### SUMMARY

Senate Bill 372 appropriates general fund to PED to develop and promote teen after-school program models using private-public partnership for use in local school districts.

### FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

Senate Bill 372 appropriates \$50.0 from the general fund and is recurring. Any unexpended or unencumbered balance remaining at the end of fiscal year 2007 shall revert to the general fund.

### SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

According to PED, the program would encourage students to stay on campus for academic, intramural or other recreational projects.

### PERFORMANCE IMPLICATIONS

The PED indicates that according to the Food Research and Action Center; after school programs have been proven to decrease juvenile crime and violence, reduce drug use and addiction, cut smoking and alcohol abuse and decrease teen pregnancy.

# ADMINISTRATIVE IMPLICATIONS

If SB 372 is enacted, the PED would require staff to set up a flow through account for the appropriation, develop a delivery system and provide technical assistance and fiscal monitoring of the funds.
