12	SCHOLARSHIPS AT PUBLIC POST-SECONDARY EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS
13	TO BE GRANTED BASED ON FINANCIAL NEED.
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15	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:
16	Section 1. Section 21-1-2 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1970,
17	Chapter 9, Section 1, as amended) is amended to read:
18	"21-1-2. MATRICULATION AND TUITION FEES
19	A. Except as otherwise provided in this section and
20	in Section 21-1-4.3 NMSA 1978, the boards of regents of the
21	university of New Mexico, New Mexico state university, New
22	Mexico highlands university, western New Mexico university,
23	eastern New Mexico university, New Mexico military institute
24	<u>and</u> New Mexico institute of mining and technology [ <del>and New</del>
25	Mexico junior college] shall establish and charge matriculation
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1 fees and tuition fees as follows: 2 each student shall be charged a (1)3 matriculation fee of not less than five dollars (\$5.00) upon 4 enrolling in each institution; 5 each student who is a resident of New (2) 6 Mexico shall be charged a tuition fee of not less than twenty 7 dollars (\$20.00) a year; 8 (3) each student who is not a resident of New 9 Mexico shall be charged a tuition fee of not less than fifty 10 dollars (\$50.00) a year; 11 (4) each student shall be charged a tuition 12 fee of not less than ten dollars (\$10.00) for each summer 13 session; and 14 (5) each student may be charged a tuition fee 15 for extension courses. 16 Except as otherwise provided in this section and Β. 17 in Section 21-1-4.3 NMSA 1978, the board of regents of northern 18 New Mexico [state school] college shall establish and charge 19 each student a matriculation fee and a tuition fee. 20 The board of regents of each institution may С. 21 establish and grant gratis scholarships to students who are 22 residents of New Mexico in an amount not to exceed the 23 matriculation fee or tuition and fees, or both. These 24 scholarships are in addition to the lottery tuition 25 scholarships authorized in Section 21-1-4.3 NMSA 1978 and shall .174531.1GR

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be granted to the full extent of available funds before lottery tuition scholarships are granted. The number of scholarships established and granted pursuant to this subsection shall not exceed three percent of the preceding fall semester enrollment in each institution and shall not be established and granted for summer sessions. The president of each institution shall select and recommend to the board of regents of [his] the institution, as recipients of scholarships, students who possess good moral character and satisfactory initiative, scholastic standing and personality. [At least thirty-three and one-third percent] <u>All</u> of the gratis scholarships established and granted by each board of regents each year shall be granted on the basis of financial need.

D. The board of regents <u>or governing board</u> of each institution set out in this subsection may establish and grant, in addition to those scholarships provided for in Subsection C of this section, athletic scholarships for tuition and fees. In no event shall the board of regents of any institution be allowed to award scholarships for tuition and fees for more than the number of athletic scholarships set out in this subsection and in no event shall more than seventy-five percent of the scholarships granted be for out-of-state residents:

(1) the board of regents of the university of New Mexico may grant up to two hundred ninety-three athletic scholarships;

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(2) the board of regents of New Mexico state
 university may grant up to two hundred seventy athletic
 scholarships;

4 (3) the boards of regents of New Mexico
5 highlands university, eastern New Mexico university and western
6 New Mexico university may each grant up to one hundred forty
7 athletic scholarships; and

8 (4) the [board of regents] governing board of
9 New Mexico junior college may grant up to fifty-two athletic
10 scholarships.

E. In the event that the number of athletic scholarships exceeds the number of athletic scholarships permitted that institution by regulations and bylaws of the national collegiate athletic association or the national association of intercollegiate athletics of which that institution is a member, the appropriate board of regents shall reduce the number of authorized tuition scholarships to comply with association rules and regulations.

F. Matriculation fees and tuition fees shall be fixed and made payable as directed by the board of regents of each institution, collected by the officers of each institution and accounted for as are other funds of the institutions. Matriculation fees shall be charged only once for each institution in which a student enrolls."

Section 2. Section 21-13-19 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1968, .174531.1GR

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1 2 Chapter 70, Section 2, as amended) is amended to read: "21-13-19. ENROLLMENT DEFINED--PAYMENTS.--

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For those students in community colleges taking Α. college-level courses, full-time-equivalent students shall be defined and computed by the higher education department in the same manner in which it defines and computes full-timeequivalent students for all other college-level programs within its jurisdiction.

Β. No student shall be included in any calculations made under the provisions of this section if the student is enrolled in a course the cost of which is totally reimbursed 12 from federal, state or private sources.

