Synopsis of the SRC Amendment

The Senate Rules Committee amendment does the following on page 2, lines 20 - 21:

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the study determine how to provide more interpreters communication access at political events and closed captioning on political television advertisements; and

#### Synopsis of Original Bill

Senate Joint Memorial 15 requests collaboration between the NM Commission for Deaf and Hard-of-Hearing and the Secretary of State to conduct a study to establish a mechanism to encourage communication access to ensure full participation in the Democratic Process by all deaf and hard-of-hearing citizens. The memorial requests that the study attempt to determine how to provide more interpreters at political events and closed captioning on television advertising.

#### .FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

According to the NM Commission for Deaf and Hard-of-Hearing, there are no fiscal implications
