13	DEPARTMENT TO ISSUE RULES FOR TRAINING AND OTHER REQUIREMENTS
14	FOR UNLICENSED CONTENT AREA EXPERTS; CLARIFYING TEACHER
15	MENTORSHIP PROGRAM COMPONENTS; CHANGING THE DISTRIBUTION OF
16	FUNDS FOR MENTORSHIP PROGRAMS; REQUIRING A UNIFORM STUDENT
17	IDENTIFICATION NUMBER FOR PUBLIC SCHOOLS AND PUBLIC POST-
18	SECONDARY EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS.
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20	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:
21	Section 1. Section 22-10A-8 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 2003,
22	Chapter 153, Section 39) is amended to read:
23	"22-10A-8. ALTERNATIVE LEVEL ONE LICENSE
24	A. The department shall issue an alternative level
25	one license to a person who is at least eighteen years of age
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1 and who has:

2 (1) completed a baccalaureate degree at an 3 accredited institution of higher education, including 4 completion of a minimum of thirty credit hours at either the 5 undergraduate or graduate level in the subject area of 6 instruction for which [he] the person is applying for a 7 license; 8 (2) completed a master's degree at an 9 accredited institution of higher education, including 10 completion of a minimum of twelve graduate credit hours in the 11 subject area of instruction for which [he] the person is 12 applying for a license; or 13 completed a doctoral or law degree at an (3) 14 accredited institution of higher education; and 15 (4) passed the New Mexico teacher assessments 16 examination; and 17 (5) completed a minimum of twelve semester 18 hours of instruction in teaching principles in a program 19 approved by the department; or 20 demonstrated to the department, in (6) 21 conjunction with the school district or state agency, that [he] 22 the per<u>son</u> has met the [state board-approved] department-23 approved competencies for level one teachers that correspond to 24 the grade level that will be taught. 25 B. A degree referred to in Subsection A of this

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1 section shall correspond to the subject area of instruction and 2 the particular grade level that will enable the applicant to 3 teach in a competent manner as determined by the department. 4 C. An alternative level one teacher shall 5 participate in the same mentorship, evaluation and other 6 professional development requirements as other level one 7 teachers. 8 D. A school district or state agency shall not 9 discriminate against a teacher on the basis that [he] the 10 teacher holds an alternative level one license. 11 E. The department shall provide by rule for 12 training and other requirements to support the use of 13 unlicensed content area experts as resources in classrooms, 14 team teaching, on-line instruction, curriculum development and 15 other purposes." 16 Section 2. A new section of Chapter 22, Article 10A NMSA bracketed material] = delete 17 1978 is enacted to read: 18 "[NEW MATERIAL] TEACHER EDUCATION ACCOUNTABILITY REPORT .--19 The department shall: Α. 20 (1) design a uniform statewide teacher 21 education accountability reporting system to measure and track 22 teacher education candidates from pre-entry to post-graduation 23 in order to benchmark the productivity and accountability of 24 New Mexico's teacher work force; provided that the system shall 25 be designed in collaboration with: .169413.1

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1 (a) all public post-secondary teacher 2 preparation programs in New Mexico, including those programs 3 that issue alternative licenses; 4 (b) the teacher preparation programs' 5 respective public post-secondary educational institutions; and 6 (c) the higher education department; 7 require all public post-secondary teacher (2) 8 preparation programs to submit the data required for the 9 uniform statewide teacher education accountability reporting 10 system through the department's student teacher accountability 11 reporting system; 12 (3) use the uniform statewide teacher 13 education accountability reporting system, in conjunction with 14 the department's student teacher education accountability 15 reporting system, to assess the status of the state's efforts 16 to establish and maintain a seamless pre-kindergarten through 17 post-graduate system of education; 18 (4) adopt the format for reporting the outcome 19 measures of each teacher preparation program in the state; and 20 issue an annual statewide teacher (5) 21 education accountability report. 22 Β. The annual teacher education accountability 23 report format shall be clear, concise and understandable to the 24 legislature and the general public. All annual program and 25 statewide accountability reports shall ensure that the privacy .169413.1 - 4 -

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1 of individual students is protected. 2 Each teacher preparation program's annual C. 3 teacher education accountability report shall include the 4 demographic characteristics of the students and the following 5 indicators of program success: 6 (1) the standards for entering and exiting the 7 program; 8 (2) the number of hours required for field 9 experience and for student teaching; 10 (3) the number and percentage of students 11 needing developmental course work upon entering the program; 12 (4) the number and percentage of students 13 completing the program; 14 the number and types of degrees received (5) 15 by students who complete the program; 16 the number and percentage of students who (6) 17 pass the New Mexico teacher assessments for initial licensure 18 on the first attempt; 19 a description of the program's placement (7) 20 practices; and 21 the number and percentage of students (8) 22 hired by New Mexico school districts. 23 The teacher education accountability report D. 24 shall include an evaluation plan that includes high performance 25 objectives. The plan shall include objectives and measures .169413.1 - 5 -

