Keller 5 6 7 8 FOR THE LEGISLATIVE EDUCATION STUDY COMMITTEE 9 10 AN ACT RELATING TO PUBLIC EDUCATION; REQUIRING THE PUBLIC EDUCATION 11 12 DEPARTMENT TO DEVELOP AND ADOPT A VOLUNTARY SYSTEM FOR AWARDING "DIPLOMA STAMPS" THAT RECOGNIZE A STUDENT'S OUTSTANDING WORK IN 13 14 SPECIFIED CAREER TECHNICAL EDUCATION COURSES; RECONCILING MULTIPLE AMENDMENTS TO THE SAME SECTION OF LAWS IN LAWS 2010. 15 16 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO: 17 18 SECTION 1. Section 22-13-1.1 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1986, 19 Chapter 33, Section 5, as amended by Laws 2010, Chapter 25, 20 Section 1 and by Laws 2010, Chapter 110, Section 1) is amended to read: 21 "22-13-1.1. GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS .--22 A. At the end of grades eight through eleven, each 23 student shall prepare an interim next-step plan that sets forth 24 the coursework for the grades remaining until high school 25 .183743.1

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graduation. Each year's plan shall explain any differences from previous interim next-step plans, shall be filed with the principal of the student's high school and shall be signed by the student, the student's parent and the student's guidance counselor or other school official charged with coursework planning for the student.

B. Each student must complete a final next-step plan during the senior year and prior to graduation. The plan shall be filed with the principal of the student's high school and shall be signed by the student, the student's parent and the student's guidance counselor or other school official charged with coursework planning for the student.

C. An individualized education program that meets the requirements of Subsections A and B of this section and that meets all applicable transition and procedural requirements of the federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act for a student with a disability shall satisfy the next-step plan requirements of this section for that student.

D. A local school board shall ensure that each high school student has the opportunity to develop a next-step plan based on reports of college and workplace readiness assessments, as available, and other factors and is reasonably informed about:

(1) curricular and course options, including honors or advanced placement courses, dual-credit courses, .183743.1

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1 distance learning courses, career clusters, pre-apprenticeship 2 programs or remediation programs that the college and workplace 3 readiness assessments indicate to be appropriate; opportunities available that lead to 4 (2) 5 different post-high-school options; and alternative opportunities available if the 6 (3) 7 student does not finish a planned curriculum. Ε. The secretary shall: 8 9 (1) establish specific accountability standards for administrators, counselors, teachers and school 10 district staff to ensure that every student has the opportunity 11 12 to develop a next-step plan; promulgate rules for accredited private (2) 13 schools in order to ensure substantial compliance with the 14 provisions of this section; 15 (3) monitor compliance with the requirements 16 of this section: and 17 compile such information as is necessary (4) 18 19 to evaluate the success of next-step plans and report annually, 20 by December 15, to the legislative education study committee and the governor. 21 F. Successful completion of a minimum of twenty-22 three units aligned to the state academic content and 23 performance standards shall be required for graduation. These 24 units shall be as follows: 25 .183743.1

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1 four units in English, with major emphasis (1) 2 on grammar and literature; (2) three units in mathematics, at least one 3 of which is equivalent to the algebra 1 level or higher; 4 (3) two units in science, one of which shall 5 have a laboratory component; provided, however, that with 6 7 students entering the ninth grade beginning in the 2005-2006 8 school year, three units in science shall be required, one of 9 which shall have a laboratory component; (4) three units in social science, which shall 10 include United States history and geography, world history and 11 12 geography and government and economics; (5) one unit in physical education; 13 one unit in communication skills or 14 (6) business education, with a major emphasis on writing and 15 speaking and that may include a language other than English; 16 one-half unit in New Mexico history for 17 (7) students entering the ninth grade beginning in the 2005-2006 18 19 school year; and 20 (8) nine elective units and seven and one-half elective units for students entering the ninth grade 21 in the 2005-2006 school year that meet department content and 22 performance standards. Student service learning shall be 23 offered as an elective. Financial literacy shall be offered as 24 an elective. Pre-apprenticeship programs may be offered as 25 .183743.1

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electives. Media literacy may be offered as an elective.

2 G. For students entering the ninth grade beginning in the 2009-2010 school year, at least one of the units 3 required for graduation shall be earned as an advanced placement or honors course, a dual-credit course offered in cooperation with an institution of higher education or a 7 distance learning course.

8 н. The department shall establish a procedure for 9 students to be awarded credit through completion of specified career technical education courses for certain graduation 10 requirements. 11

I. By the beginning of the 2012-2013 school year, the department shall establish a system to allow those school districts that choose to participate to award "diploma stamps" to be applied to the graduation diplomas of students who have excelled in the completion of specified career technical education courses.

