14	INDIAN EDUCATION ADVISORY COUNCIL.
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16	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:
17	Section 1. A new section of the Indian Education Act is
18	enacted to read:
19	"[<u>NEW MATERIAL</u>] POST-SECONDARY EDUCATIONThe department
20	shall collaborate and coordinate efforts with the higher
21	education department and institutions of higher education,
22	including tribal colleges and teacher education institutions
23	and tribal education departments, to facilitate the successful
24	and seamless transition of American Indian students into post-
25	secondary education and training."
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1	Section 2. Section 22-23A-3 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 2003,
2	Chapter 151, Section 3) is amended to read:
3	"22-23A-3. [DEFINITION] <u>DEFINITIONS</u> As used in the
4	Indian Education Act:
5	A. "assistant secretary" means the assistant
6	secretary for Indian education;
7	B. "government-to-government" means the
8	relationship between a tribal and a state government;
9	C. "indigenous" means native or tribal groups of
10	the Americas that maintain a cultural identity separate from
11	the surrounding dominant cultures;
12	D. "tribal" means pertaining to an Indian nation,
13	tribe or pueblo located within New Mexico;
14	<u>E.</u> "tribe" means an Indian nation, tribe or pueblo
15	located within New Mexico; <u>and</u>
16	F. "urban Indian" means a tribal member who lives
17	in an off-reservation urban area."
18	Section 3. Section 22-23A-4 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 2003,
19	Chapter 151, Section 4) is amended to read:
20	"22-23A-4. [STATE BOARDTRIBES] RULEMAKING[The state
21	board, in consultation with tribes, may adopt and promulgate
22	rules to implement the provisions of the Indian Education Act.]
23	A. The secretary shall ensure that the duties
24	prescribed in the Indian Education Act are carried out and that
25	each division within the department is collaborating to fulfill
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1 its responsibilities to tribal students. 2 B. The secretary shall consult on proposed rules 3 implementing the Indian Education Act with the Indian education 4 advisory council and shall present rules for approval at the 5 next semiannual government-to-government meeting pursuant to 6 Section 22-23A-5 NMSA 1978." 7 Section 4. Section 22-23A-5 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 2003, 8 Chapter 151, Section 5, as amended) is amended to read: 9 "22-23A-5. INDIAN EDUCATION DIVISION--CREATED--ASSISTANT 10 [SUPERINTENDENT] SECRETARY--DUTIES.--11 Α. The "Indian education division" is created 12 within the department. The secretary shall appoint an 13 assistant secretary for Indian education, who shall direct the 14 activities of the division and advise the secretary on 15 development of policy regarding the education of tribal 16 students. The assistant secretary shall also coordinate 17 transition efforts for tribal students with the secretary of 18 higher education. 19 B. The assistant secretary shall coordinate with 20 appropriate administrators and divisions to ensure that the 21 department makes implementation of the Indian Education Act a 22 <u>priority.</u> 23 The secretary and the assistant secretary, in C. 24 cooperation with the Indian education advisory council, shall

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cooperation with the Indian education advisory council, shall collaborate with state and federal departments and agencies and

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1 tribal governments to identify ways such entities can assist 2 the department in the implementation of the Indian Education 3 Act.

<u>D. The secretary and assistant secretary shall</u>
<u>convene semiannual government-to-government meetings for the</u>

8 [B.] E. In accordance with the rules of the
9 department and after consulting with the Indian education
10 advisory council and determining the resources available within
11 the department, the [Indian education division] assistant
12 secretary shall:

(1) provide assistance, <u>including advice on</u> <u>allocation of resources</u>, to school districts and tribes to <u>improve services to meet the educational needs of [American</u> <u>Indian] tribal</u> students <u>based on indigenous best practices in</u> <u>education;</u>

(2) provide assistance to school districts and tribes in the planning, development, implementation and evaluation of curricula in native languages, culture and history designed for [American Indian] tribal and nontribal students <u>as approved by tribes;</u>

(3) develop or select for implementation a challenging, sequential, culturally relevant curriculum to provide instruction to [American Indian] tribal students in .164509.1

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1 [kindergarten] pre-kindergarten through sixth grade to prepare 2 them for pre-advanced placement and advanced placement 3 coursework in grades seven through twelve; 4 provide assistance to school districts and (4) 5 tribes to develop curricula and instructional materials in 6 native languages, culture and history in conjunction and by 7 contract with native language practitioners and tribal elders, 8 unless the use of written language is expressly prohibited by 9 the tribe; 10 (5) conduct indigenous research and 11 evaluation, using state-issued student identifiers, that 12 provides the department and tribal entities and communities 13 with appropriate methods, including the short-cycle assessment, 14 to determine the effectiveness of curricula, instructional 15 materials and strategies to enhance the success of programs and 16 services for tribal students; 17 (6) collaborate with the department to provide 18 distance learning; 19 [(5)] (7) establish, support and maintain an 20 Indian education advisory council; 21 [(6) by January 2006] (8) enter into 22 agreements with each tribe or authorized tribal educational 23 entity to share programmatic information and to coordinate 24 technical assistance for public schools that serve [American 25 Indian] tribal students; .164509.1

