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8	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:	
9	Section 1. Section 29-7-4 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1969, Chapter 264,	
10	Section 6, as amended) is amended to read:	
11	"29-7-4. POWERS AND DUTIES OF BOARDThe board shall:	
	A. approve or disapprove the appointment of the director by the	
12	secretary;	
13	B. develop and implement a planned program of:	
14	(1) basic law enforcement training and in-service law enforcement training, a	
15	portion of which may be conducted on a regional basis; and	
16	(2) basic telecommunicator training and in-service	
17	telecommunicator training, as provided in the Public Safety Telecommunicator Training	
18	Act, a portion of which may be conducted on a regional basis;	
	C. prescribe qualifications for instructors and prescribe courses of	
19	instruction for:	
20	(1) basic law enforcement training and in-service law	
21	enforcement training; and	
22	(2) basic telecommunicator training and in-service	
23	telecommunicator training, as provided in the Public Safety Telecommunicator Training	
24	Act;	
25	D. report annually to the governor;	
- 5	E. in its discretion, accept donations, contributions, grants or gifts from	

1	whatever source for the benefit of the academy, which donations, contributions, grants
2	or gifts are appropriated for the use of the academy;
3	F. adopt, publish and file, in accordance with the provisions of the

9	(2) telecommunicator's certification for any just cause set forth
10	in the Public Safety Telecommunicator Training Act;
11	H. administer oaths, subpoena persons and take testimony on any
	matter within the board's jurisdiction; and
12	I. perform all other acts appropriate to the development and operation
13	of the academy."
14	Section 2. Section 29-7-5 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1969, Chapter 264,
15	Section 7, as amended) is amended to read:
16	"29-7-5. POWERS AND DUTIES OF THE DIRECTORThe director shall:
17	A. be the chief executive officer of the academy and employ necessary
18	personnel;
	B. issue a certificate of completion to any person who:
19	(1) graduates from an approved basic law enforcement training
20	program and who satisfies the qualifications for certification as set forth in Section
21	29-7-6 NMSA 1978; or
22	(2) graduates from an approved basic telecommunicator
23	training program and who satisfies the qualifications for certification as set forth in the
24	Public Safety Telecommunicator Training Act;
25	C. perform all other acts necessary and appropriate to the carrying out
	of his duties;

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1	D. act as executive secretary to the board;
2	E. carry out the policy as set by the board; and
3	F. annually evaluate the courses of instruction being offered by the
4	academy and make necessary modifications and adjustments to the programs."
	Section 3. SHORT TITLESections 3 through 11 of this act may be cited as
5	he "Public Safety Telecommunicator Training Act".
6	Section 4. DEFINITIONSAs used in the Public Safety Telecommunicator
7	Fraining Act:
8	A. "board" means the New Mexico law enforcement academy board;
9	B. "certified" means meeting the training standards established by
10	statute and rule as determined by the board;
11	C. "director" means the director of the New Mexico law enforcement
	academy;
12	D. "dispatch" means the relay of information to public safety personnel
13	by all forms of communication;
14	E. "safety agency" means a unit of state or local government, a special
15	ourpose district or a private business that provides police, firefighting or emergency
16	medical services; and
17	F. "telecommunicator" means an employee or volunteer of a safety
18	agency who:
	(1) receives calls or dispatches the appropriate personnel or
19	equipment in response to calls for police, fire or medical services; and
20	(2) makes decisions affecting the life, health or welfare of the
21	public or safety employees.
22	Section 5. QUALIFICATIONS FOR CERTIFICATIONAn applicant for
23	certification shall provide evidence satisfactory to the board that he:
24	A. is a citizen or legal resident of the United States and has reached
25	he age of majority;
	 B. holds a high school or general equivalency diploma from an

