all sources for the operation of state government in FY 2027. This includes \$11 billion from the General Fund (a year-over-year increase of 3.7%) and \$13.5 billion from the federal government. Special appropriations from FY 2027 nonrecurring revenue account for another \$1.8 billion from all sources (General Fund, federal funds and other state funds), while supplemental and deficiency appropriations account for another \$32 million in FY 2026 from all sources. The GAA directs \$13.2 billion in recurring and nonrecurring appropriations and transfers from the General Fund in FY 2026 and FY 2027. The total General Fund effort for the GAA represents a 3.7% decrease over last year.

The GAA did not include a broad compensation increase for existing employees at existing positions; however, a separate appropriation in the tax package (Senate Bill 151, discussed in the [Taxation](#) section) provides \$62.7 million from the General Fund for a 1% salary increase to employees across state agencies, higher education institutions and public schools.

Public school support remains the largest General Fund category in the GAA at \$4.8 billion and a combined \$5.3 billion from all sources. Most of the General Fund amount, \$4.6 billion, is for the state equalization guarantee distribution (SEG), which finances New Mexico's unique, non-locally funded and partially equalized K-12 public education system. After larger increases in past years, the GAA provides a 1.7% increase for FY 2027. The public school appropriations also include \$143 million for the FY 2027 transportation distribution, \$12.8 million for standards-based assessments and a \$20 million General Fund appropriation for the Indian Education Fund.

The second-largest category of General Fund appropriations is the "Health, Hospitals and Human Services" category, in which \$3.1 billion is allocated from the General Fund, but this category receives \$832 million less in federal funding in FY 2027, down to \$11 billion. Similar to last year, most General Fund appropriations in this category, about \$2.1 billion, go to the Health Care Authority. Within that agency, a single major purpose comprises one of the largest single items in the budget, with \$1.2 billion from the General Fund and \$7.7 billion in federal funds appropriated to the authority's Medical Assistance Program.

Rounding out the top three categories with the highest total of General Fund appropriations, the "Higher Education" category receives \$1.5 billion in recurring funding from the General Fund, which is split among the Higher Education Department (HED) and New Mexico's public post-secondary educational institutions. The Opportunity Scholarship Program is again fully funded in the same amount

of \$146 million in General Fund appropriations, but this year that amount is combined with a \$40 million appropriation from the Higher Education Program Fund.

◆ *Other Appropriations and Fund Transfers*

2026 marks the seventh consecutive year that General Fund money is allocated to the Department of Transportation (DOT) in the GAA, with \$204.5 million appropriated for expenditure beginning in FY 2027, which will revert to the General Fund if unexpended by the end of FY 2029. The appropriation is divided into several parts, with the largest amount of \$150 million for statewide road construction and maintenance, as well as \$42 million to the Transportation Project Fund for local and tribal government projects and \$12.5 million for rural air service enhancement grants; however, for the first time in many years, a major transportation bonding package was also enacted in Senate Bill 2, which is discussed in the [Public Finance](#) subheading.

Additionally, the GAA funds many additional special or pilot initiatives with the Government Results and Opportunity Expendable Trust and parallel Government Results and Opportunity Program Fund (GRO Fund). Section 9 of the GAA appropriates amounts from the GRO Fund that include 10 multiyear projects in Subsections A, B and C totaling almost \$120 million from all sources. Subsection D of Section 9 lists more than 230 smaller projects across the state totaling \$50 million from the GRO Fund, with most projects flowing through New Mexico's regional councils of government or local economic development districts. All of these projects are detailed in [Table 2](#) of [Appendix B](#).

Section 11 of the GAA transfers \$505 million from the General Fund to 10 other funds. This year, the largest transfer by far is to the new Higher Education Major Projects Fund, which receives \$185 million from the General Fund combined with up to \$115 million of additional funding from supplemental severance tax notes (this funding is authorized by House Bill 8 and will largely target major work at the University of New Mexico (UNM) School of Medicine, which is discussed in the [Education](#) section). Other major fund transfers that are a continuation of previous years' investments include \$100 million to the Water Project Fund, \$56 million to the Lottery Tuition Fund, \$50 million to the Behavioral Health Trust Fund and \$10 million to the Workforce Development and Apprenticeship Trust Fund. After major transfers in prior years, only \$50 million is transferred to the GRO Fund. Smaller General Fund transfers include \$4.95 million to the Mortgage Regulatory Fund and \$2.5 million to the Violence Intervention Program Fund.

With an overall view, the 2026 appropriations and transfers comprise a budget that is still supported by extraordinary resource-based revenue yet looks toward the question of longer-term budgetary durability and resilience. The legislature continues to fund core operating budgets, education, health care and higher education at historically high levels, while also targeting nonrecurring appropriations, transfers and stabilizing funds to address current priorities. Another year of robust revenue makes this continued investment possible, but a slowing revenue growth outlook, lower oil price assumptions and federal

uncertainty make the distinction between recurring commitment and one-time uses key to New Mexico's fiscal sustainability.

Feed Bill

House Bill 1 (Chapter 1), known as the "feed bill" because it "feeds" the legislative session by providing funding for session expenses, including compensation for session staff and legislators' session mileage and per diem, passed both chambers and was sent to the governor for signature in the first days of the session. In addition to appropriating \$7,241,400 from the General Fund for the expenses of the 2026 legislative session, the bill makes appropriations for the year-round operations of the LCS (\$12,805,100), the LFC (\$7,951,300) and the Legislative Education Study Committee (LESC) (\$2,024,300), as well as the interim operations of the offices of the chief clerks of the House of Representatives (\$4,201,900) and the Senate (\$3,950,000).

Additionally, the bill appropriates from the General Fund for interim expenses of the legislature (\$3.5 million), pre-session expenses (\$560,000), the legislative internship program (\$61,800), dues and fees for public policy organizations (\$479,300), information technology hardware and software (\$3,529,800), Senate Rules Committee interim activities (\$35,000) and consultant services for the Capitol Buildings Planning Commission (\$257,500). Also from the General Fund, \$13.2 million is appropriated for all expenses associated with the district legislative aides and district offices program, and \$2.1 million is appropriated for the development of an integrated capital outlay data system.

Appropriations from legislative cash balances in the feed bill include funding for repairs and upgrades to the State Capitol complex (\$2.6 million), the ongoing development of a legislative processing system (\$1 million), the official master database of laws for the New Mexico Compilation Commission (\$400,000) and New Mexico's participation in the first and second phases of the 2030 census redistricting data program (\$500,000).

Other Appropriations

Senate Finance Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 273 (Chapter 70, p.v.) makes appropriations to the Town of Estancia, the City of Grants, the Village of Milan, Cibola County, Otero County and Torrance County to hold those municipalities and counties harmless from the estimated potential loss of revenue from a contract that could have been entered into with a private entity to use a municipal or county correctional facility if not for enactment this session of the Immigrant Safety Act (which is discussed in the [Corrections, Courts and Criminal Law](#) section). The bill also makes appropriations to the Children, Youth and Families Department to implement its child welfare information system and for its Juvenile Justice Division and Protective Services Division; the Public Education Department (PED) for school improvement activities; the DFA for payment to the Pueblo of Zia for use by the state of the Zia

symbol; the Aging and Long-Term Services Department for its New MexiCare program; and the DOT for the Rural Air Service Enhancement Grant Program.

Public Finance

The four bills enacted that relate to public finance fund transportation projects, approve the issuance of revenue bonds to revitalize the State Fairgrounds, make the Conservation Legacy Permanent Fund and the Land of Enchantment Legacy Fund more sustainable with more predictable distributions and require state agencies to submit accountability and evaluation plans for pilot projects and programs that receive funding from the GRO Fund.

At the start of the 2026 session, the legislature focused on **Senate Bill 2 (Chapter 4)**, which provides a bonding package to improve state highways. The State Transportation Commission may issue \$1.5 billion of total bond proceeds for state highway projects, which will be secured by federal funds and unobligated taxes and fees that are paid into the State Road Fund. Annually, the DOT is required to submit a list of the proposed bond sales to the legislature and the DFA as part of the DOT's budget request. The bill also increases the weight distance tax for motor vehicles other than buses as well as registration fees for passenger vehicles, and it creates additional registration fees for electric and plug-in hybrid electric vehicles, all of which will be distributed to the State Road Fund.

In 2025, the legislature passed the State Fairgrounds District Act, which provides financing mechanisms, including bonds, for the revitalization of the State Fairgrounds District neighborhood in Albuquerque. **Senate Bill 48 (Chapter 33)** provides the statutorily required legislative approval for the issuance of revenue bonds, which shall be issued in an amount not to exceed \$92 million in net proceeds of the \$500 million limit established pursuant to the State Fairgrounds District Act.

The Conservation Legacy Permanent Fund distributes money to the Land of Enchantment Legacy Fund, which then makes distributions to fund natural resources, wildlife and outdoor recreation initiatives. To improve the predictability of funding for the initiatives and make the Conservation Legacy Permanent Fund more sustainable over the long term, **House Bill 184 (Chapter 37)** makes technical changes to the distributions and provides that unexpended balances now revert back to the Conservation Legacy Permanent Fund.

For pilot projects and programs funded by the GRO Fund that do not include a hypothesis, parameters and reporting requirements when enacted, **House Bill 158 (Chapter 29)** requires state agencies to submit an accountability and evaluation plan for each project or program to the State Budget Division of the DFA and the LFC, which will evaluate the project's or program's performance and make recommendations whether to continue the funding in subsequent fiscal years.

New Mexico Finance Authority

During the 2026 legislative session, the legislature passed two standard, annually introduced

pieces of legislation that allow the New Mexico Finance Authority (NMFA) to administer its core funds. First, **House Bill 64 (Chapter 16)** makes appropriations from the Public Project Revolving Fund to three funds that are administered by the NMFA. Specifically, this bill appropriates \$6.25 million to the Drinking Water State Revolving Loan Fund to provide state matching funds for federal Safe Drinking Water Act of 1974 projects and to carry out the purposes of the Drinking Water State Revolving Loan Fund Act as well as \$5 million to the Cultural Affairs Facilities Infrastructure Fund and \$2 million to the Local Government Planning Fund to carry out the purposes of those respective funds.

Similarly, the legislature introduces and typically passes a bill each year that authorizes loans and grants from the Water Project Fund, as this authorization is a requirement pursuant to the Water Project Finance Act. This year, **House Bill 63 (Chapter 35)** provides such authorization to the NMFA to make loans or grants from the Water Project Fund for 113 qualifying water projects around the state for 75 public entities. However, **House Bill 109 (Chapter 27)** suspends this annual authorization requirement until December 31, 2029. The legislature will retain authority in this process by providing criteria to be used by the Water Trust Board in deciding which projects to prioritize. Details of the projects authorized in House Bill 63 may be found in [Table 7](#) in [Appendix B](#).

Capital Outlay

There are three major revenue sources for capital outlay: severance tax bonds (STBs); the General Fund¹ and other state funds; and general obligation bonds, for which the legislature passes legislation every two years and which are usually limited to three or four ballot questions presented to voters. In the last few years, the state has provided billions of dollars for state and local capital projects from STBs and the General Fund. According to the LFC, the growth of unspent capital outlay balances topped \$7 billion across some 6,000 projects at the end of FY 2025.

Due to the increase in projects not being completed as originally authorized, each year, the capital outlay reauthorization bill gets longer and more complicated. In this year's bill before the governor's line-item vetoes, there were 380 previously authorized capital outlay projects that were in some way being changed – the expenditure time extended, the responsible party changed, the purpose altered or all of the above. Some of these projects had already been reauthorized in prior years because, from the beginning, the funding was inadequate, the planning was insufficient or the labor capacity was unavailable, particularly for small projects. In January 2026, the LFC reported that there were more than 600 General Fund and STB appropriations totaling \$82.4 million that were set to revert in June 2026; these projects had neither encumbered nor expended any money. The bond projects were "issued but unspent", which means the responsible party had certified the need for the bonds, including that a binding contract would be signed within six months of the money being available. Most of the projects set to revert were originally authorized in 2022, and approximately 70 had been reauthorized previously.

¹ "General Fund" is used here to denote all "cash" funding.

House Taxation and Revenue Committee Substitute for House Bill 332 (Chapter 68, p.v.), the capital projects reauthorization bill, reauthorizes 253 projects that had been authorized or appropriated in previous years ranging from 2019 to 2025, with the vast majority of projects needing time extensions. Out of a total of 380 reauthorization requests in the bill, 127 of those requests were vetoed by the governor. In 87% of those cases (110 requests), the original appropriation had not been spent to date, and the governor cited that as the reason for the vetoes. In other instances, the governor cited that the original appropriation had encumbered or expended less than 10% to date, and several other requests were deemed ineligible by the governor for not having been certified by the State Board of Finance deadline. The governor also line-item vetoed language in two of the reauthorization requests, in both cases citing that the vetoed language was limiting and prevented the agency from implementing the purpose of the legislation. In those cases where the reauthorization request is vetoed in its entirety, the provisions of the original appropriation remain intact.

