11	REQUESTING THE LEGISLATIVE FINANCE COMMITTEE TO STUDY NEW
12	APPROACHES TO FAMILY-WORK SUPPORT PROGRAMS.
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14	WHEREAS, it is in the public interest to pursue the common
15	good so that all families in this state have improved access to
16	economic and educational opportunities that help families
17	achieve self-sufficiency and financial security while reducing
18	the number of families living in poverty; and
19	WHEREAS, more and more middle-class families are living
20	paycheck to paycheck, especially in these very difficult
21	economic times; and
22	WHEREAS, as of 2012, nearly thirty percent of children in
23	New Mexico live in poverty; and
24	WHEREAS, more states are recognizing that reducing poverty
25	is a critical economic development issue that requires
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strategic, integrated and comprehensive approaches that create opportunities for families to achieve economic success, including creating quality jobs, providing work supports, promoting greater collaboration with the private sector and implementing targeted tax policies; and

WHEREAS, an assessment of current state policies and practices within the human services department, the public education department, the higher education department, the department of health, the taxation and revenue department, the workforce solutions department and the New Mexico mortgage finance authority could promote economic opportunity and poverty reduction by revealing inconsistencies across agencies that determine eligibility for individuals and families to move up the economic ladder; and

WHEREAS, working parents who receive a minor increase in income, making them ineligible for various programs that allow them to work, such as child care assistance, transportation, food stamps and free and reduced-fee school lunches, face the "cliff effect" and disincentives for achieving selfsufficiency; and

WHEREAS, an examination of evidence-based solutions used in other states may reveal significant efforts to reduce poverty as well as to mitigate the cliff effect;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO that the legislative finance committee be .198165.1

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requested to assess the state's current practices that promote economic opportunity and poverty reduction and develop a strategic, integrated and comprehensive plan to mitigate the cliff effect; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in the legislative finance committee's assessment, the committee consult with the human services department, the public education department, the higher education department, the department of health, the taxation and revenue department, the workforce solutions department and the New Mexico mortgage finance authority; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in the legislative finance committee's assessment, the committee consult with recipients, advocates and providers with experience in job support and welfare-to-work programs; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the legislative finance committee evaluate and make recommendations on:

A. identifying best policies and practices that build family assets and financial stability;

B. making work pay through the use of fair and sustainable targeted tax policies;

C. expanding the work force with quality jobs that meet private sector needs;

D. assessing work support issues, such as child care, transportation, nutrition and housing needs of families;

E. creating a coordinated effort among state

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1	agencies to develop policies on education, health care,
2	housing, income, child care, nutrition and transportation that
3	are consistent and create incentives for self-sufficiency; and
4	F. identifying those policies and regulations that
5	conflict with the goal of self-sufficiency; and
6	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the legislative finance
7	committee prepare a report, including the above
8	recommendations, and provide the report to the appropriate
9	legislative interim committees by December 2015; and
10	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this memorial be
11	transmitted to the president pro tempore of the senate and to
12	the director of the legislative finance committee.
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
