7	Section 1. Section 22-23A-1 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 2003,
8	Chapter 151, Section 1) is amended to read:

10	1978 may be cited as the "Indian Education Act"."
11	Section 2. Section 22-23A-5 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 2003,
12	Chapter 151, Section 5) is amended to read:
13	"22-23A-5. INDIAN EDUCATION DIVISIONCREATED
14	ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENTDUTIES
15	A. The "Indian education division" is created
16	within the department. The secretary shall appoint an
17	assistant secretary for Indian education, who shall direct
18	the activities of the division.
19	B. The Indian education division shall:
20	(1) provide assistance to school districts
21	and tribes to meet the educational needs of American Indian
22	students;
23	(2) provide assistance to school districts
24	and tribes in the planning, development, implementation and
25	evaluation of curricula in native languages, culture and

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- (4) provide assistance to school districts and tribes to develop curricula and instructional materials in native languages, culture and history in conjunction and by contract with native language practitioners and tribal elders, unless the use of written language is expressly prohibited by the tribe;
- (5) establish an Indian education advisory council;
- (6) by January 2006, enter into agreements with each tribe or authorized tribal educational entity to share programmatic information and to coordinate technical assistance for public schools that serve American Indian students;
- (7) seek funds to establish an Indian education office in the northwest corner of the state to implement agreements with each tribe or authorized tribal educational entity, monitor the progress of American Indian students and coordinate technical assistance at the public

1	schools that serve American Indian students;
2	(8) require school districts to obtain a
3	signature of approval by the tribal governments or tribal
4	government designees residing within school district
5	boundaries, verifying that the tribes agree to Indian
6	education policies and procedures pursuant to federal
7	requirements;
8	(9) seek funds to establish, develop and
9	implement the following support services for the purposes of
10	increasing the number of American Indian teachers and
11	principals and providing continued professional development
12	for educational assistants, teachers and principals serving
13	American Indian students, in conjunction with the Indian
14	education advisory council:
15	(a) recruitment and retention;
16	(b) academic transition programs;
17	(c) academic financial support;
18	(d) teacher preparation;
19	(e) teacher induction; and
20	(f) professional development;
21	(10) develop curricula to provide
22	instruction in tribal history and government and develop
23	plans to implement these subjects into history and government
24	courses in school districts throughout the state;
25	(ll) ensure that native language bilingual

2	development plan, as provided in Section 22-10A-19.1 NMSA

4	(12) develop a plan to establish a	
5	post-secondary investment system for Indian students to which
