in tribal communities;

E. encourage cooperation among the educational leadership of Arizona, Utah, New Mexico and the Navajo Nation to address the unique issues of educating students in Navajo communities that arise due to the location of the Navajo Nation in those states;

F. provide the means for a formal government-togovernment relationship between the state and New Mexico tribes and the development of relationships with the education division of the bureau of Indian affairs and other entities that serve American Indian students;

G. provide the means for a relationship between the state and urban American Indian community members to participate in initiatives and educational decisions related to American Indian students residing in urban areas;

H. ensure that parents; tribal departments of education; community-based organizations; the department of education; universities; and tribal, state and local policymakers work together to find ways to improve educational opportunities for American Indian students;

I. ensure that tribes are notified of all curricula development for their approval and support;

J. encourage an agreement regarding the alignment of the bureau of Indian affairs and state assessment programs so that comparable information is

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1 provided to parents and tribes; and

K. encourage and foster parental involvement in the education of Indian students."

A new section of the Public School Code is Section 3. enacted to read:

"DEFINITION. -- As used in the Indian Education Act, "tribe" means an Indian nation, tribe or pueblo located within New Mexico."

9 Section 4. A new section of the Public School Code is 10 enacted to read:

11 "STATE BOARD--TRIBES--RULEMAKING.--The state board. in 12 consultation with tribes, may adopt and promulgate rules to 13 implement the provisions of the Indian Education Act."

14 A new section of the Public School Code is Section 5. 15 enacted to read:

16 "INDIAN EDUCATION DIVISION--CREATED--ASSISTANT 17 SUPERI NTENDENT- - DUTI ES. - -

18 The "Indian education division" is created Α. 19 within the department of education. The state 20 superintendent shall appoint an assistant superintendent for 21 Indian education, who shall direct the activities of the 22 di vi si on.

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B. The Indian education division shall:

provide assistance to school districts (1) and tribes to meet the educational needs of American Indian

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students;

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(2) provide assistance to school districts and tribes in the planning, development, implementation and evaluation of curricula in native languages, culture and history designed for American Indian students;

(3) provide assistance to school districts and tribes to develop curricula and instructional materials in native languages, culture and history in conjunction and by contract with native language practitioners and tribal elders, unless the use of written language is expressly prohibited by the tribe;

(4) establish an Indian education advisory council;

14 (5) by January 2006, enter into agreements
15 with each tribe or authorized tribal educational entity to
16 share programmatic information and to coordinate technical
17 assistance for public schools that serve American Indian
18 students;

(6) seek funds to establish an Indian
education office in the northwest corner of the state to
implement agreements with each tribe or authorized tribal
educational entity, monitor the progress of American Indian
students and coordinate technical assistance at the public
schools that serve American Indian students;

(7) require school districts to obtain a

SFC/SB 115 Page 4 signature of approval by the tribal governments or tribal government designees residing within school district boundaries, verifying that the tribes agree to Indian education policies and procedures pursuant to federal requirements; and

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(8) seek funds to establish, develop and implement the following support services for the purposes of increasing the number of American Indian teachers and principals and providing continued professional development for educational assistants, teachers and principals serving American Indian students, in conjunction with the Indian education advisory council:

13 recruitment and retention: (a) 14 **(b)** academic transition programs; 15 (c) academic financial support; 16 teacher preparation; (d) 17 (e) teacher induction; and 18 (f) professional development; 19 (9) develop curricula to provide 20 instruction in tribal history and government and develop 21 plans to implement these subjects into history and 22 government courses in school districts throughout the state; 23 ensure that native language bilingual (10)24 programs are part of a school district's professional **SFC/SB** 115 25 development plan, as provided in Section 22-2-2 NMSA 1978; Page 5

1 and 2 develop a plan to establish a post-(11)3 secondary investment system for Indian students to which 4 parents, tribes and the state may contribute." 5 A new section of the Public School Code is Section 6. 6 enacted to read: 7 "ADVI SORY COUNCI L. - -8 The "Indian education advisory council" shall A. 9 consist of fourteen members as follows: 10 (1) four representatives from the Navajo 11 Nation: 12 two representatives, one from the (2)13 Mescalero Apache Tribe and one from the Jicarilla Apache 14 Nation: 15 (3) four representatives, two from the 16 southern pueblos and two from the northern pueblos; and 17 four members representing urban areas, (4) 18 the bureau of Indian affairs, head start organizations and 19 the general public, at least one of whom shall be non-20 Indian, but all of whom shall have knowledge of and 21 involvement in the education of Indian students. 22 On a semiannual basis, representatives from **B**. 23 all tribes, members of the state board, the governor's 24 office, the New Mexico office of Indian affairs, the **SFC/SB** 115 25 legislature, the state superintendent and the Indian Page 6

C. Members of the Indian education advisory council may receive per diem and mileage as provided for nonsalaried public officers in the Per Diem and Mileage Act."

A new section of the Public School Code is Section 7. enacted to read:

"REPORT. - -

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Α The Indian education division in collaboration with the education division of the bureau of Indian affairs and other entities that serve American Indian students shall submit an annual statewide American Indian education status report to all tribes.

A school district with tribal lands located **B**. within its boundaries shall provide a districtwide American Indian education status report to all tribes represented within the school district boundaries.

C. The status reports shall be written in a brief format and shall include the following information, through which public school performance is measured and reported to the tribes:

student achievement as measured by a (1) statewide test approved by the state board, with results

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disaggregated by ethnicity; 1 2 (2) school safety; 3 (3) the dropout rate; 4 (4) attendance: 5 (5) parent and community involvement; 6 (6) educational programs targeting American 7 Indian students: 8 (7) financial reports; 9 current status of federal Indian (8) 10 education policies and procedures; 11 (9) school district initiatives to decrease 12 the number of student dropouts and increase attendance; 13 (10) public school use of variable school 14 cal endars; and 15 (11)school district consultations with 16 parent advisory committees." 17 A new section of the Public School Code is Section 8. 18 enacted to read: 19 "FUND CREATED. --20 The "Indian education fund" is created in the Α. 21 state treasury. The fund consists of appropriations, gifts, 22 grants and donations and income from investment of the fund. 23 Money in the fund shall not revert to any other fund at the 24 end of a fiscal year. The fund shall be administered by the **SFC/SB** 115 25 department of education, and money in the fund is Page 8

appropriated to the department to distribute awards to
 support the Indian Education Act.

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B. The department of education shall develop
procedures and rules for the award of money from the fund.
Disbursement of the fund shall be made by warrant of the
department of finance and administration pursuant to
vouchers signed by the state superintendent."

Section 9. REPEAL.--Sections 22-2-11 through 22-2-13 SFC/SB 115 Page 9 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1975 (1st S.S.), Chapter 8, Sections 1 through 3) are repealed.
