#### **SUMMARY**

#### Synopsis of Bill

Senate Bill 820 requires the Taxation and Revenue Department (TRD) to issue special motor vehicle registration plates to emergency medical technicians (EMT). The plates must be a standardized special registration plate with a logo specified in current law indicating that the recipient is an EMT.

The bill makes anyone who represents himself to be an emergency medical technician when they are not will be guilty of a petty misdemeanor.

#### Senate Bill 820 -- Page 2

Anyone who loses his or her licensure as an EMT with the State of New Mexico is required to remove the plate immediately.

# Significant Issues

- There are currently about 7,000 licensed Emergency Medical Services (EMS) personnel in the State of New Mexico. About 60% are volunteer responders.
  - This bill provides a method of recognizing emergency medical technicians during an emergency response. Currently, only a shoulder patch visually identifies emergency medical services (EMS) personnel responding to an emergency.
- This bill provides a method of visual recognition for volunteer and paid EMS providers that serve their communities. This recognition may help curb the decline in volunteerism and help with recruitment and retention of personnel.

### FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

TRD is authorized to charge a \$25.00 fee in addition to the normal registration fee for the special licensed plates.

# **ADMINISTRATIVE IMPLICATIONS**

The EMS Bureau may need to modify its rules regarding licensing of EMS personnel to add special license plates as a means of recognition of EMS personnel. This can be easily accomplished with existing DOH personnel.