There have been quite a few attempts to improve the entire capital outlay process and to ensure that projects are vetted and determined to be "shovel-ready" before they are funded. There has been some improvement in the "authorized but unissued" bonding category, due mainly to the movement toward more cash funding than incurring debt through bond sales. But, when bonds for projects have been authorized but not issued, those projects hold part of the bonding capacity that could have gone for one or more projects that could be completed in a timely manner. **House Bill 247 (Chapter 59)** is the first successful measure to modernize the process since funding for local projects began in the mid- to late-1980s. The first significant change specifies that a capital outlay project cannot be reauthorized or reappropriated more than once, for a time period greater than two years and unless at least 10% of the initial bond or General Fund appropriation has been encumbered by January 1 of the year in which the reauthorization or reappropriation is requested. In addition, the reauthorization or reappropriation of a project may include only a technical change, defined as a minor correction or adjustment that does not alter the original purpose. The second significant change is that the Board of Finance Division of the DFA is required to freeze the accounts of stalled projects and report to the legislature by January 15 on those freezes; after that, the balances of frozen accounts are available for legislative expenditure. The third significant change provides that authorizations and appropriations of \$100,000 or more shall not be made for a project unless it is included on an infrastructure capital improvement plan, thus ensuring that the state or a local government has planned for the project and is prepared to staff or operate it when finished.

In this year's capital outlay bill, **Senate Finance Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 240 (Chapter 71, p.v.)**, \$1.25 billion in capital outlay project funding is appropriated in FY 2026 through FY 2030 for new capital outlay projects. The bill includes \$443 million in General Fund appropriations, \$444 million in STB projects and nearly \$366 million in appropriations from other state funds. The governor vetoed five capital projects in the bill, citing potential constitutional conflicts or insufficient

funding to implement the projects effectively, which account for \$1.88 million in General Fund appropriations.

The bill additionally includes a package of statewide capital outlay projects jointly requested by the legislature and the governor totaling nearly \$730 million and including \$280 million to UNM for the construction of its new School of Medicine. Meanwhile, the Capital Program Fund receives appropriations of \$95 million for the construction of an executive office building in Santa Fe and \$75 million for a new forensic unit at the New Mexico Behavioral Health Institute at Las Vegas. Also, \$39 million is appropriated from the Public School Capital Outlay Fund to the PED that includes \$18.8 million for purchasing new school buses across the state, as well as \$10 million apiece for constructing a literacy institute and a science, technology, engineering and mathematics institute in Albuquerque.

Other highlights from the statewide package include \$20 million for the Department of Information Technology to modernize public safety radio communication systems throughout the state and \$17 million to improve magistrate courts, including up to \$10 million for a magistrate court in Cibola County and up to \$6.5 million for a magistrate court in Sandoval County. In addition, the Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources Department receives \$20 million for the improvement of state parks and \$13 million for improving forest facilities across the state, including a wildfire response facility in Santa Fe, while NMSU receives \$17.6 million for the construction of a reforestation center in Mora County.

House and Senate members and the governor split a total of \$523,259,882 in this year's capital outlay bill to fund capital outlay projects of their choice. The governor's funding package includes more than \$40 million to fund water projects across the state, including \$10 million to improve a wastewater treatment plant in Bosque Farms, \$6 million for the construction of a wastewater system in the Pueblo of Santo Domingo and \$4 million to improve the water system in the Melody Ranch area of Torrance County. Furthermore, the governor's package includes \$26.5 million for affordable housing and for projects addressing homelessness, as well as \$15 million to UNM for the acquisition of property and the construction of clinical health facilities in San Miguel County to improve rural access to health care. Appropriations of \$10 million each are made to the Local Government Division of the DFA for the construction of a Navajo code talkers museum and to the HED for the construction of early childhood facilities and instructional laboratories at institutions of higher education statewide.

Lastly, the 2026 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act, **House Taxation and Revenue Committee Substitute for House Bill 248 (Chapter 65)**, lists the capital outlay projects to be funded by a statewide property tax that are subject to voter approval on the November 2026 general election ballot. The total amount of each ballot question includes the cost of issuance of the bonds for that question. The first ballot question authorizes the issuance of general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed \$21,582,213 for senior citizen facility improvements, construction and equipment acquisition. The second ballot question authorizes bonds not to exceed \$19,324,188 for academic, public school, public

and tribal library resource acquisitions. The third ballot question authorizes bonds not to exceed \$352,225,379 for capital improvements and acquisitions at institutions of higher education, special schools and tribal schools. Each ballot question stands alone; the voters' disapproval of a question does not affect the other questions. Pursuant to the Art in Public Places Act, each project includes 1% of its appropriation for public art.

BROADBAND AND TELECOMMUNICATIONS

While other bills related to broadband and telecommunications were introduced and debated, only one bill found itself signed into law. **Senate Finance Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 152 (Chapter 34)** is a multifaceted bill that aims to expand accessibility to broadband and telephone services to low-income families across the state. Primarily, the bill establishes a new Low-Income Telecommunications Assistance Program that is funded by the State Rural Universal Service Fund. Additionally, the bill exempts participants in the Low-Income Telecommunications Assistance Program from paying various monthly surcharges, caps certain funding, establishes eligibility requirements for households and the reduced rates available to those households and amends and provides various definitions, most importantly definitions for "underserved" and "unserved".

CHILDREN AND FAMILIES

To improve access to affordable, quality child care, two pieces of legislation relating to children and families were enacted this session. One bill creates a program to implement universal child care, and the other prohibits local governments and homeowner associations from imposing additional regulations, fees and taxes for child care homes and child care centers while also addressing related zoning district issues.

In September 2025, the governor and the Early Childhood Education and Care Department announced the rollout of the nation's first universal child care program. During the 2026 session, the legislature worked to enact that program into law in **Senate Finance Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 241 (Chapter 63)**, which creates the Child Care Assistance Program Act. The bill provides an operational framework for the Child Care Assistance Program, including eligibility requirements for participation,

payment rates for child care providers and copayment triggers for those receiving child care assistance. If revenues are sufficient and enrollment is stable, copayments could continue to be waived or may remain minimal for eligible families. However, if revenue shortfalls or unexpected increases in demand occur, the department may implement or increase copayments within statutory limits to preserve program continuity and avoid waitlists or service disruptions. The bill also addresses how funds will flow from the Early Childhood Education and Care Fund to the Early Childhood Education and Care Program Fund to pay for the program for the next five years.

Meanwhile, **Senate Health and Public Affairs Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 96 (Chapter 62)** establishes statewide zoning and regulatory protections for child care homes and child care centers. The bill prohibits local authorities from imposing additional regulations, fees and taxes on child care homes and child care centers that do not also apply to other private residences within the same zoning district and allows child care centers to be permitted by right in a zoning district that is commercial, mixed-use or multifamily residential. The bill also amends the Homeowner Association Act to prohibit homeowner associations from banning the operation of child care homes or charging fees or taxes for their operation. Finally, the bill preserves the authority of the Early Childhood Education and Care Department to regulate licensing standards.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

In the 2026 regular session, 16 joint resolutions proposing amendments to the Constitution of New Mexico were introduced, but only three passed both chambers and will be included on the 2026 general election ballot. The LCS publishes a summary of arguments for and against proposed amendments to the Constitution of New Mexico prior to any election in which they appear. The next publication, titled *Summary of and Arguments for and Against the Constitutional Amendments Proposed by the Legislature in 2025 and 2026*, will be released by the LCS in the summer of 2026.

House Joint Resolution 5 (C.A. 4) is the much talked-about and much sought-after proposed amendment to Article 4, Section 10 of the Constitution of New Mexico that would establish salaries for legislators. Currently, that section allows legislators to receive per diem at the Internal Revenue Service per diem rate for the City of Santa Fe and a standard mileage rate of \$.725 per mile. For this year's 30-day legislative session, each member received \$202 per day and mileage for one round trip. This interim, the per diem will be \$247 and mileage will remain the same for attendance at interim committees. The proposed change to this section provides that members shall receive a salary in an amount equal to the annual median household income² for New Mexico as initially determined and adjusted by the rise or fall of that statistic, although a member may reject the salary or an increase in salary. While the constitutional amendment will be voted on at this year's general election, if approved by the voters, its provisions will not

be effective until the 2029 legislative session because all legislative seats are up for election at the general election of 2028, so all legislators (new or reelected) start off at the beginning of a new legislature on the third Tuesday of 2029 with increased compensation that includes a salary and per diem and mileage.

There is another lag built into the system, which is when the annual household income for the states are reported in the American Community Survey. The survey is published in or around September of each year and reports on the prior year's annual median household income; therefore, if the constitutional amendment is adopted, the increase or decrease in the compensation paid to legislators will be based on that prior-year report. The nominal annual median household income for New Mexico for 2024 was \$67,800, and the inflation-adjusted income was \$64,059. While New Mexico has seen an economic boom, with household income growth of 8.9% from 2023 to 2024, the following chart shows that it is still below the national averages.

To change how members of the boards of regents for certain state educational institutions are appointed, **House Joint Resolution 1 (C.A. 3)** proposes to amend Article 12, Section 13 of the Constitution of New Mexico. If approved by voters, the amendment would require the creation of nominating committees for each state educational institution listed in Article 12, Section 11 of the Constitution of New Mexico. For nonstudent regent positions, the governor would be required to nominate individuals from a list provided by the institution's nominating committee and appoint them with the advice and consent of the Senate. The legislature would establish by law the structure, terms, powers and duties of the nominating committees, with the requirement that no more than 50% of a committee's members may belong to the same political party and that members may not have changed their political party registration in the 12 months preceding their appointment. For student regent positions, the governor would appoint a student member, with Senate confirmation, from a list provided by the institution's elected student governing body rather than from a list provided by the institution's president, as current language provides. The proposed amendment also adds a new requirement that, except for student members, individuals appointed to boards of regents may not have changed their political party registration in the 12 months preceding their appointment.

Lastly, the Constitution of New Mexico currently requires school elections to be held at different times from partisan elections. **Senate Joint Resolution 1 (C.A. 2)** proposes to amend Article 7, Section 1

of the Constitution of New Mexico to remove that limitation. If approved by the voters, this change will allow the legislature to provide by law that school elections, including bond and mill levy questions, can be considered at partisan elections such as general elections.

CORRECTIONS, COURTS AND CRIMINAL LAW

In 2026, there were many bills introduced and debated relating to corrections, courts and criminal law. The legislature quickly introduced, debated and passed the Immigrant Safety Act before the halfway mark of the session, which restricts public bodies from making certain agreements related to immigration with the federal government. Also, the legislature passed bills relating to the statute of limitations for certain sex crimes, the crime of battery on a police officer, commitment procedures, the creation of judgeships in two judicial districts and changes in parole requirements.

House Bill 9 (Chapter 5), the Immigrant Safety Act, prohibits a public body from entering into, extending or renewing an agreement to detain individuals for civil immigration violations. The bill also requires the termination of any such existing agreements at the earliest possible date. However, the bill does not prohibit agreements to hold individuals for criminal violations. Furthermore, the bill prohibits public bodies from entering into agreements to deputize officers, employees or agents of a public body to perform the functions of a federal immigration officer and requires the termination of any such agreements at the earliest possible date.

As for laws related to crime, **Senate Judiciary Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 41 (Chapter 21)** removes the statute of limitations for prosecuting certain serious sexual offenses, particularly those involving minors, allowing charges such as criminal sexual penetration, criminal sexual contact of a minor and related conspiracy or solicitation to be brought at any time. It also modifies existing law so that, in cases involving certain crimes against children, the statute of limitations does not begin to run until the victim turns 18 or the offense is reported to law enforcement, whichever occurs first. Additionally, the bill repeals a statute that established time limits for these offenses and affirms that prosecution of the offenses is permitted regardless of when the crime occurred. Another crime-related bill, **House Bill 61 (Chapter 15)**, increases the penalty for aggravated battery on a peace officer by recategorizing the offense from a third degree felony to a second degree felony. This change aligns the penalties for the offense with those provided for inflicting great bodily harm upon a peace officer.

In the 2025 session, the legislature overhauled the procedures for competency and commitment in the court system. This year, the legislature passed and the governor signed into law **Senate Bill 3 (Chapter 46)**, which amends the definitions of "serious harm to self" and "serious harm to others" in the Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities Code and the Assisted Outpatient Treatment Act. The new definitions provide judges with clearer guidance on when it is appropriate to hold a person accused of

a crime when that person may present a danger to the person's self or the general public.

House Bill 95 (Chapter 25) adds additional judgeships to the first and second judicial districts, increasing the number of judges in the First Judicial District from 10 to 11 and in the Second Judicial District from 30 to 31. Both judicial districts have seen an increase in caseloads, and this bill is an attempt to alleviate the burden on the judges in those districts.

