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AN ACT

MAKING APPROPRIATIONS AND AUTHORIZING EXPENDITURES BY STATE AGENCIES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. JUDICIAL PROJECTS.--The following amounts are appropriated from the general fund to the following agencies for expenditure in fiscal year 2008 for the purposes specified and, unless otherwise indicated, any unexpended or unencumbered balance of the appropriations remaining at the end of fiscal year 2008 shall revert to the general fund:

- 1. to the supreme court, sixty-four thousand dollars (\$64,000) for a paralegal position to assist staff attorneys;
- 2. to the administrative office of the courts:
 - (a) one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) for operational expenses of the drug court program to be used for replacement of lapsing funds, drug court expansion or implementation of new drug courts;
 - (b) twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) to contract for additional usage of judges pro tempore;
 - (c) twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) to pay the costs of producing written transcripts for indigent defendants in criminal proceedings; and
 - (d) fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) for one

1 court clerk in the Taos county magistrate court;

2 3. to the first judicial district court, eighty

20 teen court program in Hobbs; and

21 (c) ninety thousand dollars (\$90,000) for

23 7. to the seventh judicial district court:

24 (a) one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000)
25 to establish a drug court; and

1 b) one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000)
2 to start a drug court in Torrance county;

3 8. to the ninth judicial district attorney,
4 thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000) for an anti-graffiti
5 program;

6 9. to the eleventh judicial district court:

7 (a) seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000)
8 for an adult drug court in San Juan county; and

9 (b) eighty-five thousand dollars (\$85,000)
10 for a staff attorney;

11 10. to the twelfth judicial district court, one
12 hundred twenty thousand dollars (\$120,000) for two court
13 reporters and one motor vehicle;

14 11. to the thirteenth judicial district court:

15 (a) fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) for a
16 court clerk;

17 (b) fifty-seven thousand dollars (\$57,000)
18 for a court clerk;

19 (c) ninety-five thousand dollars (\$95,000)

21 (d) eighty thousand dollars (\$80,000) for an
22 adult mental health court;

23 12. to the second judicial district attorney,
24 fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) to restore funding;

25 13. to the fourth judicial district attorney:

1 (a) thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000)
2 to fund a Victims of Crime Act position to aid prosecution of
3 domestic violence cases;

4 (b) twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) for an
5 administrative secretary; and

6 (c) twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000)
7 for staff expansion;

8 14. to the fifth judicial district attorney:

9 (a) eighty-seven thousand dollars (\$87,000)
10 for a domestic violence prevention program;

11 (b) one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000)
12 for a drug awareness and prevention program for school
13 districts in the fifth judicial district;

14 (c) seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000)
15 for operations of the safehouse program in Chaves county; and

16 (d) twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) for
17 increased salaries for assistant district attorneys in Lea
18 county;

19 15. to the eleventh judicial district attorney,
20 division 2, fifty-one thousand dollars (\$51,000) for a senior
21 legal secretary in Gallup;

22 16. to the twelfth judicial district attorney:

23 (a) twenty-eight thousand dollars (\$28,000)
24 for a program assistant for records management; and

25 (b) fifty-six thousand two hundred dollars

1 (\$56,200) for a domestic violence investigator in the Otero
2 county sheriff's office;

3 17. to the thirteenth judicial district attorney:

4 (a) eighty-five thousand dollars (\$85,000)
5 for a violent crimes investigator; and

6 (b) thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) for a
7 victim advocate; and

8 18. to the administrative office of the district
9 attorneys, forty thousand dollars (\$40,000) for two motor
10 vehicles.

11 Section 2. ATTORNEY GENERAL PROJECT.--Twenty thousand
12 dollars (\$20,000) is appropriated from the general fund to
13 the attorney general for expenditure in fiscal year 2008 to
14 fund the operation of the Guadalupe Hidalgo treaty division.
15 Any unexpended or unencumbered balance remaining at the end
16 of fiscal year 2008 shall revert to the general fund.