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1	accredited institution;
2	C. has not been convicted of, pled guilty to or entered a plea of nolo
3	contendere to a:
4	(1) felony charge; or
	(2) violation of a federal or state law, a local ordinance relating
5	to aggravated assault or theft or a law involving moral turpitude within the three-year
6	period immediately preceding his application;
7	D. has not received a dishonorable discharge from the armed forces
8	of the United States;
9	E. is free from a physical, emotional or mental condition that might
10	adversely affect his performance;
11	F. is of good moral character;
	G. has met all other requirements for certification prescribed by the
12	board; and
13	H. has received a certificate attesting to his completion of an approved
14	basic telecommunicator training program from the director.
15	Section 6. BASIC TELECOMMUNICATOR TRAINING PROGRAMThe board
16	shall develop and adopt a basic telecommunicator training program for
17	telecommunicator certification. The program shall be constructed to meet the
18	minimum basic needs of telecommunicators in New Mexico.
	Section 7. MINIMUM TRAINING STANDARDS FOR CERTIFICATION
19	A. A telecommunicator shall satisfy the qualifications for certification
20	set forth in the Public Safety Telecommunicator Training Act within twelve months after
21	beginning employment and shall provide a certificate of completion to the director.
22	B. The director shall waive the training requirements set forth in
23	Subsection A of this section for a police radio dispatcher who is certified as a police
24	radio dispatcher and has met all other requirements set forth by the board.
25	Section 8. CERTIFICATION BY WAIVER
	Δ The director shall waive the basic telecommunicator training

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1	program and certify applicants who furnish evidence of satisfactory completion of a	S
2	basic telecommunicator training program that, in the director's opinion, is substantially	В
3	equivalent to the board's basic telecommunicator training program.	3 8
4	B. A telecommunicator granted a waiver under this section shall meet	6 P
-	all other requirements set out in the Public Safety Telecommunicator Training Act.	а
5	Section 9. IN-SERVICE TELECOMMUNICATOR TRAINING	g e
6	A. In-service telecommunicator training consists of at least twenty	5
7	hours of board-approved advanced training for each certified telecommunicator during	Ü
8	each two-year period. The first training course shall commence no later than twelve	
9	months after graduation from a board-approved basic telecommunicator training	
10	program.	
11	B. A certified telecommunicator shall provide proof of completion of in-	
	service training requirements to the director no later than March 1 of the year	
12	subsequent to the year in which the requirements are met. The director shall provide	
13	annual notice to all certified telecommunicators regarding in-service training	
14	requirements. Failure to complete in-service training requirements may be grounds	
15	for suspension of a telecommunicator's certification at the director's discretion. A	
16	telecommunicator may be reinstated at the discretion of the director when the	
17	telecommunicator presents to the director evidence he has satisfied the in-service	
	training requirements.	
18	Section 10. REPORTS AND ROSTERS	
19	A. A safety agency that operates within the state shall submit a	
20	quarterly report to the director on the status of each telecommunicator. The reporting	
21	forms and submittal dates shall be prescribed by the director.	
22	B. The director shall maintain a roster of all certified	
23	telecommunicators.	
24	Section 11. REFUSAL, SUSPENSION OR REVOCATION OF CERTIFICATION	
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25	A. The board shall refuse to issue or shall suspend or revoke a	

1	telecommunicator's certification, after consultation with his employing safety agency, if
2	the board determines that a person has:
3	(1) failed to satisfy the qualifications for certification set forth in
4	Section 29-7A-3 NMSA 1978;
5	(2) committed acts that constitute dishonesty or fraud;
	(3) been convicted of, pled guilty to or entered a plea of nolo
6	contendere to a:
7	(a) felony charge; or
8	(b) violation of a federal or state law, a local ordinance
9	relating to aggravated assault or theft or a law involving moral turpitude; or
10	(4) knowingly made a false statement on his application.
11	B. The board shall develop, adopt and promulgate administrative
12	procedures for suspension or revocation of a telecommunicator's certification that
	include:
13	(1) notice and opportunity for the affected telecommunicator to
14	be heard; and
15	(2) procedures for review of the board's decision.
16	Section 12. REPEALSections 29-7A-1 through 29-7A-7 NMSA 1978 (being
17	Laws 1979, Chapter 228, Sections 1 through 7, as amended) are repealed.
18	Section 13. EFFECTIVE DATEThe effective date of the provisions of this act
19	is July 1, 2003.
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