Relating to corrections, **Senate Bill 43 (Chapter 22)** clarifies how the Parole Board should focus its consideration of parole eligibility for an inmate sentenced to life in prison, and what aspects of the inmate's history should be included in that consideration. The bill also allows for Parole Board members to receive per diem and mileage for a scheduled meeting or hearing or any other reimbursable activity. Lastly, the bill prohibits the scheduling of a parole hearing on the anniversary of the birth or death of a person whose death was the basis for a conviction and sentence.

EDUCATION

Education is a broad category for the legislature and includes the public school system, public post-secondary educational institutions, constitutional special schools and, to some degree, the Early Childhood Education and Care Department. Unlike some of the most recent legislative sessions, the legislature was more circumspect with its education priorities this legislative session. For public schools, the legislature's focus was on a few specific, although highly consequential, issues relating to math and reading proficiency, special education, virtual education and school employee recruitment and retention. The legislature also passed one bill related to post-secondary education that segregates some higher education capital outlay projects from the general stream of capital outlay as part of a broader effort to reform the capital outlay process.

Public Schools

The cases that would become the *Martinez and Yazzie, et al., v. the State of New Mexico* consolidated lawsuit (*Martinez-Yazzie*) were initiated in 2014 and marked the beginning of a new paradigm in education policymaking whereby an inferior court of the judicial branch has effectively assigned itself the responsibility to manage the legislature's and executive's political decisions with respect to the issues at stake in the case. This paradigm is a departure from the way government has traditionally functioned and requires continued adaptation by both the legislature and executive, which has made *Martinez-Yazzie* "compliance" a perennial theme each legislative session. However, despite the legislature's attention and state resources dedicated to this matter, many, including the *Martinez-Yazzie* plaintiffs, would say New Mexico has not seen the desired educational outcomes for its students.

This legislative session saw targeted approaches to improving math and reading proficiency. **Senate Bill 29 (Chapter 53)** approaches math proficiency from two angles: teachers and students.

Regarding teachers, the law requires six hours of mathematics methods courses for persons seeking licensure or reciprocity in elementary, special, early childhood or secondary education, whether standard or alternative licensure, for licenses issued on or after July 1, 2028. These courses focus on pedagogical techniques and lesson planning to enable teachers to effectively teach math to students. The law also amends the Mathematics and Science Education Act to provide for a mathematics instructional leadership framework, which must be a structured, evidence-based model developed by the PED to strengthen mathematics teaching and learning.

From the student angle, public schools are required to administer PED-approved, grade-specific and nondiagnostic math screening assessments for kindergarten through third grade students at the beginning of a school year to assess a student's math performance; these assessments must have minimal impact on instructional time, and results must be timely reported so they can be integrated with instructional support for teachers and students. The Mathematics and Science Bureau of the PED is required to provide training and technical assistance to school districts and charter schools on developing math professional learning plans, implementing math screening assessments, developing math support plans and math interventions, including selecting evidence-based instructional materials, monitoring student progress and involving parents of kindergarten through third grade students. Elementary schools are required to send written reports on students' progress to parents at least four times each school year.

Similarly, **Senate Bill 37 (Chapter 54)** approaches reading proficiency from multiple angles. First, the law imposes new requirements on teacher preparation programs to ensure that prospective teachers receive adequate training in structured literacy and the science of reading, which are evidence-based approaches to teaching foundational literacy skills for all learners. These concepts are based on nuanced pedagogical research but generally focus literacy instruction on phonics, phonemic awareness, fluency, vocabulary and comprehension. Second, the law imposes new requirements on how public schools deliver literacy instruction by enacting the High-Quality Literacy Instruction Act to ensure that literacy instructional materials are aligned with structured literacy and the science of reading, that teachers receive uniform training in the use of these instructional materials and the implementation of literacy interventions and that elementary schools with the greatest challenges regarding reading proficiency receive the support of literacy instructional coaches. Third, the law also attempts to ensure earlier identification of students with reading difficulties and the earlier provision of necessary literacy interventions by requiring public schools to administer annual literacy assessments to students in kindergarten through third grade.

Special education students comprise one of the "at-risk" student groups identified in *Martinez-Yazzie*. The Special Education Act, **Senate Bill 64 (Chapter 55)**, enacts, amends, compiles and recompiles sections of law pertaining to special education. The bill creates the Office of Special Education in the PED, headed by a deputy secretary for special education who reports directly to the secretary of public

education, and provides its duties, including verifying that students with disabilities are receiving a free appropriate public education, regardless of the nature or severity of the disabilities, and ensuring stability and consistency in services. The act also requires the office to: develop and maintain a statewide uniform online system for the formulation of individualized education programs; require all school districts to use the system to document services, monitor progress and ensure consistency, fidelity and compliance with the federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act time lines and safeguards; and enforce federal laws regarding the education of students with disabilities. Of note, the act requires the office to consult quarterly with a committee of local superintendents and head administrators selected by their peers to plan and implement continuous improvement measures related to the systems and services provided to students with disabilities throughout the state. The office must set standards for diagnosis and screening of and educational offerings for students with disabilities, developmentally delayed three- and four-year-old children and children in private, nonsectarian, nonprofit training centers and in state institutions under the authority of the Department of Health (DOH), and classroom interventions are to be provided through a multilayered system of supports.

Over the past decade, in addition to facing new challenges related to *Martinez-Yazzie* and its ability to make policy, the legislature has also faced new and novel policy issues that arose due to the COVID-19 pandemic. One of these policy issues is virtual education, which was once an unconventional and rarely implemented concept that became ubiquitous and, from some perspectives, an essential element of the public education system. As of December 2025, the PED estimated that approximately 8,977 New Mexico students were enrolled in 67 full-time virtual education programs.

House Education Committee Substitute for House Bill 253 (Chapter 8) is the legislature's first attempt to comprehensively regulate virtual education after these programs exponentially expanded after the pandemic. The law enacts the Distance Learning Act by significantly amending and renaming the Statewide Cyber Academy Act to limit the ability of school districts and charter schools to continue expanding these programs and to ensure that all virtual education programs are compliant with other state laws and aligned with state education standards. The law also amends provisions of the Public School Finance Act to account for virtual education programs in the SEG so school districts that administer these programs are properly funded. Additionally, the law enacts temporary provisions to mitigate funding losses in the 2026-2027 school year for certain school districts that had significant reductions in enrollment caused by controversies relating to the ways the school districts administered virtual education programs.

The funding issues caused by these virtual education controversies extended beyond the school districts involved and had the potential to impact all public schools. The general appropriation act allows the secretary of public education to adjust the current-year unit value by January 31 of each year to account for changes in enrollment growth program units. **Senate Bill 19 (Chapter 2)** is another temporary

provision that allows the secretary to also adjust the unit value no later than February 27, 2026 to ensure that the unit value does not result in school districts and charter schools overspending the SEG. Like all SEG adjustments, this one must be done in consultation with the DFA, the LESC and the LFC. Because of the issue regarding virtual education and school district enrollment, the assumption of the school finance experts is that without reducing the unit value, the SEG will be short approximately \$35 million.

Addressing the challenge of improving the recruitment and retention of all types of public school employees has been a priority of the legislature for several years. To improve the recruitment of teachers in the state, **House Bill 30 (Chapter 51)** amends the Teacher Residency Act to increase the stipend that teaching residents receive from \$35,000 to 65% of the statutory minimum salary received by level one teachers for teaching residents who are undergraduates and to 80% of that statutory minimum salary for teaching residents who have bachelor's degrees. With the current statutory minimum, the stipends are approximately \$35,750 and \$44,000, respectively. In addition to increasing the stipend, the law allows a teaching resident to meet post-residency commitments by working at any public school rather than requiring that the resident work at the school district or charter school that hosted the resident.

House Bill 34 (Chapter 40) focuses on the retention of school nurses by enacting changes to the school nurse licensing statutes, making it easier to advance as a school nurse. To be a level two school nurse, a person now has to demonstrate progress and competency as a level one school nurse or have at least three years of registered nursing experience, without serving as a level one nurse. Level three is similar; a person has to demonstrate competence as a level two school nurse or meet one of the following: have three years' experience as a registered nurse, hold a post-baccalaureate degree or be certified by the National Board for Certification of School Nurses. The bill makes clear that it covers school nurses in charter schools as well as school districts.

Post-Secondary Education

As discussed in the [Capital Outlay](#) section of this year's *Highlights*, there was a concerted effort this session to reform the capital outlay process, and **House Bill 8 (Chapter 50)** was part of that effort. The law segregates major higher education projects from the general stream of capital outlay so that these expensive projects, which take up a lot of capacity that otherwise could go for other projects, have their own rules, including match requirements. Funded by the newly created Higher Education Major Projects Fund, eligible uses include research and instruction and general purposes projects as well as student housing and student life projects (which include athletic facilities). The four-year institutions (the state universities) and the two-year institutions (community colleges, including branches; Northern New Mexico College; and the New Mexico Military Institute for its junior college program) have different rules for which projects may be funded and different match requirements for design phase funding and construction phase funding.

Matches must be from sources other than the state, and they can be waived, except for athletic facilities, though the process is involved. The HED must first determine that the institution cannot reasonably afford the match, which waiver finding is reported to the DFA and the LFC by November 1 for consideration by the legislature in the next regular session in which funding will be sought; waivers must be approved by the legislature. Construction funding cannot be appropriated prior to completion of at least 50% of the design phase and submission of design documents to the HED and the LFC. To receive funding, institutions are required to include data showing historic on-campus student populations and the expected number of on-campus students to be served by a new facility and documentation that the new facility is in compliance with existing instructional space standards and policies, with additional data requirements for athletic facilities. Also, the law contains a priority project list that includes: \$150 million for the new medical school at UNM; \$20 million for UNM Stadium; \$50 million for a multidisciplinary building at NMSU; \$10 million each for Eastern New Mexico University, New Mexico Highlands University and Western New Mexico University for student housing and student life; and \$100 million for student housing and student life projects statewide.

ELECTIONS

Two bills relating to elections passed during the 2026 legislative session, one prohibiting interference with elections and adding elections procedures during a state of emergency, and the other proposing an amendment to the Constitution of New Mexico to remove language that requires all school elections to be held at different times from partisan elections, which is discussed in the [Constitutional Amendments](#) section.

Midterm elections, which take place across all states halfway through the four-year presidential term, will be held November 3, 2026. With these elections approaching, many states are considering efforts to ensure safe and efficient elections, and with enactment of **Senate Rules Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 264 (Chapter 58)**, New Mexico is one of the first to address potential election interference by federal civil or military personnel or unauthorized changes to state election law. Provisions of the bill include:

- ◆ prohibiting the ordering, bringing or keeping of a troop or armed person or persons in the civil, military or naval service of the United States to any polling location or within 50 feet of a secured

ballot container beginning 28 days before an election through election day unless necessary to repel armed enemies of the United States;

- ◆ prohibiting the prescription of voter qualifications or imposing voting rules contrary to the laws of the state and prohibiting interference with the conduct of the election or election officials;
- ◆ providing penalties and remedies for violating those prohibitions;
- ◆ authorizing the development of emergency plans and procedures during a state of emergency, including the establishment of alternative voting locations and the use of mobile voting units;
- ◆ authorizing certain election officials to request assistance from the New Mexico State Police or other peace officer to maintain order; and
- ◆ prohibiting a person from intentionally preventing free ingress or egress to a voting location or creating any disorder or disruption beginning 28 days before an election through election day and providing penalties for violations.

EMPLOYMENT AND LABOR

The legislature passed several bills regarding employment and labor, including provisions that: make funding levels permanent for the Workforce Solutions Department to carry out the purposes of the Apprenticeship Assistance Act; create a new division within the Workforce Solutions Department; expand occupational disease benefits eligibility for firefighters; and expand and clarify requirements for public works construction projects in the state.

On July 1 of each year, \$2.5 million is transferred to the Public Works Apprentice and Training Fund and another \$2.5 million is appropriated to the Workforce Solutions Department from the Workforce Development and Apprenticeship Trust Fund to carry out the purposes of the Apprenticeship Assistance Act. Effective July 1, 2026, those amounts would have been reduced to \$1.5 million each. However, with the passage of **House Bill 7 (Chapter 24)**, the annual \$2.5 million transfer and \$2.5 million appropriation have been made permanent.

The New Americans Division of the Workforce Solutions Department is created in **House Bill 124 (Chapter 61)**, which defines "new Americans" as people residing in the United States who are not United States citizens or who were not citizens at birth. The division is intended to support new Americans residing in New Mexico in achieving their maximum economic potential within the state's workforce and as entrepreneurs. Key duties for the division include expanding and supporting educational and workforce training initiatives that improve economic integration and identifying strategies to improve licensing pathways for people who were professionally trained or licensed in another country.

The division is also tasked with assisting businesses that employ new Americans by helping them identify, attract and retain global talent necessary to remain competitive in the global economy. Additionally, the division is intended to serve as an information center by providing resources and engagement opportunities to businesses, community-based organizations, workers, community members, state agencies and local governments regarding policies and legislation affecting new Americans, including support for eligible lawful permanent residents to become naturalized United States citizens.

