SUMMARY

Synopsis of Bill

Senate Bill 345 (SB 345) amends NMSA1978, Section 66-8-138, proposing changes to the scope of the prohibition on open alcohol containers in motor vehicles. The bill creates a new express exception to the prohibition for any passenger in a bus, taxicab, or limousine, while deleting exceptions for (i) a person carrying alcoholic beverages for medicinal purposes and (ii), a clergyman transporting alcohol for religious purposes.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

The main thrust of SB 345 is to allow for alcohol consumption by passengers of vehicles for hire that are licensed to transport passengers. This would allow people to consume alcohol in chartered busses and limousines. It would not apply to public transportation vehicles (which are not for hire).

The removal of the exemptions for people who carry alcoholic beverages for medicinal or religious purposes clarifies that open containers can be carried in a motor vehicle but not within the area occupied by the driver and passengers such as the utility or glove compartment.
