SUMMARY

Synopsis of Bill

Senate Bill 50 appropriates \$800.0 from the general fund to the Emergency Medical Services Fund for expenditure in accordance with the emergency medical fund distribution formula in fiscal year 2008 and subsequent fiscal years.

Senate Bill 50 – Page 2

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

The appropriation of \$800.0 contained in this bill is a recurring expense to the general fund. Any unexpended or unencumbered balance remaining at the end of a fiscal year shall revert to the general fund.

DOH currently receives approximately \$3.9 million in general fund for the emergency medical services through the Emergency Medical Services Fund. DOH reports the funding in the proposed legislation would augment the \$3.9 million in Emergency Medical Services Fund Act appropriations to the department.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

DOH reports New Mexico has approximately 450 emergency medical services. Of these, about half are staffed by a volunteer workforce. DOH notes many services are located in rural communities, which have difficulty providing financial support for day-to-day operational needs and education and training necessary for the certification and licensure of the volunteer providers. The Emergency Medical Services Fund Act provides vital funding for many of these services.

PERFORMANCE IMPLICATIONS

DOH reports that the proposed legislation is consistent with the department's goals for epidemiology and response division in regards to ensuring preparedness for health emergencies, including pandemic influenza, and improved emergency medical services and trauma care across the state.

ADMINISTRATIVE IMPLICATIONS

DOH currently administers the Emergency Medical Services Fund and distributes awards to emergency medical services statewide based on applications.

WHAT WILL BE THE CONSEQUENCES OF NOT ENACTING THIS BILL

HSEMD reports that with federal funds for emergency medical services continually decreasing, New Mexico would be less capable of improving statewide delivery of life saving emergency services to residents.
