AN ACT

RELATING TO ANIMALS; AUTHORIZING EUTHANASIA TECHNICIANS TO PURCHASE, POSSESS AND ADMINISTER CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES FOR THE EUTHANASIA AND PRE-EUTHANASIA OF ANIMALS; CHANGING THE NAME OF THE ANIMAL SHELTERING SERVICES ACT AND THE ANIMAL SHELTERING SERVICES BOARD; CHANGING CERTAIN REQUIREMENTS AFFECTING THE BOARD AND EUTHANASIA AGENCIES; RECONCILING MULTIPLE AMENDMENTS TO THE SAME SECTION OF LAW IN LAWS 2008.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. Section 26-1-2 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1967, Chapter 23, Section 2, as amended by Laws 2008, Chapter 9, Section 3 and by Laws 2008, Chapter 44, Section 4) is amended to read:

"26-1-2. DEFINITIONS.--As used in the New Mexico Drug, Device and Cosmetic Act:

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- "board" means the board of pharmacy or its duly authorized agent;
- "person" includes an individual, partnership, corporation, association, institution or establishment;
- "biological product" means a virus, therapeutic serum, toxin, antitoxin or analogous product applicable to the prevention, treatment or cure of diseases or injuries of humans and domestic animals and, as used within the meaning of this definition:
- a "virus" is interpreted to be a product (1) containing the minute living cause of an infectious disease and includes filterable viruses, bacteria, rickettsia, fungi and protozoa;
- a "therapeutic serum" is a product (2) obtained from blood by removing the clot or clot components and the blood cells;
- a "toxin" is a product containing a (3) soluble substance poisonous to laboratory animals or humans in doses of one milliliter or less of the product and having the property, following the injection of nonfatal doses into an animal, or causing to be produced therein another soluble substance that specifically neutralizes the poisonous substance and that is demonstrable in the serum of the animal thus immunized; and
- (4) an "antitoxin" is a product containing the .176242.1GR

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soluble substance in serum or other body fluid of an immunized animal that specifically neutralizes the toxin against which the animal is immune;

- "controlled substance" means a drug, substance or immediate precursor enumerated in Schedules I through V of the Controlled Substances Act;
 - Ε. "drug" means articles:
 - recognized in an official compendium;
- intended for use in the diagnosis, cure, (2) mitigation, treatment or prevention of disease in humans or other animals and includes the domestic animal biological products regulated under the federal Virus-Serum-Toxin Act, 37 Stat 832-833, 21 U.S.C. 151-158, and the biological products applicable to humans regulated under Federal 58 Stat 690, as amended, 42 U.S.C. 216, Section 351, 58 Stat 702, as amended, and 42 U.S.C. 262;
- other than food, that affect the structure or any function of the human body or the bodies of other animals; and
- intended for use as a component of Paragraph (1), (2) or (3) of this subsection, but does not include devices or their component parts or accessories;
- "dangerous drug" means a drug, other than a F. controlled substance enumerated in Schedule I of the Controlled Substances Act, that because of a potentiality for harmful .176242.1GR

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effect or the method of its use or the collateral measures necessary to its use is not safe except under the supervision of a practitioner licensed by law to direct the use of such drug and hence for which adequate directions for use cannot be "Adequate directions for use" means directions under prepared. which the layperson can use a drug or device safely and for the purposes for which it is intended. A drug shall be dispensed only upon the prescription of a practitioner licensed by law to administer or prescribe the drug if it:

- is a habit-forming drug and contains any quantity of a narcotic or hypnotic substance or a chemical derivative of such substance that has been found under the federal act and the board to be habit forming;
- because of its toxicity or other potential (2) for harmful effect or the method of its use or the collateral measures necessary to its use is not safe for use except under the supervision of a practitioner licensed by law to administer or prescribe the drug;
- (3) is limited by an approved application by Section 505 of the federal act to the use under the professional supervision of a practitioner licensed by law to administer or prescribe the drug;
- (4) bears the legend: "Caution: federal law prohibits dispensing without prescription.";

