SUMMARY

Synopsis of Bill

Senate Bill 165 appropriates \$387,600 from the general fund to the Board of Regents of the University of New Mexico (UNM) to develop a program in collaboration with New Mexico State University (NMSU) that will provide qualified and interested high school students with conditional admission to the UNM College of Pharmacy.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

The appropriation of \$387,600 contained in this bill is a recurring expense to the general fund. Any unexpended or unencumbered balance remaining at the end of fiscal year 2007 shall revert to the general fund. These funds would augment funding received by UNM through the Instruc-

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tion and General (I&G) funding formula for operation of the existing pharmacy program.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

The College of Pharmacy at UNM is the only accredited college of pharmacy in New Mexico, one of 89 accredited colleges in the United States. The COP, in cooperation with NMSU, proposes to offer a collaborative six-year curriculum leading to a Doctor of Pharmacy degree. The UNM/NMSU Cooperative Pharmacy program will provide highly qualified high school seniors from southern New Mexico conditional admission to the COP. Students will complete the sixty hours of pre-pharmacy coursework at NMSU and then be admitted to the UNM COP.

The UNM Board of Regents have indorsed this proposal as priority number five among 12 proposed special program expansion requests. The UNM request has not been included in the Higher Education Department recommendations and, consequently, is not included among the fiscal year 2007 funding recommendations of the LFC or Executive branch.

PERFORMANCE IMPLICATIONS

If this legislation is funded, the New Mexico Higher Education Department (NMHED) requests that UNM and NMSU submit a joint plan for program evaluation, including specific program goals and criteria for assessing program effectiveness by no later than October 1, 2006. NMHED also requests that a program evaluation covering a three-year period be submitted to the LFC and NMHED by June 30, 2009 reporting the benefits of the program to the students of New Mexico.

ADMINISTRATIVE IMPLICATIONS

UNM would bear the primary administrative responsibility for the proposed program, although NMSU would also assume responsibilities relative to program coordination.

CONFLICT, DUPLICATION, COMPANIONSHIP, RELATIONSHIP

House Bill 39 and Senate Bill 165 are duplicate measures.

OTHER SUBSTANTIVE ISSUES

According to UNM, the goals of the UNM/NMSU Cooperative Pharmacy Program are to:

- enhance accessibility of pharmacy education for citizens of southern New Mexico
- reduce the shortage of pharmacists in southern New Mexico
- serve the pharmaceutical care need of the underserved in the southern New Mexico region
- increase the diversity of the pharmacy profession in southern New Mexico by increasing the number of pharmacists who are sensitive to the unique needs of a significant Hispanic population

The Health Policy Commission cites an October 2004 report by the New Mexico Department of Labor which indicates the number of pharmacists in New Mexico is expected to increase from 1,460 in 2002 to 2,100 in 2012, an increase of 43.8%. Additionally, New Mexico's population is expected to age. New Mexico currently ranks 39th for the percentage of people age 65 or older and is projected to be 16th by 2010 and 4th by 2030. Given the projections of the increasing need

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for pharmacists in New Mexico as well as the increasing age of the general population of New Mexico, the NMSU & UNM Cooperative Pharmacy Program could potentially provide needed additional qualified pharmacists to New Mexico. This program could potentially be replicated at other New Mexico universities and colleges.
