### **SUMMARY**

Synopsis of Bill

HB 922 makes cock fighting illegal. A person who sponsors or participates in a cock fight is guilty of a fourth degree felony. A person who is present is guilty of a misdemeanor.

# FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

There are significant law enforcement costs associated with cock fighting since these events tend to lead to or involve illegal activities such as gambling and abuse of alcohol.
