A MEMORIAL

REQUESTING RECOGNITION AND EXPLORATION OF THE POSSIBLE ECONOMIC BENEFITS OF BUILDING A MULTIPURPOSE ARENA IN DOWNTOWN ALBUQUERQUE.

WHEREAS, the Albuquerque metropolitan area is a vibrant and rapidly evolving urban market; and

WHEREAS, the area has a population of more than nine hundred thousand residents and is currently growing at a steady pace of one or two percent a year, according to city of Albuquerque economic development department statistics; and

WHEREAS, Albuquerque boasts a temperate climate with more than three hundred days of sunshine a year, which makes it an ideal location for outdoor activities and entertainment; and

WHEREAS, Albuquerque city government has taken recent steps to reinvigorate Albuquerque's downtown corridor with a multifaceted plan that focuses on building, renovating and reimagining many areas of downtown; and

WHEREAS, projects are already underway for renovation of the convention center, reconstruction of an element on civic plaza and expansion of Albuquerque's burgeoning entertainment district; and

WHEREAS, the inclusion of a multipurpose arena as a

sports and entertainment venue would greatly enhance the reinvigoration of Albuquerque's downtown corridor and provide positive economic benefits; and

WHEREAS, migration and growth patterns within the metropolitan area make downtown Albuquerque an excellent location for a new multipurpose arena as it provides accessibility to residents of the entire metropolitan area and is at the intersection of primary north-south and east-west interstates; and

WHEREAS, multipurpose arenas attract people throughout the year by offering sporting events, concerts, entertainment, job fairs and conventions; and

WHEREAS, multipurpose arenas sustain the local economy, and cities benefit from a year-round economic impact; and

WHEREAS, often, multipurpose arenas are connected to other venues, such as hotels and conferencing; shopping malls and education; and training facilities, which provide additional revenue opportunities; and

WHEREAS, a multipurpose arena provides the economic advantage of a singular infrastructure and piece of real estate that can support more than one team or event; and

WHEREAS, a multipurpose arena could host minor league hockey, indoor soccer or other sports and could target an arena football franchise; and

WHEREAS, the Albuquerque area has the economic capacity

to support a major league sports team, according to a recent analysis by American City Business Journals; and

WHEREAS, eighty-three markets in the United States and Canada were analyzed to determine if they had the financial ability to support new teams in baseball, football, basketball, hockey and soccer; and

WHEREAS, the analysis found that the greater metropolitan area, which includes Albuquerque, Rio Rancho and Santa Fe, has the economic capacity to support a major league sports team such as a soccer team; and

WHEREAS, many metropolitan area governments have taken advantage of the economic benefits of building multipurpose arenas in their downtown areas, including the Chesapeake Energy arena in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma; the Jon M. Huntsman center in Salt Lake City, Utah; the Sleep Train arena in Sacramento, California; the Moda center in Portland, Oregon; the SAP center at San Jose, California; the Thomas & Mack center in Las Vegas, Nevada; the BOK center in Tulsa, Oklahoma; the CenturyLink center in Omaha, Nebraska; the Wells Fargo arena in Des Moines, Iowa; and the Pinnacle Bank arena in Lincoln, Nebraska; and

WHEREAS, the Duke City Gladiators arena football team plays at several multipurpose arenas with smaller city populations than Albuquerque, including the United Wireless arena in Dodge City, Kansas; the Allen event center in Allen,
