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15	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:
16	Section 1. SHORT TITLEThis act may be cited as the
17	"Safe House Act".
18	Section 2. PURPOSESThe purposes of the Safe House Act
19	are to:
20	A. ensure that a person who needs behavioral health
21	support but does not need hospitalization has access to an
22	appropriate level of such support; and
23	B. ensure state compliance with federal law
24	requiring that persons with behavioral health needs be cared
25	for in the least restrictive environment.
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1 Section 3. DEFINITIONS.--As used in the Safe House Act: 2 Α. "department" means the human services 3 department; "peer support specialist" means a person who has 4 Β. 5 previously experienced urgent behavioral health needs and recovered and who has successfully completed training 6 7 qualifying that person to work with a resident; 8 C. "resident" means an adult who has experienced 9 urgent behavioral health needs yet does not require 10 hospitalization and who voluntarily lives in a safe house; "safe house" means a home-like environment 11 D. 12 housing no more than six voluntary residents who engage in 13 routine activities of daily living and learn about tools for 14 recovery through experience and peer support; and "short term" means a period of no longer than 15 Ε. 16 twelve weeks. 17 Section 4. PEER SUPPORT TRAINING.--The department shall 18 provide by rule for training and credentialing of a peer 19 support specialist; provided that each peer support specialist 20 shall personally have experienced urgent behavioral health 21 needs and shall be certified as completing training in de-22 escalation techniques, cultural competency, race relations, the 23 recovery process and avoidance of aggressive confrontation 24 prior to working at a safe house.

Section 5. SAFE HOUSE PROGRAM--ELIGIBILITY.--

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1 The department shall administer one or more safe Α. 2 houses in each of the state's four geographic quadrants and one 3 safe house dedicated to serving the Native American population 4 in the northwest part of the state, as funds permit, or at 5 least one safe house site in a rural area on a pilot program 6 basis. 7 A safe house authorized by this section shall: Β. serve both those eligible and not eligible 8 (1) 9 for federal medical assistance programs; 10 be staffed twenty-four hours a day by one (2) 11 or more peer support specialists and shall employ a full-time 12 licensed clinician and a part-time psychiatric consultant; 13 include peer support in helping residents (3) 14 perform daily public living skills and reentry into independent 15 living; 16 offer a mix of therapeutic services, (4) 17 including nontraditional tools for wellness and traditional 18 behavioral health services; and 19 accept a resident, funds permitting, on a (5) 20 first-come, first-served basis; provided that no resident shall 21 live at a safe house except for a short term. 22 As early as possible, but within one week of a C. 23 resident's departure from a safe house, the resident shall be 24 introduced to service providers who may coordinate care and 25 otherwise provide support for the resident after the safe house .171471.1 - 3 -

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	2	Section 6. APPROPRIATIONFour million one hundred
	3	thousand dollars (\$4,100,000) is appropriated from the general
	4	fund to the human services department for expenditure in fiscal
	5	2009 to establish a safe house pilot program in five
	6	communities spread throughout the state as provided in the Safe
	7	House Act. Any unexpended or unencumbered balance remaining at
	8	the end of fiscal year 2009 shall revert to the general fund.
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
