AN ACT

RELATING TO EXECUTIVE REORGANIZATION; CREATING THE OFFICE OF PEACE; PROVIDING POWERS AND DUTIES; CREATING THE CITIZENS PEACE ADVISORY COUNCIL; MAKING AN APPROPRIATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. SHORT TITLE.--This act may be cited as the "Office of Peace Act".

Section 2. PURPOSE.--The purpose of the Office of Peace
Act is to establish an office dedicated to peacemaking, justice
and human rights; training that will enable the prevention,
management and resolution of conflict without violence; and the
study and implementation of conditions that are conducive to a
culture of peace.

Section 3. DEFINITIONS.--As used in the Office of Peace Act:

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- "council" means the citizens peace advisory council:
- "dialogue" means a facilitated process of a В. group of people taking turns talking and listening to each other to allow an exchange of diverse ideas, opinions and experiences and to foster greater understanding between people;
- "director" means the director of the office of peace; and
 - D. "office" means the office of peace.

Section 4. OFFICE ESTABLISHED. -- The "office of peace" is The office shall be administratively attached to the department of finance and administration. For purposes of this section, the term "administratively attached" has the meaning specified in Section 9-1-7 NMSA 1978.

Section 5. DIRECTOR--APPOINTMENT.--

- The administrative head of the office is the "director of the office of peace", who shall be appointed by the governor with the consent of the senate.
- The director shall be an administrator who has successful administrative experience and no fewer than eighty hours of training in alternative dispute resolution, mediation and dialogue and at least one year of experience in applying these skills in a community setting or equivalent life experience.
- The director shall serve and have all the .163843.1

duties, responsibilities and authority of the office during the time prior to final action by the senate confirming or rejecting the appointment.

Section 6. DIRECTOR--DUTIES.--

A. The director is responsible to the governor for the operation of the office. The director shall manage all operations of the office. The director shall employ professional and clerical assistance, contractors and general counsel as deemed necessary and oversee staff performance, setting priorities within time and budget constraints. The director shall apply the resources and skills of the office to the following areas: prevention, management and resolution of conflict; public education on peace and nonviolence; the study and promotion of social, environmental and economic conditions that create a culture of peace; and public information.

- B. In regard to the prevention, management and resolution of conflict, the director shall:
- (1) organize and participate in public dialogues throughout the state, providing a diplomatic method for addressing controversial issues and conflicts;
- (2) analyze and build upon existing policies and programs and develop new approaches and encourage innovation, in collaboration and coordination with established institutional and agency efforts and nongovernmental organizations, including alternative dispute resolution

1	centers, statewide peace studies programs, statewide peace and	
2	justice centers and public school peer mediation programs, for	
3	preventing, managing and resolving social conflict, including:	
4	(a) spouse abuse, child abuse and	
5	mistreatment of the elderly;	
6	(b) crime, punishment, rehabilitation	
7	and pursuit of restorative justice;	
8	(c) school and gang violence;	
9	(d) hate crimes, such as racial and	
10	ethnic violence and violence based on sexual orientation;	
11	(e) disputes between the police and	
12	community members;	
13	(f) natural resource disputes within and	
14	between communities; and	
15	(g) disputes within and between	
16	government agencies; and	
17	(3) assist in establishing community-based	
18	violence prevention programs, including violence prevention	
19	counseling and peer mediation and dialogues in schools, and	
20	peaceful settlement programs for police and other public safety	
21	officers.	
22	C. In regard to public education on peace and	
23	nonviolence, the director shall:	
24	(1) develop a peace education curriculum,	
25	which shall include the study of:	
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(a) the constitutions of the United

States and New Mexico and the Universal Declaration of Human

Rights adopted by the general assembly of the United Nations in

1948 to develop understanding as to how these documents serve

the interests of peace;

(b) historical advancements in the peace, civil, social justice and human rights movements in the United States and throughout the world, with special emphasis on how individual and group commitment to nonviolence has contributed to advancements in the interests of peace and justice; and

(c) peace agreements and circumstances in which peaceful intervention has succeeded in stopping conflict;

- (2) cooperate with the secretary of public education and superintendents of New Mexico public school districts to develop and make available curricula and supporting materials for use in school districts to facilitate instruction in peaceful conflict resolution, peace awareness and other peace objectives at public schools or any combination of public schools in a school district;
- (3) help integrate the peace education curriculum into the training programs for new and experienced teachers and recommend peace studies courses as part of teacher education in New Mexico; and