The higher education department shall not C. recommend an appropriation greater than three hundred twenty-five dollars (\$325) for each full-time-equivalent student for any community college that levies a tax at a rate less than two dollars (\$2.00), unless a lower amount is required by operation of the rate limitation provisions of Section 7-37-7.1 NMSA 1978 upon a rate of at least two dollars (\$2.00) on each one thousand dollars (\$1,000) of net taxable value, as that term is defined in the Property Tax Code, or any community college that reduces a previously authorized tax levy, except as required by the operation of the rate limitation provisions of Section 7-37-7.1 NMSA 1978.

D. The higher education department shall require .174531.1GR - 5 -

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from the community college such reports as the department deems necessary for the purpose of determining the number of fulltime-equivalent students at the community college eligible to receive support under this section.

E. A community college board shall establish tuition and fee rates for its respective institutions for fulltime, part-time, resident and nonresident students, as defined by the higher education department.

A community college board may establish and F. grant gratis scholarships to students who are residents of New Mexico in an amount not to exceed the matriculation fee or tuition and fees, or both. The gratis scholarships are in addition to the lottery tuition scholarships authorized in Section 21-13-10 NMSA 1978 and shall be granted to the full extent of available funds before lottery tuition scholarships The number of scholarships established and are granted. granted pursuant to this subsection shall not exceed three percent of the preceding fall semester enrollment in each institution and shall not be established and granted for summer sessions. The president of each institution shall select and recommend to the community college board of the president's institution, as recipients of scholarships, students who possess good moral character and satisfactory initiative, scholastic standing and personality. [At least thirty-three and one-third percent] <u>All</u> of the gratis scholarships .174531.1GR

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established and granted by each community college board each year shall be granted on the basis of financial need.

G. A student in a home school or private school who meets the eligibility criteria in rules promulgated by the public education department and higher education department may apply for dual credit courses, provided that the student pays the full cost of dual credit courses."

Section 3. Section 21-14-5 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1957, Chapter 143, Section 4, as amended) is amended to read:

"21-14-5. FINANCING OF BRANCH COMMUNITY COLLEGES--TUITION AND FEE WAIVERS.--

A. Financing of branch community colleges shall be by tuition and fees, which shall be set by the board of regents of the parent institution, by gifts and grants and by other funds as may be made available pursuant to the provisions of the College District Tax Act or Chapter 21, Article 14 NMSA 1978.

B. The board of regents of the respective parent institution of the branch community college may establish and grant gratis scholarships to students of the branch community college who are residents of New Mexico in an amount not to exceed the matriculation fee or tuition and fees, or both. Except as provided in Section 21-1-4.3 NMSA 1978, the number of scholarships established and granted shall not exceed three percent of the preceding fall semester enrollment in the branch .174531.1GR

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1 community college and shall not be established and granted for 2 summer sessions. The president of each institution shall 3 select and recommend to the board of regents of [his] the 4 president's institution, as recipients of scholarships, 5 students who possess good moral character and satisfactory 6 initiative, scholastic standing and personality. [At least 7 thirty-three and one-third percent] All of the gratis 8 scholarships established and granted by the board of regents 9 for a branch community college each year shall be granted on 10 the basis of financial need."

Section 4. Section 21-16-10 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1968, Chapter 59, Section 3, as amended) is amended to read: "21-16-10. APPROPRIATION--DISTRIBUTION.--

A. The higher education department shall recommend an appropriation for each technical and vocational institute based upon its financial requirements in relation to its authorized program and its available funds from non-general fund sources; provided, the recommended appropriation shall be an amount not less than three hundred twenty-five dollars (\$325) for each full-time-equivalent student.

B. The higher education department shall by rule provide for the method for calculating the number of full-time-equivalent students in technical and vocational institutes. No student shall be included in any calculation of the number of full-time-equivalent students if the student is .174531.1GR

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1 enrolled in a course, the cost of which is totally reimbursed 2 from federal, state or private sources.

3 C. The higher education department shall not recommend an appropriation greater than three hundred twenty-five dollars (\$325) for each full-time-equivalent student for any technical and vocational institute that levies 7 a tax at a rate less than two dollars (\$2.00), unless a lower 8 amount is required by operation of the rate limitation provisions of Section 7-37-7.1 NMSA 1978 upon a rate approved 10 by the electors of at least two dollars (\$2.00) on each one 11 thousand dollars (\$1,000) of net taxable value, as that term is 12 defined in the Property Tax Code, or any technical and vocational institute that reduces a previously authorized tax levy, except as required by the operation of the rate 15 limitation provisions of Section 7-37-7.1 NMSA 1978.

The board may establish and grant gratis D. scholarships to students who are residents of New Mexico in an amount not to exceed the matriculation fee or tuition and fees, or both. The gratis scholarships are in addition to the lottery tuition scholarships authorized in Section 21-16-10.1 NMSA 1978 and shall be granted to the full extent of available funds before lottery tuition scholarships are granted. The number of scholarships established and granted pursuant to this subsection shall not exceed three percent of the preceding fall semester enrollment in the technical and .174531.1GR
