12	EDUCATION DEPARTMENT TO CONSULT WITH INDIAN TRIBES; CHANGING
13	THE COMPOSITION OF THE INDIAN EDUCATION ADVISORY COUNCIL;
14	AMENDING THE INDIAN EDUCATION ACT.
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16	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:
17	Section 1. A new section of the Indian Education Act is
18	enacted to read:
19	"[<u>NEW MATERIAL</u>] POST-SECONDARY EDUCATIONThe department
20	shall collaborate and coordinate efforts with the higher
21	education department and institutions of higher education,
22	including tribal colleges and teacher education institutions
23	and tribal education departments, to facilitate the successful
24	and seamless transition of American Indian students into post-
25	secondary education and training."
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1	Section 2. Section 22-23A-3 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 2003,
2	Chapter 151, Section 3) is amended to read:
3	"22-23A-3. [DEFINITION] <u>DEFINITIONS</u> As used in the
4	Indian Education Act:
5	A. "assistant secretary" means the assistant
6	secretary for Indian education;
7	B. "government-to-government" means the
8	relationship between a tribal and a state government;
9	<u>C. "indigenous" means native or tribal groups of</u>
10	the Americas that maintain a cultural identity separate from
11	the surrounding dominant cultures;
12	D. "tribal" means pertaining to an Indian nation,
13	tribe or pueblo located within New Mexico;
14	<u>E.</u> "tribe" means an Indian nation, tribe or pueblo
15	located within New Mexico; <u>and</u>
16	F. "urban Indian" means a tribal member who lives
17	in an off-reservation urban area."
18	Section 3. Section 22-23A-4 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 2003,
19	Chapter 151, Section 4) is amended to read:
20	"22-23A-4. [STATE BOARDTRIBES] RULEMAKING[The state
21	board, in consultation with tribes, may adopt and promulgate
22	rules to implement the provisions of the Indian Education Act.]
23	A. The secretary shall ensure that the duties
24	prescribed in the Indian Education Act are carried out and that
25	each division within the department is collaborating to fulfill
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its responsibilities to tribal students.

2 The secretary shall consult on proposed rules Β. 3 implementing the Indian Education Act with the Indian education 4 advisory council and shall present rules for review and comment at the next semiannual government-to-government meeting 5 6 pursuant to Section 22-23A-5 NMSA 1978." 7 Section 4. Section 22-23A-5 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 2003, 8 Chapter 151, Section 5, as amended) is amended to read: 9 "22-23A-5. INDIAN EDUCATION DIVISION--CREATED--ASSISTANT 10 [SUPERINTENDENT] SECRETARY--DUTIES.--11 Α. The "Indian education division" is created 12 within the department. The secretary shall appoint an 13 assistant secretary for Indian education, who shall direct the 14 activities of the division and advise the secretary on 15 development of policy regarding the education of tribal 16 students. The assistant secretary shall also coordinate 17 transition efforts for tribal students in public schools with 18 the higher education department. 19 B. The assistant secretary shall coordinate with 20 appropriate administrators and divisions to ensure that 21 department administrators make implementation of the Indian 22 Education <u>Act a priority.</u> 23 C. The secretary and the assistant secretary, in 24 cooperation with the Indian education advisory council, shall

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collaborate with state and federal departments and agencies and

1 tribal governments to identify ways such entities can assist 2 the department in the implementation of the Indian Education 3 Act.

<u>D. The secretary and assistant secretary shall</u>
<u>convene semiannual government-to-government meetings for the</u>
<u>express purpose of receiving tribal input on education of</u>
<u>tribal students.</u>

8 [B.] E. In accordance with the rules of the
9 department and after consulting with the Indian education
10 advisory council and determining the resources available within
11 the department, the [Indian education division] assistant
12 secretary shall:

(1) provide assistance, <u>including advice on</u> <u>allocation of resources</u>, to school districts and tribes to <u>improve services to</u> meet the educational needs of [American <u>Indian</u>] <u>tribal</u> students <u>based on current published indigenous</u> <u>best practices in education</u>;