House Bill 128 (Chapter 36) expands occupational disease disablement provisions for firefighters to include additional conditions presumed to be caused by employment as a firefighter, primarily cancers, that were not previously listed and changes the minimum employment period to five years for each condition. Previously, statute required minimum employment periods ranging from five to 15 years for a condition to be presumed proximately caused by employment as a firefighter. The bill updates the minimum employment period to be five years for the additional conditions as well as the conditions previously included.

The Public Works Apprenticeship and Training Act is amended by **House Bill 270 (Chapter 30)** to expand and determine employer contribution requirements for public works construction projects in New Mexico. The bill requires contributions to the apprenticeship and training programs for most public works projects and modifies how certain contribution rates are set. Under prior law, certain public works projects – particularly street, highway, bridge, road, utility or maintenance contracts where employers elect not to participate in training – were exempt from apprenticeship and training contribution requirements. However, the bill removes those exemptions and mandates that for public works construction projects the employer must agree to contribute to an approved apprenticeship and training program in New Mexico in which the employer participates or to the Public Works Apprenticeship and Training Fund. Contributions must be made in the same manner and in the same amounts as apprenticeship and training contributions required under wage rate determinations issued by the Workforce Solutions Department. For street, highway, bridge, road, utility and light engineering public works construction projects, the department must set a contribution rate of zero in wage rate determinations for any trade classification that does not have an approved apprenticeship and training program. This provision prevents employers from being required to contribute for trades where no qualifying training program is available.

HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

The legislature dedicated a significant amount of time and effort to bills relating to health and human services during the regular session. A majority of the bills were focused on providing quality, accessible and affordable health care to New Mexico residents. There is no magic bullet to achieving quality, accessible and affordable health care, so the legislature passed bills that attempt to reach those goals in various ways. Some bills improve the way the state funds particular health care programs, while

others aim to establish specific protections for New Mexico residents. A few of the health and human services bills passed this year create entirely new programs, but most of the enacted bills build upon the legislature's recent work to improve New Mexico's health care system, which can mostly be described as implementing initiatives to augment and improve existing health care programs created or supported by the legislature. This includes two bills that remove the delayed repeals of recently instituted health care programs.

To shore up funding for health care programs that have experienced recent funding cuts by the federal government, **House Appropriations and Finance Committee Substitute for House Bill 4 (Chapter 39)** increases the amount of money distributed to the Health Care Affordability Fund, which was created to subsidize affordable health insurance for New Mexico residents. House Bill 2 from the 2025 first special session expanded the Health Care Authority's ability to use money from the fund to provide affordable health insurance options to New Mexico residents who lose health insurance coverage due to acts or decisions made by the federal government. However, the Health Care Affordability Fund required more money to cover the fund's expanded scope.

As of September 1, 2025, the Health Care Affordability Fund received 55% of the net receipts attributable to the health insurance premium surtax. House Bill 4 increases the percentage of the net receipts attributable to the health insurance premium surtax that is distributed to the Health Care Affordability Fund to 80% in 2027 and 95% starting in 2028. Additionally, beginning in 2028, the remaining 5% of the net receipts will be distributed to the Behavioral Health Program Fund, which will be used to invest in the state's behavioral health care infrastructure.

The legislature passed multiple bills that create new protections for health care consumers. For example, **Senate Bill 30 (Chapter 48)** enhances patient privacy by repealing a requirement that all induced abortions be reported to the DOH. Another bill, **House Health and Human Services Committee Substitute for House Bill 306 (Chapter 43)**, prohibits hospitals from charging patients certain fees and requires increased transparency when a hospital bills a patient. The bill prohibits a hospital from charging a patient a facility fee when the hospital is providing preventive health care services, vaccination services or telehealth services. The bill defines "facility fees" as fees for outpatient hospital services that are intended to compensate a hospital for operational expenses rather than for professional medical services.

In 2021, the legislature amended the Medical Malpractice Act for the first time since its enactment in 1976. The changes were focused on ensuring the solvency of the Patient's Compensation Fund because the fund's deficit was growing by millions of dollars each year. To bolster the solvency of the fund, the 2021 amendments capped the amount that the Patient's Compensation Fund would cover for claims against hospitals and outpatient facilities at \$750,000 until January 1, 2027, and after that, the fund would not cover hospitals or outpatient facilities at all. The Medical Malpractice Act was then amended again in 2023, primarily to fix an issue in the way the act was applied to small, independently

owned outpatient health care facilities.

During this session, the legislature revisited the Medical Malpractice Act for a third time with **House Judiciary Committee Substitute for House Bill 99 (Chapter 44)**, which makes several changes to the act. First, the bill strikes the provisions from 2021 that prohibited the Patient's Compensation Fund from covering hospitals and outpatient facilities starting in 2027, so those facilities will now remain covered by the fund indefinitely. The bill also requires that payments made from the Patient's Compensation Fund for medical care are made as expenses are incurred, rather than in a large lump payment. Additionally, the bill places caps on punitive damage awards in medical malpractice cases. The cap on punitive damage awards varies based on the defendant and will be adjusted for inflation annually, but in most cases the cap on punitive damages will be equal to the applicable cap on monetary damages already provided in the Medical Malpractice Act. For independent health care providers, the cap on a punitive damage award will be approximately \$700,000. However, if the defendant is a large hospital, the cap on a punitive damage award could be around \$15 million.

The legislature passed a bill in the 2025 regular session requiring every school in the state to develop and implement a plan to respond to incidents that involve a person experiencing a sudden cardiac arrest or a similar life-threatening emergency while on school grounds. To improve responses to such emergencies, the bill required every school in the state to install an automated external defibrillator. **House Bill 256 (Chapter 66)** builds upon the legislature's work from the previous year by requiring schools to expand cardiac response plans to account for cardiac emergencies that occur during school athletic activities, and it requires an automated external defibrillator to be clearly marked and accessible at each school athletic activity.

In 2024, the legislature enacted the Health Care Delivery and Access Act to enable the state to leverage additional federal Medicaid matching funds. Under this act, certain hospitals are required to pay an assessment that is collected and administered by the Taxation and Revenue Department. The money collected through the assessment is distributed to the Health Care Delivery and Access Fund and is then used by the Health Care Authority to make Medicaid-directed payments. This process maximizes available federal funding for Medicaid. The Health Care Delivery and Access Act originally included a delayed repeal that would repeal this act on July 1, 2030. However, **Senate Bill 101 (Chapter 49)** eliminates the delayed repeal, so the program created pursuant to the Health Care Delivery and Access Act will continue to function.

In the 2025 first special session, the legislature passed a bill to amend the rulemaking requirements for immunizations recommended and purchased by the DOH and immunizations the DOH requires of children attending early childhood programs and schools. The bill established that immunization rules promulgated by the DOH only need to be based on the recommendations of public health experts at the DOH or the American Academy of Pediatrics. The changes provided in the bill were

originally temporary and were set to repeal on July 1, 2026. However, **House Bill 156 (Chapter 42)** eliminates the delayed repeal, so the changes will remain in effect indefinitely.

Finally, **House Health and Human Services Committee Substitute for House Bill 66 (Chapter 45)** amends the Health Professional Loan Repayment Act to provide more awards and higher award amounts to licensed physicians. Specifically, an awarded licensed physician will receive \$75,000 per year for four years to repay eligible education debt. However, an awarded licensed physician is required to maintain an active practice or agree to relocate and commence practice in New Mexico within 90 days, among other criteria. The bill also provides guidelines to be used by the HED in determining award amounts for other health professionals and adjusts requirements for loan repayment award contracts entered into by the HED and health professionals.

HOUSING

In response to the state's housing supply shortage, the legislature passed one bill to encourage development of starter homes and provide financial assistance to first-time home buyers. **House Bill 200 (Chapter 38)** creates the New Homes for New Mexico Program that the New Mexico Mortgage Finance Authority will administer to provide zero-interest loans for down payment and closing costs for eligible buyers to purchase starter homes from eligible builders. The bill also directs the New Mexico Mortgage Finance Authority to promulgate rules for program eligibility and administration. Under this program, households that meet program eligibility requirements that seek to purchase starter homes outside of high-cost counties could receive up to \$50,000 in assistance, and households meeting these requirements within high-cost counties could receive up to \$75,000. These amounts are required to be repaid upon sale of the property purchased with the loan or failure of the eligible buyer to occupy the property purchased with the loan as the buyer's primary residence. Also, the program imposes restrictions on the starter homes built by eligible builders, such as limits on the size of the homes and the lots they occupy.

INSURANCE

The legislature passed three insurance bills during the 2026 regular session, each of which expand health insurance coverage requirements for insurance companies. The first of the three health insurance

bills is **House Health and Human Services Committee Substitute for House Health and Human Services Committee Substitute for House Bill 38 (Chapter 41)**, which requires health insurance companies to provide coverage for "complex rehabilitation technology devices" that consist of highly specialized wheelchairs and mobility devices that are custom-made to support a person's unique medical, physical, functional and environmental needs and capacities. The bill requires insurance companies to provide for up to two complex rehabilitation technology devices for each person covered by the insurance company. The bill also mandates coverage for maintenance and replacement of these devices.

In recent years, the legislature has taken several measures to limit prior authorizations for prescription drugs. The legislature continued the effort in 2026 by passing **Senate Tax, Business and Transportation Committee Substitute for Senate Health and Public Affairs Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 20 (Chapter 47)**, which amends the Prior Authorization Act to limit insurance companies from requiring prior authorizations for prescription drugs that are prescribed to treat serious mental illnesses, including schizophrenia and bipolar disorder. In addition, the bill provides that once an insurance company approves prior authorization for a drug prescribed to treat a chronic health condition, the insurance company cannot require subsequent prior authorization for that drug more than once every three years.

To provide New Mexico seniors more freedom to choose a Medicare supplement policy that is right for them, **Senate Bill 21 (Chapter 10)** requires insurance companies that offer Medicare supplement policies to offer an annual open enrollment period to Medicare supplement policyholders over the age of 65. This allows Medicare supplement policyholders an annual option to switch to any Medicare supplement policy offered in this state that is of an equal or lesser value to the policyholder's current Medicare supplement policy.

LAW ENFORCEMENT AND PUBLIC SAFETY

The legislature continued its efforts to expand the public safety workforce across New Mexico through enactment of **House Bill 255 (Chapter 19)**, creating the Public Safety Workforce Building Program in the DFA. The bill consolidates several existing workforce capacity funds into the new Public Safety Workforce Capacity Building Fund, and it establishes a competitive grant process designed to increase the employment of public safety professionals in law enforcement, firefighting, detention and corrections and licensed attorneys working in district attorney and public defender offices. In awarding grants, the DFA must consider vacancy rates for public safety professionals, the local cost of living and market compensation conditions and crime rates. The program requires the DFA to prioritize initiatives that recruit experienced professionals who are not currently employed by a governmental entity in New

Mexico, encourage collaboration between overlapping jurisdictions and expand investigative, response or case management capacity. Lastly, the bill establishes a distribution formula to allocate funds equitably among counties based on population size.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT AND SPECIAL DISTRICTS

One local government and special districts bill, relating to special assessments under the Improvement Special Assessment Act, was passed and signed into law. **House Bill 165 (Chapter 18)** amends the Improvement Special Assessment Act to clarify that special assessments imposed in accordance with that act must be paid by the property's owner or by a lessee when the property is subject to an industrial revenue bond. In addition, the legislation specifically states that a municipality shall not be liable in any way for special assessment financing debt.

MOTOR VEHICLES AND TRANSPORTATION

Regarding motor vehicles and transportation, the legislature passed one bill focused on traffic safety and two bills focused on the information collected by government agencies in connection to the enforcement of traffic laws and the registration of vehicles or licensing of drivers.

Pedestrians, roadway workers and users of alternative transportation modes along roadways may be at increased risk of serious injury in traffic environments. **Senate Bill 73 (Chapter 57)** seeks to improve roadway safety by requiring driver education courses to include formal instruction on safely operating a vehicle around vulnerable road users. The bill mandates that all approved driver education and motorcycle driver education courses include at least three hours of education and training on driving with vulnerable road users. The requirement applies to public school driver education programs as well as licensed private driving schools, and the Traffic Safety Bureau of the DOT must incorporate this three-hour requirement into its prescribed minimum driver training program standards. In addition to establishing the training requirement, the bill creates a statutory definition of "vulnerable road user" that includes pedestrians, roadway workers and emergency responders; persons riding or leading animals; and individuals lawfully operating bicycles, tricycles, farm tractors, skateboards, scooters, mopeds, motorcycles, roller skates, inline skates, animal-drawn vehicles, electric personal assistive mobility devices, wheelchairs

and other similar transportation modes in which the individual is not surrounded by the protective shell of a motor vehicle.

