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8	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:	
9	Section 1. Section 22-10A-11 NMSA 1978 (being Laws	
10	2003, Chapter 153, Section 42, as amended by Laws 2007,	
11	Chapter 303, Section 1 and by Laws 2007, Chapter 304, Section	
12	2) is amended to read:	
13	"22-10A-11. LEVEL THREE LICENSURETRACKS FOR TEACHERS,	
14	COUNSELORS AND SCHOOL ADMINISTRATORS	
15	A. A level three-A license is a nine-year license	
16	granted to a teacher who meets the qualifications for that	
17	level and who annually demonstrates instructional leader	
18	competencies. If a level three-A teacher does not	
19	demonstrate essential competency in a given school year, the	
20	school district shall provide the teacher with additional	
21	professional development and peer intervention during the	
22	following school year. If by the end of that school year the	
23	teacher fails to demonstrate essential competency, a school	
24	district may choose not to contract with the teacher to teach	
25	in the classroom.	SI Pa

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1 Β. The department shall grant a level three-A 2 license to an applicant who has been a level two teacher for 3 at least three years and holds a post-baccalaureate degree or national board for professional teaching standards 4 5 certification; demonstrates instructional leader competence as required by the department and verified by the local 6 superintendent through the highly objective uniform statewide 7 standard of evaluation; and meets other qualifications for 8 the license. 9 C. With the adoption by the department of a highly 10 objective uniform statewide standard of evaluation for level 11 three-A teachers, the minimum salary for a level three-A 12 teacher for a standard nine and one-half month contract shall 13 be as follows: 14 15 (1) for the 2003-2004 school year, thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000); 16 (2) for the 2004-2005 school year, 17 thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000); 18 (3) for the 2005-2006 school year, forty 19 20 thousand dollars (\$40,000); for the 2006-2007 school year, (4) 21 forty-five thousand dollars (\$45,000); and 22 for the 2007-2008 school year, fifty (5)23 thousand dollars (\$50,000). 24 D. 1 granted to a school administrator who meets the 2 qualifications for that level. Licenses may be renewed upon 3 satisfactory annual demonstration of instructional leader and administrative competency. 4 5 Ε. The department shall grant a level three-B 6 license to an applicant who: holds a level two license and meets the 7 (1)8 requirements for a level three-A license or who holds a 9 current level two teacher's license and for at least four years, has held the highest-ranked counselor license as 10 provided in Chapter 22, Article 10A NMSA 1978 and rules 11 promulgated by the department; 12 (2) holds a post-baccalaureate degree or 13 national board for professional teaching standards 14 15 certification; 16 (3) has satisfactorily completed department-approved courses in administration and a 17 department-approved administration apprenticeship program; 18 and 19 20 (4) demonstrates instructional leader competence required by the department and verified by the 21 local superintendent through the highly objective uniform 22 statewide standard of evaluation. 23 Beginning with the 2007-2008 school year, the 24 F. minimum annual salary for a level three-B school principal or 25

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1 assistant school principal shall be fifty thousand dollars 2 (\$50,000) multiplied by the applicable responsibility factor. 3 G. By the beginning of the 2008-2009 school year, the department shall adopt a highly objective uniform 4 5 statewide standard of evaluation, which includes data sources 6 linked to student achievement and educational plan for student success progress, for level three-B school principals 7 and assistant school principals and rules for the 8 implementation of that evaluation system linked to the level 9 10 of responsibility at each school level." Section 2. A new section of the School Personnel Act is 11 enacted to read: 12 "LEVEL THREE-B PROVISIONAL LICENSURE FOR SCHOOL 13 PRINCIPALS.--14 15 Α. A school district that has a shortage of 16 qualified school principal candidates may request that the department issue a provisional three-B license to a level two 17 teacher whom the school district believes has the potential 18 to be an effective school principal. 19 20 Β. To qualify for a provisional three-B license, the candidate shall: 21 (1) meet the requirements for a level 22 three-A license; 23 be enrolled in a department-approved 24 (2) induction and mentoring program in the school district; and 25

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1	(3) be accepted into a department-approved	
2	school administrator preparation program.	
3	C. The provisional license is a four-year license	
4	and is not renewable. To maintain the provisional license,	
5	the licensee must receive satisfactory evaluations each year	
6	from the school district's mentoring program and from the	
7	school administrator preparation program. At the end of	
8	the four years, the provisional license may be converted to	
9	a regular level three-B license if the candidate:	
10	(1) satisfactorily completes the school	
11	district's mentoring program; and	
12	(2) satisfactorily completes the	
13	department-approved school administrator preparation