(2) provide assistance to school districts and tribes in the planning, development, implementation and evaluation of curricula in native languages, culture and history designed for [American Indian] tribal and nontribal students <u>as approved by tribes;</u>

(3) develop or select for implementation a challenging, sequential, culturally relevant curriculum to provide instruction to [American Indian] tribal students in .166083.1

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1 [kindergarten] pre-kindergarten through sixth grade to prepare 2 them for pre-advanced placement and advanced placement 3 coursework in grades seven through twelve; 4 provide assistance to school districts and (4) 5 tribes to develop curricula and instructional materials in native languages, culture and history in conjunction and by 6 7 contract with native language practitioners and tribal elders, unless the use of written language is expressly prohibited by 8 9 the tribe; 10 (5) conduct indigenous research and evaluation 11 for effective curricula for tribal students; 12 (6) collaborate with the department to provide 13 distance learning for tribal students in public schools to the 14 maximum limits of the department's abilities; 15 [(5)] (7) establish, support and maintain an 16 Indian education advisory council; 17 [(6) by January 2006] (8) enter into 18 agreements with each tribe or authorized tribal educational 19 entity to share programmatic information and to coordinate 20 technical assistance for public schools that serve [American 21 Indian] tribal students; 22 [(7)] (9) seek funds to establish and maintain 23 an Indian education office in the northwest corner of the state 24 or other geographical location to implement agreements with 25 each tribe or authorized tribal educational entity, monitor the .166083.1

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1	progress of [American Indian] <u>tribal</u> students and coordinate
2	technical assistance at the public pre-kindergarten to post-
3	<u>secondary</u> schools that serve [American Indian] <u>tribal</u> students;
4	[(8)] <u>(10)</u> require school districts to obtain
5	a signature of approval by the tribal governments or tribal
6	government designees residing within school district
7	boundaries, verifying that the tribes agree to Indian education
8	policies and procedures pursuant to federal requirements;
9	[(9)] <u>(11)</u> seek funds to establish, develop
10	and implement [the following] <u>culturally relevant</u> support
11	services for the purposes of increasing the number of [American
12	Indian] tribal teachers, administrators and principals and
13	providing continued professional development for educational
14	assistants, teachers and principals serving [American Indian]
15	tribal students, in conjunction with the Indian education
16	advisory council:
17	(a) recruitment and retention <u>of highly</u>
18	qualified teachers and administrators;
19	(b) academic transition programs;
20	(c) academic financial support;
21	(d) teacher preparation;
22	(e) teacher induction; and
23	(f) professional development;
24	[(10)] <u>(12)</u> develop curricula to provide
25	instruction in tribal history and government and develop plans
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1 to implement these subjects into history and government courses 2 in school districts throughout the state; 3 [(11)] (13) ensure that native language 4 bilingual programs are part of a school district's professional development plan, as provided in Section 22-10A-19.1 NMSA 1978; 5 6 and 7 [(12)] (14) develop a plan to establish a 8 post-secondary investment system for [Indian] tribal students 9 to which parents, tribes and the state may contribute." 10 Section 5. Section 22-23A-6 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 2003, 11 Chapter 151, Section 6) is amended to read: 12 "22-23A-6. ADVISORY COUNCIL.--13 The "Indian education advisory council" is Α. 14 created and shall [consist] advise the secretary and assistant 15 secretary on implementation of the provisions of the Indian 16 Education Act. The council consists of [fourteen] seventeen 17 members as follows: 18 four representatives from the Navajo (1)19 Nation; 20 two representatives, one from the (2) 21 Mescalero Apache Tribe and one from the Jicarilla Apache 22 Nation; 23 four representatives, two from the (3) 24 southern pueblos and two from the northern pueblos; [and] 25 (4) four [members] urban Indians representing .166083.1 - 7 -

