11	MAKING GENERAL APPROPRIATIONS AND AUTHORIZING EXPENDITURES BY STATE AGENCIES REQUIRED BY LAW.
12	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:
13	Section 1. SHORT TITLEThis act may be cited as the "General Appropriation Act of 2001".
14	Section 2. DEFINITIONSAs used in the General Appropriation Act of 2001:
15	A. "activity" is a strategy or work process designed to achieve a common purpose with a given
16	set of inputs, one or more of which constitute a program;
17	B. "agency" means an office, department, agency, institution, board, bureau, commission,
18	court, district attorney, council or committee of state government;
19	C. "efficiency measure" is a indicator of the cost of an activity in dollars or employee
20	hours per unit of output or outcome;
21	D. "expenditures" means costs, expenses, encumbrances and other financing uses, other than
22	refunds authorized by law, recognized in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles for the
23	legally authorized budget amounts and budget period;
24	E. "explanatory data" means information that can help users to understand reported
25	performance measures and to evaluate the significance of underlying factors that may have affected the

1 reported information;

F. "federal funds" means any payments by the United States government to state government or
 agencies except those payments made in accordance with the federal Mineral Lands Leasing Act;

G. "full-time equivalent" or "FTE" means one or more authorized positions that together
receive compensation for not more than two thousand eighty hours worked in fiscal year 2002. The
calculation of hours worked includes compensated absences but does not include overtime, compensatory time
or sick leave paid pursuant to Section 10-7-10 NMSA 1978;

8 H. "general fund" means that fund created by Section 6-4-2 NMSA 1978 and includes federal 9 Mineral Lands Leasing Act receipts and those payments made in accordance with the federal block grant and 10 the federal Workforce Investment Act, but excludes the general fund operating reserve and the

11 appropriation contingency fund;

12 I. "interagency transfers" means revenue, other than internal service funds, legally 13 transferred from one agency to another;

14 J. "internal service funds" means:

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(1) revenue transferred to an agency for the financing of goods or services to another

16 agency on a cost-reimbursement basis; and

17 (2) unencumbered balances in agency internal service fund accounts appropriated by the 18 General Appropriation Act of 2001;

19 K. "other state funds" means:

20 (1) unencumbered, nonreverting balances in agency accounts, other than in internal 21 service funds accounts, appropriated by the General Appropriation Act of 2001;

(2) all revenue available to agencies from sources other than the general fund, internal
 service funds, interagency transfers and federal funds; and

(3) all revenue, the use of which is restricted by statute or agreement;

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L. "outcome measure" is an indicator of the accomplishments or results that occur because of

1 services provided by a program and is a measure of the actual impact or public benefit of a program;

2 M. "output measure" is an indicator of the physical quality of a service or product delivered 3 by an activity or program;

N. "performance measure" means a quantitative or qualitative indicator used to assess a state
agency's performance;

6 0. "program" means a set of activities undertaken in accordance with a plan of action
7 organized to realize identifiable goals and objectives based on legislative authorization;

8 P. "quality measure" is an indicator of the quality of a good or service produced and is 9 often an indicator of the timeliness, reliability or safety of services or products produced by a 10 program;

Q. "revenue" means all money received by an agency from sources external to that agency, net of refunds and other correcting transactions, other than from issue of debt, liquidation of investments or as agent or trustee for other governmental entities or private persons;

R. "target" means the expected level of performance of a program's performance measures; and S. "unforeseen federal funds" means a source of federal funds or an increased amount of federal funds that could not have been reasonably anticipated or known during the first session of the forty-fifth legislature and, therefore, could not have been requested by an agency or appropriated by the legislature.

19 Section 3. GENERAL PROVISIONS.--

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A. Amounts set out under column headings are expressed in thousands of dollars.

B. Amounts set out under column headings are appropriated from the source indicated by the column heading. All amounts set out under the column heading "Internal Service Funds/Interagency Transfers" indicate an intergovernmental transfer and do not represent a portion of total state government appropriations. All information designated as "Totals" or "Subtotals" are provided for information and are not appropriations.

C. Amounts set out in Section 4 and Section 5 of the General Appropriation Act of 2001, or so
 much as may be necessary, are appropriated from the indicated source for expenditure in fiscal year 2002
 for the objects expressed.

D. Unencumbered balances in agency accounts remaining at the end of fiscal year 2001 shall
revert to the general fund by October 1, 2001, unless otherwise indicated in the General Appropriation Act
of 2001 or otherwise provided by law.

E. Unencumbered balances in agency accounts remaining at the end of fiscal year 2002 shall
revert to the general fund by October 1, 2002, unless otherwise indicated in the General Appropriation Act
of 2001 or otherwise provided by law.

F. The state budget division shall monitor revenue received by agencies from sources other than the general fund and shall reduce the operating budget of any agency whose revenue from such sources is not meeting projections. The state budget division shall notify the legislative finance committee of any operating budget reduced pursuant to this subsection.

G. Except as otherwise specifically stated in the General Appropriation Act of 2001, appropriations are made in that act for the expenditures of agencies and for other purposes as required by existing law for fiscal year 2002. If any other act of the first session of the forty-fifth legislature changes existing law with regard to the name or responsibilities of an agency or the name or purpose of a fund or distribution, the appropriation made in the General Appropriation Act of 2001 shall be transferred from the agency, fund or distribution to which an appropriation has been made as required by existing law to the appropriate agency, fund or distribution provided by the new law.

