A MEMORIAL

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2 LAUDING CHARACTER COUNTS AND DECLARING FRIDAY, FEBRUARY 1, 3 2008, AS "CHARACTER COUNTS DAY" IN THE SENATE. 4 5 WHEREAS, young people will be the stewards of our 6 communities, nation and world in critical times, and the 7 present and future well-being of our society requires an 8 involved, caring citizenry with good character; and 9 WHEREAS, concerns about the character training of 10 children have taken on a new sense of urgency as violence by 11 and against youth threatens the physical and psychological 12 well-being of the nation; and 13 WHEREAS, more than ever, children need strong and 14 constructive guidance from their families and their 15 communities, including schools, youth organizations, 16 religious institutions and civic groups; and 17 WHEREAS, the character of a nation is only as strong as 18 the character of its individual citizens, and the public good 19 is advanced when young people are taught that good character 20 counts in personal relationships, in school and in the 21 workplace; and 22 WHEREAS, scholars and educators agree that people do not 23 automatically develop good character and, therefore, 24 conscientious efforts must be made by youth-influencing 25 SM 14 institutions and individuals to help young people develop the

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essential traits and characteristics that constitute good character; and

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WHEREAS, character development is, first and foremost, an obligation of families, but efforts by faith communities, schools and youth, civic and human service organizations also play a very important role in supporting families by fostering and promoting good character; and

8 WHEREAS, in July 1992, the Aspen declaration was written 9 by an eminent group of educators, youth leaders and ethics 10 scholars for the purpose of articulating a coherent framework 11 for character education appropriate to a diverse and 12 pluralistic society; and

WHEREAS, the Aspen declaration states that "effective character education is based on core ethical values which form the foundation of democratic society"; trustworthiness, respect, responsibility, fairness, caring and citizenship are six pillars of character that transcend cultural, religious and socioeconomic difficulties; and

WHEREAS, the Aspen declaration states further that "The character and conduct of our youth reflect the character and conduct of society; therefore, every adult has the responsibility to teach and model the core ethical values and every social institution has the responsibility to promote the development of good character";

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the six pillars of character be endorsed; that all state and local government employees be urged to seek out opportunities to incorporate these core ethical values into their work with young people in park and recreation activities, child care programs, community events and intern and employee training; and that all citizens be encouraged to model these traits of good character in an ongoing commitment to promote character development and ethical behavior in the youth of our community; and