17 Section 3. DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION
18 PROJECTS.--The following amounts are appropriated from the
19 general fund to the department of finance and administration
20 for expenditure in fiscal year 2008 for the specified
21 purposes and, unless otherwise indicated, any unexpended or
22 unencumbered balance remaining at the end of fiscal year 2008
23 shall revert to the general fund:

24 1. seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000) is
25 appropriated from the general fund to the department of

1 finance and administration for expenditure in fiscal year
2 2008 to purchase mortgage loans made to low-income
3 homeowners;

10 Section 4. LOCAL GOVERNMENT DIVISION PROJECTS.--The

15 unexpended or unencumbered balance of the appropriations
16 remaining at the end of fiscal year 2008 shall revert to the
17 general fund:

12 54. thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000) to
13 contract with a nonprofit organization to provide a music and
14 visual and performing arts education program for at-risk
15 youth and high-risk youth offenders incarcerated in
16 correctional facilities in Santa Fe county;

19 Section 5. NEW MEXICO SENTENCING COMMISSION PROJECTS.--

20 The following amounts are appropriated from the general fund
21 to the New Mexico sentencing commission for expenditure in
22 fiscal year 2008 for the specified purposes and, unless
23 otherwise indicated, any unexpended or unencumbered balance
24 remaining at the end of fiscal year 2008 shall revert to the
25 general fund:

1 1. fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) to contract
2 for a study of and report on bias-based policing on a
3 statewide basis; and

4 2. fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) to study
5 gender-specific probation and parole models; survey existing
6 probation and parole participants on effectiveness of current
7 programs; and make recommendations on implementing best
8 practices in New Mexico.

9 Section 6. GOVERNOR'S OFFICE PROJECTS.--The following
10 amounts are appropriated from the general fund to the
11 governor's office for expenditure in fiscal year 2008 for the
12 specified purposes and, unless otherwise indicated, any
13 unexpended or unencumbered balance remaining at the end of
14 fiscal year 2008 shall revert to the general fund:

15 1. one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) to fund
16 programs that support healthy marriage and healthy family
17 living for parents and their children in Albuquerque; and

18 2. one hundred twenty-five thousand dollars
19 (\$125,000) to provide advocacy and technical assistance and
20 to act as a liaison for claimants seeking compensation
21 pursuant to the federal Energy Employees Occupational Illness
22 Compensation Program Act of 2000.

23 Section 7. STATE COMMISSION OF PUBLIC RECORDS
24 PROJECTS.--The following amounts are appropriated from the
25 general fund to the state commission of public records for

1 expenditure in fiscal year 2008 for the specified purposes
2 and, unless otherwise indicated, any unexpended or
3 unencumbered balance remaining at the end of fiscal year 2008
4 shall revert to the general fund:

5 1. forty-five thousand dollars (\$45,000) to
6 prepare title abstracts of state-owned property located
7 within former common lands of community land grants;

8 2. twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) for the
9 state historian's New Mexico history scholars program for
10 fellowships and for the implementation of a lecture program;
11 and

12 3. seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000) for the
13 state historian's service learning student internship
14 program.

15 Section 8. NEW MEXICO SPORTS AUTHORITY PROJECTS.--One
16 hundred two thousand dollars (\$102,000) is appropriated from
17 the general fund for expenditure in fiscal year 2008 to the
18 New Mexico sports authority to support and promote the New
19 Mexico bowl. Any unexpended or unencumbered balance
20 remaining at the end of fiscal year 2008 shall revert to the
21 general fund.

22 Section 9. TOURISM DEPARTMENT PROJECTS.--The following
23 amounts are appropriated from the general fund to the tourism
24 department for expenditure in fiscal year 2008 for the
25 specified purposes and, unless otherwise indicated, any

1 unexpended or unencumbered balance remaining at the end of
2 fiscal year 2008 shall revert to the general fund:

3 1. twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) to promote
4 wild horse tourism;

5 2. sixty-eight thousand dollars (\$68,000) for an
6 international indigenous environmental film festival;

7 3. sixty-seven thousand dollars (\$67,000) to
8 promote the tenth anniversary of the Georgia O'Keeffe museum;

9 4. eighty-five thousand dollars (\$85,000) for
10 planning for an international conference on creative tourism
11 to be held in Santa Fe;

12 5. ninety-eight thousand dollars (\$98,000) to
13 promote Native American cultural tourism in Albuquerque;

14 6. fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) to plan,
15 promote and conduct the Santa Fe fiesta;

16 7. eighty thousand dollars (\$80,000) for the
17 scenic byways program; and

18 8. two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) for
19 personal services and employee benefits.

