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15	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:
16	SECTION 1. Section 22-2E-2 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 2011,
17	Chapter 10, Section 2) is amended to read:
18	"22-2E-2. DEFINITIONSAs used in the A-B-C-D-F Schools
19	Rating Act:
20	A. "growth" means learning a year's worth of
21	knowledge in one year's time, which is demonstrated by a
22	student's performance on New Mexico standards-based assessments
23	that [ <del>shows</del> ] <u>demonstrates that</u> the student:
24	(1) [moving] <u>has moved</u> from one performance
25	level to a higher performance level;
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1 (2) [maintaining] has maintained a proficient 2 or advanced proficient performance level as provided by 3 department rule; or [remaining] has remained in beginning step 4 (3) 5 or nearing proficient performance level but [improving] has improved a number of scale score points as specified by 6 7 department rule; [and] "school options" means a right to transfer to 8 Β. 9 any public school not rated an F in the state or to have children continue their schooling through distance learning 10 offered through the statewide or a local cyber academy; and 11 12 C. "supplemental accountability model school" means a public school whose enrollment includes at least seventy-five 13 14 percent of any combination of the following: (1) students with a history or family history 15 of incarceration or extended or significant involvement in a 16 17 court system; (2) students with a history of gang 18 19 involvement; 20 (3) students who are pregnant or have one or more children; 21 (4) students with a history of physical or 22 mental health issues, including abuse, neglect, domestic 23 violence, drug or alcohol use, disease or chronic or severe 24 medical conditions; 25 .191010.1

21	A. All public schools shall be graded annually by
22	the department.
23	B. The department shall assign a letter grade of A,
24	B, C, D or F to each public school pursuant to criteria
25	established by department rules, after input from the
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1 secretary's superintendents' council, that include as a minimum 2 a combination of the following factors in a public school's 3 grade: for elementary and middle schools other 4 (1) 5 than supplemental accountability model schools: (a) student proficiency, including 6 7 achievement on the New Mexico standards-based assessments; 8 student growth in reading and (b) 9 mathematics; and (c) growth of the lowest twenty-fifth 10 percentile of students in the public school in reading and 11 12 mathematics; and for high schools other than supplemental (2) 13 accountability model schools: 14 student proficiency, including (a) 15 achievement on the New Mexico standards-based assessments; 16 student growth in reading and 17 (b) mathematics; 18 19 (c) growth of the lowest twenty-fifth percentile of students in the high school in reading and 20 mathematics; and 21 (d) additional academic indicators such 22 as high school graduation rates, growth in high school 23 graduation rates, advanced placement and international 24 baccalaureate courses, dual enrollment courses and SAT and ACT 25 .191010.1 - 4 -

2	C. The department shall assign a letter grade of A,
3	<u>B, C, D or F to each supplemental accountability model school</u>
4	pursuant to the following modified assessment formula:
5	(1) the current standing of the school shall
6	<u>be weighted ten points;</u>
7	(2) the growth of the top seventy-five percent
8	of students shall be weighted twenty points;
9	(3) the growth of the bottom twenty-five
10	percent of students shall be weighted twenty points;
11	(4) the results of the opportunity to learn
12	survey shall be weighted twenty points;
13	(5) the graduation rate shall be weighted ten
14	points; and
15	(6) the college and career readiness of
16	students shall be weighted twenty points.
17	$[C_{\bullet}]$ <u>D.</u> The New Mexico standards-based assessments
18	used for rating a school are those administered annually to
19	students in grades three, four, five, six, seven, eight, nine
20	and eleven pursuant to Section 22-2C-4 NMSA 1978.
21	$[D_{\bullet}] = E_{\bullet}$ In addition to any rights a parent may have
22	pursuant to federal law, the parent of a student enrolled in a
23	public school rated F for two of the last four years has the
24	right to transfer the student in the same grade to any public
25	school in the state not rated F or the right to have the
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student continue schooling by means of distance learning offered through the statewide or a local cyber academy. The school district or charter school in which the student is enrolled is responsible for the cost of distance learning.

 $[\underline{E} \cdot ] \underline{F} \cdot$  The department shall ensure that a local school board or governing body of a charter school is prioritizing resources of a public school rated D or F toward proven programs and methods linked to improved student achievement until the public school earns a grade of C or better for two consecutive years.

[F-] <u>G.</u> The school options available pursuant to the A-B-C-D-F Schools Rating Act are in addition to any remedies provided for in the Assessment and Accountability Act for students in schools in need of improvement or any other interventions prescribed by the federal No Child Left Behind Act of 2001."

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