H. In August, October, December and May of fiscal year 2002, the department of finance and administration, in consultation with the staff of the legislative finance committee and other agencies, shall prepare and present revenue estimates to the legislative finance committee. If these revenue estimates indicate that revenues and transfers to the general fund, excluding transfers to the general fund operating reserve, the appropriation contingency fund or the state-support reserve fund, as of the 1 end of fiscal year 2002, are not expected to meet appropriations from the general fund, then the 2 department shall present a plan to the legislative finance committee that outlines the methods by which 3 the administration proposes to address the deficit.

4 I. Pursuant to Sections 6-3-23 through 6-3-25 NMSA 1978, agencies whose revenue from 5 unforeseen federal funds, from state board of finance loans, from revenue appropriated by other acts of 6 the legislature, or from gifts, grants, donations, bequests, insurance settlements, refunds, or payments 7 into revolving funds which exceed specifically appropriated amounts, may request budget increases from the 8 state budget division. If approved by the state budget division, such money is appropriated. In 9 approving a budget increase from unforeseen federal funds, the director of the state budget division shall 10 advise the legislative finance committee as to the source of the federal funds and the source and amount 11 of any matching funds required.

J. For fiscal year 2002, the number of permanent and term full-time equivalent positions specified for each agency shows the maximum number of employees intended by the legislature for that agency, unless another provision of the General Appropriation Act of 2001 or another act of the first session of the forty-fifth legislature provides for additional employees.

16 K. Except for gasoline credit cards used solely for operation of official vehicles and 17 telephone credit cards used solely for official business, none of the appropriations contained in the 18 General Appropriation Act of 2001 may be expended for payment of credit card invoices.

19 L. To prevent unnecessary spending, expenditures from the General Appropriation Act of 2001 20 for gasoline for state-owned vehicles at public gasoline service stations shall be made only for 21 self-service gasoline; provided that a state agency head may provide exceptions from the requirement to 22 accommodate disabled persons or for other reasons the public interest may require.

23 M. When approving operating budgets based on appropriations in the General Appropriation Act 24 of 2001, the state budget division is specifically authorized to approve only those budgets that are in 25 accordance with generally accepted accounting principles for the purpose of properly classifying other

and then upon verification of the number of units statewide for fiscal year 2002, but no later than
 January 31, the superintendent of public instruction may adjust the program unit value.

The general fund appropriation for the state equalization guarantee distribution contains sufficient funds to provide an eight percent salary increase for teachers; and a seven percent increase for other instructional staff, certified and noncertified staff. The appropriation for transportation contains sufficient funding to provide a statewide average six and two-tenths percent salary increase for transportation employees.

8 The general fund appropriation in the state equalization guarantee distribution reflects the 9 deduction of federal revenue pursuant to Paragraph (2) of Subsection C of Section 22-8-25 NMSA 1978 that 10 includes payments commonly known as "impact aid funds" pursuant to 20 USCA 7701 et. seq., formerly known 11 as "PL 874 funds".

12 The general fund appropriation to the public school fund shall be reduced by the amounts transferred 13 to the public school fund from the current school fund and from the federal Mineral Lands Leasing Act 14 receipts otherwise unappropriated.

15 For the 2001-2002 school year, the state equalization guarantee contains sufficient funding for 16 districts implementing a formula-based program for the first time. Those districts shall use current 17 year MEM in the calculation of program units for the new formula-based program.

18 Any unexpended or unencumbered balance in the distributions authorized remaining at the end of 19 fiscal year 2002 from appropriations made from the general fund shall revert to the general fund.

 10 Unless otherwise indicated, any unexpended or unencumbered balance of the appropriations remaining at the
 11 end of fiscal year 2002 shall revert to the appropriate fund.

12 Under guidelines developed by the state budget division, in consultation with the legislative 13 finance committee, each agency for which appropriations are made or for which performance measures are 14 established in this section or Section 4 of the Supplemental Performance Measures and Targets Act shall 15 file a report with the state budget division and the legislative finance committee analyzing its 16 performance relative to the performance measures established for fiscal year 2002. The report shall be 17 submitted quarterly for the performance measures established in this section and annually for the 18 performance measures in Section 4 of the Supplemental Performance Measures and Targets Act. The report 19 shall compare actual performance for the report period with targeted performance based on the level of 20 funding appropriated. In developing guidelines for the submission of agency performance reports, the 21 state budget division shall establish standards for the reporting of variances between actual and targeted 22 performance levels. The annual and guarterly reports for the period ending June 30, 2002 shall be filed 23 with the state budget division and the legislative finance committee on or before September 1, 2002.

24 It is the intent of the legislature to continue to improve implementation of the 25 Accountability in Government Act by emphasizing measures that are meaningful to the public and measures

For those agencies that have already submitted performance-6 based program budgets, the legislature expects continued refinement of measures to improve their 7 consistency, reliability and relevance, and continued emphasis on defining and measuring the constituent 8 activities of a program.

9 Unless explicitly stated otherwise, each of the program measures and the associated targets 10 contained in this section reflect performance to be achieved for fiscal year 2002. In the case where 11 there are no targets for output, outcome, efficiency or quality measures, agencies are expected to develop 12 baseline date for fiscal year 2002 and to propose targets when submitting budget requests for fiscal year 13 2003.

In concert with the annual agency strategic planning process required by the state budget division, the state budget division shall require strategic plans, including internal and external assessments and development of programs and performance measures, be coordinated among the state agency on aging, human services department, department of labor, department of health and the children, youth and families department.