20 Section 10. ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT DEPARTMENT PROJECTS.--

21 The following amounts are appropriated from the general fund
22 to the economic development department for expenditure in
23 fiscal year 2008 for the specified purposes and, unless
24 otherwise indicated, any unexpended or unencumbered balance
25 remaining at the end of fiscal year 2008 shall revert to the

1 general fund:

2 1. one hundred ten thousand dollars (\$110,000) for
3 certified business incubators in New Mexico;

4 2. thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000) to
5 contract for manufacturing extension services, contingent
6 upon the receipt of money from the national institute of
7 standards and technology to operate a manufacturing center in
8 New Mexico that is approved by that institute;

9 3. ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) for small cities
10 economic development planning in southeastern New Mexico;

11 4. ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) to continue
12 economic development through enterprise facilitation with
13 leaders from several communities in Taos county;

14 5. fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) to support
15 employee training and product development to promote economic
16 development in Mora;

17 6. thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000) for new
18 business recruiting statewide;

19 7. ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) for Mesilla
20 valley economic development advertising;

21 8. twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) for the New
22 Mexico partnership; and

23 9. three hundred thousand dollars (\$300,000) for
24 expansion of the New Mexico film division.

25 Section 11. REGULATION AND LICENSING DEPARTMENT

1 PROJECT.--one hundred ninety-two thousand dollars (\$192,000)
2 is appropriated from the general fund to the regulation and
3 licensing department for expenditure in fiscal year 2008 and
4 subsequent fiscal years for animal sheltering services,
5 contingent upon the enactment into law of Senate Bill 458 or
6 similar legislation of the first session of the forty-eighth
7 legislature. Any unexpended or unencumbered balance
8 remaining at the end of a fiscal year shall not revert to the
9 general fund.

10 Section 12. SPACEPORT AUTHORITY PROJECT.--One hundred
11 thousand dollars (\$100,000) is appropriated from the general
12 fund to the spaceport authority for expenditure in fiscal
13 year 2008 for operational expenses. Any unexpended or
14 unencumbered balance remaining at the end of fiscal year 2008
15 shall revert to the general fund.

16 Section 13. CULTURAL AFFAIRS DEPARTMENT PROJECTS.--The
17 following amounts are appropriated from the general fund to
18 the cultural affairs department for expenditure in fiscal
19 year 2008 for the purposes specified and, unless otherwise
20 indicated, any unexpended or unencumbered balance of the
21 appropriations remaining at the end of fiscal year 2008 shall
22 revert to the general fund:

23 1. twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) to
24 contract with a nonprofit music organization that organizes a
25 competition in which children twelve years of age and under

1 compete to hear their musical compositions performed in
2 concert and recorded on compact disc;

3 2. one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) for
4 family passes that promote the national Hispanic cultural
5 center and allow children and their families one-time free
6 admission to experience the arts and culture at the cultural
7 center;

8 3. one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) for
9 cultural and arts programs and educational outreach in
10 Bernalillo county;

11 4. twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) for a
12 multidisciplinary Native American film festival in Bernalillo
13 county;

14 5. one hundred six thousand dollars (\$106,000) to
15 provide symphony orchestra music programs and concerts in
16 Roswell;

17 6. fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) for
18 expenditure in fiscal year 2008 and subsequent fiscal years
19 to the main street revolving loan fund to make loans pursuant
20 to the Main Street Revolving Loan Act, contingent upon House
21 Bill 1266 or similar legislation of the first session of the
22 forty-eighth legislature becoming law;

23 7. fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) for
24 expenditure in fiscal years 2008 and 2009 for establishing
25 and securing the reburial grounds and reburying remains and

1 funerary objects of Native Americans, contingent upon House
2 Bill 73 or similar legislation of the first session of the
3 forty-eighth legislature becoming law;

4 8. fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) for
5 operational expenses at the Bosque Redondo memorial;

6 9. three hundred twenty thousand dollars
7 (\$320,000) for the library division's grants-in-aid program
8 for library services in El Rito, Embudo valley, Truchas and
9 Abiquiu;

10 10. fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) for the
11 annual border book festival in Mesilla;

12 11. forty-five thousand dollars (\$45,000) for
13 outreach programs at a science center and children's museum
14 in Albuquerque;

15 12. sixty-five thousand dollars (\$65,000) to
16 support a summer ballet festival in Albuquerque;

17 13. fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) for a Santa
18 Fe international folk art market;

19 14. fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) to contract
20 with a children's museum in Santa Fe for children's art and
21 education programs;

22 15. seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000) to

5 operational expenses of the fine arts museum; and

6 19. seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000) to
7 restore music programs.

8 Section 14. NEW MEXICO LIVESTOCK BOARD PROJECT.--Two
9 hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) is appropriated from the
10 general fund to the New Mexico livestock board for

13 and, unless otherwise indicated, any unexpended or

10 program. Any unexpended or unencumbered balance remaining at
