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18	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:
19	Section 1. A new section of the Public School Finance Act
20	is enacted to read:
21	"[<u>NEW MATERIAL</u>] ELEMENTARY PHYSICAL EDUCATION PROGRAM

23	A. The number of elementary physical education
24	program units is determined by multiplying the number of
25	students in elementary physical education by the cost

As used in this section, "elementary physical 3 education" means eligible physical education programs that 4 serve students in kindergarten through grade six in a public 5 school classified by the department as an elementary school." Section 22-8-18 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1974, 6 Section 2. 7 Chapter 8, Section 8, as amended) is amended to read: 8 "22-8-18. PROGRAM COST CALCULATION--LOCAL 9 RESPONSIBILITY.--10 The total program units for the purpose of Α. 11 computing the program cost shall be calculated by multiplying 12 the sum of the program units itemized as Paragraphs (1) through 13 [(5)] (6) in this subsection by the instructional staff 14 training and experience index and adding the program units 15 itemized as Paragraphs [(6)] (7) through [(10)] (12) in this 16 subsection. The itemized program units are as follows: 17 (1) early childhood education; 18 (2) basic education: 19 (3) special education, adjusted by subtracting 20 the units derived from membership in class D special education 21 programs in private, nonsectarian, nonprofit training centers; 22 bilingual multicultural education; (4) 23 fine arts education; (5) 24 (6) elementary physical education; 25 [(6)] (7) size adjustment; .165102.1

10	B. The total program cost calculated as prescribed
11	in Subsection A of this section includes the cost of early
12	childhood, special, bilingual multicultural, fine arts and
13	vocational education and other remedial or enrichment programs.
14	It is the responsibility of the local school board or governing
15	body of a charter school to determine its priorities in terms
16	of the needs of the community served by that board. Funds
17	generated under the Public School Finance Act are discretionary
18	to local school boards and governing bodies of charter schools,
19	provided that the special program needs as enumerated in this
20	section are met."
21	Section 3. A new section of Chapter 22, Article 13 NMSA
22	1978 is enacted to read:
23	"[<u>NEW MATERIAL</u>] ELEMENTARY PHYSICAL EDUCATION
24	A. As used in this section:
25	(l) "eligible students" means students in

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kindergarten through grade six in a public school classified by the department as an elementary school; and

(2) "physical education" includes programs of education through which students participate in activities related to fitness education and assessment; active games and sports; and development of physical capabilities such as motor skills, strength and coordination.

B. Elementary physical education programs that serve eligible students are eligible for funding if those programs meet academic content and performance standards for elementary physical education programs.

C. In granting approval for funding of elementary physical education programs, the department shall provide that programs are first implemented in public schools that have the highest proportion of students most in need based on the at-risk index or grade-level schools that serve an entire school district and in public schools with available space. If the department determines that an elementary physical education program is not meeting the academic content and performance standards necessary to ensure adequate yearly progress of students in the program, the department shall notify the school district that the public school's failure to meet the academic content and performance standards will result in the cessation of funding for the following school year. The department shall compile the program results submitted by the school districts .165102.1

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each year of the phase-in of elementary physical education and
 make an annual report to the legislative education study
 committee and the legislature.

4 As they become eligible for elementary physical D. 5 education program funding, public schools shall submit to the 6 department their elementary physical education program plans 7 that meet academic content and performance standards and other 8 guidelines of the department. At a minimum, the plan shall 9 include the elementary physical education courses being taught 10 and an evaluation component. To be eligible for state 11 financial support, an elementary physical education program 12 shall:

(1) provide for the physical education needsof students defined in this section; and

(2) use teachers with a license endorsementfor physical education.

E. Elementary physical education programs shall be phased in over a four-year period as follows:

(1) effective with the 2007-2008 school year, one-fourth of New Mexico's eligible students shall be in an elementary physical education program;

(2) effective with the 2008-2009 school year, one-half of New Mexico's eligible students shall be in an elementary physical education program;

(3) effective with the 2009-2010 school year, .165102.1

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three-fourths of New Mexico's eligible students shall be in an elementary physical education program; and effective with the 2010-2011 school year, (4) all of New Mexico's eligible students shall be in an elementary physical education program." Section 4. APPROPRIATION.--Eight million dollars (\$8,000,000) is appropriated from the general fund to the state equalization guarantee distribution for expenditure in fiscal year 2008 to fund elementary physical education program units. Any unexpended or unencumbered balance remaining at the end of fiscal year 2008 shall not revert to the general fund. - 6 -.165102.1

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