1	(4) provide peace education grants for the	
2	creation and expansion of peace studies and programs and	
3	practice at all educational levels.	
4	D. In regard to the study and promotion of social,	
5	environmental and economic conditions that create a culture of	
6	peace, the director shall:	
7	(1) promote counseling and community support	
8	on behalf of victims of violence and for family members of	
9	perpetrators of violence;	
10	(2) develop and support community-based	
11	strategies for celebrating diversity to promote tolerance and	
12	understanding among the diverse people in New Mexico and to	
13	help reduce racial and class tension;	
14	(3) create a community peace block grant	
15	program to provide grants to nonviolent conflict resolution	
16	programs and local nongovernmental peace-building initiatives	
17	and	
18	(4) study and promote a sustainable, life-	
19	affirming economy that puts people and justice first, as an	
20	essential avenue to peace and security, including:	
21	(a) offering nonviolent conflict	
22	resolution strategies on issues that threaten community well-	
23	being and security and disputes concerning wise use of water	
24	and other natural resources and protection of the environment;	
25	(b) promoting renewable, sustainable	
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1	technologies; and
2	(c) encouraging the conservation and
3	restoration of natural resources to prevent future conflicts
4	stemming from resource scarcity and environmental
5	contamination.
6	E. In regard to public information, the director
7	shall:
8	(1) gather information on effective community
9	peace-building activities and disseminate the information;
10	(2) make studies available to the public that
11	address the role of the media as it affects the escalation or
12	recession of conflict;
13	(3) publish information on the activities of
14	the office and encourage scholarly participation; and
15	(4) sponsor and organize conferences to create
16	awareness of the office's findings and promote a forum for
17	discussing peace issues and studies and exploring the meaning
18	and practice of peace in the lives of New Mexicans.
19	Section 7. COUNCILCREATIONMEMBERSRESPONSIBILITIES
20	COMPENSATION
21	A. The "citizens peace advisory council" is created
22	and shall be composed of the director and ten appointed members
23	as follows, who reflect the multicultural, gender, economic,
24	geographic and political diversity of the people of New Mexico:
25	(l) one representative from an established
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1	peace advocacy organization, appointed by the director;
2	(2) one representative from a religious or
3	spiritual organization, appointed by the New Mexico faith
4	community;
5	(3) one representative from a local, county or
6	state law enforcement agency, appointed by the secretary of
7	public safety;
8	(4) one health professional with expertise in
9	behavioral and public health issues, appointed by the secretary
10	of health;
11	(5) one representative from an environmental
12	and energy conservation organization with expertise in
13	renewable energy use, appointed by the secretary of
14	environment;
15	(6) one veteran who has served in an armed
16	conflict, appointed by the secretary of veterans' services;
17	(7) one public school educator, appointed by
18	the secretary of public education;
19	(8) one representative affiliated with the
20	arts, appointed by the chair of the New Mexico arts commission;
21	(9) one youth representative, between the ages
22	of fifteen and twenty-four years, appointed by the lieutenant
23	governor; and
24	(10) one member appointed by the secretary of
25	Indian affairs.

- B. The term of service of appointed council members shall be four years. The initial terms shall be staggered. The terms of five members shall expire at the end of the initial two years, and the terms of five members shall expire at the end of the initial four years. The initial terms shall be selected by random drawing. An appointed citizen member of the council shall not serve more than two full terms. In the event of a vacancy on the council, a new member shall be appointed by the original appointing authority for the unexpired term.
- C. The council shall select a chair, a vice chair and other officers as it deems necessary.
- D. The council shall meet no less than twice annually and may meet more frequently upon the call of the chair. The council shall:
- (1) use the dialogue process in its interactions with each other and the staff;
- (2) provide assistance and make recommendations to the director and the governor concerning policies and practices relating to state peace activities;
- (3) annually, assess peace activities in the state and submit a report to the director and the governor reviewing the impact of state peace activities on governmental entities and communities; and
- (4) publicize and allot time to receive and .163843.1

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report citizen input at regular council meetings, maintaining a grassroots connection with the citizens of New Mexico.

Council members shall receive per diem and mileage as provided for nonsalaried public officers in the Per Diem and Mileage Act and shall receive no other compensation, perquisite or allowance.

Section 8. OFFICE LOGO. -- The official logo of the office of peace is an ancient universal symbol most recently copyrighted in 1935 by artist Nicholas Roerich to symbolize an international pact for the preservation of culture during times of violent conflict. The Roerich museum in New York city has granted permission to any state creating a department or office of peace the right to use this symbol. The office shall use this logo on appropriate correspondence and publications.

Section 9. APPROPRIATION. -- Four hundred ninety-three thousand six hundred dollars (\$493,600) is appropriated from the general fund to the office of peace for expenditure in fiscal years 2008 and 2009 to carry out the provisions of the Office of Peace Act. Any unexpended or unencumbered balance remaining at the end of fiscal year 2009 shall not revert to the general fund.

Section 10. EFFECTIVE DATE. -- The effective date of the provisions of this act is July 1, 2007.
