SUMMARY

Synopsis of Bill

Senate Bill 200 appropriates \$270 thousand from the general fund to the 6th Judicial District Court for the purpose of providing funding to the restorative justice program in that district.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

The appropriation of \$270 thousand contained in this bill is a recurring expense to the general fund. Any unexpended or unencumbered balance remaining at the end of FY14 shall revert to the general fund.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

The 6th judicial district has received general funding since 2005 for juvenile and adult restorative justice services in the three counties in its jurisdiction. The 6th currently has \$245.8 thousand in its base budget for this purpose and distributes \$100 thousand to Luna County, \$100 thousand to Grant County, and \$45 thousand to Hidalgo County annually; the counties use that money to fund mediation, community conferencing, and justice circles for adult and juvenile offenders.

The judiciary's unified budget does not include a request from the 6^{th} Judicial District for additional funding for the juvenile and adult restorative justice services it already funds, nor is the 6^{th} aware of the need for additional funds for such services in its jurisdiction.

The 6th Judicial District was unaware of this bill and did not participate in its construction.
