SUMMARY

Synopsis of Bill

SB 680 requires legislative approval for the sale, transfer, or closure of a state park. Additionally, a state agency shall not enter into any agreement for the management of a state park without legislative approval.

Significant Issues

Sales, transfers or closure of state parks represent significant changes in the assets of the State of New Mexico. It is reasonable that significant changes in the ultimate control of these assets be approved by legislative joint resolutions. The opportunity will generally only arise once a year during the regular sessions of the New Mexico Legislature, slowing down the process to a deliberate public policy debate.

According to the Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources Department, this bill will severely limit executive authority related to park lands.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

SB 680 contains no appropriation.
