# LEGISLATIVE EDUCATION STUDY COMMITTEE BILL ANALYSIS

Bill No: SB 399a 49th Legislature, 1st Session, 2009

**Short Title: Local Educational Retirement Unit Audits**

#### **AS AMENDED**

The House Education Committee amendment, by striking "or has reason to believe", requires the director or the director's designee to find, during the course of an audit, that financial controls or procedures are not adequate for an LAU (local administrative unit) to properly account for and pay required contributions.

### **Original Bill Summary:**

SB 399 amends the *Educational Retirement Act* (ERA) to authorize the director of the Educational Retirement Board (ERB) or the director's designee to conduct an audit at any time of any local administrative unit in order to ensure compliance with the act and board rules. The audit may include interviews with employees of the local administrative unit, which is directed to cooperate with the director and to provide access to "records, information and employees."

Should the audit determine that discrepancies or violations of the act or ERB rule exist or that financial controls or procedures are not adequate to allow the local administrative unit to properly account for and pay required contributions, the director must:

- order the local administrative unit to implement remedial measures;
- submit a report to the ERB, the State Auditor, the Public Education Department (PED), or the Higher Education Department (HED) as appropriate; and
- if criminal activity is found or suspected, notify the Attorney General, the State Auditor, and the appropriate law enforcement agency.

### **Fiscal Impact:**

SB 399 makes no appropriation.

### **Fiscal Issues:**

According to the ERB, SB 399 should have little or no fiscal impact.

In its analysis of SB 399, HED suggests that the ERB will require an additional three to five employees at a cost of \$350,000 to implement the provisions in the bill. However, ERB indicates that no additional resources will be necessary: "The ERB internal auditor would be detailed to perform limited scope compliance audits in the event of a discrepancy. Scheduled internal audits identified in our audit plan would be delayed until the special audit is complete."

### **Issues**:

According to the ERB website, SB 399 incorporates a 2009 legislative priority of the board:

ERB is seeking audit authority to ensure that all local administrative units (LAUs) are paying the correct contributions, employee and employer, for all eligible members on time and in full. Providing audit authority will create a venue for the ERB to work cooperatively with the LAUs on administrative issues. By proactively identifying compliance issues, early negative consequences can be avoided and the fund will receive the correct amount of contributions.

In support of this request, in its analysis of SB 399, ERB cites the following instance: "An administrative unit ran into financial difficulty and closed in FY 2008. Legal disputes resulted from the closure and consequently they refused to provide accounting documentation to the ERB. Without audit authority the ERB has no recourse but to accept undocumented payroll information."

Finally, the Department of Finance and Administration (DFA) notes that implementation of SB 399 "could provide for better accountability and payment of contributions by administrative units to the [ERB]."

### **Background:**

In 1957, the Legislature enacted the ERA to provide the education community with a vehicle for retirement through establishment of the Educational Retirement Fund.

According to the ERB, as of February 2, 2009, there are 183 contributing employers, including public school districts and charter schools, higher education institutions, special schools such as the New Mexico School for the Blind and Visually Impaired, and other state agencies such as PED (see Attachment).

Management of the Education Retirement Fund is under the ERB, which consists of a board of seven members, the categories of which are statutorily determined and include the Secretary of Public Education, the State Treasurer, one member elected by the members of the New Mexico Association of Educational Retirees, one member elected by the National Education Association-New Mexico, one member elected by the American Association of University Professors, and two members appointed by the Governor.

### **Related Bill:**
