20	A. The economic development department shall
21	establish a development training program that provides quick-
22	response classroom and in-plant training to furnish qualified
23	manpower resources for new or expanding industries and non-
24	retail service sector businesses in New Mexico that have
25	business or production procedures that require skills unique to

Training shall be custom designed for, [the 2 particular company] and [shall be] based on the special 3 requirements of, each company. The program shall be operated 4 on a statewide basis and shall be designed to assist any area 5 in becoming more competitive economically. 6 **B**. There is created the "industrial training board" 7 composed of: 8 the director of the economic development (1) 9 division of the economic development department; 10 the director of the vocational education (2)11 division of the state department of public education; 12 (3) the director of the job training division 13 of the labor department; 14 (4) the executive director of the commission 15 on higher education; 16 (5) one member from organized labor appointed 17 by the governor; and 18 one public member from the business (6)19 community appointed by the governor. 20 C. F. The state shall contract with a company or an educational institution to provide training or instructional services in accordance with the approved training proposal and within the following limitations:

(1) [no] payment shall be made for [training in excess of] up to one thousand forty hours of training per [trainee for the total duration of training] full-timeequivalent position;

(2) training applicants shall have resided within the state for a minimum of one year immediately prior to the commencement of the training program and be of legal status for employment; provided, however, that prior to July 1, 2004, the residency requirements may be waived in part for [projects] <u>a project</u> within <u>a</u> New Mexico [communities] community located within fifty miles of the state border if the project meets the following criteria:

(a) the project will employ more thanone thousand five hundred employees;

(b) the resident labor force within a fifty-mile radius of the project location is not sufficient to fill the full-time-equivalent position requirements of the project as determined by the labor department;

(c) preference for training shall be

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1 given to New Mexico residents; and 2 (d) no less than fifty percent of the project's work force shall be residents of New Mexico; 3 4 (3) payment for institutional classroom training shall be made [under any] pursuant to an accepted 5 6 training contract for a qualified training program; 7 [no] payment shall not be made [under any] (4) 8 pursuant to an accepted training contract for rental of 9 facilities unless facilities are not available on site or at 10 the educational institution: 11 (5) all applicants shall be eligible under the 12 federal Fair Labor Standards Act of 1938, as amended, and shall 13 not have terminated a public school program within the past 14 three months except by graduation; 15 trainees shall be guaranteed [full-time] (6) 16 employment with the contracted company upon successful 17 completion of the training; 18 persons employed to provide the (7) 19 instructional services shall be exempt from the minimum 20 requirements established in the state plan for other state 21 vocational programs; and 22 (8) [no] payment shall not be made for 23 training programs or production of Indian jewelry or imitation 24 Indian jewelry unless a majority of those involved in the 25 training program or production are of Indian descent." . 142602. 1

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