- (3) intended to affect the structure or a function of the human body or the bodies of other animals and that does not achieve any of its principal intended purposes through chemical action within or on the human body or the bodies of other animals and that is not dependent on being metabolized for achievement of any of its principal intended purposes;
- "prescription" means an order given individually I. for the person for whom prescribed, either directly from a licensed practitioner or the practitioner's agent to the pharmacist, including by means of electronic transmission, or indirectly by means of a written order signed by the prescriber, and bearing the name and address of the prescriber, the prescriber's license classification, the name and address of the patient, the name and quantity of the drug prescribed, directions for use and the date of issue;
- "practitioner" means a certified advanced .176242.1GR

practice chiropractic physician, physician, doctor of oriental medicine, dentist, veterinarian, <u>euthanasia technician</u>, certified nurse practitioner, clinical nurse specialist, pharmacist, pharmacist clinician, certified nurse-midwife, physician assistant, prescribing psychologist or other person licensed or certified to prescribe and administer drugs that are subject to the New Mexico Drug, Device and Cosmetic Act;

K. "cosmetic" means:

- (1) articles intended to be rubbed, poured, sprinkled or sprayed on, introduced into or otherwise applied to the human body or any part thereof for cleansing, beautifying, promoting attractiveness or altering the appearance; and
- (2) articles intended for use as a component of any articles enumerated in Paragraph (1) of this subsection, except that the term shall not include soap;
- L. "official compendium" means the official United States pharmacopoeia national formulary or the official homeopathic pharmacopoeia of the United States or any supplement to either of them;
- M. "label" means a display of written, printed or graphic matter upon the immediate container of an article. A requirement made by or under the authority of the New Mexico Drug, Device and Cosmetic Act that any word, statement or other information appear on the label shall not be considered to be .176242.1GR

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complied with unless the word, statement or other information also appears on the outside container or wrapper, if any, of the retail package of the article or is easily legible through the outside container or wrapper;

- "immediate container" does not include package N. liners;
- 0. "labeling" means all labels and other written, printed or graphic matter:
- on an article or its containers or (1) wrappers; or
 - accompanying an article;
- "misbranded" means a label to an article that is misleading. In determining whether the label is misleading, there shall be taken into account, among other things, not only representations made or suggested by statement, word, design, device or any combination of the foregoing, but also the extent to which the label fails to reveal facts material in the light of such representations or material with respect to consequences that may result from the use of the article to which the label relates under the conditions of use prescribed in the label or under such conditions of use as are customary or usual;
- "advertisement" means all representations Q. disseminated in any manner or by any means, other than by labeling, for the purpose of inducing, or that are likely to .176242.1GR

induce, directly or indirectly, the purchase of drugs, devices or cosmetics;

- R. "antiseptic", when used in the labeling or advertisement of an antiseptic, shall be considered to be a representation that it is a germicide, except in the case of a drug purporting to be or represented as an antiseptic for inhibitory use as a wet dressing, ointment, dusting powder or such other use as involves prolonged contact with the body;
 - S. "new drug" means a drug:
- (1) the composition of which is such that the drug is not generally recognized, among experts qualified by scientific training and experience to evaluate the safety and efficacy of drugs, as safe and effective for use under the conditions prescribed, recommended or suggested in the labeling thereof; or
- (2) the composition of which is such that the drug, as a result of investigation to determine its safety and efficacy for use under such conditions, has become so recognized, but that has not, otherwise than in such investigations, been used to a material extent or for a material time under such conditions;
- T. "contaminated with filth" applies to a drug, device or cosmetic not securely protected from dirt, dust and, as far as may be necessary by all reasonable means, from all foreign or injurious contaminations, or a drug, device or .176242.1GR

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cosmetic found to contain dirt, dust, foreign or injurious contamination or infestation;