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[(7)] <u>(9)</u> seek funds to establish <u>and maintain</u> 1 2 an Indian education office in the northwest corner of the state 3 or other geographical location to implement agreements with each tribe or authorized tribal educational entity, monitor the 4 5 progress of [American Indian] tribal students and coordinate 6 technical assistance at the public pre-kindergarten to post-7 secondary schools that serve [American Indian] tribal students; 8 [(8)] <u>(10)</u> require school districts to obtain 9 a signature of approval by the tribal governments or tribal 10 government designees residing within school district 11 boundaries, verifying that the tribes agree to Indian education 12 policies and procedures pursuant to federal requirements; 13 [(9)] (11) seek funds to establish, develop 14 and implement [the following] culturally relevant support 15 services for the purposes of increasing the number of [American 16 Indian] tribal teachers, administrators and principals and 17 providing continued professional development for educational 18 assistants, teachers and principals serving [American Indian] 19 tribal students, in conjunction with the Indian education 20 advisory council: 21 recruitment and retention of highly (a) 22 qualified teachers and administrators; 23 academic transition programs; (b) 24 (c) academic financial support; 25 (d) teacher preparation;

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1	(e) teacher induction; [and]
2	(f) professional development; and
3	(g) student and community wellness and
4	<u>mental health training;</u>
5	[(10)] <u>(12)</u> develop curricula to provide
6	instruction in tribal history and government and develop plans
7	to implement these subjects into history and government courses
8	in school districts throughout the state;
9	[(11)] <u>(13)</u> ensure that native language
10	bilingual programs are part of a school district's professional
11	development plan, as provided in Section 22-10A-19.1 NMSA 1978;
12	and
13	[(12)] <u>(14)</u> develop a plan to establish a
14	post-secondary investment system for [Indian] <u>tribal</u> students
15	to which parents, tribes and the state may contribute."
16	Section 5. Section 22-23A-6 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 2003,
17	Chapter 151, Section 6) is amended to read:
18	"22-23A-6. ADVISORY COUNCIL
19	A. The "Indian education advisory council" <u>is</u>
20	<u>created and</u> shall [consist] <u>advise the secretary and assistant</u>
21	secretary on implementation of the provisions of the Indian
22	<u>Education Act. The council consists</u> of [fourteen] <u>seventeen</u>
23	members as follows:
24	(1) four representatives from the Navajo
25	Nation;
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1 two representatives, one from the (2) 2 Mescalero Apache Tribe and one from the Jicarilla Apache 3 Nation: 4 (3) four representatives, two from the 5 southern pueblos and two from the northern pueblos; [and] 6 (4) four [members] urban Indians representing 7 urban areas, [the] including Albuquerque, Gallup and 8 Farmington; and 9 (5) three at-large representatives, one from 10 the federal bureau of Indian affairs, one from a head start 11 [organizations] organization and one from the general public, 12 at least one of whom shall be [non-Indian] nontribal, but all 13 of whom shall have knowledge of and involvement in the 14 education of [Indian] tribal students. 15 B. Members shall be appointed for staggered terms 16 so that the terms of the at-large members and of one-half of 17 each of the tribal representatives and the urban Indian 18 organization representatives end on December 31, 2009 and the 19 terms of the remaining members end on December 31, 2011. 20 Thereafter, appointments shall be for terms of four years. The 21 terms of existing members shall expire on the effective date of 22 this 2007 act. 23 C. A majority of the members of the Indian 24 education advisory council constitutes a quorum. The advisory 25 council shall elect a chair from its membership.

11	nonsalaried public officers in the Per Diem and Mileage Act."

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1	C. The status reports shall be written in a brief
2	format and shall include the following information, through
3	which public school performance is measured and reported to the
4	tribes and disseminated at the semiannual government-to-
5	government meetings held pursuant to Section 22-23A-5 NMSA
6	<u>1978</u> :
7	(1) student achievement as measured by a
8	statewide test approved by the [state board] <u>department</u> , with
9	results disaggregated by ethnicity;
10	(2) school safety;
11	(3) the [dropout] <u>graduation</u> rate;
12	(4) attendance;
13	(5) parent and community involvement;
14	(6) educational programs targeting [American
15	Indian] <u>tribal</u> students;
16	(7) financial reports;
17	(8) current status of federal Indian education
18	policies and procedures;
. 19	(9) school district initiatives to decrease
20	the number of student dropouts and increase attendance;
21	(10) public school use of variable school
22	calendars; [and]
23	(11) school district consultations with
24	[parent advisory committees] district Indian education
25	committees, school-site parent advisory councils and tribal,
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municipal and Indian organizations;

(12) tribal student wellness and tribal mental 2 health status as collected by the school; and 3

(13) indigenous research and evaluation measures and results."

Section 22-23A-8 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 2003, Section 7. Chapter 151, Section 8) is amended to read:

"22-23A-8. FUND CREATED. --

The "Indian education fund" is created in the Α. 10 state treasury. The fund consists of appropriations, gifts, 11 grants and donations and income from investment of the fund. 12 Money in the fund shall not revert [to any other fund at the 13 end of a fiscal year]. The fund shall be administered by the department [of education], and money in the fund is 15 appropriated to the department to distribute awards to support 16 the Indian Education Act.

B. The department shall ensure that money from the fund is used to supplement, not supplant, services that are provided to tribal students and schools from other divisions within the department or other services.

[B.] C. The department [of education] shall develop procedures and rules for the award of money from the fund. Disbursement of the fund shall be made by warrant of the department of finance and administration pursuant to vouchers signed by the [state superintendent] secretary of public .164509.1
