SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

According to the Fish and Wildlife Service, Valle de Oro offers a unique environmental education and recreation opportunity in a highly populated area while promoting a wildlife conservation message. Located in Albuquerque's South Valley, Valle de Oro is within a half-hour drive of one-half of New Mexico's population. To date, 431 acres of land along the Rio Grande have been protected for the new wildlife refuge, including significant water rights to address restoration of the Middle Rio Grande. The refuge will eventually encompass 570 acres.
