17	SECTION 1. Section 22-8-18 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1974,
18	Chapter 8, Section 8, as amended) is amended to read:
19	"22-8-18. PROGRAM COST CALCULATIONLOCAL

21	A. The total program units for the purpose of
22	computing the program cost shall be calculated by multiplying
23	the sum of the program units itemized as Paragraphs (1) through

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1 childhood, special, bilingual multicultural, fine arts and 2 vocational education and other remedial or enrichment programs. It is the responsibility of the local school board or governing 3 body of a charter school to determine its priorities in terms 4 5 of the needs of the community served by that board. Except as otherwise provided in this section, funds generated under the 6 7 Public School Finance Act are discretionary to local school 8 boards and governing bodies of charter schools; provided that 9 the special program needs as enumerated in this section are met; and provided [however] further that if a public school has 10 been rated D or F for two consecutive years, the department 11 12 shall ensure that the local school board or governing body of a charter school is prioritizing resources for the public school 13 14 toward proven programs and methods linked to improved student achievement until the public school earns a C or better for two 15 consecutive years." 16

SECTION 2. Section 22-8-23.9 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 2013, Chapter 113, Section 1) is amended to read:

"22-8-23.9. HOME [SCHOOLED] SCHOOL STUDENT PROGRAM UNITS.--Notwithstanding the provision in Section 22-8-2 NMSA 1978 defining a qualified student as one who is regularly enrolled in one-half or more of the minimum course requirements approved by the department for public school students, home [schooled] school students may take one or more classes at public schools and, if so, shall generate program units as .195207.1

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1 provided in this section. The home [schooled] school student 2 program unit for a school district is determined by multiplying the number of home [schooled] school students who are enrolled 3 4 in one or more classes by the cost differential factor 0.25 per 5 class per <u>home school</u> student up to the enrollment required for the <u>home school</u> student to meet the definition of "qualified 6 7 student". The home [schooled] school student program units shall be paid to the school district in which they are 8 generated. A home [schooled] school student is eligible to 9 enroll in a public school in the attendance zone in which the 10 student resides or in another public school outside the 11 12 attendance zone as provided in Section 22-1-4 NMSA 1978. The school district shall verify each home [schooled] school 13 student's academic and other eligibility to enroll in the 14 class." 15 - 4 -16

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
