SUMMARY

Synopsis of Bill

Senate Bill 484 provides for an alternative method for the allocation of authorized gaming machines. The bill would amend the Gaming Control Act within 60-2E-27 to allow tribe or pueblo that is a party to a tribal-state class III gaming compact to engage in gaming activity to allocate gaming machines to horse racetrack gaming operators.

The GCB indicates that the enactment of Senate Bill 484 would increase the maximum number of gaming machines permitted to be operated in the state from 3,600 (600 machines x 6 racetracks) to 4,500 (750 machines x 6 racetracks).

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

According to GCB the enactment of Senate Bill 484 could represent an expansion of gaming and might permit the compacted tribes to cease revenue-sharing payments to the state.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

Also, GCB state that the bill could constitute an expansion of gaming under the state/tribal gaming compacts. This bill would require any tribe leasing gaming machines to a racetrack gaming operator to be licensed as a distributor under the Gaming Control Act.