[1.] J. Successful completion of the requirements of the New Mexico diploma of excellence shall be required for graduation for students entering the ninth grade beginning in the 2009-2010 school year. Successful completion of a minimum of twenty-four units aligned to the state academic content and performance standards shall be required to earn a New Mexico diploma of excellence. These units shall be as follows:

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four units in English, with major emphasis (1)

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1 on grammar, nonfiction writing and literature; 2 (2) four units in mathematics, of which one 3 shall be the equivalent to or higher than the level of algebra 2, unless the parent submitted written, signed permission for 4 5 the student to complete a lesser mathematics unit; and provided that a financial literacy course that meets state mathematics 6 7 academic content and performance standards shall qualify as one of the four required mathematics units; 8 9 (3) three units in science, two of which shall 10 have a laboratory component; (4) three and one-half units in social 11 12 science, which shall include United States history and geography, world history and geography, government and 13 economics and one-half unit of New Mexico history; 14 one unit in physical education; 15 (5) one unit in one of the following: 16 (6) a career cluster course, workplace readiness or a language 17 other than English; and 18 19 (7) seven and one-half elective units that 20 meet department content and performance standards. Student service learning shall be offered as an elective. Financial 21 literacy shall be offered as an elective. Pre-apprenticeship 22 programs may be offered as electives. Media literacy may be 23 offered as an elective. 24 [J.] K. For students entering the eighth grade in 25 .183743.1

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1 the 2012-2013 school year, a course in health education is 2 required prior to graduation. Health education may be required in either middle school or high school, as determined by the 3 school district. Each school district shall submit to the 4 department by the beginning of the 2011-2012 school year a 5 health education implementation plan for the 2012-2013 and 6 7 subsequent school years, including in which grade health 8 education will be required and how the course aligns with 9 department content and performance standards.

[K.] L. Final examinations shall be administered to all students in all classes offered for credit.

[L.] M. Until July 1, 2010, a student who has not passed a state graduation examination in the subject areas of reading, English, mathematics, writing, science and social science shall not receive a high school diploma. The state graduation examination on social science shall include a section on the constitution of the United States and the constitution of New Mexico. If a student exits from the school system at the end of grade twelve without having passed a state graduation examination, the student shall receive an appropriate state certificate indicating the number of credits earned and the grade completed. If within five years after a student exits from the school system the student takes and passes the state graduation examination, the student may receive a high school diploma. Any student passing the state .183743.1

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graduation examination and completing all other requirements within five years of entering ninth grade, including a final summer session if completed by August 1, may be counted by the school system in which the student is enrolled as a high school graduate for the year in which completion and examination occur.

7 [M.] N. Beginning with the 2010-2011 school year, a student shall not receive a New Mexico diploma of excellence if 8 9 the student has not demonstrated competence in the subject areas of mathematics, reading and language arts, writing, 10 social studies and science, including a section on the 11 constitution of the United States and the constitution of New 12 Mexico, based on a standards-based assessment or assessments or 13 14 a portfolio of standards-based indicators established by the department by rule. The standards-based assessments required 15 in Section 22-2C-4 NMSA 1978 may also serve as the assessment 16 required for high school graduation. If a student exits from 17 the school system at the end of grade twelve without having 18 19 satisfied the requirements of this subsection, the student 20 shall receive an appropriate state certificate indicating the number of credits earned and the grade completed. If within 21 five years after a student exits from the school system the 22 student satisfies the requirement of this subsection, the 23 student may receive a New Mexico diploma of excellence. Any 24 student satisfying the requirements of this subsection and 25 .183743.1

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completing all other requirements within five years of entering ninth grade, including a final summer session if completed by August 1, may be counted by the school system in which the student is enrolled as a high school graduate for the year in which all requirements are satisfied.

 $[N_{\cdot}]$ <u>O.</u> As used in this section:

(1) "final next-step plan" means a next-step
plan that shows that the student has committed or intends to
commit in the near future to a four-year college or university,
a two-year college, a trade or vocational program, an
internship or apprenticeship, military service or a job;

(2) "interim next-step plan" means an annual next-step plan in which the student specifies post-high-school goals and sets forth the coursework that will allow the student to achieve those goals; and

(3) "next-step plan" means an annual personal written plan of studies developed by a student in a public school or other state-supported school or institution in consultation with the student's parent and school counselor or other school official charged with coursework planning for the student that includes one or more of the following:

(a) advanced placement or honorscourses;

(b) dual-credit courses offered in cooperation with an institution of higher education;

3	(e) pre-apprenticeship programs.
