## A MEMORIAL

RECOGNIZING THE CONTRIBUTIONS OF THE UNITED STATES MILITARY ACADEMY AT WEST POINT. NEW YORK.

WHEREAS, the United States military academy at West Point, New York, was established by an act of congress that was signed into law by President Thomas Jefferson in 1802; and

WHEREAS, this year marks the bicentennial of the establishment of the academy; and

WHEREAS, during its existence, the academy has graduated nearly fifty-eight thousand five hundred cadets; and

WHEREAS, in keeping with its mission, the academy developed those graduates as leaders of character for the United States army and inspired them to pursue careers as commissioned officers and a lifetime of selfless service to our nation; and

WHEREAS, many of the graduates have distinguished themselves as leaders in the armed services, including Generals Ulysses S. Grant, George A. Custer, Douglas MacArthur, George S. Patton, Omar N. Bradley, Dwight D. Eisenhower and H. Norman Schwarzkopf; and

WHEREAS, West Point graduates Ulysses S. Grant and

Dwight D. Eisenhower have gone on to become president of the HM 13

"Buzz" Aldrin have gone on to become astronauts; and
