All persons who are duly commissioned officers 15 of the police or sheriff's department of any New Mexico 16 Indian nation, tribe or pueblo or who are law enforcement 17 officers employed by the bureau of Indian affairs and are 18 assigned in New Mexico are, when commissioned under 19 Subsection B of this section, recognized and authorized to 20 act as New Mexico peace officers. These officers have all 21 the powers of New Mexico peace officers to enforce state laws 22 in New Mexico, including the power to make arrests for 23 violation of state laws.

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24 The chief of the New Mexico state police is Β. SB 941 granted authority to issue commissions as New Mexico peace

The procedures to be followed in the issuance and revocation of commissions 6 and the respective rights and responsibilities of the departments shall be set forth in a written agreement to be 8 executed between the chief of the New Mexico state police and the Indian nation, tribe or pueblo or the appropriate federal official.

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11 C. The agreement referred to in Subsection B of 12 this section shall contain the following conditions:

13 the Indian nation, tribe or pueblo, but (1) 14 not the bureau of Indian affairs, shall submit proof of 15 adequate public liability and property damage insurance for 16 vehicles operated by the peace officers and police 17 professional liability insurance from a company licensed to 18 sell insurance in the state;

19 each applicant for a commission shall (2) 20 successfully complete four hundred hours of basic police 21 training that is approved by the director of the New Mexico 22 law enforcement academy;

23 (3) the chief of the New Mexico state police 24 shall have the authority to suspend any commission granted SB 941 25 pursuant to Subsection B of this section for reasons solely

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within the chief's discretion;

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(4) if any provision of the agreement is violated by the Indian nation, tribe or pueblo or any of its agents, the chief of the New Mexico state police shall suspend the agreement on five days' notice, which suspension shall last until the chief is satisfied that the violation has been corrected and will not recur;

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exterior boundaries of the reservation, and the authority conferred in any written agreement between the chief of the New Mexico state police and the Navajo Nation may extend beyond the exterior boundaries of the Navajo reservation to and including the area enclosed by the following description:

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6 Beginning at a point where the southern boundary line of 7 the Navajo Nation reservation intersects the western right-of-way line of US 491, and running thence; southerly 8 9 along the western right-of-way line of US 491 to the 10 northerly city limits of Gallup; thence, easterly along the 11 northerly city limits of Gallup to the northern side of the 12 right of way of I-40; thence, in an easterly direction along 13 the northerly side of the right of way of I-40 to the 14 northerly limits of the village of Prewitt; thence, in a 15 straight line between the northerly boundary of the village 16 of Prewitt to the southerly boundary of Ambrosia Lake; thence 17 in a straight line between the southerly boundary of Ambrosia 18 Lake to the southerly boundary of Hospah; thence, east along 19 a straight line from the southerly boundary of Hospah to the 20 southern boundary of Torreon; thence along the easterly side 21 of the right of way of state road 197 to the westerly city 22 limits of Cuba; thence, north along the westerly side of the 23 right of way of state road 44 to the southerly boundary of 24 the Jicarilla Apache Nation reservation; thence, westerly 25 along the southerly boundary of the Jicarilla Apache Nation

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1 reservation to the southwest corner of that reservation; 2 thence, northerly along the westerly boundary of the 3 Jicarilla Apache Indian reservation to a point where the westerly boundary of the reservation intersects the southerly 4 5 side of the right of way of state road 44; thence, northerly 6 along the southerly side of the right of way of state road 44 7 to its intersection with the northerly side of the right of way of Navajo road 3003; thence, along the northerly side of 8 9 the right of way of Navajo road 3003 to a point where the 10 northerly side of the right of way of Navajo road 3003 11 intersects the westerly side of the right-of-way line of 12 state road 371; thence, northerly along the west side of the 13 right of way of state road 371 to the southerly side of the 14 right of way of Navajo road 36; thence, westerly along the 15 southerly side of the right of way of Navajo road 36 to the 16 eastern border of the Navajo Nation reservation; thence, 17 along the eastern and southerly borders of the Navajo Nation 18 reservation to the point of beginning.

The municipalities of Cuba and Gallup and the villages

D. Nothing in this section impairs or affects the 18 existing status and sovereignty of an Indian nation, tribe or 19 pueblo as established under the laws of the United States.

All persons who are duly commissioned federal 21 law enforcement officers employed by the federal bureau of 22 investigation; drug enforcement administration; bureau of 23 alcohol, tobacco and firearms; United States secret service; 24 United States customs service; immigration and naturalization 25 service; United States marshals service; postal inspection

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1 service; United States probation department; and United 2 States pretrial services agency; and other appropriate 3 federal officers whose primary duty is law enforcement 4 related, who are assigned in New Mexico and who are required 5 to be designated by the county sheriff on a case-by-case 6 basis in the county in which they are working, are recognized 7 and authorized to act as New Mexico peace officers and have 8 all the powers of New Mexico peace officers to enforce state 9 laws in New Mexico, including the power to make arrests for 10 violation of state laws. The department of public safety 11 shall maintain a registry that lists the name and affiliated 12 federal agency of every federal law enforcement officer 13 recognized and authorized to act as a New Mexico peace 14 officer pursuant to the provisions of this subsection. This 15 subsection shall not be construed to impose liability upon or 16 to require indemnification by the state for any act performed 17 by a federal law enforcement officer pursuant to this 18 subsection.

19 F.
