"interoperability" means coordination of 6 critical information communication systems or networks, including radio and emergency coordination information 7 equipment, that are consistently operable with all relevant 8 local, state, tribal and federal agencies and first 9 10 responders." Section 3. A new section of Chapter 12 NMSA 1978 is 11 enacted to read: 12 "INTEROPERABILITY PLANNING COMMISSION--CREATED.--13 The "interoperability planning commission" is 14 Α. 15 created and administratively attached to the department. The interoperability planning commission is a 16 Β. permanent advisory commission created to advise and support 17 the department on emergency response and homeland security 18 activities relating to interoperability, the obtaining of 19 20 funding and the use of available funding. C. The commission consists of twelve members, 21 including: 22 (1) the lieutenant governor; 23 (2) the homeland security advisor; 24 (3) the secretary of information technology 25 SB 173 Page 2

1 or the secretary's designee; 2 the adjutant general or a representative (4) 3 from the department of military affairs; the secretary of energy, minerals and 4 (5) 5 natural resources or the secretary's designee; (6) the state fire marshal or the fire 6 marshal's designee; 7 (7) the secretary of Indian affairs or the 8 secretary's designee; 9 10 (8) the secretary of transportation or the secretary's designee; 11 (9) the secretary of health or the 12 secretary's designee; 13 the secretary of public safety or the (10) 14 15 secretary's designee; the executive director of the New 16 (11)Mexico municipal league or the executive director's designee; 17 and 18 (12) the executive director of the New 19 20 Mexico association of counties or the executive director's designee. 21 D. The commission shall appoint a chair and vice 22 chair from among its members. The commission shall meet at 23 the call of the chair but no less than two times each year. 24 Ε. Members of the commission, or their designees, 25

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7 "INTEROPERABILITY PLANNING COMMISSION--DUTIES.--The 8 interoperability planning commission shall advise the 9 department on:

A. the development and coordination of a statewide
interoperable emergency communications plan in compliance
with national incident management system guidelines,
including an integrated public safety radio communications
system and other coordinated critical information systems, to
achieve interoperability within and between local, state,
tribal and federal agencies and first responders;

B. implementation of the interoperable emergency
communications plan by state and local agencies and shall
provide specific directions for methods by which agencies
shall implement those strategies;

C. priorities relating to the interoperableemergency communications plan; and

D. other matters relating to planning,
development, coordination, promotion and implementation of
the interoperable emergency communications plan." SB 173

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Section 5. A new section of Chapter 12 NMSA 1978 is enacted to read:

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"INTEROPERABILITY--DEPARTMENT.--The department shall:

A. establish, implement and administer a statewide interoperable emergency communications plan and standards for a statewide integrated public safety radio communications system;

8 B. train representatives of entities in the state
9 that are involved in emergency response and homeland security
10 activities with respect to interoperability;

11 C. require that all radio communications at 12 emergency incidents adhere to the national incident 13 management system guidelines established by the federal 14 department of homeland security and statewide integrated 15 public safety radio communications standards;

D. use appropriated money, including money from relevant federal homeland security grants, for the purposes of designing and promulgating systems compliant with the standards established under Subsection A of this section and to enable the implementation and maintenance of a statewide interoperable public safety radio communications system; and

22 E. report annually to the appropriate interim23 legislative committee."