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1 urban areas, [the] including Albuquerque, Gallup and 2 Farmington; and 3 (5) three at-large representatives, one from 4 the federal bureau of Indian affairs, one from a head start 5 [organizations] organization and one from the general public, 6 at least one of whom shall be [non-Indian] nontribal, but all 7 of whom shall have knowledge of and involvement in the 8 education of [Indian] tribal students. 9 B. Members shall be appointed by the secretary with 10 input from tribes for staggered terms so that the terms of the 11 at-large members and of one-half of each of the tribal 12 representatives and the urban Indian organization 13 representatives end on December 31, 2009 and the terms of the 14 remaining members end on December 31, 2011. Thereafter, 15 appointments shall be for terms of four years. The terms of 16 existing members shall expire on the effective date of this 17 2007 act. 18 C. A majority of the members of the Indian 19 education advisory council constitutes a quorum. The advisory 20 council shall elect a chair from its membership. 21 [B.] D. On a semiannual basis, representatives from 22 all tribes, members of the [state board] commission, the 23 [governor's] office of the governor, the [New Mexico office of] 24 Indian affairs <u>department</u>, the legislature, the [state 25 superintendent] secretary, the assistant secretary and the .166083.1

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Indian education advisory council shall meet to assist in evaluating, consolidating and coordinating all activities relating to the education of [<u>American Indian</u>] <u>tribal</u> students.

[C.] <u>E.</u> Members of the Indian education advisory council may receive per diem and mileage as provided for nonsalaried public officers in the Per Diem and Mileage Act."

Section 6. Section 22-23A-7 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 2003, Chapter 151, Section 7) is amended to read:

"22-23A-7. REPORT.--

A. The Indian education division in collaboration with the education division of the <u>federal</u> bureau of Indian affairs and other entities that serve [<u>American Indian</u>] <u>tribal</u> students shall submit an annual statewide [<u>American Indian</u>] <u>tribal</u> education status report <u>no later than November 15</u> to all tribes. <u>The division shall submit the report whether or not</u> entities outside state government collaborate as requested.

B. A school district with tribal lands located
within its boundaries shall provide a districtwide [American
Indian] tribal education status report to all tribes
represented within the school district boundaries.

C. The status reports shall be written in a brief format and shall include the following information, through which public school performance is measured and reported to the tribes <u>and disseminated at the semiannual government-to-</u> <u>government meetings held pursuant to Section 22-23A-5 NMSA</u> .166083.1

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1 1978: 2 (1)student achievement as measured by a statewide test approved by the [state board] department, with 3 4 results disaggregated by ethnicity; 5 (2) school safety; 6 (3) the [dropout] graduation rate; 7 attendance; (4) 8 parent and community involvement; (5) 9 educational programs targeting [American (6) 10 Indian] tribal students; 11 (7) financial reports; 12 current status of federal Indian education (8) 13 policies and procedures; 14 (9) school district initiatives to decrease 15 the number of student dropouts and increase attendance; 16 public school use of variable school (10)17 calendars; [and] 18 (11)school district consultations with 19 [parent advisory committees] district Indian education 20 committees, school-site parent advisory councils and tribal, 21 municipal and Indian organizations; and 22 (12) indigenous research and evaluation 23 measures and results for effective curricula for tribal 24 students." 25 Section 7. Section 22-23A-8 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 2003, .166083.1 - 10 -

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Chapter 151, Section 8) is amended to read:

"22-23A-8. FUND CREATED.--

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state treasury. The fund consists of appropriations, gifts, grants and donations and income from investment of the fund. Money in the fund shall not revert [to any other fund at the end of a fiscal year]. The fund shall be administered by the department [of education], and money in the fund is appropriated to the department to distribute awards to support the Indian Education Act.

The "Indian education fund" is created in the

Β. The department shall ensure that funds appropriated from the Indian education fund shall be used for the purposes stated in the Indian Education Act and shall not be used to correct for previous reductions of program services.

[B.] C. The department [of education] shall develop procedures and rules for the award of money from the fund. Disbursement of the fund shall be made by warrant of the department of finance and administration pursuant to vouchers signed by the [state superintendent] secretary of public education."

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