- U. "selling of drugs, devices or cosmetics" shall be considered to include the manufacture, production, processing, packing, exposure, offer, possession and holding of any such article for sale and the sale and the supplying or applying of any such article in the conduct of a drug or cosmetic establishment;
 - V. "color additive" means a material that:
- (1) is a dye, pigment or other substance made by a process of synthesis or similar artifice or extracted, isolated or otherwise derived, with or without intermediate or final change of identity, from a vegetable, mineral, animal or other source; or
- (2) when added or applied to a drug or cosmetic or to the human body or a part thereof, is capable, alone or through reaction with other substances, of imparting color thereto; except that such term does not include any material that has been or hereafter is exempted under the federal act;
- W. "federal act" means the Federal Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act;
- X. "restricted device" means a device for which the sale, distribution or use is lawful only upon the written or oral authorization of a practitioner licensed by law to .176242.1GR

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administer, prescribe or use the device and for which the federal food and drug administration requires special training or skills of the practitioner to use or prescribe. This definition does not include custom devices defined in the federal act and exempt from performance standards or premarket approval requirements under Section 520(b) of the federal act;

- Υ. "prescription device" means a device that, because of its potential for harm, the method of its use or the collateral measures necessary to its use, is not safe except under the supervision of a practitioner licensed in this state to direct the use of such device and for which "adequate directions for use" cannot be prepared, but that bears the label: "Caution: federal law restricts this device to sale by or on the order of a ", the blank to be filled with the word "physician", "physician assistant", "certified advanced practice chiropractic physician", "doctor of oriental medicine", "dentist", "veterinarian", "euthanasia technician", "certified nurse practitioner", "clinical nurse specialist", "pharmacist", "pharmacist clinician" or "certified nursemidwife" or with the descriptive designation of any other practitioner licensed in this state to use or order the use of the device;
- Z. "valid practitioner-patient relationship" means a professional relationship, as defined by the practitioner's licensing board, between the practitioner and the patient; and .176242.1GR

- "dispense" means to deliver a controlled substance to an ultimate user or research subject pursuant to the lawful order of a practitioner, including the administering, prescribing, packaging, labeling or compounding necessary to prepare the controlled substance for that delivery;
- "dispenser" means a practitioner who dispenses and includes hospitals, pharmacies and clinics where controlled substances are dispensed;
- "distribute" means to deliver other than by J. administering or dispensing a controlled substance or controlled substance analog;
- "drug" or "substance" means substances recognized as drugs in the official United States pharmacopoeia, official homeopathic pharmacopoeia of the United States or official national formulary or any respective supplement to those publications. It does not include devices or their components, parts or accessories;
- "hashish" means the resin extracted from any part of marijuana, whether growing or not, and every compound, .176242.1GR

manufacture, salt, derivative, mixture or preparation of such resins:

- M. "manufacture" means the production, preparation, compounding, conversion or processing of a controlled substance or controlled substance analog by extraction from substances of natural origin or independently by means of chemical synthesis or by a combination of extraction and chemical synthesis and includes any packaging or repackaging of the substance or labeling or relabeling of its container, except that this term does not include the preparation or compounding of a controlled substance:
- (1) by a practitioner as an incident to administering or dispensing a controlled substance in the course of the practitioner's professional practice; or
- (2) by a practitioner, or by the practitioner's agent under the practitioner's supervision, for the purpose of or as an incident to research, teaching or chemical analysis and not for sale;
- N. "marijuana" means all parts of the plant cannabis, including any and all varieties, species and subspecies of the genus Cannabis, whether growing or not, the seeds thereof and every compound, manufacture, salt, derivative, mixture or preparation of the plant or its seeds. It does not include the mature stalks of the plant, hashish, tetrahydrocannabinols extracted or isolated from marijuana,