Automated license plate readers are electronic devices that read and record license plate information of motor vehicles passing by the device's location, and they have become an increasingly prevalent tool used by law enforcement. **Senate Judiciary Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 40 (Chapter 20)** enacts the Driver Privacy and Safety Act to govern the use of such devices and the data collected by them. A user of an automated license plate reader may not sell, share, allow access to or transfer data if the data may be used for: assisting in immigration enforcement; investigating or prosecuting protected health care activities, including reproductive or gender-affirming health care; or identifying or imposing civil or criminal liability on a person or entity engaging in constitutionally protected activities. The bill also imposes limits on how data from an automated license plate reader system may be used or shared. Law enforcement agencies that use these systems are required to file annual reports with the Department of Public Safety that include the size of the systems, how they have been used and the law enforcement actions that have resulted from the data collected. The department will aggregate the data from the reports and make it publicly available. The bill also provides for civil penalties for vendors and users of automated license plate reader systems that violate its provisions, and a court may impose civil penalties of actual damages or \$10,000, whichever is greater, for violations.

The Motor Vehicle Division of the Taxation and Revenue Department collects various types of information from individuals when it issues licenses and registrations to them. However, some of that information is defined as personal information, and the division is limited by law in how and the purposes for which it can release personal information to third parties. **Senate Bill 111 (Chapter 11)** expands the definition of "personal information" to now include sex, gender identity, immigration status or national origin.

PROFESSIONAL AND OCCUPATIONAL LICENSURE

Interstate health care professional licensure compacts received a significant amount of attention during this year's regular session. These compacts are legally binding agreements between two or more states that streamline the licensing process for professionals to practice in multiple jurisdictions, facilitating interstate telemedicine and reducing administrative burdens. In order to join an interstate health care professional licensure compact, the legislature is required to pass a bill that includes the language of the compact. The legislature considered joining interstate compacts for a wide variety of health care professions and ultimately passed two interstate compact bills, the Interstate Medical Licensure

Compact in **Senate Bill 1 (Chapter 3)** and the Social Work Licensure Interstate Compact in **House Bill 50 (Chapter 6)**. The passage of these bills will make it easier for out-of-state physicians and social workers to become licensed in the state and treat New Mexico residents.

PUBLIC OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES

During the 2026 legislative session, several bills relating to public officers and employees were introduced, but only three pieces of legislation garnered the approval of the legislature and the governor.

First, **House Bill 43 (Chapter 14)** amends the Public Employees Retirement Act, the Volunteer Firefighters Retirement Act and the Magistrate Retirement Act. The Public Employees Retirement Act changes include non-substantive clarifying technical amendments, such as adopting gender-neutral language, as well as a significant number of substantive changes. Namely, the bill:

- ◆ clarifies that Public Employees Retirement Board members and Public Employees Retirement Association (PERA) employees are required to comply with the Gift Act;
- ◆ provides that the PERA may submit member information to the Educational Retirement Board for purposes of administering the Public Employees Retirement Reciprocity Act;
- ◆ corrects a provision concerning the payment of pre-retirement survivor benefits, bringing it into alignment with current administrative practice;
- ◆ removes a requirement that at least one member of the Disability Review Committee be a physician licensed in New Mexico;
- ◆ changes the earnings allowable for a disability retiree to limits permitted by the federal Social Security Administration;
- ◆ removes the requirement that the purchase of withdrawn service credits be made in a single lump sum amount purchased in increments of one year and alternatively permits the Public Employees Retirement Board to determine the process and consider alternatives that can be implemented through the rulemaking process;
- ◆ includes state firefighter members in the class of members who can earn, under certain circumstances, service credit while on workers' compensation leave;
- ◆ changes the Volunteer Firefighters Retirement Act to provide that a surviving spouse's benefit shall not terminate upon remarriage; and
- ◆ amends the Magistrate Retirement Act to clarify that certain retirees under that act who are otherwise exempt from the membership requirements for magistrate judges must make member contributions and that the Administrative Office of the Courts must also pay employer contributions.

The second of the three bills, **House Appropriations and Finance Committee Substitute for House Bill 47 (Chapter 52)**, makes amendments to group insurance contributions for school districts and charter schools by requiring those entities to contribute at least 80% of the cost of employee health

insurance. The legislation also eliminates waivers for school district and charter school participation in Public School Insurance Authority health, disability income and term life insurance plans. Additionally, the bill requires a state agency that is responsible for providing state employee health benefits under the Health Care Purchasing Act to establish a reference-based pricing program for in-network and out-of-network hospital services and also requires a comprehensive study and report of the sustainability of insurance programs for public school employees.

Lastly, **Senate Bill 104 (Chapter 7)** provides a removal process for members of the State Wildlife Commission as a matter of law that is identical to the constitutional process for the removal of members of boards of regents. Article 12, Section 13 of the Constitution of New Mexico provides for the appointment of the boards of regents for the state's institutions of higher education by the governor, and it also provides for the removal of these appointed members for incompetence, neglect of duty or malfeasance in office. Before removal, members of boards of regents are required to be given notice and an opportunity to be heard, and the New Mexico Supreme Court has original jurisdiction over the removal proceedings. This same process now applies to the membership of the State Wildlife Commission.

.STATE GOVERNMENT

The state government category includes bills and other legislative measures that affect the day-to-day operations of executive agencies or the administrative functions of the courts, the legislature and the procurement and disposition of state property. During some legislative sessions, state government has been an active category. As recently as the 2023 legislative session, approximately two dozen legislative measures affecting state government were passed. This year, however, the state government category includes two bills, a House resolution and a joint resolution, although a few other related measures also passed.

Entities and Operations

The Public Regulation Commission is established in the Constitution of New Mexico to regulate public utilities and other public service companies. **House Judiciary Committee Substitute for House Bill 70 (Chapter 64)** restructures the commission's administrative functions by amending, repealing and enacting sections of law to further distinguish the commission's powers and duties from that of the commission's staff and to provide consistency with other state agencies regarding the application of statutes such as the Gift Act, the Open Meetings Act and the State Rules Act. The law also redirects fees collected by the commission to a newly created Utility Oversight Fund and reassigns certain enforcement

duties of the attorney general to the commission.

Senate Rules Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 132 (Chapter 12) expands the Department of Information Technology's equipment replacement framework to include software. Effectively, the bill changes the statutory framework to recognize software as a capital replacement asset alongside equipment and ensures ongoing fiscal planning and accounting consistency for enterprise technology services. Under the amended statute, the Department of Information Technology must establish and maintain replacement plans for both capital equipment and software used in its enterprise functions.

Legislature

The continued public concern regarding the alleged human trafficker Jeffrey Epstein gave rise to **House Resolution 1**. This resolution creates a special committee of the House of Representatives to investigate allegations of past criminal activity at Epstein's Zorro Ranch in Santa Fe County as well as the responses to those allegations by state and local law enforcement. The committee is authorized to function through December 31, 2026 and is required to complete an interim report and a final report that includes the committee's findings, conclusions and recommendations.

Property

Pursuant to statute, all real property transactions involving the sale, trade or lease of state property worth at least \$550,000 must be ratified and approved by the legislature. **Senate Joint Resolution 7** ratifies and approves an exchange of real property between the General Services Department and the City of Santa Fe that allows the state to acquire the parcel of land on Cerrillos Road where the Department of Public Safety's facilities are located. Specifically, the state exchanged five parcels of undeveloped land in the city's Midtown area with an appraised value of \$6.5 million for one parcel of developed land currently used by the Department of Public Safety with an appraised value of \$8.6 million.

TAXATION

Several tax-related bills were passed and signed into law this session ranging in subject matter from property to watershed districts. The enacted tax bills include a tax package, changes to Oil and Gas Reclamation Fund distributions, changes to the Watershed District Act, the expansion of a definition in the advanced energy equipment income and corporate income tax credits, clarification on the disabled veteran property tax exemption, the extension of a property tax abatement period for metropolitan

redevelopment projects and multiple changes to the tax code supported by the Taxation and Revenue Department.

Unlike many tax packages passed by the legislature in recent years, this year's tax package, **Senate Finance Committee Substitute for Senate Tax, Business and Transportation Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 151 (Chapter 69)**, is fairly revenue neutral, meaning that a provision is included to raise enough revenue to pay for the cost of other provisions in the bill. That revenue raiser decouples the corporate income tax from certain provisions of the 2025 Congressional Budget Reconciliation Bill (H.R. 1) related to first-year bonus depreciation, first-year expensing for manufacturing facilities and business interest deductions and also adds certain income from foreign-controlled corporations into the tax base. Additionally, the tax package:

- ◆ extends the high-wage jobs tax credit to July 1, 2036;
- ◆ creates a \$10,000 income tax credit for medical and osteopathic physicians licensed in New Mexico;
- ◆ provides income tax and corporate income tax credits for local news organizations that employ journalists and local news printers that print newspapers for local news organizations;
- ◆ creates a gross receipts tax deduction for the sale of construction materials and labor used to develop multifamily residential housing if 80% or more of the housing being developed will be affordable housing; and
- ◆ includes appropriations to fund a 1% salary increase for employees of state agencies, higher education institutions and public schools.

House Energy, Environment and Natural Resources Committee Substitute for House Bill 80 (Chapter 60) amends a distribution of the oil and gas conservation tax to the Oil and Gas Reclamation Fund. Beginning July 1, 2027, 50% of the tax will be distributed to the fund, which distribution will increase to 75% on July 1, 2028 and then to 100% on July 1, 2029. On July 1, 2037, the amount of distribution will decrease to 50%. The bill also clarifies that the fund is nonreverting and is administered by the Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources Department. Finally, beginning on July 1, 2028, up to \$250,000 may be spent from the fund each year on statewide education related to energy, its sources and the impacts of all energy-related emissions.

In 2025, the legislature passed a bill that changed the process for how watershed district boards of directors are selected from an election to an appointment. However, Article 8, Section 9 of the Constitution of New Mexico authorizes elected governing bodies, not bodies that are appointed, to levy taxes. **House Bill 108 (Chapter 26)** addresses this issue by requiring a soil and water conservation district to levy taxes for a watershed district located within the soil and water conservation district's boundaries upon the watershed district's request. Additionally, the bill amends definitions used in the Watershed District Act and amends the procedures for the appointment of a director to a watershed district board.

House Bill 154 (Chapter 17) amends the advanced energy equipment income tax credit and the advanced energy equipment corporate income tax credit to expand the definition of "advanced energy products" to include specific types of energy and battery components, machinery, critical minerals and inverters. This is a departure from the previous definition, which relied on a definition provided under the federal advanced manufacturing production credit to list eligible technology, products, systems and components.

Pursuant to constitutional amendments approved by voters at the November 5, 2024 general election and subsequent enabling legislation enacted in 2025, **House Bill 285 (Chapter 9)** amends statutes relating to the administration of the disabled veteran property tax exemption. Amended statutory language clarifies that a disabled veteran must continuously occupy the property as the veteran's principal place of residence to be eligible for the exemption and clarifies issues relating to multiple ownership interests on a property subject to the exemption. Prior to this bill's enactment, the disabled veteran exemption was to be claimed in proportion to the taxpayer's ownership interests. Now, in the case of multiple ownership interests, the exemption will be determined using the highest disability percentage among the eligible disabled veteran owners. Additionally, the legislation provides procedures for a property owner wishing to file a protest.

Also related to property taxes, **Senate Bill 58 (Chapter 23)** extends the property tax abatement period for project property pursuant to the Metropolitan Redevelopment Code from seven years to a period not to exceed 14 years from the date of acquisition of the project property by a local government.

Multiple tax statutes are amended to make various technical and substantive changes in **House Bill 291 (Chapter 31)**, including:

- ◆ allowing attorney fees to be paid from revenue distributions;
- ◆ preventing the accrual of interest when an extension of time to file a return has been granted;
- ◆ amending rounding requirements for amounts of tax due;
- ◆ clarifying that a taxpayer who has entered into an installment agreement is not considered a delinquent taxpayer for purposes of license or permit renewal;
- ◆ providing that a minimum civil penalty of \$5.00 will not apply for failure to pay a tax levied pursuant to the Withholding Tax Act, the Oil and Gas Proceeds and Pass-Through Entity Withholding Tax Act or the workers' compensation fee;
- ◆ amending definitions in the Film Production Tax Credit Act and allowing expenditures made from businesses located on a federally recognized Indian nation, tribe or pueblo in New Mexico not subject to New Mexico taxes to qualify for the credit pursuant to that act;
- ◆ amending definitions in the Technology Jobs and Research and Development Tax Credit Act;

- ◆ clarifying the tobacco products tax on closed system cartridges;
- ◆ allowing excess property tax auction proceeds to be applied to outstanding tax debt;
- ◆ requiring specific effective dates for an ordinance changing the imposition of tax imposed by an Indian nation, tribe or pueblo and collected by the Taxation and Revenue Department pursuant to a tribal cooperative agreement; and
- ◆ amending with whom the secretary of taxation and revenue may enter into tribal cooperative agreements.

WATER

The 2026 legislative session included the passage of legislation that specifically addresses water rights compliance and increased funding for acequia and ditch infrastructure. Such actions reflect a continued focus on strengthening oversight and supporting long-term water resource protection and management across the state.

