Except as otherwise provided in this 4 section, regular students shall be in school-directed programs, 5 exclusive of lunch, for a minimum of the following: 6 (1) kindergarten, for half-day programs, two 7 and one-half hours per day [or four hundred fifty hours per year] or, for full-day programs, five and one-half hours per 8 9 day [or nine hundred ninety hours per year]; 10 grades one through six, five and one-half (2) 11 hours per day [or nine hundred ninety hours per year]; and 12 grades seven through twelve, six hours per (3) 13 dav.