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1 fiber produced from the stalks, oil or cake made from the seeds 2 of the plant, any other compound, manufacture, salt, 3 derivative, mixture or preparation of the mature stalks, fiber, oil or cake, or the sterilized seed of the plant that is 5 incapable of germination; "narcotic drug" means any of the following, 0. 7 whether produced directly or indirectly by extraction from 8 substances of vegetable origin or independently by means of 9 chemical synthesis or by a combination of extraction and 10 chemical synthesis: 11 12 derivative or preparation of opium or opiate;

- opium and opiate and any salt, compound,
- any salt, compound, isomer, derivative or preparation that is a chemical equivalent of any of the substances referred to in Paragraph (1) of this subsection, except the isoquinoline alkaloids of opium;
- opium poppy and poppy straw, including all (3) parts of the plant of the species Papaver somniferum L. except its seeds; or
- coca leaves and any salt, compound, derivative or preparation of coca leaves, any salt, compound, isomer, derivative or preparation that is a chemical equivalent of any of these substances except decocainized coca leaves or extractions of coca leaves that do not contain cocaine or ecgonine;

- P. "opiate" means any substance having an addiction-forming or addiction-sustaining liability similar to morphine or being capable of conversion into a drug having addiction-forming or addiction-sustaining liability. "Opiate" does not include, unless specifically designated as controlled under Section 30-31-5 NMSA 1978, the dextrorotatory isomer of 3-methoxy-n-methylmorphinan and its salts, dextromethorphan.
 "Opiate" does include its racemic and levorotatory forms;
- Q. "person" means an individual, partnership, corporation, association, institution, political subdivision, government agency or other legal entity;
- R. "practitioner" means a physician, certified advanced practice chiropractic physician, doctor of oriental medicine, dentist, physician assistant, certified nurse practitioner, clinical nurse specialist, certified nurse-midwife, prescribing psychologist, veterinarian, euthanasia technician, pharmacist, pharmacist clinician or other person licensed or certified to prescribe and administer drugs that are subject to the Controlled Substances Act;
- S. "prescription" means an order given individually for the person for whom is prescribed a controlled substance, either directly from a licensed practitioner or the practitioner's agent to the pharmacist, including by means of electronic transmission, or indirectly by means of a written order signed by the prescriber, bearing the name and address of .176242.1GR

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the prescriber, the prescriber's license classification, the name and address of the patient, the name and quantity of the drug prescribed, directions for use and the date of issue and in accordance with the Controlled Substances Act or rules adopted thereto;

- "scientific investigator" means a person Τ. registered to conduct research with controlled substances in the course of the person's professional practice or research and includes analytical laboratories;
- "ultimate user" means a person who lawfully possesses a controlled substance for the person's own use or for the use of a member of the person's household or for administering to an animal under the care, custody and control of the person or by a member of the person's household;
- "drug paraphernalia" means all equipment, V. products and materials of any kind that are used, intended for use or designed for use in planting, propagating, cultivating, growing, harvesting, manufacturing, compounding, converting, producing, processing, preparing, testing, analyzing, packaging, repackaging, storing, containing, concealing, injecting, ingesting, inhaling or otherwise introducing into the human body a controlled substance or controlled substance analog in violation of the Controlled Substances Act. It includes:
- kits used, intended for use or designed .176242.1GR

for use in planting, propagating, cultivating, growing or harvesting any species of plant that is a controlled substance or controlled substance analog or from which a controlled substance can be derived;

- (2) kits used, intended for use or designed for use in manufacturing, compounding, converting, producing, processing or preparing controlled substances or controlled substance analogs;
- (3) isomerization devices used, intended for use or designed for use in increasing the potency of any species of plant that is a controlled substance;
- (4) testing equipment used, intended for use or designed for use in identifying or in analyzing the strength, effectiveness or purity of controlled substances or controlled substance analogs;
- (5) scales or balances used, intended for use or designed for use in weighing or measuring controlled substances or controlled substance analogs;
- (6) diluents and adulterants, such as quinine hydrochloride, mannitol, mannite dextrose and lactose, used, intended for use or designed for use in cutting controlled substances or controlled substance analogs;
- (7) separation gins and sifters used, intended for use or designed for use in removing twigs and seeds from, or in otherwise cleaning and refining, marijuana;