The penalties for violating water laws have remained relatively unchanged since 1907, with fines ranging from just \$10.00 to \$100 per incident. In an effort to modernize the statutes and deter illegal water use, **House Bill 111 (Chapter 28)** increases civil penalties for violating water rights, state engineer rules or orders, permit or license conditions or court orders from \$100 per day of violation to \$3,400 per day of violation. The bill also increases the maximum penalty for violating a condition of a bond maintained as a prerequisite for a license to drill a well for water from an underground source from \$1,000 to \$10,000.

Additionally, legislators acknowledged the need for increased funding to support water infrastructure projects this session. The Acequia and Community Ditch Infrastructure Fund provides funding to acequias or community ditches for the planning, engineering and construction of irrigation works and infrastructure projects, as well as to match other state and federal funding programs. **Senate Bill 193 (Chapter 56)** increases the annual transfer of money from the New Mexico Irrigation Works Construction Fund to the Acequia and Community Ditch Infrastructure Fund from \$2.5 million to \$5 million.

FIFTY-SEVENTH LEGISLATURE
FIRST SPECIAL SESSION, 2025

On July 4, 2025, President Trump signed H.R. 1, the federal budget reconciliation bill, into law, which featured significant reductions in federal support to states for Medicaid, the federal Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) and public broadcasting, as well as changes to the federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act that would result in increased premiums for many individuals receiving health insurance through its provisions. As all of these federal changes threatened to hit New Mexico particularly hard due to its heavy reliance on federal funding for the aforementioned programs, there was much concern about the potential effects of the federal cuts on New Mexicans. In response, the governor called a special session to convene on October 1, 2025. After both houses adjourned the following day, the special session ended with the legislature passing five bills, including an appropriations bill and four other bills that: provide affordable health insurance options; stabilize the provision of health care services in rural and underserved areas; allow the DOH to set vaccination standards; and allow metropolitan court judges to preside over criminal competency proceedings.

The First Special Session of the Fifty-Seventh Legislature's general appropriation act, **House Bill 1 (Chapter 2, p.v.)**, pays the expenses of the special session, reverts a \$120 million balance from a 2023 appropriation to the Human Services Department to the General Fund Operating Reserve, transfers from the General Fund \$30 million to the Appropriation Contingency Fund and \$50 million to the Rural Health Care Delivery Fund and makes the following appropriations from the General Fund, except as noted:

- ◆ \$1 million to the Administrative Office of the Courts for expansion of assisted outpatient treatment programs, competency diversion pilot programs and other behavioral health pilot programs;
- ◆ \$5,560,962 to the DFA for educational television and public radio;
- ◆ \$429,527 to the Indian Affairs Department for educational television and public radio provided by and for Indian nations, tribes and pueblos;
- ◆ to the Health Care Authority:
 - \$4.6 million to maintain the SNAP benefit for elders and people with disabilities;
 - \$12 million to maintain the SNAP benefit for lawfully present residents;
 - \$1,246,000 to prevent layoffs of employees administering SNAP;
 - \$8 million to support food banks, food pantries, regional distribution organizations and partner agencies in the state to ensure access to nutritious food;
 - \$2 million to support educational-based centers and food pantry and food distribution programs;
 - \$1.5 million to support individuals in meeting work and volunteer requirements necessary to qualify for benefits under SNAP and the state Medicaid program;

- \$4.4 million for additional staffing and administrative costs for the Income Support Division of the authority;
 - \$2.2 million for services, additional staffing and administrative costs for the Medical Assistance Division of the authority;
 - \$10 million for updates to information technology and other costs related to changes to eligibility requirements for Medicaid and SNAP made by Public Law No. 119-21;
 - \$3 million to contract for health care services provided by nonprofit health care facilities not eligible under federal law to receive Medicaid funding; and
 - \$17.3 million from the Health Care Affordability Fund to reduce health care premiums and cost sharing for New Mexico residents who purchase health care coverage on the New Mexico Health Insurance Exchange;
- ◆ to the Regulation and Licensing Department:
 - \$7,879,606 for projected shortfalls in operating expenses and to remediate cash deficits; and
 - \$100,000 to implement interstate compacts regarding health care professionals; and
 - ◆ \$450,000 to the Board of Regents of NMSU for the university's college assistance program to provide for post-secondary educational needs of United States citizens and permanent legal residents who worked as migratory seasonal farmworkers, dairy workers and ranch workers.

The legislature also passed three bills to address proposed and enacted federal regulatory and funding changes that impact access to affordable and quality health care. **House Bill 2 (Chapter 1)** expands the Health Care Authority's ability to use money from the Health Care Affordability Fund to provide affordable health insurance options to New Mexico residents who lose health insurance coverage due to acts or decisions made by the federal government. Also, **Senate Bill 1 (Chapter 3)** expands the permissible uses of the Rural Health Care Delivery Fund to allow grants to a rural health care provider or a rural health care facility in a high-needs geographic health professional shortage area to stabilize the provision of existing health care services.

Additionally, **Senate Bill 3 (Chapter 5)** amends the rulemaking requirements for immunizations recommended and purchased by the DOH and immunizations the DOH requires of children attending early childhood programs and schools. Formerly, immunization rules promulgated by the DOH were based on the recommendations of the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices of the United States Department of Health and Human Services. With the bill's enactment, immunization rules promulgated by the DOH now only need to be based on the recommendations of public health experts at the DOH or the American Academy of Pediatrics. The changes provided in the bill were originally temporary and were set to repeal on July 1, 2026. However, House Bill 156 from the 2026 regular session

(discussed in the [Health and Human Services](#) section of these *Highlights*) eliminates the delayed repeal, so the changes will remain in effect indefinitely.

During the 2025 regular legislative session, the legislature enacted a crime package that centered on comprehensive amendments to the state's criminal competency statutes. One of the amendments stripped the metropolitan court's jurisdiction to resolve questions of competency and gave the district court exclusive jurisdiction over those questions. The state's only metropolitan court is in the state's busiest judicial district, the Second Judicial District, and the change in jurisdiction affected that district court's ability to process criminal cases. To address this issue, **Senate Bill 2 (Chapter 4)** was enacted to restore the metropolitan court's jurisdiction over questions of competency.

FIFTY-SEVENTH LEGISLATURE
SECOND SPECIAL SESSION, 2025

On the same day that the first special session convened on October 1, 2025, the federal government entered into a shutdown due to Congress failing to pass an appropriations bill for federal FY 2026. As the weeks progressed and the shutdown dragged on, the money appropriated during the first special session for SNAP benefits was set to run out, meaning a sizeable number of New Mexicans could be without food assistance for the foreseeable future if the shutdown continued. Thus, on November 10, 2025, the governor called legislators back to Santa Fe for a one-day special session solely devoted to the enactment of one appropriations bill.

The Second Special Session of the Fifty-Seventh Legislature's general appropriation act, **House Bill 1 (Chapter 1)**, covers the expenses of the special session and also:

- ◆ appropriates \$100,000 from the General Fund to the Administrative Office of the Courts for enhanced security protocols, equipment and infrastructure;
- ◆ on a weekly basis, appropriates \$20 million from the General Fund Operating Reserve to the Income Support Division of the Health Care Authority for expenditure in each of those weeks to provide state nutrition assistance benefits to those eligible if the federal government fails to provide federal SNAP benefits;
- ◆ to help cover the cost of the appropriations for the state nutrition assistance benefits, provides the following reversions to the General Fund Operating Reserve:
 - \$46,365,316 of a 2022 appropriation to the Human Services Department for the Medical Assistance Program;
 - \$21,339,391 of appropriations made from the General Fund to the DOH for the Developmental Disabilities Support Program for FY 2019 through FY 2021;
 - \$89,743,800 of a 2023 appropriation to the Human Services Department for the Medical Assistance Program;
 - \$2,990,800 of a 2024 appropriation to the Health Care Authority Department for the Developmental Disabilities Support Program;
 - \$685,260 of a 2024 appropriation to the Health Care Authority Department for the Medical Assistance Program; and
 - \$1,378,204 of a 2024 appropriation to the Health Care Authority Department for the Epi Duran regional recovery center;
- ◆ provides that if, on January 23, 2026, the total amount of reversions to the General Fund Operating Reserve exceeds \$137 million, the excess will be transferred to the Medicaid Trust Fund;
- ◆ further provides that if, beginning January 24, 2026 until May 1, 2026, the balance of the General Fund Operating Reserve exceeds \$137 million, any money received by the state from the federal government to repay or reimburse state funds used beginning November 1, 2025 to provide SNAP benefits will be transferred to the Medicaid Trust Fund;

- ◆ transfers \$30 million from the General Fund Operating Reserve to the Appropriation Contingency Fund;
- ◆ provides transfer authority to the governor if revenue and transfers to the General Fund at the end of FY 2025 are not sufficient to meet appropriations; and
- ◆ provides that \$50,000 of a 2025 appropriation to the LFC be expended to conduct a program evaluation of the state's administration of SNAP.

