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1 "child" means an individual under the age of Α. 2 eighteen years who is not emancipated; 3 "clearinghouse" means the missing persons Β. 4 information clearinghouse; 5 C. "custodian" means a parent, guardian or other 6 person who exercises legal physical control, care or custody of 7 a child; 8 "endangered person" means a missing person who: D. 9 is in imminent danger of causing harm to (1)10 the person's self; 11 (2) is in imminent danger of causing harm to 12 another; 13 (3) is in imminent danger of being harmed by 14 another or who has been harmed by another; [or] 15 (4) has been a victim of a crime as provided 16 in the Crimes Against Household Members Act or in Section 17 30-3A-3 or 30-3A-3.1 NMSA 1978, or their equivalents in any 18 other jurisdiction; 19 (5) is or was protected by an order of 20 protection pursuant to the Family Violence Protection Act; or 21 [(4)] (6) has Alzheimer's disease; 22 "immediate family member" means the spouse, [or] Ε. 23 nearest relative or close friend of a person; 24 "lead station" means an AM radio station that F. 25 has been designated as the "state primary station" by the .180219.2 - 2 -

G. "missing person" means a person whose whereabouts are unknown to the person's custodian or immediate family member and the circumstances of whose absence indicate that:

7 (1) the person did not leave the care and
8 control of the custodian or immediate family member voluntarily
9 and the taking of the person was not authorized by law; or

10 (2) the person voluntarily left the care and 11 control of the custodian without the custodian's consent and 12 without intent to return;

H. "missing person report" means information that is:

15 (1) given to a law enforcement agency on a
16 form used for sending information to the national crime
17 information center; and

(2) about a person whose whereabouts are unknown to the reporter and who is alleged in the form submitted by the reporter to be missing;

I. "person" means an individual, regardless of age;

J. "possible match" means the similarities between an unidentified body of a person and a missing person that would lead one to believe they are the same person;

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K. "reporter" means the person who reports a .180219.2

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1 missing person; and

2	L. "state agency" means an agency of the state, <u>a</u>
3	political subdivision of the state or <u>a</u> public post-secondary
4	educational institution."
5	Section 3. Section 29-15-7 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1995,
6	Chapter 146, Section 7, as amended) is amended to read:
7	"29-15-7. LAW ENFORCEMENT REQUIREMENTSMISSING PERSON
8	REPORTSUNIDENTIFIED BODIES
9	A. A law enforcement agency, upon receiving a
10	missing person report, shall:
11	(1) immediately start an appropriate
12	investigation to determine the present location of the missing
13	person and to determine whether the missing person is an
14	endangered person;
15	(2) provide to the clearinghouse all
16	information the law enforcement agency has relating to an
17	investigation regarding, or the location or identification of,
18	a missing person;
19	(3) immediately enter the name of the missing
20	person into the clearinghouse and the national crime
21	information center missing person file; and
22	(4) if the missing person is determined to be
23	an endangered person, [ <del>immediately</del> ] notify the department of
24	public safety immediately, within twelve hours of receiving the
25	report, in accordance with procedures prescribed by the
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1 department.

B. Information not immediately available shall be
obtained as soon as possible by the law enforcement agency and
entered into the clearinghouse and the national crime
information center file as a supplement to the original entry.

6 C. All New Mexico law enforcement agencies are 7 required to enter information about all unidentified bodies of 8 persons found in their jurisdiction into the clearinghouse and 9 the national crime information center unidentified person file, 10 including all available identifying features of the body and a 11 description of the clothing found on the body. If an 12 information entry into the national crime information center 13 file results in an automatic entry of the information into the 14 clearinghouse, the law enforcement agency is not required to 15 make a direct entry of that information into the clearinghouse."

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