(8) blenders, bowls, containers, spoons and
mixing devices used, intended for use or designed for use in
compounding controlled substances or controlled substance
analogs;
(9) capsules, balloons, envelopes and other
containers used, intended for use or designed for use in
packaging small quantities of controlled substances or
controlled substance analogs;
(10) containers and other objects used,
intended for use or designed for use in storing or concealing
controlled substances or controlled substance analogs;
(11) hypodermic syringes, needles and other
objects used, intended for use or designed for use in
parenterally injecting controlled substances or controlled
substance analogs into the human body;
(12) objects used, intended for use or
designed for use in ingesting, inhaling or otherwise
introducing marijuana, cocaine, hashish or hashish oil into the
human body, such as:
(a) metal, wooden, acrylic, glass,
stone, plastic or ceramic pipes, with or without screens,
permanent screens, hashish heads or punctured metal bowls;
(b) water pipes;
(c) carburetion tubes and devices;
(d) smoking and carburetion masks;

- W. "controlled substance analog" means a substance other than a controlled substance that has a chemical structure substantially similar to that of a controlled substance in Schedule I, II, III, IV or V or that was specifically designed to produce effects substantially similar to that of controlled substances in Schedule I, II, III, IV or V. Examples of chemical classes in which controlled substance analogs are found include the following:
 - phenethylamines;
 - (2) N-substituted piperidines;
 - (3) morphinans;
 - (4) ecgonines;
 - (5) quinazolinones;
 - (6) substituted indoles; and
 - (7) arylcycloalkylamines.

Specifically excluded from the definition of "controlled

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substance analog" are those substances that are generally
recognized as safe and effective within the meaning of the
Federal Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act or have been manufactured,
distributed or possessed in conformance with the provisions of
an approved new drug application or an exemption for
investigational use within the meaning of Section 505 of the
Federal Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act:

- X. "human consumption" includes application, injection, inhalation, ingestion or any other manner of introduction;
- Y. "drug-free school zone" means a public school, parochial school or private school or property that is used for a public, parochial or private school purpose and the area within one thousand feet of the school property line, but it does not mean any post-secondary school; and
- Z. "valid practitioner-patient relationship" means a professional relationship, as defined by the practitioner's licensing board, between the practitioner and the patient."

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- "emergency field euthanasia" means the process defined by rule of the board to cause the death of an animal in an emergency situation when safe and humane transport of the animal is not possible;
- "euthanasia" means to produce a humane death of an animal by standards deemed acceptable by the board as set forth in its rules:
- "euthanasia agency" means a facility that provides shelter to animals on a regular basis, including a dog pound, a humane society or a public or private shelter facility that temporarily houses stray, unwanted or injured animals, and that performs euthanasia;
- I. "euthanasia drugs" means non-narcotic schedule II or schedule III substances and chemicals as set forth in the Controlled Substances Act that are used for the purposes of euthanasia and pre-euthanasia of animals;
- "euthanasia instructor" means a veterinarian or <u>a</u> euthanasia [provider licensed and] <u>technician</u> certified by the board to instruct other individuals in euthanasia techniques;
- "euthanasia [provider] technician" means a Κ. person licensed by the board to euthanize animals for a euthanasia agency;
- "livestock" means all domestic or domesticated .176242.1GR

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animals that are used or raised on a farm or ranch and exotic
animals in captivity and includes horses, asses, mules, cattle,
sheep, goats, swine, bison, poultry, ostriches, emus, rheas,
camelids and farmed cervidae but does not include canine or
feline animals:

M. "rescue organization" means an organization that rescues animals and is not involved in the breeding of animals; and
