Bill No: SB 476a 49th Legislature, 1st Session, 2009

Short Title: Educational Retirees Returning to Work

Sponsor(s): Senator Gay Kernan

AS AMENDED

The Senate Education Committee amendment eliminates the extended sunset date for the Return to Work program for retired ERB members.

Bill Summary:

SB 476 amends the Educational Retirement Act (ERA) to:

- extend the "sunset" date for the return to work (RTW) provision from January 1, 2012 to January 1, 2022;
- require the retiree to complete an application and receive approval from the Educational Retirement Board (ERB) prior to returning to work for a local administrative unit (ERB employer);
- require the ERB employer to pay to the Educational Retirement Fund the total contributions that a regular employee and an employer would pay if the employer were hiring a non-retiree to fill the position;
- clarify what types of services "rendered" to an ERB employer during the 12-month layout period would disqualify the individual from participating in the RTW program; ¹ and
- define the term "local administrative unit."²

Fiscal Impact:

SB 476 makes no appropriation.

Fiscal Issues:

The RTW provision enables retired members of the Educational Retirement Fund to resume working for an ERB employer without having to suspend their retirement so long as they have not worked for an ERB employer for a period of 12 consecutive months. Current statute requires that the employer pay only the employer's share of what the total contribution to the fund would be if the returning worker were not retired.

¹ Rendered services include "employment by a local administrative unit, whether full or part time; substitute teaching; voluntarily performing duties for a local administrative unit that would otherwise be, or in the past have been, performed by a paid employee or independent contractor; or performing duties for a local administrative unit as an independent contractor or an employee of an independent contractor."

² The term includes "any entity incorporated, formed or otherwise organized by, or subject to the control of a local administrative unit, whether or not the entity is created for profit or nonprofit purposes."

According to its website, one of ERB's 2009 legislative proposals is to continue the RTW program with the changes included in SB 476:

... By continuing the program, we offer retirees the opportunity to contribute their knowledge and strengthen their financial standing in retirement. The proposal will fortify the fund by having the employer make both the employer and employee statutory contributions.

The Legislative Finance Committee's Fiscal Impact Report (FIR) indicates that the increased contributions to the Educational Retirement Fund could result in additional revenue to the fund of approximately \$4.2 million per fiscal year.

Both the Public Education Department (PED) and the Higher Education Department (HED) suggest that requiring the employer to pay both portions of the total contribution could result in fewer retirees being hired.

Issues:

Data provided by the ERB shows that currently there are 1,328 individuals in the RTW program currently employed by 127 educational institutions and state agencies. The number of participants per employer is listed in Attachment 1.

In its analysis of SB 476, PED states that, during school year 2007-2008, approximately 1,200 teachers, or 5.0 percent of the public school teachers statewide, were employed under the RTW program. PED indicates that allowing the RTW program to sunset could lead to "serious teacher shortages" and an adverse effect on "New Mexico's ability to meet the 'highly qualified' teacher requirements under [the *No Child Left Behind Act of 2001*]."

PED indicates that, based on information from school year 2007-2008, there is a total shortage statewide of 1,675 teachers in the following areas: 279 bilingual/Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages (TESOL) teachers; 179 elementary teachers; 663 math teachers; 391 science teachers; and 145 special education teachers.

Background:

- In 1957, the Legislature enacted the ERA to provide the education community with a vehicle for retirement through establishment of the Educational Retirement Fund.
- According to the ERB, as of February 2, 2009, there are 183 contributing employers, including public school districts and charter schools, higher education institutions, special schools such as the New Mexico School for the Blind and Visually Impaired, and other state agencies such as PED (see Attachment 2).
- Management of the Educational Retirement Fund is under the ERB, which consists of a
 board of seven members, the categories of which are statutorily determined and include the
 secretary of public education, the state treasurer, one member elected by the members of the
 New Mexico Association of Educational Retirees, one member elected by National
 Education Association-NM, one member elected by the American Association of University
 Professors, and two members appointed by the Governor.

- In order to attract and retain quality teachers in the profession, the 2001 Legislature enacted an LESC-endorsed amendment to the ERA to allow retired or eligible-to-retire educators to receive retirement benefits and salary following a one-year break in service beginning January 1, 2002, and continuing until January 1, 2012.
- The 2003 Legislature enacted legislation to include those ERA retirees who retired before the return-to-work provisions of ERA were enacted and either laid out a year and went back to work and suspended retirement benefits or worked part time after they retired and did not suspend retirement benefits.
- The 2003 Legislature enacted a measure to amend the *Public Employees Retirement Act* (PERA) to allow PERA retirees who wait 90 days prior to returning to work to accept employment with a PERA-affiliated employer without suspension of their pension benefits but also without accruing service credit. In addition, both the employee and the employer were required to make contributions to the fund. Subsequently, the 2004 Legislature amended the act to specify that, beginning January 1, 2007, the employer would make both the employer's and the employee's contributions to the fund.
- The 2003 Legislature also enacted a measure that (1) exempts PERA retirees from the ERA requirement to make contributions to the ERA fund if they accept employment with a local ERA unit; (2) prohibits them from purchasing service credit for this time; and (3) requires the local administrative unit to make contributions to the ERA fund on behalf of the employee.
