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14	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:
15	Section 1. Section 57-22-6 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1983,
16	Chapter 140, Section 6, as amended) is amended to read:
17	"57-22-6. FILING OF REQUIRED DOCUMENTS
18	A. A charitable organization existing, operating or
19	soliciting in the state, unless exempted by Section 57-22-4
20	NMSA 1978, shall register with the attorney general on a form
21	provided by the attorney general; correct any deficiencies in
22	its registration upon notice of deficiencies provided by the
23	attorney general; and provide a copy of its IRS Form 1023 or
24	IRS Form 1024 application for exempt status with its
25	registration.

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1 Β. The attorney general shall notify each 2 charitable organization required to register within ten 3 business days of [his] receipt of the registration form of any 4 deficiencies in the registration and may make rules in 5 accordance with the State Rules Act, as are necessary for the 6 proper administration of this section, including: 7 requirements for filing additional (1) 8 information, including disclosure of professional fundraising 9 counsel retained by the charitable organization; and 10 (2) provisions for suspending the filing of 11 reports or granting an exemption from the registration and 12 reporting requirements of this section for a charitable 13 organization subject to audit, registration, charter or other 14 requirements of a statewide, regional or national association 15 and if it is determined that such reports or registration is 16 not necessary for the protection of the public interest.

C. In addition to any other reporting requirements pursuant to the Charitable Solicitations Act, every charitable organization that has received tax-exempt status pursuant to Section 501(c)(3) of the federal Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, and <u>that</u> is required to file a form 990, 990EZ or 990PF pursuant to the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, shall file that form and the accompanying [schedule A] <u>schedules</u> annually with the office of the attorney general up to six months following the close of the charitable .176074.1

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1 organization's fiscal year. Extensions of time for filing may 2 be allowed at the discretion of the attorney general for good 3 cause shown. Such forms shall be public records and available 4 for public inspection, subject to the relevant public 5 disclosure provisions of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended. Organizations that do not file a form 990, 990EZ or 6 7 990PF pursuant to the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as 8 amended, shall file an annual report, under oath, on the form 9 provided by the attorney general for that purpose. A 10 charitable organization that received total revenue in excess 11 of five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000) shall be audited by 12 an independent certified public accountant. Audits shall be 13 performed in accordance with generally acceptable accounting 14 principles. A charitable organization shall correct any 15 deficiencies in an annual report upon notice of deficiencies 16 provided by the attorney general.

D. A charitable organization that fails to register before a solicitation is made or fails to timely file its tax filings with the attorney general pursuant to Subsection C of this section may be assessed a late filing fee of one hundred dollars (\$100).

E. The attorney general may accept information filed by a charitable organization with another state or the federal government in lieu of the registration and reporting requirements of the Charitable Solicitations Act if such .176074.1
