## SUMMARY

#### Synopsis of Bill

House Bill 16 appropriates \$50.0 from the general fund to the New Mexico Sentencing Commission for the purpose of conducting a study on gender-specific probation and parole models. The proposed legislation provides for the surveying of existing participants on probation and parole on the effectiveness of programs and ability to re-enter society. The results of the study are to be shared with the Courts, Corrections and Justice Committee and the New Mexico Sentencing Commission is to make recommendations on implementing best practices in New Mexico.

## **FISCAL IMPLICATIONS**

The appropriation of \$50.0 contained in this bill is a non-recurring expense to the general fund. Any unexpended or unencumbered balance remaining at the end of fiscal year 2007 shall revert to the general fund.

The New Mexico Sentencing Commission states they believe the appropriated amount is sufficient to properly conduct and publish the study.

## SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

NMCD reports an increase in its female population over the past several years. The rate of females incarcerations increased by approximately 8 percent in 2005 while the male population increased by less than half that rate. In 2005, the overall growth of offenders under community supervision increased by 10 percent, while the number of females probationers and parolees increased by 14 percent. The Probation and Parole Division reports they have never considered a comprehensive gender specific strategy to address female offenders. The Probation and Parole Division states they would welcome a study that would bring to light a strategy that would help better address the needs of this growing population.

## **PERFORMANCE IMPLICATIONS**

New Mexico Sentencing Commission has a performance measure "number of research projects completed" with a FY07 target of 11. The gender-specific probation and parole models study would comprise of one out of 11 research projects towards meeting the commission's performance measure target.

## **ADMINISTRATIVE IMPLICATIONS**

The New Mexico Sentencing Commission believes it can complete this study in a timely fashion provided it receives the funding in the proposed legislation. The commission states they will have to limit the scope of work to the funding level.