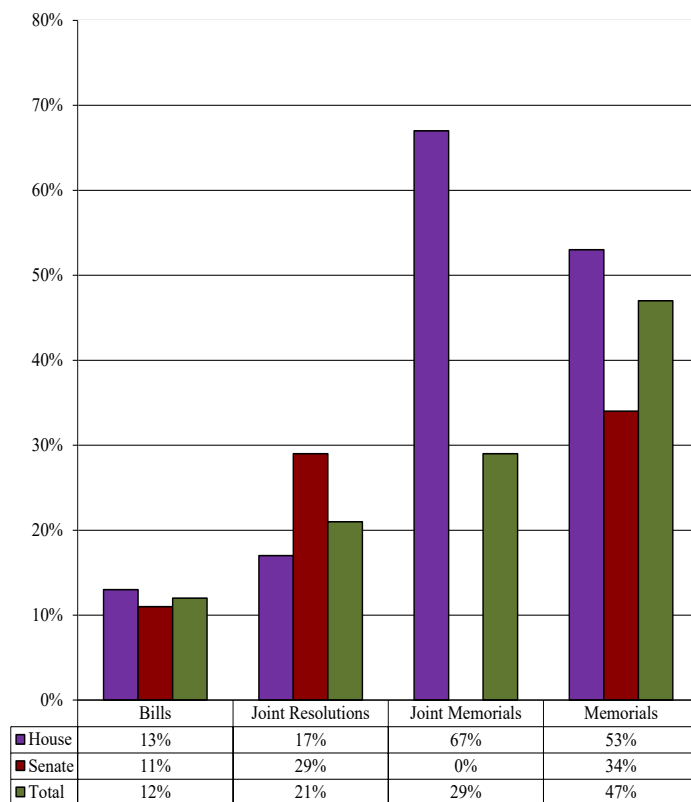

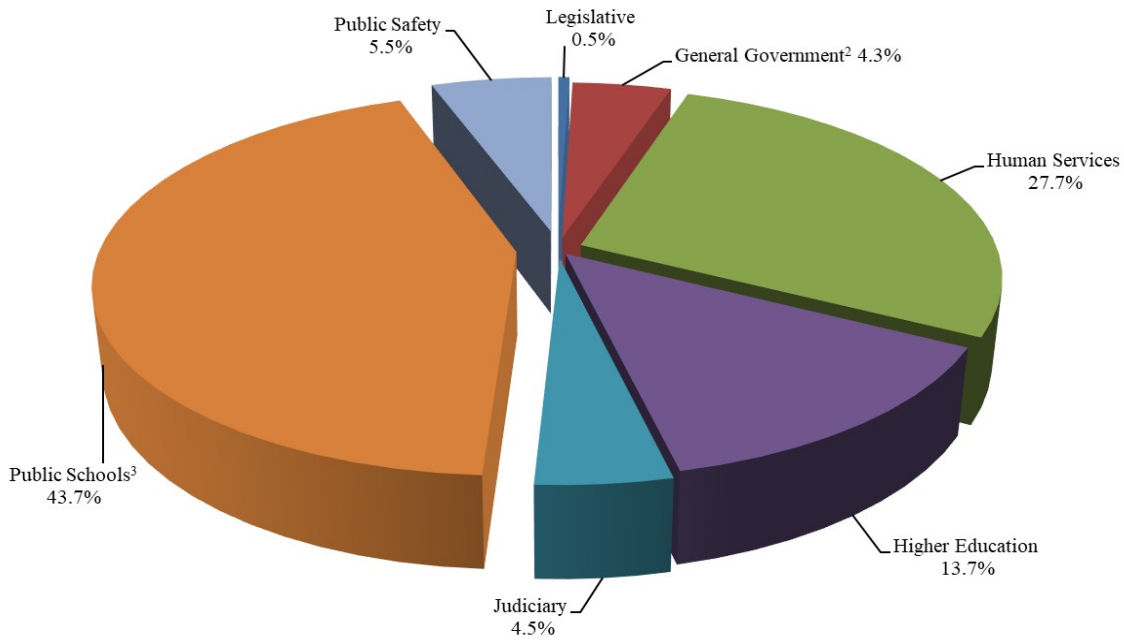

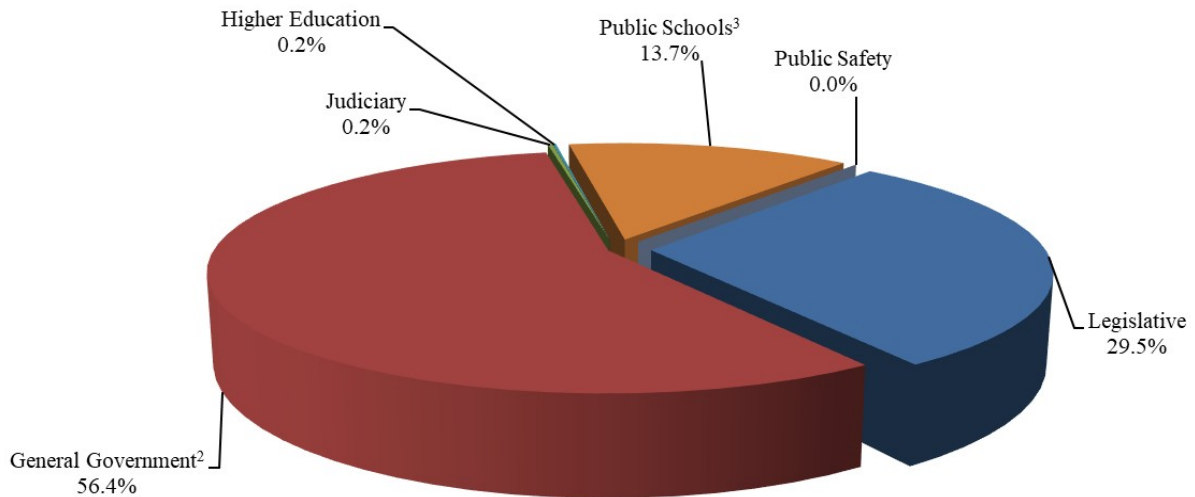

\$11.1 Billion¹**



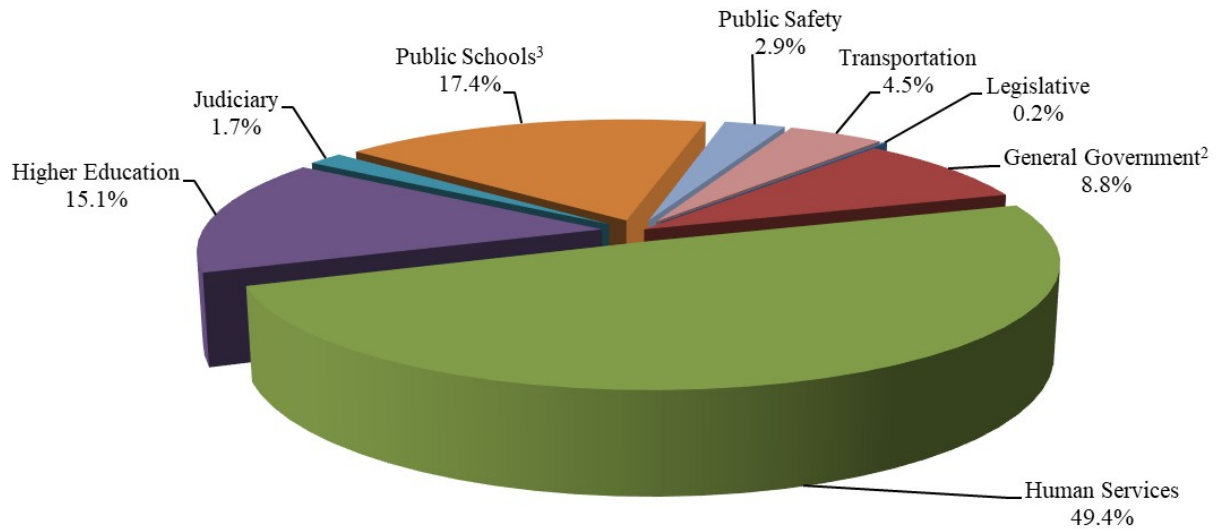

\$31.4 Billion¹**

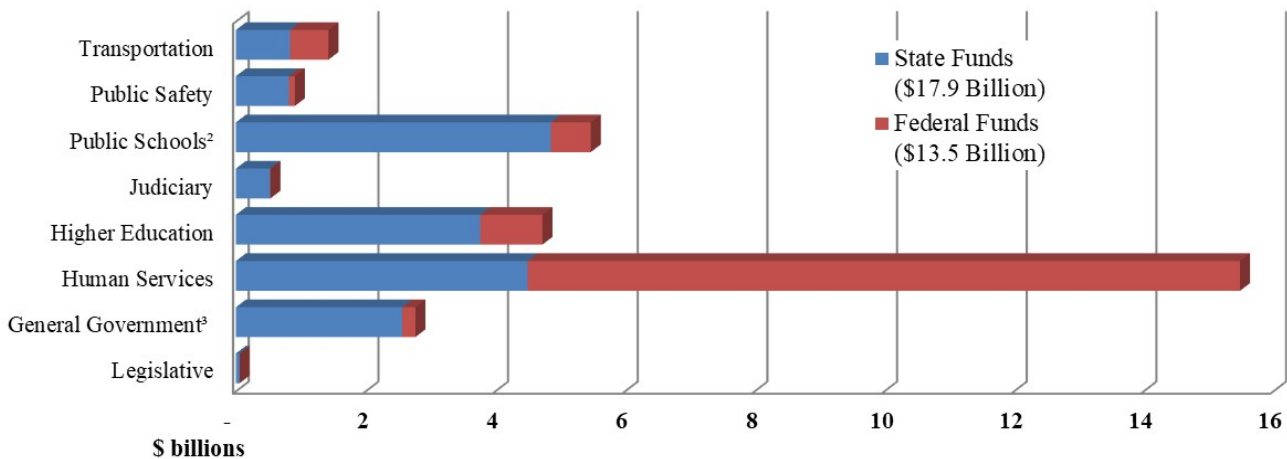

\$31.4 Billion**

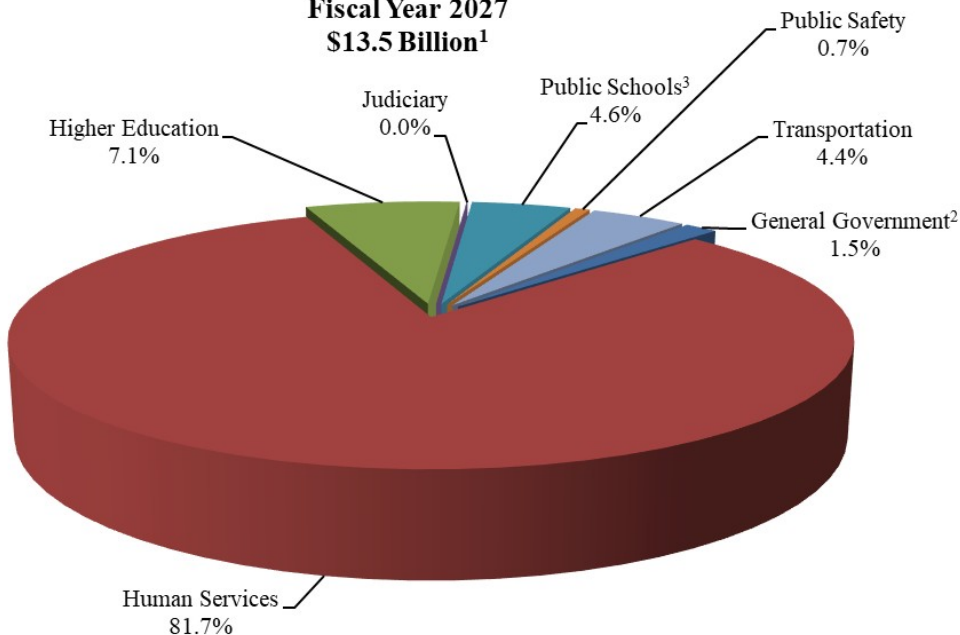

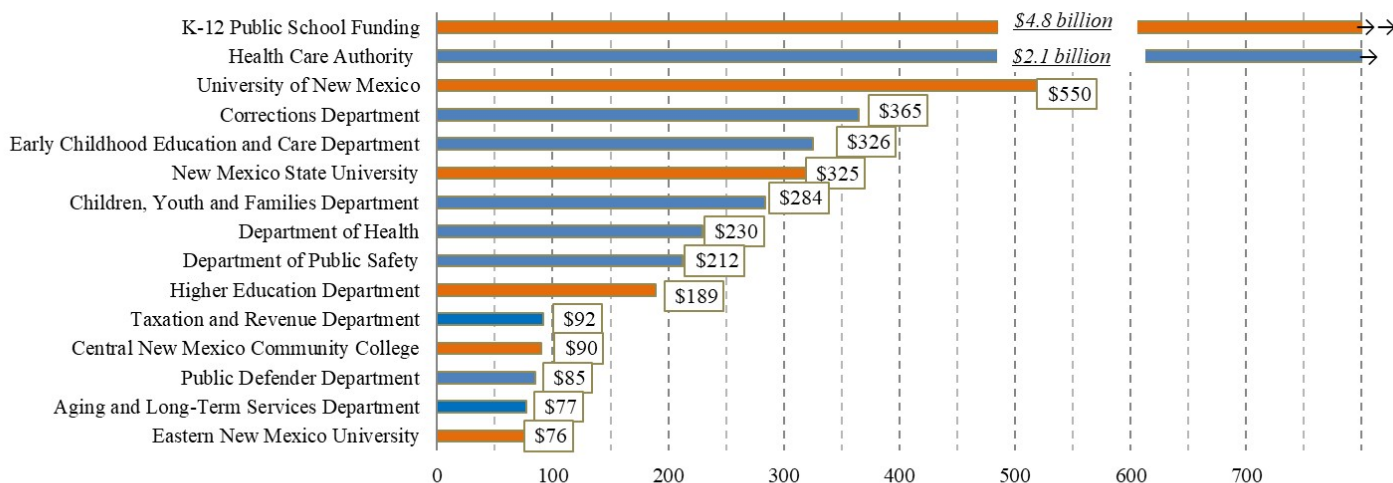

GENERAL APPROPRIATION ACT OF 2026 VETO TABLE ENDNOTES

1. The general appropriation act (or House Bill 2) is the omnibus bill the legislature passes each year to fund the current operations of state government. After each legislative session, the Legislative Council Service (LCS) provides commentary on the governor's partial vetoes of the House Bill 2 and relies on New Mexico Supreme Court (Supreme Court) case law and attorney general opinions to analyze the effects of the vetoes and arguments as to the vetoes' constitutionality. The LCS's commentary on the governor's partial vetoes in House Bill 2 is not intended to serve as an official position regarding the constitutionality of the vetoes. Rather, this commentary is intended to aid legislators in their review of the legislative session and is based on the analysis of LCS staff. The preceding chart describes each of the governor's partial vetoes. The vetoes that LCS staff determined may conflict with the parameters established by the Constitution of New Mexico (Constitution) and the Supreme Court are footnoted with the LCS's commentary. The money shown in the fund columns reflects both the vetoed appropriations and, based on the analysis of LCS staff, the appropriations that may be questioned due to the governor's specific exercise of the partial veto power in connection with those appropriations.

2. Generally, the Constitution prohibits the legislature from passing bills that embrace more than one subject; however, Article 4, Section 16 of the Constitution provides a specific exception for "general appropriation bills" so long as they "embrace nothing

but appropriations for the expense of the executive, legislative and judiciary departments, interest, sinking fund, payments on the public debt, public schools and other expenses required by existing laws". Since early in New Mexico's statehood, the Supreme Court has held that, in addition to appropriations, a general appropriation bill may also include provisions that are germane and naturally connected to those appropriations. *State ex rel. Lucero v. Marron*, 1912-NMSC-037, ¶ 13; and *National Building v. State Board of Education*, 1973-NMSC-053, ¶ 14.

Article 4, Section 22 of the Constitution provides for the partial veto (also known as the line-item veto), which is the governor's power to approve or disapprove parts or items of any bill that appropriates money. Although this power confers broad discretion to the governor, the Supreme Court has ruled that the partial veto power is not without limit and must be exercised with restraint and in accordance with the constitutional principles of separation of powers and checks and balances.

Importantly, the Supreme Court has held the following regarding the general parameters of the partial veto power:

"The power of the partial veto is the power to disapprove. This is a negative power to delete or destroy a part or item, and is not a positive power, or a power to alter, enlarge or increase the effect of the remaining parts or items. It is not the power to enact or create new legislation by selective deletions." *State ex rel. Sego v. Kirkpatrick*, 1974-NMSC-059, ¶ 18. "[T]he Legislature has the power to affix reasonable provisions, conditions or limitations upon appropriations and upon the expenditure of the funds appropriated", and "[t]he Governor may not distort, frustrate or defeat the legislative purpose by a veto of proper legislative conditions, restrictions, limitations or contingencies placed upon an appropriation". *Sego*, ¶ 23.

