SUMMARY

Synopsis of Senate Judiciary Committee Amendment

The House Judiciary Committee amendment to House Bill 391 strikes the reference to Section 31-19-1 NMSA 1978, making the penalty for conviction of leaving a gate open a misdemeanor with a fine ranging from not less than \$250 nor more than \$1,000.

Synopsis of House Judiciary Committee Amendment

The House Judiciary Committee amendment to House Bill 391 clarifies the penalty for conviction as a fine ranging from not less than \$250 or more than \$1,000.

House Bill 391/aHJC/aSJC – Page 2

Synopsis of Original Bill

House Bill 391 proposes to amend Section 77-16-15 NMSA 1978 to increase the penalty for leaving a gate open. The current penalty is a fine of not less than five nor more than ten dollars, and the proposed penalty is a minimum fine of \$1,000.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

Article XII Section 4 of the Constitution of New Mexico would determine that any fines collected under this statute would go to the common school fund. There is no readily available data on the annual number of violations of this statute, the revenue estimate is therefore very conservative.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

Livestock let loose as a result of a gate left open pose a public safety hazard for motorists. The injury or death of motorists due to collisions with livestock can result in the Department of Transportation being found liable for damages, and ranchers suffer the economic losses for injured or dead livestock.
