1 A MEMORIAL COMMEMORATING THE LIFE OF MARY ANN VAUGHN AND DECLARING 2 3 APRIL 17, 2009 "MARY ANN VAUGHN DAY". 4 5 WHEREAS, Mary Ann Vaughn is descended from a proud line 6 of New Mexicans with roots spanning four decades in the state and more than nine generations in the nation; and 7 WHEREAS, Mary Ann Vaughn's descendants include Jacob 8 Meisser, who fought for Pennsylvania during the Revolutionary 9 10 War; and WHEREAS, Mary Ann Vaughn was born in Yokohama, Japan, on 11 April 17, 1949, and she was the only daughter of 12 James A. Vaughn of New Mexico and Vivienne Joy Wilson; and 13 WHEREAS, Vivienne Wilson and Mary Ann Vaughn were not 14 15 permitted to immigrate to the United States due to Vivienne's Swedish and Mary Ann's Japanese ancestry; and 16 WHEREAS, James Vaughn appealed to Senator Patrick 17 McCarren of Nevada to introduce private legislation in the 18 United States congress to allow the immigration of Vivienne 19 20 and Mary Ann; and WHEREAS, on August 5, 1950, congress passed a private 21 bill permitting Vivienne Wilson and Mary Ann Vaughn to 22 immigrate to the United States; and 23 WHEREAS, on the very day her immigration rights were 24

secured, Vivienne Wilson died in Tokyo, Japan, of

tuberculosis; and

WHEREAS, the infant, Mary Ann, was kidnapped by her nanny and held incommunicado in the slums of Yokohama, Japan, and was raised there; and

WHEREAS, the family of Vivienne Wilson discovered

Mary Ann's whereabouts and sought her custody and extradition
to Sweden, their country of residence; and

WHEREAS, the case of Lagerfelt v. Yamaguchi was brought on Mary Ann's behalf in the name of the king of Sweden in the Tokyo high court in 1956; and

WHEREAS, upon prevailing in the lawsuit, Mary Ann remained in the custody of the Swedish ambassador to Japan and attended the American school in Japan, graduating in the 1960s; and

WHEREAS, Mary Ann's New Mexico grandparents,
Osmar Andrew and Hester Ruby Vaughn of Questa, sought
tirelessly to locate her, but to no avail; and

WHEREAS, Mary Ann Vaughn, now known as Mrs. Marianne
Kuroda, also sought tirelessly to locate her family of origin
in the United States; and

WHEREAS, after fifty-four years, she located her family of origin from an obituary of her father in the *Albuquerque*Journal; and

WHEREAS, Mrs. Kuroda has finally been reunited with her New Mexico family and roots, and the New Mexico and Tokyo

1	branches of the Vaughn family have now grown together;	
2	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE	
3	STATE OF NEW MEXICO that the life of Mary Ann Vaughn be	
4	commemorated and that April 17, 2009 be declared "Mary Ann	
5	Vaughn Day" in honor of her sixtieth birthday; and	
6	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this memorial be	
7	transmitted to Mrs. Marianne Wilson Kuroda (Mary Ann Vaughn)	
8	of Kashiwa, Japan, and Mr. Akira Honda, the honorable mayor of