The legislature, however, may not attempt to intrude on the executive managerial function by including provisions concerned with detailed, miniscule or inconsequential management decisions. *State ex rel. Coll v. Carruthers*, 1988-NMSC-057, ¶¶ 11-12. When the legislature includes an unreasonable or otherwise inappropriate provision with an appropriation, the governor may veto only those provisions and is not required to veto the entire appropriation. *Coll*, ¶¶ 14-15. On the other hand, when the legislature includes reasonable or otherwise appropriate provisions with an appropriation, the governor may not use the partial veto power to carefully strike words, phrases, clauses or sentences to avoid legislative oversight. *Sego*, ¶ 18; *Coll*, ¶ 15.

3. The LCS's position is that, by striking an earmark, the governor reduces the appropriation by the amount of the earmark. In appropriating money, the Constitution requires the legislature to "fix the amount and object of expenditure" with "definite fixed conditions and circumstances". *State ex rel. Constitutional Convention v. Evans*, 1969-NMSC-139. Generally, earmarking portions of an appropriation complies with this constitutional requirement. If the governor were able to strike the "definite fixed conditions" of an earmark and attempt to expend the money for a different purpose, the governor would enlarge the effect of the appropriation and subvert the legislature's intent. Such an enlargement and a subversion are proscribed by the Constitution. (See *Holmes* and *Sego*.)

4. As previously noted, the partial veto power is "a power to delete or destroy" and cannot be wielded to alter, enlarge or increase the effect of remaining parts or items. (See *Sego*.) With this type of veto, the governor attempts to substitute her judgment for that of the legislature's and ultimately frustrates legislative purpose. The Supreme Court in *Sego* specifically held: "Thus, a partial veto must be so exercised that it eliminates or destroys the whole of an item or part and does not distort legislative intent, and in effect create legislation inconsistent with that enacted by the legislature, by the careful striking of words, phrases, clauses or sentences".

5. The governor "may not properly distort legislative appropriations or arrogate unto himself the power of making appropriations by carefully striking words, phrases or sentences from an item or part of an appropriation". (See *Sego*.) The Supreme Court has held that striking a portion of a complete and readily understandable sentence and leaving a grammatically incorrect collection of words distorts or frustrates legislative purpose. Partial vetoes that create, rather than eliminate, inconsistencies are generally unconstitutional. *State ex rel. Stewart v. Martinez*, 2011-NMSC-045.

6. The governor returned House Bill 2 with most of her objections in House Executive Message 98. In this message, the governor provides 96 descriptions of partial vetoes in House Bill 2, and 74 of these descriptions reference "executive managerial function" as the basis for the governor's objection. The governor explained her understanding of the "executive managerial function" as follows:

Finally, I have vetoed parts of HB 2 that impermissibly intrude into the executive managerial function. I object to provisions in HB 2 that unduly restrict appropriations to specified types of expenditures. These restrictions on agency functions exceed the Legislature's proper, constitutionally defined role—unduly constraining the Executive's ability to effectively administer programs to meet the State's needs, in violation of the distribution of powers established by Article III, Section 1 of the New Mexico Constitution. See *Coll*, 1988-NMSC-057, ¶¶ 11-36.

While the governor is correct that the Supreme Court has held that a governor may veto contingencies, conditions or expenditure provisions attached to appropriations if they intrude on the executive managerial function, "intrusion" of the executive managerial function is different from merely "constraining the Executive's ability to effectively administer programs to meet the State's needs". Importantly, an intrusion of the executive managerial function is an attempt by the legislature "to make detailed, minuscule, inconsequential executive management decisions". (*See Coll.*) The governor's reliance on this concept as the basis for her objections in the vast majority of the partial vetoes of House Bill 2 may be misplaced and could indicate misuse of the partial veto power.

7. The governor vetoed the limitation, saying it interfered with executive managerial functions; however, the legislature is required to include such limitations. Absent a proper delegation from the legislature, the executive branch is precluded from exercising any control over the expenditure of appropriated money in a manner that would affect the legislature's choice of purpose. As in *Holmes*, when the legislature purports to delegate authority to control the expenditure of appropriated money, it must provide reasonable standards as a guide to the exercise of the discretionary powers conferred. (*See State ex rel. Holmes v. State Bd. of Fin.*, 1961-NMSC-172; and *State ex rel. Schwartz v. Johnson*, 1995-NMSC-080.)

8. Article 4, Section 16 of the Constitution provides, in relevant part, that "General appropriation bills shall embrace nothing but appropriations for the expense of the executive, legislative and judiciary departments, interest, sinking fund, payments on the public debt, public schools and other expenses required by existing laws". The Supreme Court has interpreted this provision as allowing appropriations only for the current expenses of state government.

The Supreme Court has also held: "The object and purpose of [Article 4, Section 16] was to protect the treasury against legislative raids by the insertion of special appropriations for new purposes in a general appropriation where they might easily pass unnoticed. When careful consideration of such items upon their merits, which might be had if presented separately, would result in their defeat by reason of their doubtful strength. The further purpose was to prevent the passage of general legislation as a part of such bill, which in no way was connected with the subject of making provision for the expenses of the government. The term 'general appropriation bills shall embrace nothing but appropriations,' as used, means that no appropriations other than those specified shall be valid if placed in such general appropriation bill." (*See State ex rel. Whittier v. Safford*, 1923-NMSC-041.)

Regarding amendments by reference, Article 4, Section 18 of the Constitution provides that: "No law shall be revised or amended, or the provisions thereof extended by reference to its title only; but each section thereof as revised, amended or extended shall be set out in full." Section 5 of the GAA provides for "special appropriations", which are generally non-operational expenses that may otherwise be required by existing laws. It is noted that some of the special appropriations in the GAA are for new purposes and not current expenses. Additionally, Section 5 contains some provisions that may amount to substantive law or amendments by reference.

In Section 5 and elsewhere in the GAA, there are provisions that extend the expenditure periods for or change the purposes of appropriations made in previous fiscal years by previous legislatures. Although general appropriation bills are considered ephemeral laws that are not compiled in the New Mexico Statutes Annotated, they are still duly enacting laws subject to the provisions of Article 4, Section 18 of the Constitution. To align with the requirements in Article 4, Section 18 and with the Legislative Style Manual adopted by the New Mexico Legislative Council, the session laws containing appropriations that were amended by reference in the GAA would need to instead be set out in full in legislation and amended with brackets and underscoring. Alternatively, the appropriations in those previously enacted laws could be allowed to expire and those amounts to revert, allowing the current legislature to choose whether and how to re-appropriate the money.

9. This veto may be improper due to the removal of the appropriation and the language specifying how the money was to be expended, leaving a nonsensical purpose. One of the governor's objections is that the vetoed language conflicts with existing law; however, the governor does not cite a section of law, and the LCS is not aware of such law. (*See Sego, Stewart and Coll.*)

10. This veto improperly strikes a contingency or condition precedent. The legislature may not include substantive law or permanent policy in the GAA. *State ex rel. Delgado v. Sargent*, 1913-NMSC-054. However, it may include provisions in the GAA for the expenditure of and accounting for the money appropriated, so long as the provisions are germane and directly connected with the object of the appropriation. *State ex rel. Lucero v. Marron*, 1912-NMSC-037. The court has held that a partial veto of a reasonable condition precedent attempts to create new legislation that affirmatively appropriates money without conditions. (*See Sego.*)

11. This veto may be improper because it frustrates the purpose of the appropriation. Article 4, Section 30 of the Constitution provides that "Every law making an appropriation shall distinctly specify the sum appropriated and the object to which it is to be applied." By striking language that provides the legislature's distinct specifications as to the object of an appropriation, the governor attempts to substitute her judgment for that of the legislature and enlarge the effect of the remaining language.

12. While this veto strikes a contingency or condition precedent, it is distinct from the types of vetoes contemplated in Endnote 10. In *Stewart*, the court distinguished partial vetoes that improve unworkable legislation from those that create unworkable legislation. Unworkable provisions in the GAA are provisions that are unpractical (*see Coll*) or provisions that are inconsistent substantive law (*see Stewart*). The partial veto of this contingency may not be improper because the legislature may not have given the executive enough direction regarding the local match requirement.

13. While a veto like this could be an attempt to frustrate the legislative purpose of the appropriation, this veto may not substantively interfere with the legislature's intent.

14. Article 9, Section 14 of the Constitution is known as the "anti-donation clause", which generally prohibits the state and its political subdivisions from giving financial aid to "any person, association or public or private corporation".

15. The appropriations in Section 9 are divided into four categories: Subsection A is appropriations for fiscal year 2027; Subsection B is appropriations for fiscal year 2028; Subsection C is appropriations for fiscal year 2029; and Subsection D is appropriations for fiscal years 2027 and 2028. Appropriations beyond the fiscal year next succeeding the current fiscal year are constitutionally infirm.

16. As discussed in previous Endnotes, the governor cannot use the partial veto power in an attempt to substitute her judgment for that of the legislature. By striking "randomized controlled" from an appropriation specifically for a "randomized controlled trial", the governor is substituting her judgment for the legislature's and frustrates the legislative purpose.

 (Laws 2026, Chapter 71, p.v.)

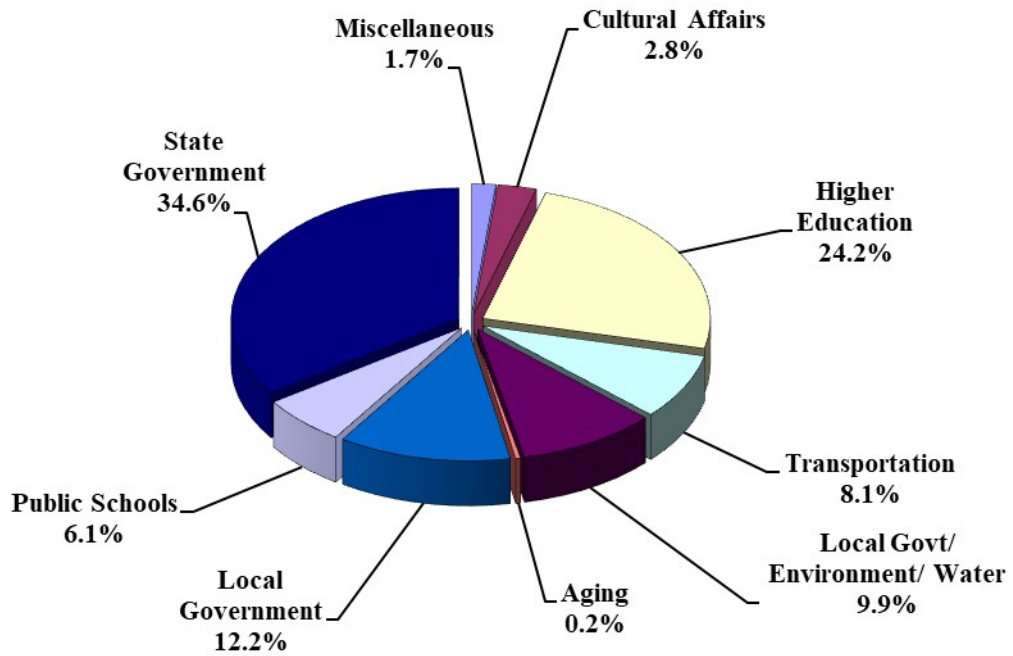

 (Laws 2026, Chapter 65)

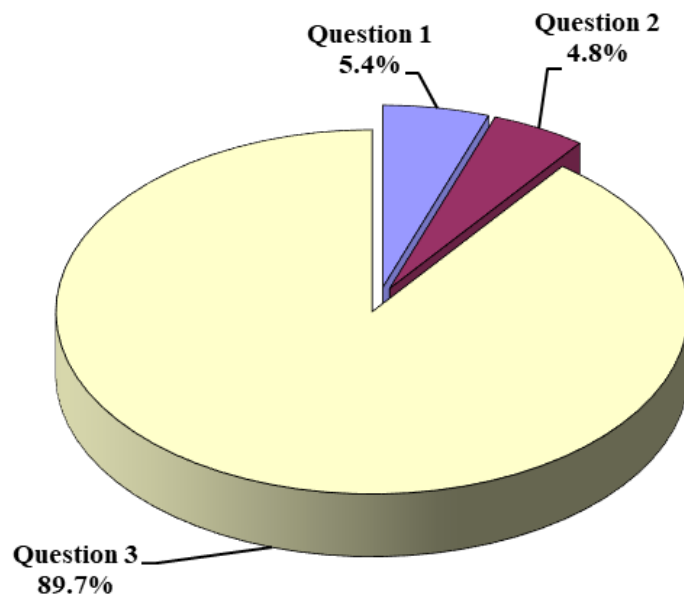

The legislature may reauthorize funds that have been appropriated for capital outlay projects in previous years to change, expand or clarify the project purpose; to extend the time of expenditure or the certification period for the project; or to change the administering agency.