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1	for:
2	(1) increasing student achievement for all
3	students;
4	(2) increasing teacher retention, particularly
5	in the first three years of a teacher's career;
6	(3) increasing the percentage of students who
7	pass the New Mexico teacher assessments for initial licensure
8	on the first attempt;
9	(4) increasing the percentage of secondary
10	school classes taught in core academic subject areas by
11	teachers who demonstrate by means of rigorous content area
12	assessments a high level of subject area mastery and a thorough
13	knowledge of the state's academic content and performance
14	standards;
15	(5) increasing the percentage of elementary
16	school classes taught by teachers who demonstrate by means of a
17	high level of performance in core academic subject areas their
18	mastery of the state academic content and performance
19	standards; and
20	(6) increasing the number of teachers trained
21	in math, science and technology.
22	E. In addition to the specifications in Subsections
23	C and D of this section, the annual teacher education
24	accountability report shall also include itemized information
25	on program revenues and expenditures, including staff salaries
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and benefits and the operational cost per credit hour.

F. The annual teacher education accountability report shall be adopted by each public post-secondary educational institution, reported in accordance with guidelines established by the department to ensure effective communication with the public and disseminated to the governor, legislators and other policymakers and business and economic development organizations by November 1 of each year."

Section 3. Section 22-10A-9 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 2003, Chapter 153, Section 40, as amended by Laws 2005, Chapter 315, Section 6 and by Laws 2005, Chapter 316, Section 3) is amended to read:

"22-10A-9. TEACHER MENTORSHIP PROGRAM FOR LEVEL ONE TEACHERS--PURPOSE--DEPARTMENT DUTIES.--

A. The purpose of the teacher mentorship program is to provide beginning teachers with an effective transition into the teaching field, to build on their initial preparation and to ensure their success in teaching; to improve the achievement of students; and to retain capable teachers in the classroom and to remove teachers who show little promise of success.

B. The department shall develop a framework for a teacher mentorship program for all level one teachers. The department shall work with licensed school employees, representatives from teacher preparation programs and the [commission on] higher education <u>department</u> to establish the .169413.1

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1 framework. 2 C. The framework shall include: 3 individual support and assistance for each (1)4 beginning teacher from a designated mentor; 5 structured training for mentors; (2) 6 an ongoing, formative evaluation that is (3) 7 used for the improvement of teaching practice; 8 (4) procedures for a summative evaluation of 9 beginning teachers' performance during at least the first three 10 years of teaching, including annual assessment of suitability 11 for license renewal, and for final assessment of beginning 12 teachers seeking level two licensure; 13 (5) support from local school boards, school 14 administrators and other school district personnel; and 15 (6) regular review and evaluation of the 16 teacher mentorship program. 17 The department shall: D. 18 require submission and approval of each (1)19 school district's teacher mentorship program; 20 provide technical assistance to school (2) 21 districts that do not have a well-developed teacher mentorship 22 program in place; [and] 23 encourage school districts to collaborate (3) 24 with teacher preparation program administrators at institutions 25 of higher education, career educators, educational .169413.1 - 8 -

1	organizations, regional service centers and other state and
2	community leaders in the teacher mentorship program; and
3	(4) distribute available funds for mentorship
4	programs to school districts annually on a per-teacher basis
5	according to the number of beginning teachers on the fortieth
6	day of the school year.
7	E. The department shall require that teacher
8	preparation programs collaborate with colleges of arts and
9	sciences and high schools to develop a model to provide
10	mentorship services with structured supervision and feedback to
11	each of their graduates who have obtained a teaching position
12	in a public high school, including charter schools; develop
13	cost estimates; and provide recommendations to the legislative
14	education study committee by November 1, 2007. The model shall
15	provide for the following:
16	(1) mentorship services for the first year as
17	a level one teacher to each of their graduates who has obtained
18	a teaching position in any New Mexico public high school,
19	including charter schools; provided that teacher preparation
20	programs may enter into contracts or memoranda of agreement
21	with each other or with level three teachers in providing
22	services to their students;
23	(2) an annual report to the department of the
24	number of teachers that have completed each of their programs
25	the previous spring or summer and have been hired by public
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high schools, including charter schools, for the following school year; and

3 (3) an annual report providing a description
4 of the mentorship services that will be provided to each of
5 their teachers, including the name of the teacher, the grade
6 level the teacher has been hired to teach and the name of the
7 school and district where the teacher has been hired."

Section 4. A new section of Chapter 21, Article 1 NMSA 1978 is enacted to read:

"[<u>NEW MATERIAL</u>] PUBLIC POST-SECONDARY EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS--STUDENT IDENTIFICATION NUMBER.--

A. The higher education department shall, in collaboration with public post-secondary educational institutions, use the same student identification number issued to a New Mexico public school student pursuant to Section 22-2C-11 NMSA 1978 for a student enrolled in a public postsecondary educational institution, including an off-campus instructional program or learning center.

B. In collaboration with the public education department, the higher education department shall:

(1) develop a system for assigning a unique student identifier to a student who did not attend a New Mexico public school;

(2) add an additional identifier to the student identification number for those students who enter a .169413.1

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1	teacher preparation program; and
2	(3) adopt the format to report individual
3	student data into the public education department's student
4	teacher accountability reporting system.
5	C. The higher education department shall promulgate
6	rules to carry out the provisions of this section."
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
