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2 For the purpose of the Counseling and Therapy Α. 3 Practice Act, a person is practicing as a professional mental 4 health counselor, professional clinical mental health 5 counselor, marriage and family therapist, professional art 6 therapist, registered independent mental health counselor, 7 registered mental health counselor, licensed mental health 8 counselor, licensed associate marriage and family therapist, 9 alcohol and drug abuse counselor, alcohol abuse counselor, drug 10 abuse counselor or substance abuse [trainee] associate if he 11 advertises, offers himself to practice, is employed in a 12 position described as professional mental health counselor, 13 professional clinical mental health counselor, marriage and 14 family therapist, professional art therapist, registered 15 independent mental health counselor, [registered mental health 16 counselor] alcohol and drug abuse counselor, alcohol abuse 17 counselor, drug abuse counselor or substance abuse counselor 18 [trainee] associate, or holds out to the public or represents 19 in any manner that he is licensed or registered to practice as 20 a counselor or therapist enumerated in this section in this 21 state.

E.] F. The scope of [practice] practices of alcohol [er] and drug abuse counseling, or both, consists of rendering treatment and intervention services specific to alcohol and other drug use disorders to [individuals] persons, couples, families or groups. The services may include evaluation, assessment, diagnosis of chemical abuse and chemical dependency disorders only, consultation, development of treatment plans, case management-counseling, referral, appraisal, crisis intervention, education, reporting and record keeping. Nothing in this scope of practice shall be construed as preventing licensed [alcohol abuse counselors, drug abuse counselors and] alcohol and drug abuse counselors from providing screening and referrals for mental health disorders. However, assessment, .155465.1

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treatment and diagnosis for such disorders is not within the scope of practice of this license. The practice of these activities will be limited to the individual's level of training, education and supervised experience.

 $[F_{\bullet}]$ <u>G</u>. The scope of practice of a substance abuse [trainee] associate under the supervision by an appropriate supervisor is limited to supervised work in a public or private institution. The [trainee] associate may be involved in taking social histories or conducting home studies. The [trainee] associate utilizes the basic problem-solving process of gathering information, assessing that information at a beginning professional level and developing an intervention plan. The [trainee] associate may implement the plan and conduct follow-ups pertaining specifically to alcohol and drug abuse counseling. The [trainee] associate may provide client education and assist <u>a</u> licensed counselor-therapist with group or individual counseling sessions. A substance abuse associate shall not practice independently as a private practitioner."

Section 4. Section 61-9A-6 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1993, Chapter 49, Section 6, as amended by Laws 2003, Chapter 422, Section 4 and by Laws 2003, Chapter 423, Section 1) is amended to read:
