# Synopsis of Bill

Senate Joint Memorial 61 requests the PED to encourage all secondary schools to provide balanced information about critical life choices involving the military and to undertake a study to determine if there is balance to military recruiters' messages.

### **SIGNIFICANT ISSUES**

Senate Joint Memorial 61 focuses on:

• the requirement in the federal *No Child Left Behind Act of 2001* (NCLB) that requires school districts receiving federal funds to permit military recruiters to have access to students' names, addresses and telephone listings;

## **Senate Joint Memorial 61 – Page 2**

- the federal requirement that school districts admit recruiters to the same extent as colleges or employers; this carries an impact in time, costs, risks and educational mission upon secondary schools;
- the frequency of visits' resulting in incompatibility with local control over secondary school curricula;
- uniformed military members being regarded by students as persons of authority or special trust;
- the hundreds of cases of military recruiter improprieties, misconduct, and criminal convictions reported in the last two years;
- the risks involved in being recruited; and
- the amount being spent by the military to recruit exceeds \$4 billion per year.

# CONFLICT, DUPLICATION, COMPANIONSHIP, RELATIONSHIP

SB 1163 enacts new sections of the Public School Code to place restrictions and requirements on public secondary schools with respect to "post-secondary" recruiters.

HB 789 requires public post-secondary educational institutions to provide on-campus recruitment opportunities and facilities to military recruiters to the same degree it provides to members of the public.
