11	RELATING TO TOBACCO SETTLEMENT REVENUE; MAKING APPROPRIATIONS
12	FROM THE TOBACCO SETTLEMENT PROGRAM FUND.
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14	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:
15	Section 1. APPROPRIATIONS
16	A. The following amounts are appropriated from the
17	tobacco settlement program fund to the following agencies for
18	the specified purposes for expenditure in fiscal year 2004:
19	(1) eight million dollars (\$8,000,000) to the
20	department of health for comprehensive tobacco use prevention
21	and cessation programs that are community based, culturally
22	appropriate and designed to achieve the "best practices"
23	standards developed by the federal centers for disease control
24	and prevention, including school-based youth and parent
25	programs, media and public awareness campaigns and partnerships
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with disparate populations;

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2 (2)one million dollars (\$1,000,000) to the department of health for diabetes prevention and control; 3 (3) two million five hundred thousand dollars 4 (\$2,500,000) to the department of health for an early 5 intervention program for at-risk children; 6 7 (4) four hundred seventy thousand dollars (\$470,000) to the department of health for human 8 9 immunodeficiency virus and acquired immune deficiency syndrome 10 care and prevention; two hundred fifty thousand dollars 11 (5) 12 (\$250,000) to the department of health to fund inpatient treatment beds as an alternative to incarceration for women 13 14 with a substance abuse history convicted of nonviolent felony offenses: 15 two hundred fifty thousand dollars 16 (6) (\$250,000) to the department of health for the statewide 17 tobacco education prevention program; 18 forty-two thousand dollars (\$42,000) to 19 (7)20 the department of health for the purchase of a pulmonary function analyzer, office equipment and furniture for a 21 collaborative program on chronic disease risk reduction in Taos 22 county; 23 (8) one million dollars (\$1,000,000) to the 24 department of health to contract for the provision of diabetes 25

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1 testing equipment in rural clinics for uninsured patients, for 2 computer equipment to track and monitor those patients and for the development of a diabetes collaborative; 3 two hundred fifty thousand dollars 4 (9) (\$250,000) to the department of health to provide automatic 5 external defibrillators in state and local government buildings 6 7 and vehicles: one million two hundred thousand dollars 8 (10)(\$1, 200, 000) to the department of health to provide technology 9 10 for primary care clinics statewide; (11) two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) 11 12 to the department of health to contract for the implementation of a comprehensive cancer control plan; 13 three hundred thousand dollars (\$300,000) 14 (12)to the department of health to provide for linking medical 15 16 information among the state's community access programs; one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) 17 (13)to the department of health for public education on prostate 18 19 cancer: 20 (14)three million eight hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$3,850,000) to the board of regents of the 21 university of New Mexico for the New Mexico health sciences 22 center for research programs as follows: 23 three hundred seventeen thousand six (a) 24 hundred dollars (\$317,600) for genomics core facilities; 25 . 143585. 1

14	(a) fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) for
15	area health education centers;
16	(b) one hundred fifty thousand dollars
17	(\$150,000) to the center for telehealth;
18	(c) fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) to
19	the Los Pasos program;
20	(d) four hundred thousand dollars
21	(\$400,000) for pediatric oncology;
22	(e) four hundred fifty thousand dollars
23	(\$450,000) to the poison and drug information center;
24	(f) four hundred thousand dollars
25	(\$400,000) for specialty education in pediatrics; and
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1 (g) four hundred thousand dollars (\$400,000) for specialty education in trauma; 2 (16) one million seven hundred fifty thousand 3 dollars (\$1,750,000) to the board of regents of the university 4 of New Mexico for the New Mexico health sciences center to 5 contract for research on emphysema and lung cancer detection 6 7 and treatment; one million three hundred thousand 8 (17)9 dollars (\$1,300,000) to the human services department for a 10 breast and cervical cancer treatment program; (18) two hundred fifty thousand dollars 11 12 (\$250,000) to the corrections department to fund a women's reentry drug treatment court pilot project; 13 14 (19)fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) to the corrections department to fund the task force created pursuant 15 to Senate Joint Memorial 48 of the second session of the forty-16 fifth legislature that is examining issues relating to the 17 increase in the incarceration of females due to drug use and 18 19 addiction: and 20 (20)six hundred thousand dollars (\$600,000) to the New Mexico veterans' service commission to contract for 21 an assisted living program for veterans with lung disease. 22 **B**. Any unexpended or unencumbered balance remaining 23 at the end of fiscal year 2004 shall revert to the tobacco 24 settlement program fund. 25

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
