

1 A MEMORIAL

2 CELEBRATING TWENTY-FIVE YEARS OF NEW MEXICO MAIN STREET
3 ECONOMIC REVITALIZATION PROJECTS IN TRADITIONAL TOWN CENTERS,
4 COURTHOUSE SQUARES AND VILLAGE PLAZAS AND REQUESTING THE
5 GOVERNOR TO DECLARE AUGUST 14, 2010 "NEW MEXICO MAIN STREET
6 DAY".

8 WHEREAS, in the late 1970s, the national trust for
9 historic preservation developed the main street four-point
10 approach to commercial district revitalization, a
11 comprehensive strategy that encourages economic development
12 within the context of historic preservation; and

13 WHEREAS, in 1984, former Lieutenant Governor Mike
14 Runnels applied to the national trust for historic
15 preservation to establish, license and accredit New Mexico as
16 a state coordinating program in the national main street
17 network; and

18 WHEREAS, in 1985, the New Mexico legislature created and
19 funded the main street program in the economic development
20 department to assist local communities to implement this
21 strategy; and

22 WHEREAS, Sections 3-60B-1 through 3-60B-4 NMSA 1978
23 identify that "the purpose of the Main Street Act is to
24 provide for the revitalization of central business districts
25 in New Mexico communities based on the preservation and

1 rehabilitation of existing structures of unique historical
2 and architectural character and the development of
3 progressive marketing and management techniques as an
4 economic development strategy for local governments"; and

5 WHEREAS, Gallup, Las Vegas, Raton, Silver City and
6 Socorro, New Mexico, were the first five communities to
7 become main street community affiliates, followed by Aztec,
8 Bernalillo, Carlsbad, Clovis, Deming, Taos and Tucumcari in
9 1986 and by Roswell and Ruidoso in 1987; and

10 WHEREAS, over the past twenty-five years, thirty-three
11 New Mexico communities have been officially affiliated as
12 local main street projects within the New Mexico main street
13 state coordinating program with remarkable economic results;
14 and

15 WHEREAS, New Mexico main street communities have
16 rehabilitated historic railroad depots, libraries, hotels,
17 museums and neighborhoods in downtowns throughout New Mexico;
18 and

19 WHEREAS, since the program began, more than nine
20 thousand jobs and close to three thousand new businesses have
21 been created in New Mexico's main street programs; and

22 WHEREAS, in 2007, an initiative of Governor Bill
23 Richardson called the New Mexico arts and cultural district
24 program was established to enhance economic development by
25 placing an emphasis on the indigenous arts and culture of

1 each district administered by the New Mexico main street
2 program; and

3 WHEREAS, the downtown districts of Albuquerque, Las
4 Vegas, Los Alamos, Raton, Silver City and Taos are currently
5 participating in that initiative; and

6 WHEREAS, during their twenty-five-year history, New
7 Mexico main street communities have proven themselves as
8 dynamic revitalization engines in the state;

9 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE
10 STATE OF NEW MEXICO that twenty-five years of New Mexico main
11 street economic revitalization projects in traditional town
12 centers, courthouse squares and village plazas be celebrated;
13 and

14 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the governor be requested to
15 declare August 14, 2010 "New Mexico Main Street Day", and
16 that the economic development department recognize this day
17 and this anniversary with a symposium; and

18 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the main street communities
19 of New Mexico be recognized and applauded for their excellent
20 community economic development work through the main street
21 four-point approach; and

22 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the economic development
23 department be encouraged to continue its financial and
24 technical support of the main street program in New Mexico;
25 and

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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this memorial be transmitted to the governor and the secretary of economic development.
